Governor Price Daniel covernor Pice Daniel said today that preliminary figures, showing a 9 per cent reduction in Texas highway deaths as compared with 4 per cent for the entire nation, are a tribute to the tremendous efforts of Texans who have given so much time and energy to saving lives time and energy to saving lives on our streets and highways.

on our streets and highways.

The Governor said the tentative figures, compiled by the Statistical Services of the Department of Public Safety, indicate that more than 200 lives were saved in 1958 as compared with 1957 traffic deaths. Final figures will not be know until the holiday and hospital reports are completed, the Governor said, "but it is certain that the Statewide campaign for reducing fatalities in 1958 has been very successful."

With such comparatively small loss of life in the holiday period, this December may prove to have been one of the safest Decembers in years, traffic-

"In any event, the Governor said." It appears that 1958 will be the second consecutive year in which Texas has reduced its in which Texas has reduced its traffic toll. The 1957 death list was down 3 per cent over 1956, and 1958 apparently will add another 9 or 10 per cent reduc-tion.

Washington, D. C. — If you have not heard a sonic boom, it likely will not be long before you do. You will not have to visit an air show or live near an air base. It may awaken you in the night. It may set the dishes jumping in the cupboard at any hour of the day or night, no matter where you live.

Instead of finding an answer to a problem, the problem is increasing day by day. Within eight to ten years from now, commercial planes will be breaking the sound barrier. Contrary to popular understanding, when a plane breaks the sound barrier by flying at a speed of 750 miles per hour at sea level, the barrier stays broken as long as the plane flys at that speed or greater. In other words, it is not one boom, but a continuous boom affecting everything in the path of the shock wave which it creates.





Built around nutritional and nursing needs of oldsters, the program promises to be the big-

nursing needs of oldsters, the program promises to be the biggest boon to their health and comfort since passage of the nursing home licensure law in 1953. It works like this:

On request of county health officers and local health department directors, a nutritionist, a chronic disease nurse and two sanitarians instruct local health health


