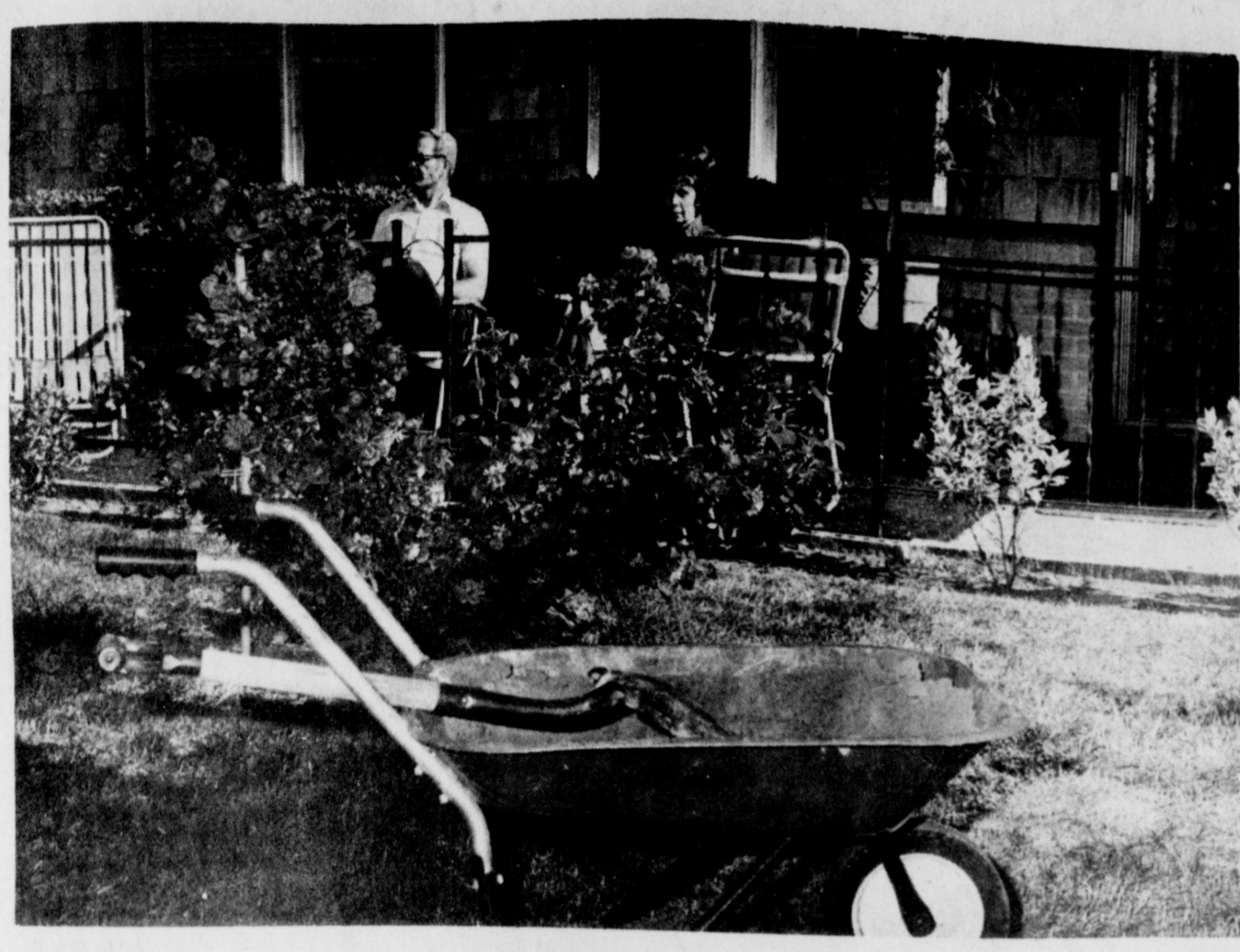

# Pot gardeners charged; speeders clogging court

A drug bust here resulted in two Iowa Park residents being charged with possession of marijuana, and an increase in speeding citations points toward another heavy municipal court docket today.

The drug raid occurred late last Thursday afternoon at 305 W. Ruby where Iowa Park police officers found marijuana seeds, marijuana plants growing in a backyard garden plot, and several capsules and pills of "a dandestine nature," according to police reports.

Arrested in the raid and later charged with the Class A misdemeanor of possession of marijuana were Merrill Guinn Moser and Willie Moser, according to the county attorney's office.

The municipal court docket was a little thicker than usual last week, and it will be thicker today as the Iowa Park police department enforces an earlier vow to crack down on traffic violators.

Twenty-three persons were convicted of speeding violations in municipal court last week, and the

court docket indicates more than 30 persons will be up against the same charge when court is held this morning.

"There's just been entirely too much running stop signs and speeding," Jim Voyles, police chief, said.

"We're going to get rough on them if they don't stop it," Voyles said.

Explaining the apparent loss of respect here for speed limits, Voyles said officers on one shift wrote more than 20 citations in less than three hours.

And while the traffic docket is increasing, Voyles said incidents of traffic mishaps have dropped dramatically. Officers have investigated only one significant wreck this month, he said.

In other action, police investigated the reported theft of two tires and wheels from a three-ton horse trailer parked at the high school FFA barn on East Ruby. Reported by Dennis Brooks on Monday, the tires and wheels were valued at \$250.

C.A. Hicks, 415 Aldine, told police Sunday that someone had broken the windshield, back window and driver's window of a vehicle parked at his home.

Wanda Scobee at Scobee's Mini Mart at 322 W. Highway told officers last Friday that two young boys entered the store and were examining knives in a display case when she turned to wait on another customer.

While she was turned the boys grabbed a lock-blade knife valued at \$9.95 and fled the store.

# Purchase, remodeling, contracts city topics

The Iowa Park city council Monday night voted to purchase a new backhoe and advertise for bids to remodel the city hall, and also made changes in a water purchase contract submitted by Wichita Falls.

Consideration of purchasing a backhoe took more of the council's time during the meeting than any other subject. Three suppliers had submitted bids, with Case being the lowest bid.

Not wishing to make a decision on which unit to purchase that night, council members voted to buy a unit, but wait until a committee made recommendations at the next meeting before deciding which bid to accept.

Aldermen Bud Adams and Bill Gilmore were named to the committee. The new backhoe will replace a 10-year-old unit for the sewer and water department which would require some \$5,800 to repair. The city has another backhoe which was purchased six years ago for the street department. Both have been used extensively and both departments need backhoes, according to Charlie Helms, head of the street department.

### REMODELING

Bids will be sought for remodeling of the city hall. They apparently will be opened for the June 14 meeting, since it was decided not to meet May 28, Memorial Day.

- Listed as items to be done were:
- \* Installation of carpet throughout city hall with linoleum placed in the front lobby, vault and rest rooms.
- \* Installation of six inches insulation in the attic.
- \* Installation of keyed lock and aluminum threshold on front door.
- \* Installation of approximately 50 feet of four-inch black base board.
- \* Applying two coats of Thompson water seal on front canopy of council chambers.
- \* Installing of seven storm windows.
- \* Cleaning and painting of all windows, two outside doors, and four garage doors.
- \* Filling in of open joints in brick and tile wall on storage room.
- \* Reinforcing corner of storage room where floor has dropped down, with approximately half yard of concrete and steel.
- \* Close in two outside restroom doors with wood, wall and brick, and open the rooms to inside rooms.

### WATER CONTRACT

Council members took exception to certain portions of a contract offered by the Wichita Falls city council, under which Iowa Park is to purchase treated water at 50 cents per thousand gallons, with a maximum daily purchase of two-million gallons.

Primarily their objection was a phrase which stated Wichita Falls would establish a rate April 30th of

each year and submit it to Iowa Park. There was no mention that Iowa Park might want to negotiate the contract.

Secondly, the contract called for inclusion of a "reservoir capacity charge", which means Wichita Falls would charge extra for not selling that water in its reservoirs which has been designated for sale to Iowa park.

Changes were made in the contract and sent back to Wichita Falls for consideration.

### POLICE PROTECTION

Neil McMullen, president of Mowrey Gun Works, asked the council for police protection at his manufacturing plant which is located on FM 368 in the south part of town.

He acknowledged locating in an area which was not inside the city limits and that it was surrounded on three sides by the city. He asked if he might purchase police protection.

McMullen said he had been connected with the police station with a security alarm, and it had been disconnected without his being informed. He also said he had been receiving trash service, which also had been discontinued.

The manufacturer indicated everyone had been very interested in his moving his plant here from Olney, but it seemed interest had been lost now that it had been accomplished.

Mayor Johnny Crawford apologized for the lack of communication concerning city services, but pointed out the law prohibits any city police protection outside the city limits. He encouraged McMullen to petition for annexation.

Crawford said the disconnecting of the security alarm system was "handled poorly" but it was not done with council knowledge.

### OTHER BUSINESS

Other action taken by the council was:

- \* Deny a request to rework a section of Lincoln Street at a cost of some \$1,100 to permit water to drain from a driveway.
- \* Approved advertising for sale a 1977 model Plymouth police department cruiser.

## New business opening Friday

After months of preparation, a new business will formally open for business Friday in Iowa Park.

Located at 117 E. Cash is Cook's Classic Corral, a firm which reconditions "classic" automobiles for resale.

Mr. and Mrs. J.E. Cook have spent several months preparing the building, which for many years was the location of The Famous Department Store.

\* Approved designation of Block 182, city owned, as Rotary Park. The site is near Bradford Elementary and has been improved by the civic organization.

\* Approved a change in city employee insurance, costing 88 cents per employee per month.

\* Rejected an appeal by the Masonic Lodge to discontinue trash service, and monthly fee.

\* Suggested an amendment to the city trash ordinance be made which would permit administering a fine to any non-resident depositing trash in city containers.

## Iowa Park to be honored at Sheppard AFB tomorrow

Iowa Park will be among 19 Texas and Oklahoma communities recognized Friday afternoon at Sheppard AFB as part of the base's Enhanced Participation in Communities program (EPIC).

Each community is slated to be honored with a formal aircraft

dedication. Aircraft are used at Sheppard for training purposes and will each carry the name of the given community.

Unveiling of the aircraft will begin at 3:10 p.m. near Building 1010. It will be preceded with a welcoming address by Maj. Gen. Charles L. Donnelly, center commander, and a center mission briefing.

Dedication ceremonies are scheduled to conclude with performances by the Sheppard Drum and Bugle Corps and Drill Team and a formal parade. A reception will follow at the Recreation Center, Building 430, beginning at 4:30.

Iowa Park will be carried on the

side of an F-15 jet fighter.

Wichita Falls and Burkburnett will be on B-52 aircraft; Waurika, Archer City and Nocona on T-38s.

Four F-111 aircraft will carry names of Graham, Vernon, Duncan and Frederick. The communities of

Seymour, Olney, Electra, Jacksboro and Marlow will be printed on F-4 aircraft.

Bowie, Henrietta and Walters are to be honored with A-7 aircraft while Montague will have a T-37 dedicated to it.

# Cook of the Week

Pies were important menu items in the 18th century cooking and seem to be equally as important today. It was during this period that most of the traditional recipes evolved. Puddings, mainstays of Colonial menus, were transformed into pies for guests. Baked puddings, such as custards, were prepared in round pastry "coffins" without top crusts - forerunner of modern custard pies.

There are many new recipes and versions today to wake up the family's taste buds, but many of the traditional recipes are still popular. Shirley (Mrs. Jimmy) Banks shares three of her pie recipes with us this week, two of which are modern and one, Buttermilk Pie, was a favorite of many of our grandmothers.

Shirley and Jimmy and their three children moved back to Iowa Park about two years ago from Seymour where they had lived for 17 years. He is general manager of Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2 and she is presently working as bookkeeper for an automotive agency.

A graduate of Iowa Park High School, Shirley was very active in the church, club, school and civic affairs at Seymour. She worked for the City of Seymour for two years. She was a member of the Ogden Home Demonstration Club and was named Outstanding Clubwoman of Baylor County. She helped organize and coached the Little Dribblers basketball team. She worked as a volunteer for the National Weather Service for 17 years.

Shirley's other activities included teaching a Sunday School class of high school girls and serving as Girls Auxiliary director in First Baptist Church where the family belonged. She served as P-TA president and directed the organization's talent shows for four years. She was also a member of the Band Boosters. She is secretary of the Iowa Park Band Boosters Club.

Jimmy and Shirley and their children Jimmy Jr., a freshman at Midwestern State University, Beverly, a senior and Tamela, a freshman at Iowa Park High School, are members of First Baptist Church.

sorts of handcraft. She also enjoys water skiing and skating. She has a reputation of being a good cook and is famous for her Brandied Fruit Cake at Christmas.

#### BUTTERMILK PIE

1 1/4 cups sugar  
3 eggs  
1/2 cup buttermilk  
1/2 stick butter  
1 t vanilla  
1 1/2 T lemon juice  
Unbaked pie shell.  
Mix all ingredients together well and pour in unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

#### CHICKEN TURNOVERS

1/2 lb. oleo  
1/2 lb. cream cheese  
2 cups flour  
2 cans Underwood's chicken spread  
Mix oleo, cream cheese and flour well. Chill about 2 hours. Roll on floured board very thin. Cut in circles with a can chicken spread was in. Place dot of chicken spread in center, fold over and crimp edges. Bake at 400 degrees for 12 minutes.

#### MILLION DOLLAR PIE

1 Graham Cracker pie crust (9 inch)  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
9 oz. carton Cool Whip  
1 can Eagle Brand Milk  
1 cup crushed pineapple

350 degrees for 1 hour or a little longer. Makes a thick crust but is real moist on the inside. Use a tube greased and floured pan.

#### BRANDIED FRUIT

Start with one cup sugar and one cup fruit. Let set two weeks, allowing two weeks before each addition, always add in this order: Pineapple tidbits or chunk, cut in half  
Sliced peaches, cut in chunks  
Maraschino cherries, cut in halves

Things to remember:  
Do not add fruit more often than once every two weeks and always add 1 cup of sugar to each cup of fruit.

Never, never refrigerate. Keep in a warm spot, close to an oven or range top. Never put lid on lightly for fear of explosion. The apothecary jars are ideal because there is room for expansion in them. Stir occasionally to help keep sugar dissolved.

Note: The fruit is very good over ice cream and for a glaze for the cake made by combining it with powdered sugar. It makes a plain cake an easy elegant dessert, too.

#### GARLIC CHEESE ROLL

1 - 8 oz. triangle sharp cheddar cheese  
1 small pkg. cream cheese  
1 lb. processed cheese  
1 t red pepper, grated  
3 to 4 cloves garlic, well grated  
Paprika  
Chopped pecans

Let cheese set at room temperature. Grate sharp cheddar cheese. Mix with other cheeses by hand. Apply red pepper and cloves of garlic. Roll into two rolls. Roll in paprika, and then in pecans. Wrap in wax paper and refrigerate. Slice and serve on crackers and garnish if desired.

#### CHERRY-O CREAM CHEESE PIE

2 cans Eagle Brand milk

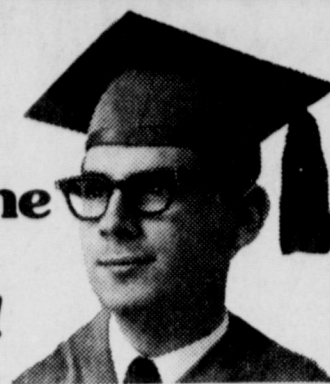

Major Horsky, a native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, was pilot of a C-123 airlift support mission in support of Republic of Vietnam troops Dec. 11, 1965 when his aircraft was downed.

Major Horsky's widow, the former Joan Woodford of Cedar Rapids who now resides in the Phoenix, Ariz., area, their daughter, Jan Ellen, and his brother, Vernon Horsky, formerly of Cedar Rapids who now lives in Iowa Park are scheduled to attend services at Fort Meyers, Va. and Arlington National Cemetery.

Born Jan. 7, 1927, Major Horsky attended Cedar Rapids public schools and the Army specialized training reserve program at Coe College. He also attended Purdue University. He joined the Army Air Corps in 1944.

A veteran of the Korean War, the major flew 20 bombing missions as a B-29 pilot. He also flew B-25, B-47 and B-52 aircraft during his career.

Among his awards were the Air Medal with 16 oak leaf clusters, Bronze Star and Purple Heart. He was a command pilot.

Memorial services were held in Cedar Rapids Jan. 17, 1966 for Major Horsky.

Two aunts, Mrs. Leo Wickle and Mrs. Arthur Bahls, still live in the Cedar Rapids area.

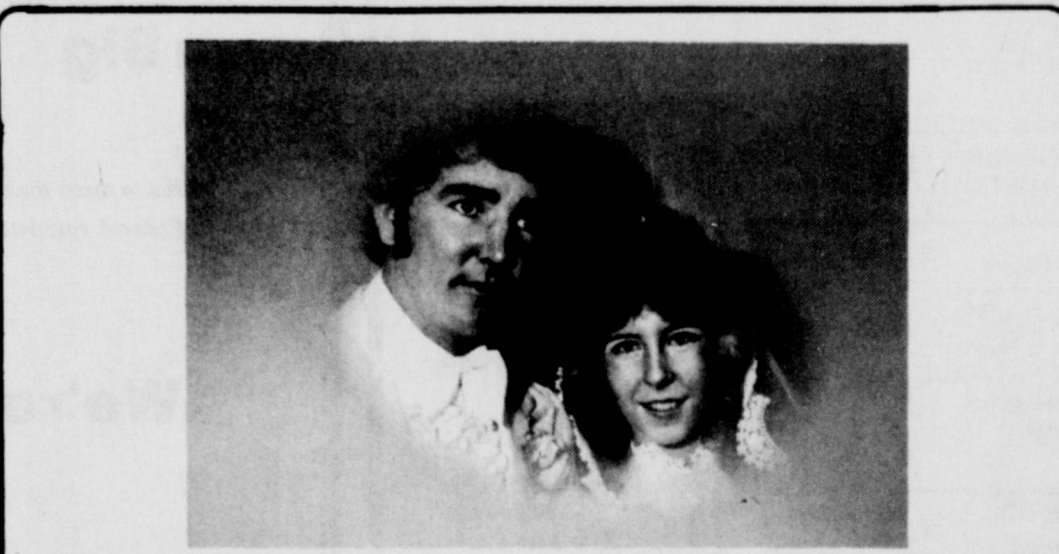

## As I See It....



There seems to be a special week or day observance each year for everything under the sun, from the newly organized grandparents week to labor day.

The fact that which week is Small-Business Week really doesn't mean much to anybody, but it does give me a chance to get on my soap box for a few minutes to bring out some points we might not have considered.

Small businesses in the United States constitute only 43 percent of the gross national product, but employs 55 percent of all private, nonagricultural employment in this nation.

In the past 10 years, according to Editor James Roberts of Andrews, 9,583,000 new jobs were created in the nation. "The Exxons, the General Motors and the 1,000 large corporations of the nation accounted for only 74,897 of the total. State and federal governments accounted for three million...and the rest came from small businesses employing an average of 20 employees."

Since all Iowa Park businesses, with the possible exception of a couple, fall in the small business category, I think this deserves a real pat on the back.

And I ask again, as I have many

times in the past, how well do we as Iowa Parkans patronize our local businesses. And how many of us zoom over to the big chain stores in Wichita Falls to do our buying?

A retail store must do business to provide the jobs and taxes each community requires. Those local salaries and sales taxes, as well as supporting the businesses which pay ad valorem taxes here, are what hold our personal taxes as low as they are. Think local taxes are high? Well just do all your spending in neighboring towns for a couple of years and watch their taxes go down and your own taxes increase! It's just a matter of simple economics.

We read the sales tax rebates paid Wichita Falls each month. By dividing the number of residents into the tax rebates of Wichita Falls and Iowa Park, it's simple to see where a great amount of our income is spent.

Each \$100 you spend in Wichita Falls means \$5 that city's residents

don't have to pay to keep the city going. And you have to make up that same \$5 here in Iowa Park where it should have been in the first place.

Have you complained about the increased Social Security tax taken from your pay check each week? Well, how do you think your employer feels, having to match it, and match it, and match it. Did you know that not all government workers contribute to the Social Security program?

Owners of small businesses are seldom heard in political circles. It's the major corporations who make the loudest noise.

The small business owner certainly isn't sitting down and crying about his plight, nor is he looking for a handout from the public or government.

It would be nice if he were considered, however, by us all. Especially during Small-Business Week.

### Cotton insect watch program is initiated

A cotton insect scouting program is being initiated in Wichita County, and cotton growers are being enlisted into this effort. The cost is 50 cents per acre. A scout will be employed by the county field crops committee to make cotton insect inspections. If harmful

insect numbers increase, the scout will contact me. We will get with the grower to determine if an insecticide application is needed.

This will be a limited scouting program where problem areas will be scouted. Since the boll weevil is the key pest, the first scouting will be directed to fields near broadleaf tree litter (along

creeks and streams). This scouting is tied directly to the uniform cotton planting date of May 20th. It will insure chemical control of weevils if egg laying possibilities develop in some cotton fields.

After the weevil season, the scouting will be directed toward bollworms. A bollworm light trap has been located at the Iowa Park Research Center. The information gained by Tim Hunter, station superintendent, will be used to predict in advance the bollworm moth flights and possible worm infestation. This information coupled with the scouts inspections should enable growers to do a good job in worm control.

The movement of boll weevils to cotton from the brush is being accomplished with pheromone traps. The traps are located with Otto Malone near Punkin Center and Fred Daume near Iowa Park. This will advise growers on the dates of the peak emergence. These dates can be compared to the May 20th uniform planting date to determine if that date can be expected to

give good cultural control.

At least 7,000 acres is needed in the scouting program. Growers can make their checks payable to the Wichita County Field Crops committee and leave them with Ralph Harvey at Texhoma Agricultural Products or at the county extension office in Wichita Falls. The grower enrollment period will last until June 1.

### MuleSkinner members are honored at meeting

The Iowa Park MuleSkinners last week named Billy James outstanding member of the year, and elected Kenny Jones new president.

James was named first recipient of the club's new award on the basis of 100 percent participation in all functions and additional work in preparation for the functions.

He was awarded a plaque in recognition. Plaques were also presented to Bud Mercer, first

president of the organization, and Deryl James, outgoing president.

Newly elected officers beside Jones are Dick Bennett, first vice president, Billy James, second vice president, Bill Hrcirik, secretary, and Tommy Key, treasurer.

The MuleSkinners are a non-profit organization made up of local men who like to cook and promote Iowa Park. When they cook for a meeting, they charge only for expenses and not for services.

### Chest X-ray will be free

The Christmas Seal Mobile X-Ray Unit of the North Texas Lung Association will be in Iowa Park on Friday, May 25. Persons 15 or over are urged to take advantage of the service to obtain a chest x-ray. Results will be returned directly to each individual using the unit.

A \$4 fee is charged to help cover a portion of the operation expenses, and may be paid at the unit.

The unit will be located at the Administration Bldg. from 8 until 11 a.m. Free literature on Emphysema, smoking, and other lung problems will be available at the same location.

The North Texas Lung Association serves a 27-county area providing educational programs for the prevention and control of lung disease. Primary source of funding for the x-ray unit and other Association programs is the annual Christmas Seal Campaign.

The new president outlined goals and plans for the next year to conclude the meeting.

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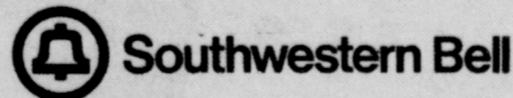
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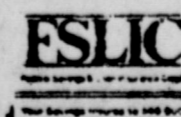

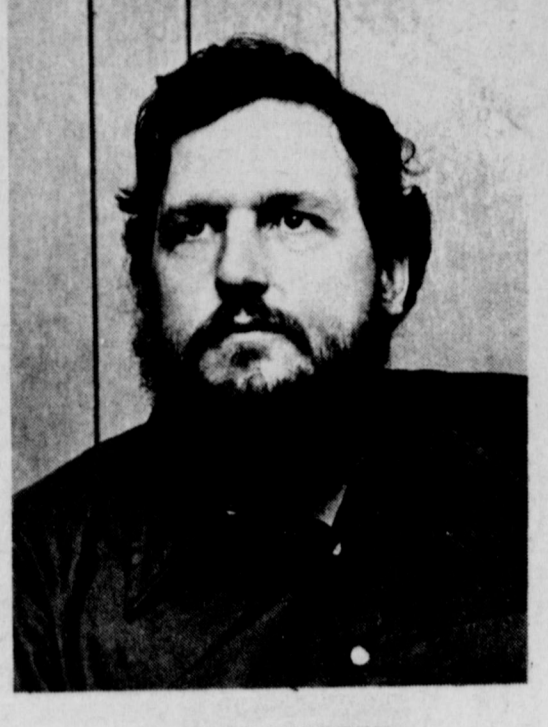

# Municipal election slated Tuesday

Two vacancies in Holliday's municipal administration will be filled next Tuesday when voters go to the polls in a special city council and mayoral election. Candidates in the mayor's race include Mary Nell Killian, Leo Chappell, Mary Denney and Tom Hall. Although one of the candidates has withdrawn from the Place 5 run-off election, ballots still must be cast as a formality. John Goforth apparently has little to stand in his way in becoming elected to the Place 5 council spot because his opponent, Rodney Hodgkins, has accepted a job transfer and will be moving to Oklahoma later this month. Goforth and Hodgkins each received 123 votes in the regular April municipal election causing the run-off.

Hodgkins has asked his supports to vote for Goforth. Voting in the special election will be from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Holliday Community Building. Mary Nell Killian, owner-operator of Mary's Mini Mart, has been a resident of Holliday since 1946. Aside from an unsuccessful write-in campaign for the city council in April, Mrs. Killian's bid for the mayor's post is her first endeavor for public office. "If elected mayor I would like to see the city cleaned up so we can have a town to be proud of. I would support the clean-up of unsightly places, old cars and abandoned buildings. I would support the enforcement of all city ordinances, especially the animal ordinance. All dogs

should be kept penned up," Mrs. Killian maintained. "The city council should cooperate in every way to help our good volunteer fire department. I would work toward better street maintenance and continue work toward upgrading our sewer and water systems. I would support building an all-weather road to the dump ground which should be kept open on weekends. My ideas would require the cooperation of all citizens and members of the council," Mrs. Killian said. Tom Hall has lived here 12 years and this marks his second mayoral election bid. He is retired and has served as city judge two years. "I know what the mayor's job consists of: supervision over all city employees, working out a system to all

operations, seeing that all equipment is properly handled and cared for, checking the prices on parts and buying the best deals, doing things to benefit the city and not a person or persons, going to meetings when chances for grants are offered and getting street work done for the least cost to the city. "Most mayors in the past have either had a job or a business that didn't allow them to spend time for the city," Hall said. "If the mayor doesn't do his job that leaves the city council to run the city's business and that doesn't work. "The city employees have at least five bosses and that means too many chiefs and not enough Indians. "The city employees are not supposed to have but one boss and that is the

mayor. If the city council wants something different done they are supposed to go to the mayor and he in turn goes to the employees and makes any changes the council wants," Hall said. "The mayor sees to it that all ordinances passed by the council are carried out, whether he likes it or not," Hall said. John Goforth, a roustabout who has lived in Holliday 20 months, is seeking election to the Place 5 council position. This is his first political endeavor. "I attended Holliday junior high and high school. I attended Cisco Junior College and Texas Tech University before moving to Gary, Indiana, with a national motor freight carrier. I was employed as an office manager and later as operations manager for two

years. Since moving back to Texas, I have been employed in the oil field," Goforth said. "I believe that my managerial experience would be an asset to me as a councilman. I am concerned about the water situation, the condition of the streets and the city services that are afforded our taxpayers. "The mayor-city council type of government can work much better than it's been working for Holliday. If elected, I will strive to see that it works the way it is designed to and not the way two or three men want it to. I will attempt to see that our taxpayers get their money's worth out of their tax dollars," Goforth said. Mary Denney, who served the remaining seven months on her husband's term on the council but lost an

election bid in the regular April balloting, is seeking the mayor's post. She is a homemaker, who has lived here 18 years. "I am running in the mayor's race because, since I have served on the council I feel I have learned a lot, and I hope to put that knowledge to work for the people of Holliday," Mrs. Denney said. "The mayor's position is a very time consuming one and since I don't hold a job outside my home, I feel I have the time to carry out the full-time duties of mayor," Mrs. Denney said. Leo Chappell, who previously served as Holliday's mayor, is seeking a return to that post. An instructor in the department of communications and missile training at Sheppard AFB and pastor of the Kamay Assembly of God

Church, Chappell has lived in the city 10 years. "The city of Holliday needs a qualified mayor. I was mayor of Holliday about three years ago. I resigned before my term expired for physical and business reasons," Chappell said. "I have disposed of my business, and am in good physical condition at this time. I feel better than I have in several years. "The city of Holliday, especially at this time, needs a mayor with experience to help complete the many programs that have been started. "We have an excellent city council with which to work. I will consider it an honor to once again be associated with this fine council. My experience with city government qualifies me for this position," Chappell said.

## Finnell supports education bill

State Rep. Charles Finnell supported House passage last week of the Texas School Finance Bill, and said he was pleased to report that "this bill provides for a fairer distribution of state aid to our local school districts." The bill passed by the House was drawn up by Rep. Hamp Atkinson of New Boston. "I have great faith in the bill Atkinson and the House Public Education Committee prepared," Finnell said, "and

its strong passage in the House (125 to 8) demonstrates the statewide support for this measure." Finnell noted that the bill now proceeds to a conference committee composed of House and Senate members, and that final approval must occur before the May 28th adjournment of the Texas Legislature. Rep. Finnell also saw two of the bills he sponsored go to Governor Clement's desk for his signature. Finnell's Red River Compact Bill received the final legislative action on its way to ratification late Thursday night in the Texas House of Representatives. With this vote, the Red River Compact nears the

end of almost a quarter century of negotiation and refinement enabling an equitable division of the waters of the Red River between the states of Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas. Also sent to the Governor's office was HB 2235 by Finnell, which replenishes the state Disaster Contingency Fund recently depleted by severe tornado damage in the Wichita Falls area and the extensive Southeast Texas floods.

**BRUSH ARBORS**  
 Church houses got awfully hot during the summer even with the windows wide open so when the weather started warming up the men in the community got together to re-do the brush arbor.  
 A brush arbor was a wooden framework built on the top of tall straight poles. The structure was covered over with tree limbs that formed a shade while the sides were left open to allow breezes to blow through. It was an outdoor meeting place that provided the coolness of a shade tree, a joyful diversion from the sweltering church building. The framework had been

built years before but it was recovered with fresh new limbs each summer to give a better shade. First, the old brush was stripped off, taken out, piled up and burned. The men would take a wagon down to the cedar breaks to cut new brush. The scrub cedar trees made the best covering for a brush arbor because the foliage was thick and would stay on the limbs longer than other types of leaves. The wagon would come back piled high with the good smelling boughs and would be greeted by several youngsters eager to help any way they could. When the top was complete it was ready for the first

revival meeting. Traveling evangelists would pass through the country holding meetings two to three weeks long in the brush arbors of first one community then another. Just about everyone in the community or those within buggy distance attended. Some came to get their religion renewed, others because it was something different to do for a change. The hard-packed dirt floor was covered with new sawdust from some nearby mill. Where no sawdust was available hay was sometimes used. When "kneeling" time came the sawdust helped keep the knees of the repenters cleaner. Most of the time preaching lasted way into the night so the younger children were

put down on quilt pallets outside of the arbor where they could sleep through the service or sit and play if they didn't make any fuss. The arbor would be used for several revivals in the course of the summer and the people braved mosquitoes, candle bugs, dim lights and hot weather to hear the gospel preached. In later years the old arbors were replaced with more permanent structures called tabernacles. The tabernacles were built with the same idea in mind but they had wood shingle roofs and side panels that could be opened or closed to prevent blowing rain from coming in. Some of these can still be seen in rural communities today but few are used since churches have been air conditioned.

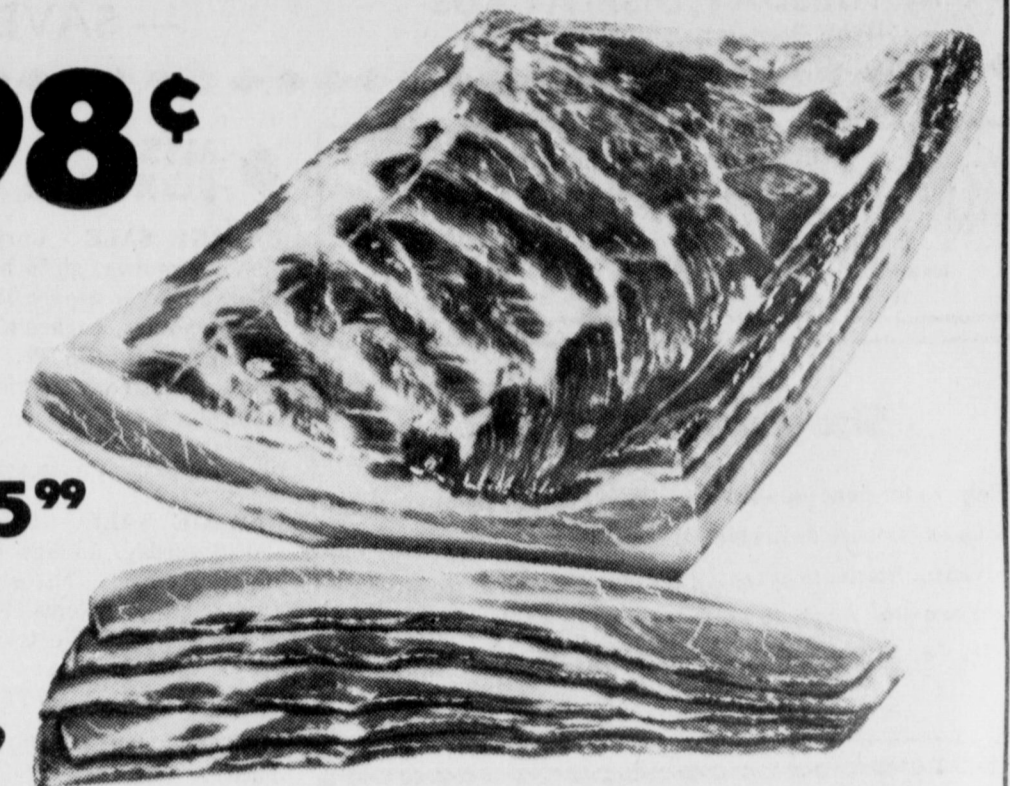
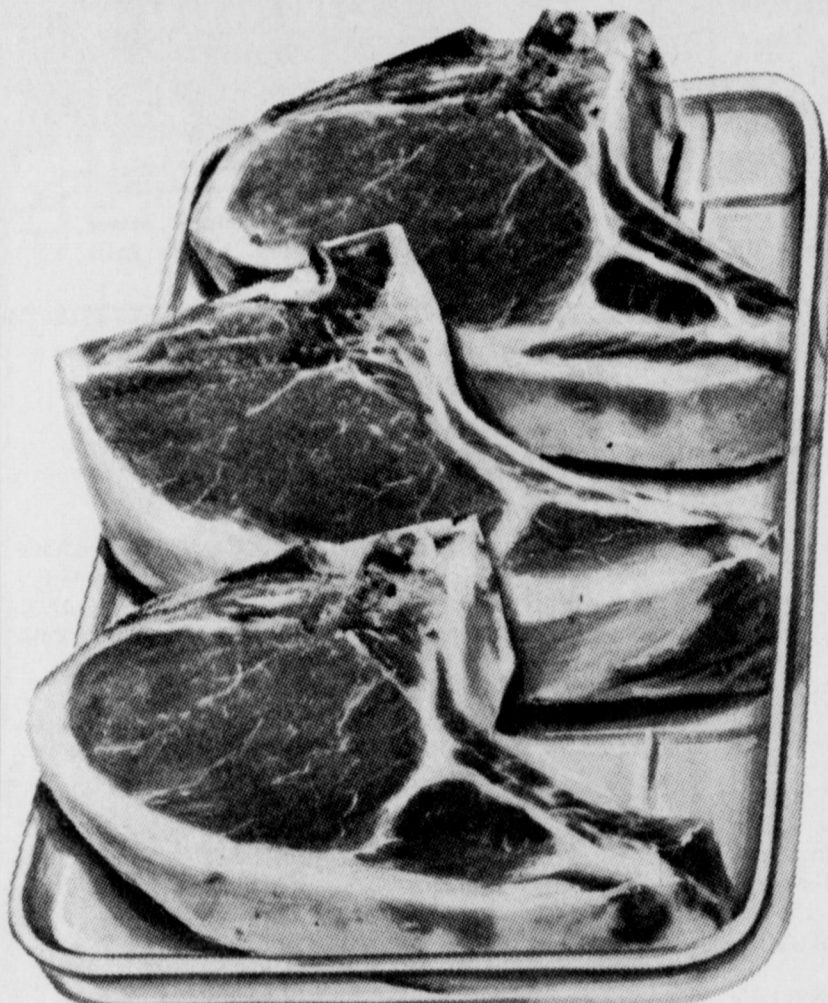

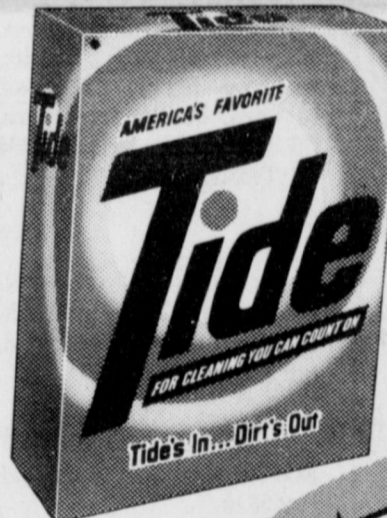
