The District Conference will begin at 10:30, presided by Gov. Day. A "NOW" luncheon and program will be conducted at noon, with Grove presiding. The afternoon session will get underway at 1:15 p.m., and a dinner-dance at 7 p.m. at the Gateway

A "Family Affair" will commence at 8 a.m. Sunday with a meeting of the executive committee and committee chairmen, winding up the meeting.

Annual Hawk-Husky clash tonight should be close

Hirschi will tangle at 8 this evening in Memorial Stadium in an important Dist. 4-AAA clash that promises to be a close decision.

Because all three Wichita Falls public schools use the one stadium, scheduling sometimes is a problem.

That is why the Hawk-Husky game is often played on Thursday rather than Friday when the two meet in Wichita Falls.

Not only does Coach Tommy Watkins predict a close game, but past meetings of the two clubs have usually turned out that way.

For instance, the 1969 game was decided on a Hawk defensive play with less than a minute remaining in the game. The 1974 and 1976 scores were 3-0.

The Hawks have not defeated Hirschi since the 1974 season. In that game, Daryl Frazier kicked a field

goal with 21 seconds showing on the scoreboard clock, to decide the outcome.

Iowa Park suffered three years following that season in which the Hawks won only one of 30 ball games. Yet there was only one lopsided score in the three meetings. The Huskies won 14-7 in 1975, and edged the Mean Green 3-0 the next year. Hirschi won 28-7 in 1976, and last year outscored the Hawks 31-14.

Just because the Huskies are 1-4 on the season is no reason to take it for granted the Hawks will have an easy time in winning, according to Watkins. He points out the fact that Hirschi has played a tougher non-conference schedule than the Hawks, losing 28-0 to Lawton McArthur, 6-0 and 14-0 to crosstown AAAA rivals Rider and Wichita Falls High, respectively, and last week 29-6 to undefeated conference leader Weatherford.

Watkins also pointed out the Huskies had an easy time knocking off Dallas Bishop Lynch 34-12, the 1978 club, R.L. Harris.

The big Husky back is so valuable. he is played at wide receiver, at runningback and sometimes even at quarterback, in an effort to get the ball to him as much as possible. He not only handles most of the punt and kickoff returning, but does the punting himself, averaging 36 yards on 24 punts this season.

Hirschi always does particularly well on its home field. The Huskies like not only to play before their hometown crowd, but on their

The Head Hawk told the Booster Club at Monday's meeting that everyone in the district will probably be in Memorial Stadium tonight, since all the other games are scheduled to be played tomorrow.

Watkins, speaking on how evenly matched all the teams in the district are this year, said nothing has been decided yet on who will be the champion. Even with two games played by most clubs, the title is still up for grabs. "Any team can beat the other," he said.

United Way campaign nears midway point

The combined forces of United Way volunteers from Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Wichita Falls totaled \$553,686 from packets worked in the past month in the three-city area. The meeting held Thursday was the second report meeting since the annual campaign began Sept. 13.

This brings the annual campaign up to 42 percent of the goal of \$1,314,500. Iowa Park Public Employees Chairman Steve Morath received the "Dead Man" award given to the leader who reported in the least amount up to date though local United Way Chairman Keith Aulds reports his workers are "moving right along" in contacting their designated employee groups.

"Everyone is busy and I expect our local campaign to really pick up steam in the next few weeks, and I also expect Steve will pick up his packets before the next report meeting so he won't have to carry that thing around with him again," Aulds said.

Morath heads the area of public employees, the division which takes in the public schools and city offices.

Vern Horsky contacts the businesses with large groups of employees. The professional area, which

includes doctors, dentists, lawyers and ministers is under the leadership of Dr. Carter Pirkle.

Bill Steger, metro division leader, has all areas not classified in the other divisions.

The campaign will be in full force through Nov. 15, the scheduled day for the victory luncheon.

Money for the United Way is collected to fund 33 community service agencies in Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Wichita Falls.

Allocations are made annually to these groups from the funds collected during the campaign with funding designated on the basis of projected need and programs.



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

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

Soil fertility tests established

Three soil fertility demonstrations were established last week on wheat. These trials are aimed at measuring crop response to the major elements - nitrogen, phosphorous, and potassium. They are also designed to show the effects of minor elements including zinc and sulphur. Soil amendment compounds are being tested. such as gypsum, to loosen the soil and lime to treat acid soils.

Marvin Klinkerman is conducting one of the demonstrations which is located north of his house on FM 368, north of Iowa Park. The fertilizer combination which gives the greatest economic return is the main goal of his test.

The site has been in wheat for several years. It is a Deandale silt loam which has a 9 inch surface layer of silt loam. The subsoil is a very firm clay which takes water slowly. This soil is low in nitrogen and phosphorous and is high in potassium.

Combinations of fertilizers being tried include 40-0-0,

100-50-0, 80-40-0 plus 3,000 pounds of gypsum, and 0-0-0. Plots will be combine harvested to determine vields.

The purpose of the demonstration by Otto Malone of Electra, on a sandy soil near the Red River is to measure the response to minor elements and soil amendment compounds. His site is an Enterprise very fine sandy loam which is low in nitrogen, high in phosphorous, medium in potassium, and slightly acid with a 6.4 pH.

Rates being tried include 80-0-0, 0-40-0, 0-0-40, 80-40-40, 80-40-40 plus 3,000 pounds of gypsum, 80-40-40 plus 3,000 pounds of lime, 80-40-40 plus 12 pounds of zinc, and 0-0-0. This is a very fertile soil which mainly needs nitrogen. However, it is low in sulfur, zinc, and calcium.

The gypsum will provide both the needed calcium and sulfur. Lime is being tried to add calcium and raise the soil pH. Zinc and sulfur are being added in the form of tions, in addition to Fred

40-40-0, 80-40-0, 80-40-40, zinc sulfate.

The soil test indicates the addition of nitrogen, calcium, sulfur, and zinc should give the best results. This demonstration will measure fertility combination the best crop giving the response.

A demonstration by Loys and James Barbour is aimed measuring the crop at response to various levels of nitrogen, phosphorous, and Topdressing potassium. with nitrogen in January will be measured too. The site is located on the 287 expressway between Iowa Park and Wichita Falls. It is Frankirk loam which is low in nitrogen and phosphorous and is high in potassium and calcium.

Fertilizers being tested include 40-0-0, 0-0-0, 0-0-40, 80-0-0, 0-80-0, 0-0-80, 80-40-0, 80-40-0 plus 3,000 pounds of gypsum, and 80-40-0 preplant plus 40-0-0 in January. This demonstration is the exact location of the test in 1978-79. This means the check plot will have a 2-year

history of no fertilizer. All of these demonstra-

Daume's test reported recently, are under the sponsorship of the county field crops committee headed by Fred Dwyer. Fertilzer for the tests have been provided by Ralph Harvey of Texhoma Agri Products, Allen Kemple of K & K Grain Company, and Frank Wolf of Thornberry. Steve Montz of Brookside Laboratory assisted by providing soil tests and laying out the demonstrations.

This is a "tribute" to the Wichita County farmer. Wind velocity reached as high as 48 miles per hour one day recently, yet there was very little blowing dust. This shows expertise of our local farmers, as well as our neighbors in Oklahoma, in protecting their land from wind erosion.

There are nearly 90,000 acres of bare ground across the top of the county waiting to be planted in wheat. A combination of keeping the old crop residue near the surface and using proper tillage methods reduced blowing soil to a minimum even when subjected to the strong winds. If winds of this velocity under current drouth conditions had occurred 2-3 decades ago, visibility would have been reduced to only a few hundred feet.

In case you don't realize it, there is a real fight brewing among educators in the state of Texas. And unless the fight is won by the good guys, our children will suffer in the long run. Now that's a strong statement, but based on what I've observed over the

They want collective bargaining; they want powers which have traditionally been reserved for local elected authority; they want contracts which would make Civil Service envious; they want rights which they have but are being told they don't have.

Apparently the paid staff of the TSTA is beating the bushes, trying to get local teachers worked up. And there are some, maybe not in our system as far as I know, who are spouting the same message.

superintendent of the Wichita Falls Public Schools, did an outstanding job of rebutting Rogers' points, according to what I read in the Wichita Falls newspaper.

Williamson, who has experience in schools where collective bargaining is allowed, should know as much or more about the union-type objectives of the militant educators than anyone in this area.

Collective bargaining is no good without the threat of strike, he pointed out.

Rogers underplayed the number of teacher strikes when he said only four percent of the 11,000 locals went on strike three years ago. That's 4,400 school districts shut down, affecting how many thousands and thousands of young students?

Several seasoned educators warned me about what was going to happen when the TSTA affiliated with the NEA. And it is all coming

It's a shame, but the TSTA, unless some drastic changes come about, will become a shell in the more conservative areas of the state. It will continue to flourish in the big cities, I

expect. But taking its place, at least in this part of the country, is the Association of Texas Educators. This is a more moderate, conservative group of educators who apparently are more interested in an organization which furthers professional standards, not union-type tactics.

I understand about half the Iowa Park faculty now belongs to the ATE. I suspect the figure will grow to near 100 percent next year, like Vernon, when local educators learn more about what the TSTA leadership is doing to their organization.

I don't like unions in the first place. And the first place unions do not belong is in public education.


