North Texas District board meeting here this weekend

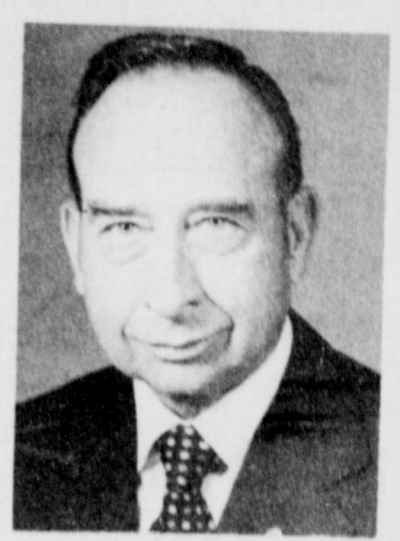

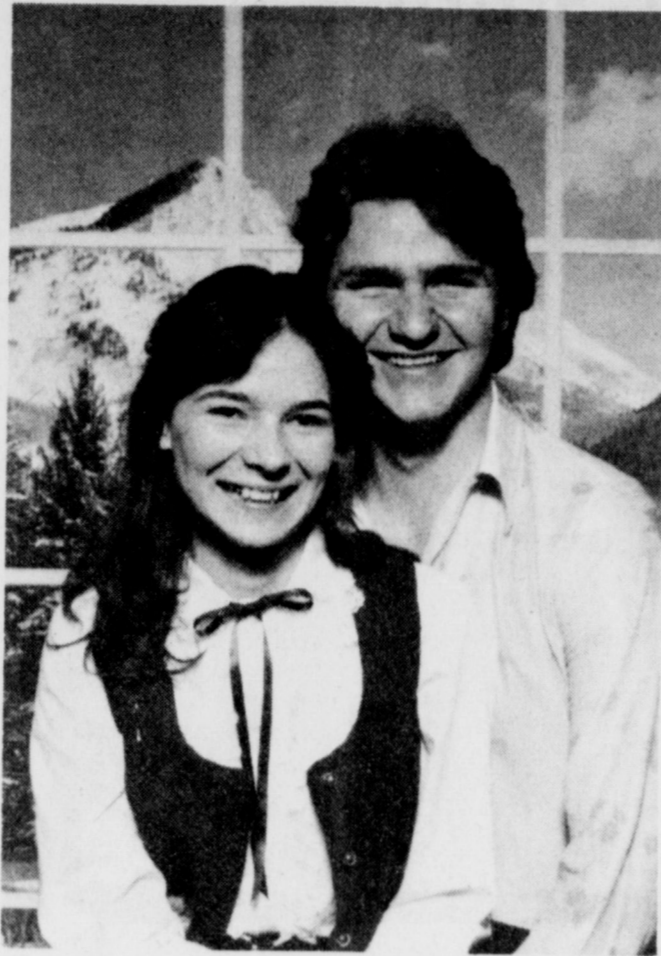
Mrs. Bertha McDonald was leader for the musical program featuring instrumental and vocal presenta-

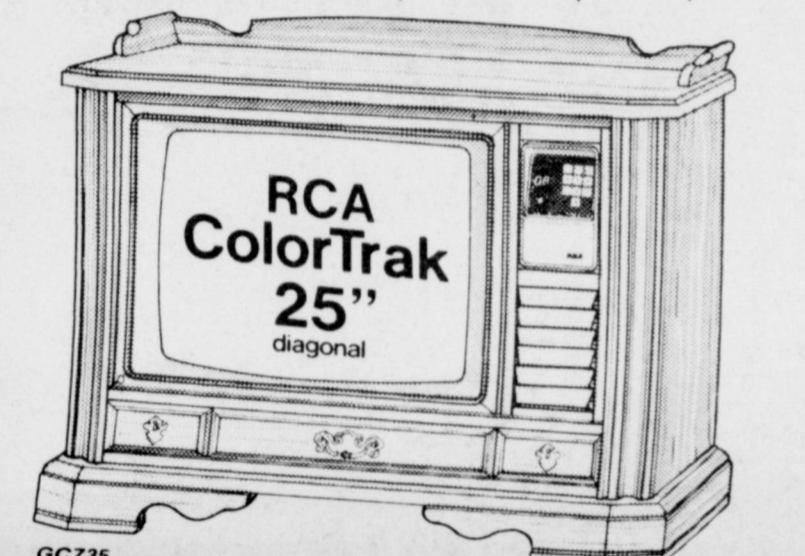

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


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Shower fetes bride elect

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Soil fertility tests established

Three soil fertility demonstrations were established last week on wheat. These trials are aimed at measuring crop response to the major elements - nitrogen, phosphorous, and potassium. They are also designed to show the effects of minor elements including zinc and sulphur. Soil amendment compounds are being tested, such as gypsum, to loosen the soil and lime to treat acid soils.

Marvin Klinkerman is conducting one of the demonstrations which is located north of his house on FM 368, north of Iowa Park. The fertilizer combination which gives the greatest economic return is the main goal of his test.

The site has been in wheat for several years. It is a Deandale silt loam which has a 9 inch surface layer of silt loam. The subsoil is a very firm clay which takes water slowly. This soil is low in nitrogen and phosphorous and is high in potassium.

Combinations of fertilizers being tried include 40-0-0,

40-40-0, 80-40-0, 80-40-40, 100-50-0, 80-40-0 plus 3,000 pounds of gypsum, and 0-0-0. Plots will be combine harvested to determine yields.

The purpose of the demonstration by Otto Malone of Electra, on a sandy soil near the Red River is to measure the response to minor elements and soil amendment compounds. His site is an Enterprise very fine sandy loam which is low in nitrogen, high in phosphorous, medium in potassium, and slightly acid with a 6.4 pH.

Rates being tried include 80-0-0, 0-40-0, 0-0-40, 80-40-40, 80-40-40 plus 3,000 pounds of gypsum, 80-40-40 plus 3,000 pounds of lime, 80-40-40 plus 12 pounds of zinc, and 0-0-0. This is a very fertile soil which mainly needs nitrogen. However, it is low in sulfur, zinc, and calcium.

The gypsum will provide both the needed calcium and sulfur. Lime is being tried to add calcium and raise the soil pH. Zinc and sulfur are being added in the form of

zinc sulfate.

The soil test indicates the addition of nitrogen, calcium, sulfur, and zinc should give the best results. This demonstration will measure the fertility combination giving the best crop response.

A demonstration by Loys and James Barbour is aimed at measuring the crop response to various levels of nitrogen, phosphorous, and potassium. Topdressing with nitrogen in January will be measured too. The site is located on the 287 expressway between Iowa Park and Wichita Falls. It is Frankirk loam which is low in nitrogen and phosphorous and is high in potassium and calcium.

Fertilizers being tested include 40-0-0, 0-0-0, 0-0-40, 80-0-0, 0-80-0, 0-0-80, 80-40-0, 80-40-0 plus 3,000 pounds of gypsum, and 80-40-0 pre-plant plus 40-0-0 in January. This demonstration is the exact location of the test in 1978-79. This means the check plot will have a 2-year history of no fertilizer.

All of these demonstrations, in addition to Fred

Daume's test reported recently, are under the sponsorship of the county field crops committee headed by Fred Dwyer. Fertilizer for the tests have been provided by Ralph Harvey of Texhoma Agri Products, Allen Kemple of K & K Grain Company, and Frank Wolf of Thornberry. Steve Montz of Brookside Laboratory assisted by providing soil tests and laying out the demonstrations.

This is a "tribute" to the Wichita County farmer. Wind velocity reached as high as 48 miles per hour one day recently, yet there was very little blowing dust. This shows expertise of our local farmers, as well as our neighbors in Oklahoma, in protecting their land from wind erosion.

There are nearly 90,000 acres of bare ground across the top of the county waiting to be planted in wheat. A combination of keeping the old crop residue near the surface and using proper tillage methods reduced blowing soil to a minimum even when subjected to the strong winds. If winds of this velocity under current drouth conditions had occurred 2-3 decades ago, visibility would have been reduced to only a few hundred feet.

As I See It....



In case you don't realize it, there is a real fight brewing among educators in the state of Texas. And unless the fight is won by the good guys, our children will suffer in the long run.

Now that's a strong statement, but based on what I've observed over the years, it's true.

The problem is, an organization which I've held in the highest of respect for many, many years is the culprit.

The Texas State Teachers Association has, as long as I've known of it, represented the highest ideals in professionalism and care for youth. But no longer. Not since it became affiliated with the militant National Education Association some three or four years ago.

The organization is now what the Texas Classroom Teachers Association was intended to be... a union-type organization. They want collective bargaining; they want powers which have traditionally been reserved for local elected authority; they want contracts which would make Civil Service envious; they want rights which they have but are being told they don't have.

A debate held at Midwestern State Univ. Monday evening featured Vance Rogers, a field representative for the TSTA. What he was saying was almost exactly the same thing Karen Johnson, legal counsel for the TSTA was saying a week earlier in a meeting in Canyon.

Apparently the paid staff of the TSTA is beating the bushes, trying to get local teachers worked up. And there are some, maybe not in our system as far as I know, who are spouting the same message.

I thought Dr. Lee Williamson,

superintendent of the Wichita Falls Public Schools, did an outstanding job of rebutting Rogers' points, according to what I read in the Wichita Falls newspaper.

Williamson, who has experience in schools where collective bargaining is allowed, should know as much or more about the union-type objectives of the militant educators than anyone in this area.

Collective bargaining is no good without the threat of strike, he pointed out.

Rogers underplayed the number of teacher strikes when he said only four percent of the 11,000 locals went on strike three years ago. That's 4,400 school districts shut down, affecting how many thousands and thousands of young students?

Several seasoned educators warned me about what was going to happen when the TSTA affiliated with the NEA. And it is all coming

true.

It's a shame, but the TSTA, unless some drastic changes come about, will become a shell in the more conservative areas of the state. It will continue to flourish in the big cities, I expect.

But taking its place, at least in this part of the country, is the Association of Texas Educators. This is a more moderate, conservative group of educators who apparently are more interested in an organization which furthers professional standards, not union-type tactics.

I understand about half the Iowa Park faculty now belongs to the ATE. I suspect the figure will grow to near 100 percent next year, like Vernon, when local educators learn more about what the TSTA leadership is doing to their organization.

I don't like unions in the first place. And the first place unions do not belong is in public education.

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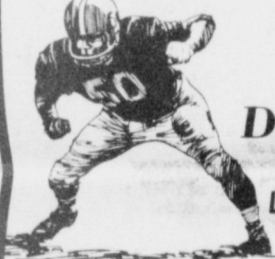
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Hawks give Steers generous portion of 'humble pie'

With the humiliation of last year's defeat still burning in their memories, the Iowa Park Hawks gave Graham's Steers a lesson in field position and big-play defense Friday night, defeating the visitors 42-0.

Graham was figured by many in the 1978 season as being the team most likely to fall to the young Hawks. But instead, they got the Mean Green on their heels early, and went on to win 44-16.

So determined was the Mean Green defense Friday night, plus the talented kicking toe of Ron Taylor, the visiting Steers were allowed to cross the midfield stripe only four times, and never closer than the Hawk 38 yard line.

The Hawk defense forced five Steer turnovers, and three of them led to touchdowns.

Graham's explosive offense 308 yards through the season, managed 211 yards against Iowa Park, but the Steers never got any place when they moved the ball.

A strong wind out of the northeast played a big part in the game, but not in Graham's favor. The Steers chose to have the breeze to their backs in the first quarter, and again in the fourth, probably to help their vaunted passing attack.

Graham had the ball twice in the first period, and advanced to the Hawk 47 on first possession, and the Steer 25 on the second.

With the wind in the last possession, the Steers advanced into Hawk territory twice in the last period. They made it to the Iowa Park 38, but on fourth down, Troy Linthicum sacked the runner for a six-yard loss. The other time was on the last play of the game, which was the 39.

While gaining 138 yards rushing and 73 passing, Graham managed only nine first downs on 53 plays from scrimmage. Iowa Park, on the other hand, picked up 20 firsts while rushing for 274 yards and 17 more passing.

Coach Tommy Watkins showed Graham that the

Steers couldn't defend against one or two players. Six Hawks scored points in the game.

Touchdowns were racked up by Troy Thompson, James Spears, Curtis Martin, James Smith, and two by Mike Ray, while Taylor was perfect for the night as an extra point kicker.

Though two of his four punts were into the wind, Taylor averaged 32.5 yards for the night. One of his punts died on the Steer eight yard line, and the other narrowly missed going out of bounds at the flag.

The Hawks took the opening kickoff, and drove 65 yards to score, with Martin doing the honors from eight yards out.

Ray scored both Iowa Park touchdowns in the second quarter, both on one-yard plunges. Taylor set up his first score, covering a Steer fumble on the Graham 31. The second TD came after Graham's punter got off a 17-yard punt into the wind, which rolled dead at his own 27 yard line.

Thompson scored Iowa Park's third-period touchdown when he capped a 60-yard drive with a five-yard sweep around right end.

A fumbled handoff on Graham's 11 yard line, covered by Tim Blackwell, set up the first touchdown in the final quarter, this one by Spears.

Tackle Tommy Ross intercepted an attempted screen pass by Graham at the Steer 30. Four plays later, with the aid of a major penalty against Graham, sophomore Smith, playing in his first varsity game, scored over left tackle from two yards out.

Smith, who was brought up from the junior varsity to alternate at tailback with Thompson, made a lasting impression in his debut. His first carry was a 15-yarder. He wound up the evening gaining 45 yards on eight carries.

Thompson finished with 74 yards, Hastings gained 71 on six carries, Ray had 62 yards, and Spears picked up 20, though only carrying five

times all in the fourth period.

Mike Smith and Linthicum covered the other two Graham fumbles during the game.

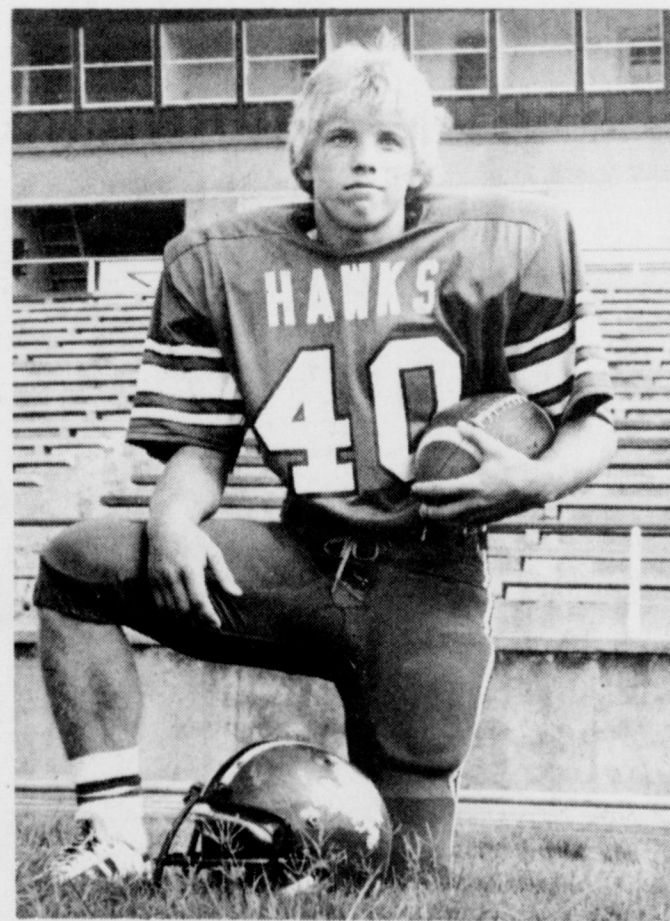

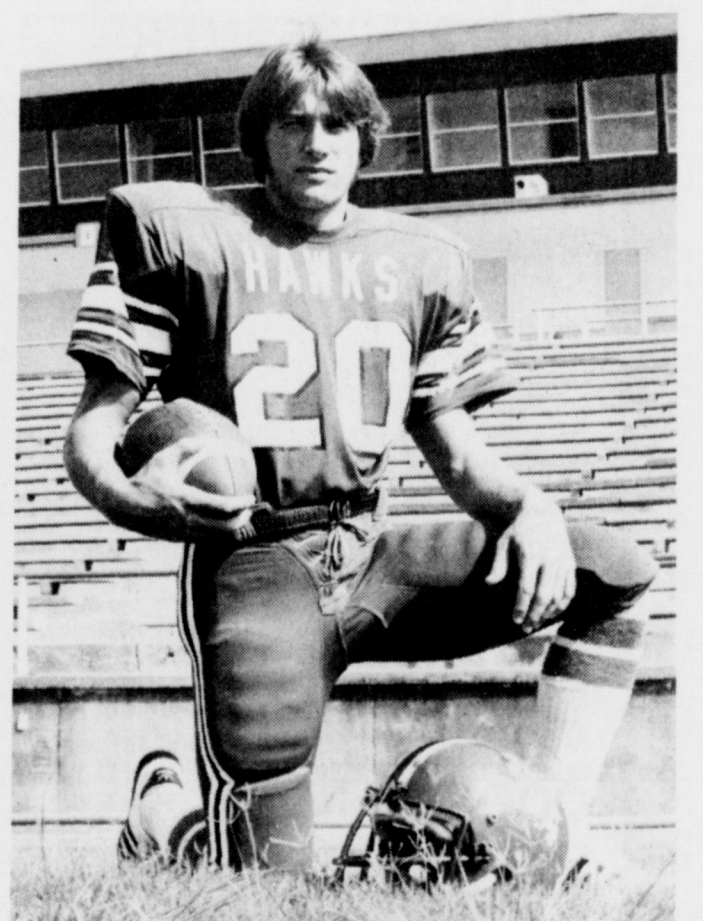
HARD HAWK TO BRING DOWN

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Big Red defense smothers Millsap

When Holliday's Eagles walked off the field Friday night after crushing another opponent, this time by the tune of 47-0, the players' uniforms seemed streaked with burnt orange, for the defense spelled only gloom and frustration for the visitors from Millsap much in the same way the University of Texas was to manhandle Oklahoma U. the following day.

But that is not to say the Big Red offense (from Holliday) wasn't doing its job, with the line plowing a new field for its stable of thoroughbred runningbacks to run in, chalking up 617 yards in the process. Sophomore Ray Looney was probably the most impressive of the depth-laden backfield as he rushed 22 times for 169 yards. Looney showed some

fine moves all night, breaking one run for a 75-yard touchdown, while taking up the slack left by an injury to senior James Porter with only seconds left in the first quarter. Porter twisted his left knee with only 11 seconds remaining in the initial period, after rushing five times for 59 yards and a touchdown. Porter joined senior

teammate Kent Lemons on the sideline. Lemons sat out the game with a broken finger on his right hand. Holliday's two workhorse fullbacks, Jim (Chisel) Ezzell and Carl Martin used a rugged, no-nonsense running style as they rushed for 121 and 94 yards, respectively. While the offense wasn't churning up the yards, the Red defense was out making

shambles of the Bulldogs with Millsap gaining only 27 yards the entire evening, while incompleting all nine pass attempts with one interception. Holliday's punter was a no-show while Millsap's punter handled the ball nine times for a 23-yard average. The Eagles showed a more impressive aerial attack than usual, completing three of six attempts for 63 yards.

SECOND HALF
The Eagle offense started the third period where it left off, taking the ball 65 yards on some time-consuming plays, eating up seven minutes of the clock before Ezzell plunged over from the one. Millsap found no new holes after receiving the kick, but did take advantage of an Eagle penalty to gain a first down at the Bulldog 35. After losing nine yards on the next three plays, the Bulldog punter unleashed a 52-yarder to the Eagle 23. Two plays later, Looney

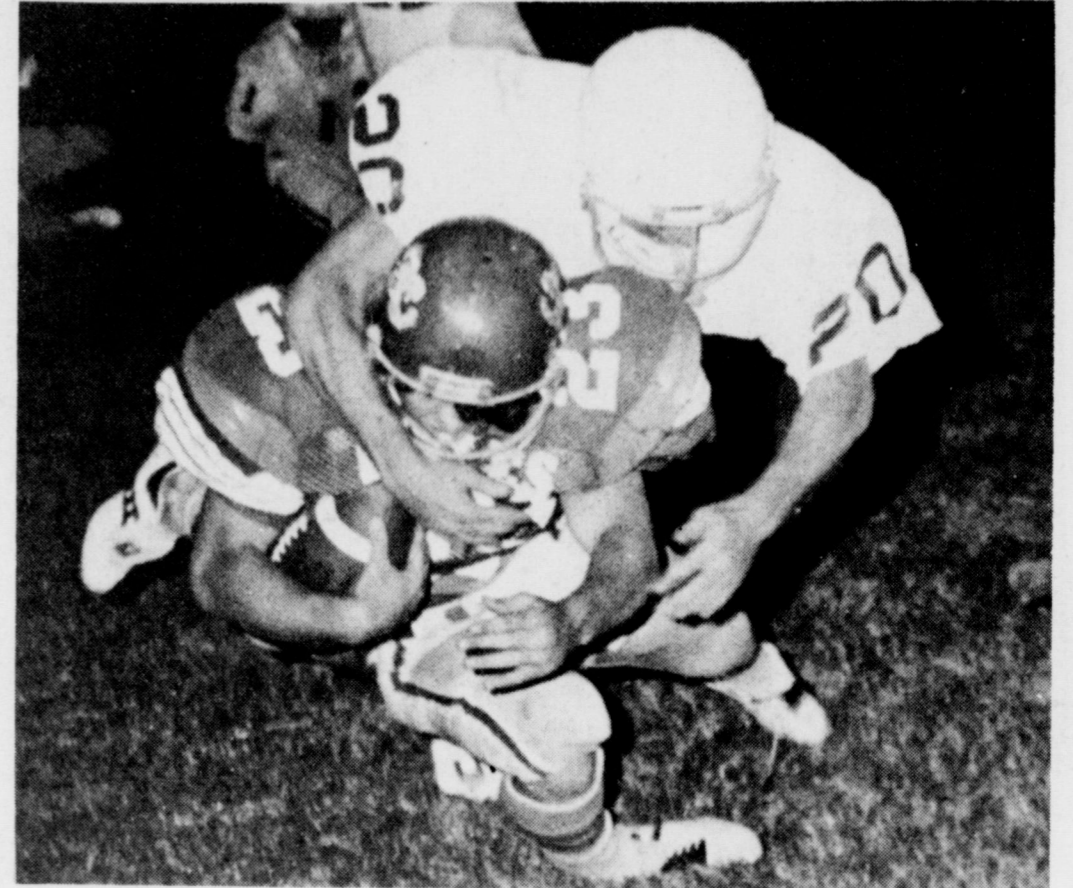
scampered 75 yards for a touchdown with the aid of a crushing block by Collier on the only player between Looney and the goal line. The Eagles built their lead to 27-0 with three minutes left in the third period. Holliday scored three more times in the final period on runs by Martin for 34 and 28 yards, and Larry Boydston's 20-yard run for another with only seconds remaining in the game. Boydston's final run was preceded by Flowers' 31-yard scamper to the Bulldog 20 with 46 seconds remain-

ing to be played. The win places the Eagles at the top in District 13-A with a 2-0 record, 3-3 overall. Holliday has now racked up 100 points in two games while holding the opponents scoreless.

PUBLIC NOTICE

City of Holliday, Texas
Ordinance 79-8

An ordinance prohibiting the throwing or propelling in any manner of eggs, water balloons, or any other missiles by any person or persons on any street, alley or public place in the City of Holliday; providing a penalty and that said violation constitutes a misdemeanor providing a fine of not more than \$200 upon conviction, repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Holliday, Texas:

(1) Any person commits an offense with intent to damage or destroy the property of another and without the other's effective consent he knowingly, intentionally or recklessly throws or propels in any manner eggs, water balloons, or other missiles within the corporate city limits of Holliday.

(2) An offense under this ordinance is a Class C misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.

(3) This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, approval, and publication. All ordinances in conflict herewith are expressly repealed including ordinance 74-2.

(4) It is further provided that the protection of the property of the citizens of Holliday and that of the City

of Holliday constitutes an emergency and that the rule that the ordinance be read on three separate times before passage is hereby suspended. passage and approval at a regular meeting of the City Council of Holliday on the eighth day of October, 1979.

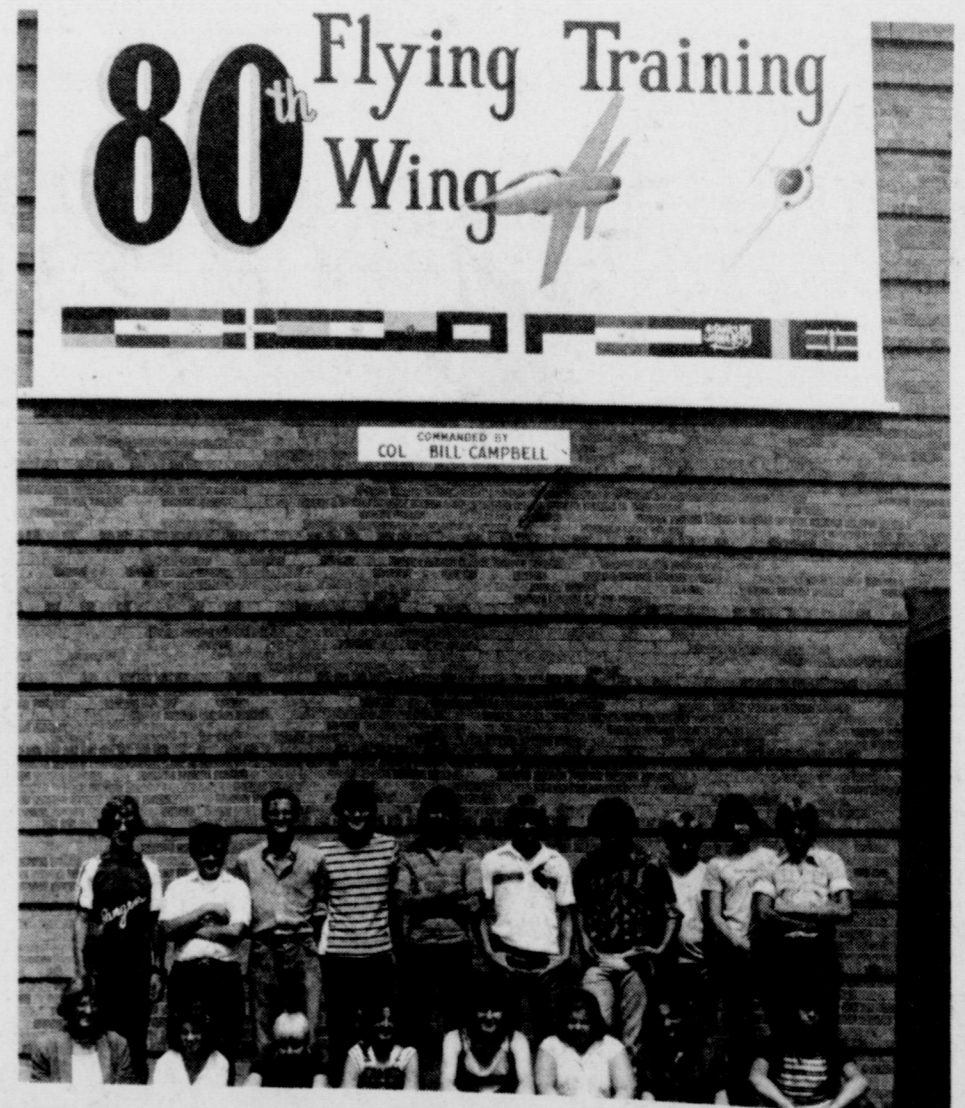

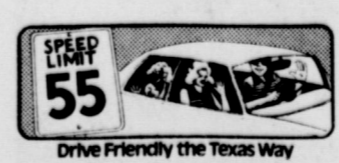

Cook of the Week

The recipes this week are those of a young homemaker, but they sound like they have stood the test of time and could be down-home favorites prepared by her mother or grandmother. To say the least, they bring us back to basic nutritious eating.

Beverly (Mrs. Danny) Bohannon heads her recipes with "I Hate Breakfasts" breakfasts aimed at causing people to change their minds about eating early morning meals. One recipe allows the use of honey, which has been in use for thousands of years. Early Romans considered it to have medicinal qualities. A jar of honey, still in perfect condition, was found in an Egyptian tomb where it was placed over 3,000 years ago.

The flavor of her stew recipe is enhanced with the use of a bay leaf. The bay or laurel leaves reach us from Turkey, Greece, Portugal and Yugoslavia and are the choice of many American cooks to add incomparable accent to many dishes. The evergreen laurel tree was beloved by Apollo; considered a lightning arrester by Tiberius Caesar who clung to it during thunderstorms; and Julius Caesar wore a wreath of its leaves. "I HATE BREAKFASTS" BREAKFASTS FRUIT COOLER

Blend in blender:
1 cup milk
1 peach, banana or 1/2 cup strawberries (or try 1/2 banana and 1/2 orange)
1/2 t vanilla
2 ice cubes

This may be sweetened with honey if necessary. Also try adding an egg for protein. Note: "Before you turn your nose up, remember that ice cream is made from milk and raw eggs".

BREAKFAST SANDWICH

In lightly-buttered

saucy pan, break egg into preheated pan (not too hot). Add 2 or 3 T water; cover and cook over low heat about a minute, depending on preferred doneness.

Place cooked egg on piece of toasted wheat bread, sprinkle with grated Cheddar cheese and place under broiler until cheese is hot and bubbly.

SPEEDY TUNA SOUFFLE

1-10 1/2 oz. can cream of celery soup
1-6 1/2 oz. can flaked tuna
4 egg yolks, beaten until thick and lemon-colored
4 egg whites, stiffly beaten

Heat oven to 300 degrees. Heat half of soup in saucepan; stir in drained tuna. Remove from heat. Blend in egg yolks and fold into egg whites. Pour into ungreased 1 1/2 qt. baking dish. Bake 50 to 60 minutes. Dilute remaining soup with 1/4 can water; heat and serve as sauce.

Note from Beverly: "Supposed to serve 4 people, but my husband likes it so well I barely get any."

OLD-FASHIONED COLD WATER STEW

[For family of four]
1 1/2 lbs. lean stew meat
Bay leaf
1 onion, sliced
4 sliced carrots
4 medium potatoes, cut in

bite-size pieces
1 lb. can sliced green beans
1 lb. can corn
1 lb. can stewed tomatoes, optional
2 t Worcestershire sauce
Salt
Pepper

Simmer meat in 4 cups water in large pot with bay leaf until tender, about 1-1 1/2 hours. Remove leaf.

Add remaining ingredients. Simmer until carrots and potatoes are tender, about 30 minutes.

HAMBURGER PIE

1 lb. ground chuck
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 t. salt
Dash pepper
1-1 lb. can cut green beans, drained
1-10 3/4 oz. can tomato soup
5 medium potatoes, boiled
1/2 cup warm milk
1 egg, beaten
1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

In large skillet, cook meat and onion till meat is lightly browned and onion is tender; add salt and pepper, drained beans and soup. Pour into lightly oiled quart casserole. Mash hot potatoes with milk and egg; season with salt and pepper. Spoon in mound over casserole, sprinkle potatoes with cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350) for 25-30 minutes. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

1 cup packed brown sugar
1 egg
1 T milk
1 t vanilla
1 cup sifted flour
1 t baking powder
1/2 t salt
1/2 t cinnamon
1 cup uncooked farina
1 cup raisins

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease baking

sheet. Cream shortening with sugar; add egg, milk and vanilla. Beat until fluffy. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon; add to creamed mixture. Blend thoroughly. Stir in farina and raisins. Drop by tablespoons on greased cookie sheet. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until lightly browned. They are soft so let them stand a minute before removing from sheet. Yield: about 3 dozen.

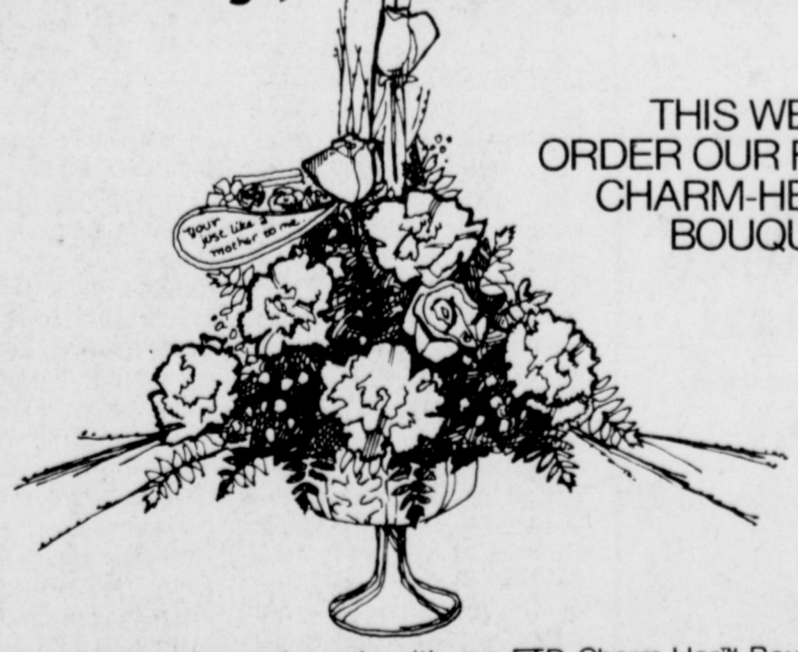

In the N.T. we find statements from the apostle Paul particularly significant, since he was a man of unusual brilliance of mind, as well as one who possessed unusual skill in speaking and writing. To Timothy he wrote, "For which cause I suffer also these things: yet I am not ashamed; for I know him whom I have believed, and I am persuaded that he is able to guard that which I have committed unto him against that day." II Tim. 1:12. In the final chapter to the letter to Philippi, Paul wrote, "Rejoice in the Lord always...In nothing be anxious, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your request be made known unto God.
