Packed audience speaks out against mobile home issue

A proposal to restrict future locations of mobile homes in Iowa Park received a thorough airing during Monday's meeting of the city council, but no action was taken on amending the zoning ordinance when the issue was tabled for "further discussion."

The subject attracted one of the largest audiences to fill council chambers since it was built, as all seats were filled and people were standing in the back of the room.

Each was given a chance to ask questions or express displeasure with the ordinance, which was the purpose of announcing the agenda, according to Mayor Johnny Crawford.

The council and Planning and Zoning Commission, after several joint meetings over the past few weeks, have generally agreed future locations of mobile homes in the city should be restricted to mobile home parks or subdivisions.

All those who spoke against the ordinance said they already lived in mobile homes on land they had purchased. They said they did not like a restriction which would not permit them to replace the mobile home they now own, either for a newer and larger unit or should the home be damaged beyond repair by fire or storm.

The proposed ordinance would force present mobile home owners to move, City Attorney O.N. Newman explained, only that they could not be replaced with another mobile home.

The issue should be back on the council's agenda within 60 days, aldermen suggested, for action to accept, defeat or alter the proposed ordinance.

OTHER BUSINESS

Among other items taken up by council members, they approved abandoning a portion of right of way on North Victoria, and turned down a

petition to disannex property.

John Barbour, owner of Barbour Trucking Co., asked that right of way along part of the 100 block of N. Victoria be abandoned, primarily so his existing building would meet set-back requirements.

Barbour said the truck workshop, which is currently being renovated, had been constructed three feet into the 100-foot-wide Victoria several years ago.

He said if the city would abandon at least 12.6 feet, his building, as well as the junior high building, would then be in compliance with city requirements.

Council members voted to abandon 12.6 feet on both the east and west sides of the street from East Highway to the alley.

Mayor Crawford said it would be recommended to the Planning and

Zoning Commission that a variance of the building code be made for the building being renovated. That issue is a requirement that a structure be set back from public right of way two feet for every one foot of structure height.

Aldermen, on a 3-2 vote, rejected a petition by Mrs. Paul E. Miller to disannex her property in Bogan Acres because she said she was not receiving any benefits from the city.

Mrs. Miller has appeared before the council at least twice before, requesting water be extended to her property, which is the extreme east end of Bogan Acres, a tract of land at the southeast intersection of the Expressway and Bell Road.

Mrs. Miller said she has no road, no sewer service nor water, and doesn't want to pay city taxes because of it.

The family took possession of the tract almost three months ago, and moved a small mobile home on it with intentions of building a home, she told the council.

At earlier meetings, Mrs. Miller was told the city was attempting to contact other property owners in that area to see if they wanted to participate in the laying of the water line, to make it larger than a two-inch line. Contacts have not yet been completed, it was explained.

After the split vote, in which Bill Gilmore and Johnny Lee voted to approve disannexation and George Hammonds, Lita Watson and Bud Adams voted against it, Mrs. Miller said "O.K., we'll see you in court."

The council also approved sale of a wrecked city pickup, and will advertise for purchase of a new compact pickup.



TREES HARVESTED - City officials have expressed deep concern following discovery of cutting the larger trees over a 10-acre area on the west side of Lake Iowa Park during the past week. City Administrator Steve Morath said it is against the law to cut trees on any public property without official permission. The recent cutting, which took place two different days, was believed to have been done by a commercial firewood sales firm, the identity known by Morath. Large piles of branches were left behind by each stump.

Trustees hire new ag teacher

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday night approved hiring a new vocational agriculture teacher to begin the spring semester, approved the 1978-79 school year audit, and heard a report of efforts to obtain employment for last spring's graduates.

After accepting the resignation of Jimmy Howell, trustees approved hiring recent Tarleton Univ. graduate George Terry Brandt, 25, to fill the vacancy.

Howell explained in a letter that his resignation would become effective Dec. 19, after nine and a half years as a teacher in the vocational agriculture department. Brandt will pick up Howell's five classes, which includes four periods of ornamental horticulture and one for production agriculture.

Howell is resigning to accept a position with Estes Chemical. Supt. Faris Nowell complimented the work

Howell had done for the school and said he would gladly accept him any time in the future should he wish to return.

Brandt, a product of Coleman High School, has a varied background both in academics and employment, and Nowell said he was qualified to fill the position.

Auditor Ken Schroeder went over the audit with trustees, explaining all record keeping was in order with one exception, and all monies were accounted for.

During his comments, Schroeder said \$40,840 more money was collected than budgeted; \$1,465,000 in bonds remain outstanding but the 1962 and 1966 series will be retired this year; and \$52,474 in delinquent taxes had been collected during the year.

Richard Davis, named last year as student placement officer with duties of assisting present and former

students find full and part time employment, gave a report of his first full year's activities.

He said he had made 260 contacts with potential employers, had contact with 302 students through his office, referred 225 students to job opportunities, and had placed 145 students in either full time or part time employment.

In a follow up of the 147 spring graduates, he said 76 had full time employment and 40 were employed part time. Thirty-six percent of the students are attending college, with 15 of them attending school full time and not employed, and 38 attending college part time and employed.

Among those students who were graduated last spring, 39 are attending Midwestern State University, three are enrolled at Vernon Regional Junior College, two at Wayland Baptist College, and the others are scattered at various

institutions. Cryovac is the largest single employer of 1979 graduates, with 12 on the industry's payroll, according to Davis' report.

Davis also told trustees 67 percent of all students at Iowa Park High, and 87 percent of the senior class, are enrolled in a vocational course.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business:

* Trustees adopted a policy of limiting all student trips, other than those related to University Inter-scholastic League activities, be limited to within 75 miles of Iowa Park, and any activity outside that area must receive board approval.

* Bill Steger told trustees the school's supply of gasoline was becoming critically short, but he believed there would be no problem in the immediate future.

Cook of the Week

Looking for a "paradise for the palate", something different to add zest to the Christmas dinner and other holiday meals? Mrs. Jack Coltrain's role as Cook of the Week seems to be perfectly timed by reason of her recipe for Scalloped Pineapple, definitely something new and different in our recipe files.

Pineapple has tradition, myth and history, and it is an exotic addition to our everyday living as well as special occasions.

Sailors of Columbus found pineapples growing on the island of Guadalupe in 1493 when they wandered off in the dense tropical forest and were lost for several days. Peter Martin, historian of the expedition records the excitement of tasting their first pineapples. Father Oviedo wrote "It - the pineapple restores a healthy appetite and stimulates people to eat".

Jack and Linda Coltrain and their four children, Danny a high school sophomore, Sam an eighth grader, Cindy a sixth grade student, and Jana a fourth grader, moved to Iowa Park in June. He is manager of Holiday Inn Downtown in Wichita Falls and she works as an assistant bookkeeper at Bates-Barrios Chevrolet.

A graduate of Pittsburg, Kansas High School, Linda has worked as an assistant to her husband in several places where they have lived. Her interests other than her family and work include crochet, ceramics and different kinds of needle work.

SCALLOPED PINEAPPLE

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple
- 3 cups packed bread crumbs
- 1 cup marshmallow bits

Mix everything together. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees uncovered or till knife inserted in middle comes out clean.

TURTLE COOKIES

- Sift together 1/2 cups flour and 1/4 t soda.
- Cream: 1/2 cup butter and gradually add 1/2 cup firmly

packed brown sugar, creaming well.

Add one egg and one egg yolk and beat well (reserve white)

Blend in one t vanilla and 1/8 t maple flavoring (optional). Add dry ingredients gradually. Mix thoroughly. Dough will be soft. Chill.

Arrange pecan halves in groups of 3 or 5 on greased baking sheet to resemble the head and legs of a turtle. Mold dough into balls, dip bottom into unbeaten egg white and press lightly onto nuts, using a rounded teaspoon. Cool and frost tops.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING

Combine 2 squares (2 oz.) of unsweetened chocolate, 1/4 cup milk and 1 teaspoon butter in top of double boiler. Heat over boiling water until chocolate is melted. Blend until smooth. Remove from heat and add 1 cup of sifted powdered sugar.

CHILI RICE BAKE

- 1 lb. lean ground beef
- 1 cup chopped onion and green pepper
- 2 cups beef broth (consomme soup can be used)
- 1-6 oz. can tomato paste
- 3 cups cooked rice
- 1 t garlic salt
- 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese

Saute beef, onion and

green peppers until meat is almost done. Add: broth, tomato paste and seasonings. Place in shallow baking dish (2 qt.) Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Serves 6.

SURPRISE COOKIES

- 1/2 lb. chocolate chips
- 4 egg whites
- 1/4 t salt
- 1/4 t cream of tartar
- 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 cup walnuts
- 1 t vanilla

Beat egg whites until foamy, add: salt, cream of tartar and beat until egg whites are stiff enough to hold peaks but not dry. Add sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time beating after each addition. Fold in chocolate, nuts and vanilla. Drop by teaspoons on wax paper. Bake at 300 degrees for 25 minutes. Remove while still warm. Do not make cookies very large.

HAMBURGER PIE

- CRUST: 2 cups sifted flour
- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 t onion salt
- 1/4 cup cold water
- HAMBURGER FILLING: 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 can (15-16 oz.) green beans, drained
- 1 t salt
- 1/4 t pepper
- 1 - 10 oz. can tomato soup
- 2 T chili powder
- 1/8 t garlic powder
- Brown beef and onion till meat is brown, stir in green beans, soup and seasonings. Pour into pastry shell. Place top crust over filling and bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes or until crust is brown.





They could just about change the Wichita County Pecan Show to "Virgil Woodfin and other Iowa Parkans Show."

The retired superintendent of the Iowa Park Experiment Station walked off from the annual show with a basket full of prizes,

leading a long list of Iowa Park exhibitors who earned honors.

Woodfin had the champion shelling pecan, a Shawnee variety, and the champion shell entry, a Choctaw. The Shawnee had 61.1 percent kernel and consisted of 63.4 nuts per pound. The Choctaw had 38.8 pecans per pound and a dress-out of 58.8 percent kernel.

Additionally, Woodfin had five first and a second place in the variety show.

Wesley Davis had the dubious distinction of entering the lightest pecans of the show. His entry required 181.4 nuts to make a pound, and judges didn't bother to shell the tiny pecans to determine the percentage of kernel.

Woodfin's Choctaw, Mohawk, Shawnee, Onilwon and San Saba Improved entries were variety champions. His Mohawk entry placed second.

group sang "Tomorrow Shall Be My Dancing Day".



She would not leave the calf for two or three days to get water or feed in the zero-degree weather. Billie and I carried her a tub of water and some feed. I was impressed that a dumb animal could show such love for its young.

Also, one morning it was snowing so fast and beautiful, I had the urge to get on Old Susy, my faithful quarterhorse, and ride. I put on all the clothes I had and rode into snow. In a few minutes I was completely lost in the snow - visibility was only a few feet. I remember the ecstatic feeling of delight of being surrounded and all alone in all the beauty about me. Later I followed the old barbed wire fence back home.

Christmas Eve, the weather changed to cold and clear with everything sparkling white. That night we took the boys for a ride in

the pickup truck. When about a mile from home, we looked back and thought we saw bright lights near our house. We rushed back home. Santa had come during the short time we were gone.

We are all well and happy today, but none were happier than Christmas 1961.
