Sally Easterwood, Jack Ayres Wedding Rites Said Before Father of Bride

Miss Sally Easterwood became the bride of Jack Ayres of Holliday in marriage rites of solemnity and dignity performed at the twilight hour Friday, June 5. The impressive ceremony took place in the Iowa Park Baptist church where the bride's father, the pastor directed the exchange of vows.

The bride is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. James N. Easterwood and the groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Ayres of Holliday.

White daisies, traditionally associated with June weddings, were featured in decorations in the nuptial space, and provided a contrast for the pink and blue costumes worn by feminine members of the wedding party. The ceremony took place before an arch entwined with greenery. On either side of the arch and in the center background the arrangements of white maroon daisies rose from a mass of lemon leaves. The setting was illuminated by tall white candles burning in Swedish steel candelabra standing beside the floral groupings. Pews where relatives were seated were marking with glowing candles uprising from standards tied with white satin bows. The white satin covered prie dieu on which the bride and groom knelt for the benedictory prayer song added the final sacred touch to the setting.

Traditional wedding music was provided by Mrs. O. E. Lechridge, organist, and Mrs. Keith Garrison, vocalist.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her brother Jimmy Easterwood, was an attractive picture in a white lace frock over white taffeta. The dress was topped with a smart jacket worn above a flared skirt. Dipping to a point in the back, the jacket buttoned closely in the front with lace covered buttons from the waistline to the Peter Pan collar which accented a high neckline.

Graceful three quarter length sleeves fastened at terminating points with buttons and loops to add provocative interest to the costume. The shoulder length bridal veil of white nylon tulle was attached to a half hat fashioned of taffeta and lace and ornamented with pearls.

The bride carried white gardenias atop a white Bible. Wearing her mother's pearls, a wedding present from the bride's father, she observed family sentiment and the "something old" tradition. Her something blue was a linen handkerchief, a gift from Mrs. R. J. Butts. Something borrowed was the Bible belonging to Mrs. Oscar Singleton.

Miss Barbara Butts, maid of honor, was attired in a blue nylon tulle frock over blue taffeta, the dress being patterned to duplicate the

one worn by the bride. On her head she wore a ruffled blue tulle bandeau and carried a colonial bouquet of pink and blue daisies.

Proceeding the ceremony the candles were lighted by Mrs. Earl Thompson of Iowa Park and Mrs. C. D. Ayres of Holliday, sister and sister in law of the groom. They wore identical dresses of pink nylon over pink taffeta. They were styled with figure fitting bodices topped with pleated heart shaped yokes and skirts which fell gracefully in unpressed pleats. They each wore a ruffled pink tulle bandeau dotted with rhinestones on their heads and blue carnation wristlets.

Best man for the groom was Holmes Stone of Holliday, Jimmy Jeter of Wichita Falls and Franklin Farmer of Iowa Park served as ushers.

Immediately following the ceremony a reception was held to honor the bridal couple in the church parlor. The room was decorated with bouquets of spring blossoms in pastel hues.

The refreshment table was laid with white linen and centered with pink tapers burning in crystal prism-dangling holders. Focal point of interest was the 4-tiered wedding cake topped with a bride and groom on one extremity of the table. The crystal punch bowl at the other end was encircled with plumous fern dotted with pink roses.

Guests were greeted by Mrs. Fred Wright. The bride's parents, the groom's parents, the newlyweds and other members of the bridal party composed the receiving line.

Mrs. Oscar Singleton presided at the bride's desk to secure signatures of guests. Miss Naomi Baxter served the cake and Mrs. Doyle Tate of Wichita Falls was in charge of serving the punch. Other members of the house party were Meses. Sam Hill, R. R. Brubaker, L. E. Brooks, Charles Metz, Earle Denny, and Homer Blalock.

The bride and groom departed following the reception for Holliday where they have established residence.

Mrs. Ayres was graduated from Iowa Park this spring. During high school days she played in the Hawk band three years. While a senior she sang with the Melody Maids and the Senior Girls Trio.

Jack graduated from Holliday High School in 1951, where he participated in football, basketball and track events. He is farming and ranching with his father near Holliday.

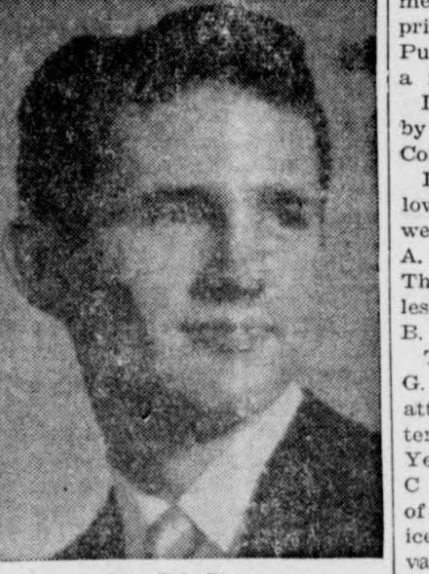
After the meeting closed a social hour was enjoyed with the worthy matron and worthy patron Taylor George, as host and hostess for the meeting.

Your C. of C.

CITY MAIL DELIVERY

Work goes steadily forward on the city mail delivery project. The plates have been cut, holes drilled and 200 of the 300 necessary markers have had their first coat of paint.

There is still much to be done; but it is worth working for. Chairman Chauncey Weiler is getting much valuable assistance from County Commissioner Buck Voyles.

DID YOU KNOW

That each shower you take requires 25 gallons of water? That a tub uses 36 gallons? That flushing the toilet uses up a minimum of 5 gallons? That running the water while you shave uses 20 gallons, and rinsing the dishes with running water takes 30 gallons. To say nothing of watering the lawn and running air conditioners; we do not know what to add for these.

This information and the following comes from an article by Emile C. Schurmacher in the Brief Magazine and reprinted in the Deep Water Magazine for June.

"We take water for granted, and because we take it for granted, we never realize how little we know about it.

"Take you yourself personally. If you weigh 150 lbs. about 105 pounds of that is just plain water. Lose a little over 10 pounds of water in your body and you're seriously ill. Dry out another 10 pounds and you're dead.

"Currently Americans are using for all purposes 170,000,000,000 gallons of water a day. Your share of this staggering total amounts to 1,100 gallons. A family of three uses much more than a million gallons of water a year.

"Much of the water you use, says Emile Schurmacher, you never see. It is employed in the factories that make the things you use and the clothes you wear." For instance: the making of one phonograph record—2 1/2 gallons; one rayon dress—100 gallons; one cotton bed sheet—1500 gallons; one dozen oranges—300 gallons; one cup of sugar—4 gallons and the daily paper—15 gallons.

"In a world that is 75 per cent water, you'd think we'd never run short but we do."

June Is Dairy Month

A statewide effort to explain the nutritional and economic value of milk and dairy foods was launched in Texas this week. Loy Gandy of San Angelo, state chairman of the 17th annual June Dairy Month in Texas, announced.

"Milk and dairy products are recognized universally as essential to the health of ever human being," he said.

50,000 Texans earn a livelihood from the production, processing, distribution and sale of dairy products with a resultant contribution of \$400 million annually to the commerce of Texas.

Dairying last year produced more than \$200 million in farm income for three of every four farms in the state. About 12,000 commercial Grade A dairies depend on milk as their chief income, and some 60,000 farm units depend upon milk and milk products for their income.

Milk, cheese, butter and ice cream are all important items on every family's budget, Gandy said. The average housewife spends more than 15 per cent of her food dollar for dairy foods.

And just to show how economical dairy products are, 30 per cent of the food consumed in Texas is milk and dairy products. Thus a wife gets twice as much for half the cost.

By spending a food budget for family can get calcium, one-half and large quantities of nutrient development, Gandy said.

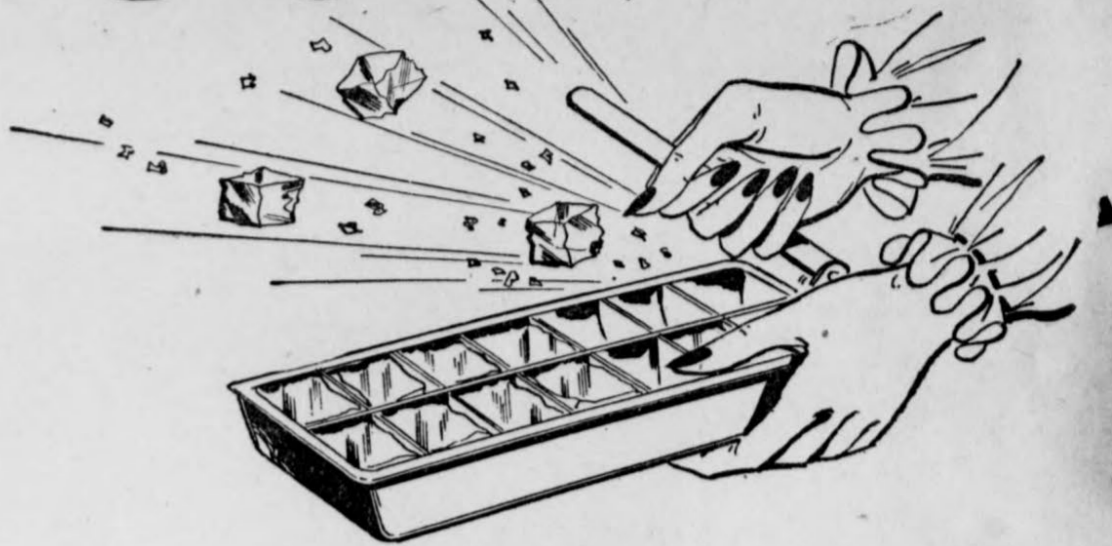

ELECTION ORDER

May 11, 1953

At a regular session of the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, the following business was transacted, to-wit:

The following officers were present:

- R. E. Van Horn, Mayor
- W. G. Steele, Alderman
- W. J. Beasley, Jr., Alderman
- C. L. Metz, Alderman
- Allan W. Berry, Alderman

Motion was made by Allan W. Berry and seconded by C. L. Metz that an Election be held to determine whether the City of Iowa Park shall be authorized to sell the following portions of streets, to-wit:

One: That part of the Street along the South Boundary Line of Blocks 19 and 36 of the Texas Addition to the town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, which lies West of North Second Street.

Two: That part of West Bank Street, lying West of the South Boundary Line of U. S. Highway No. 287 in the Texas Addition to the City of Iowa Park.

Three: That Part of North Third Street in the Texas Addition to the town of Iowa Park, lying South of West Washington Avenue.

Said motion was carried by the following vote: Those voting yes: W. G. Steele, W. J. Beasley, Jr., C. L. Metz, and Allan W. Berry. Those voting No: None. Whereupon the following election order was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, deemed it advisable to sell certain portions of the streets situated in Iowa Park, Texas, as hereinafter described:

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that an election be held on the 20th day of July, 1953, at which election the following proposition will be submitted:

Shall the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be authorized to sell the portions of streets located in the Texas Addition and original townsite of the town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, as authorized by the revised statutes of the State of Texas, said property being described as follows:

One: That portion of the Street along the South Boundary Line of Block 19 and 36 of the Texas Addition to the town of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, which lies West of North Second Street.

Two: That part of West Bank Street, lying West of the South Boundary line of U. S. Highway No. 287 in the Texas Addition to the City of Iowa Park.

Three: That part of North Third Street in the Texas Addition to

the town of Iowa Park, lying South of West Washington Avenue.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall in City Park in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, Wichita County, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election:

Earle L. Denny
M. E. Banks

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters of said City shall be allowed to vote.

And all voters desiring to support the proposition to sell said portions of said streets shall have printed on their Ballots "for the sale of said streets," and those opposing shall have printed on their ballots, "Against the sale of said streets."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas, regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor of said City shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the Mayor is directed to cause notice of said election to be posted at the places described for holding said election at least twenty (20) days prior to the date of said election, and have at least twenty (20) days notice of said election by publication of said notice duly signed by the Mayor in the Iowa Park Herald published in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, at least once a week for three weeks consecutively preceding said election.

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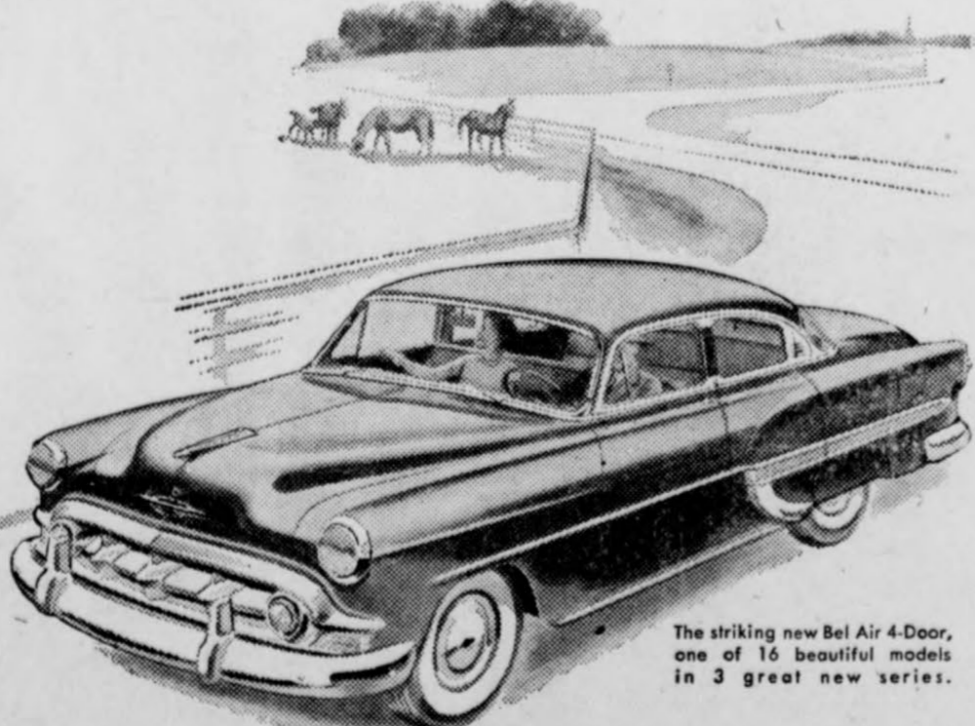
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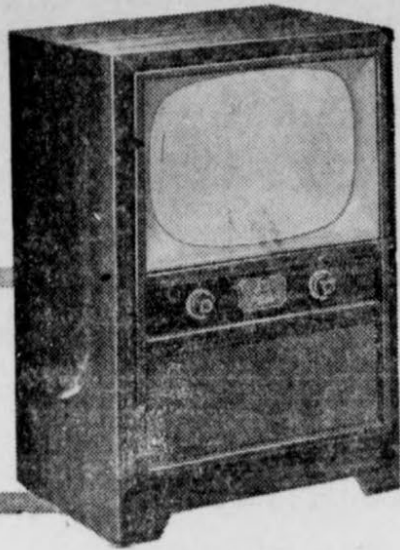
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Mrs. Mahler Gives Party for Bride-elect
