Bradford Resigns Superintendency After 33 Years; Will Move to Wichita, Teach in Oklahoma

Supt. W. R. Bradford is leaving the Iowa Park school system after 33 years of service, and has accepted a position in the Randlett (Okla.) high school as a teacher of mathematics and American history.

He has been in the Iowa Park schools since July 1920 with the exception of three years, 1927-30, when he was superintendent of schools in Panhandle and traveled for the Wichita School Supply Co. The entire school plant has been built since Mr. Bradford came here.



with the exception of the superintendent's home, and it has been remodeled.

In Jun 1920 the 2½ story school building was leveled by a storm. Since that time three school buildings have been erected. The first home economics cottage was the 7th to be built in the state.

Besides the elementary and high school buildings, the Iowa Park system has a band and agriculture building, cafeteria and football stadium.

All the trees have been planted around the school and the superintendent's home during Mr. Bradford's tenure of office.

Since 1920 the school has grown into a first class standard high school with 34 credits. In 1920 it had 8 teachers and only basic subjects.

Since then the following subjects have been added: home economics, agriculture, band, commercial subjects, music, science, physical education for girls and boys.

We now have 32 teachers, 2 caretakers, 4 buses, a librarian, 6 cafeteria workers and superintendent's secretary.

The Iowa Park school district plant is worth \$300,000 with bonded indebtedness of \$70,500.

The cafeteria takes about \$20,000 a year: to operate, not counting government assistance. It was built in 1941 and is considered outstanding.

The elementary school is supervised by Miss Ethyle Kidwell, principal and is separated from the junior high and high schools.

Iowa Park was fortunate on year in securing a teacher for handicapped pupils and it has made application for one this year. There are few trained teachers for this work.

More than 1000 pupils have been graduated under Mr. Bradford's guidance and not one has been sentenced for a major crime. Congressman Frank Icard kept a record during World War II and found that Iowa Park had more commissioned officers than any other town its size in north Texas.

Supt. Bradford began his formal education at age 19 in the fifth grade. He attended a rural school in southern Wise county. He made two grades that year.

(The reason he started to school was because he wanted to learn fractions and to spell and write, so he could write to his girl friend — and then she quit him!)

Mr. Bradford attended Boyd high school for two years and then entered North Texas Teachers college at Denton in 1912. He finished a three year course just before they raised the standard of the school to a four-year course.

After teaching at Bridgeport and being principal for two years, he became superintendent of the Byers school, a position he held three years.

He entered the University of Denver, Colo., and received his B.A. degree in 1927. During the summer 1937-41 he attended Texas Tech at Lubbock and received his master's degree in 1941.

He has taught school 37 years and has given much time to the community and its civic activities.

The list of his activities and honors shows Mr. Bradford has been and is a powerful influence for the better things:

Past president of the Lions club with 23 years membership.

Member and past director of the chamber of commerce.

Member of Masonic lodge and Order of the Eastern Star.

Past president of Wichita County School Masters organization.

Past president of Wichita County Teachers organization.

Director general of University Interscholastic League for 10 or more years.

Member of house of delegates to Texas Teachers association.

Appointed to Who's Who in American Education.

He has accompanied all senior classes except two on their Carlsbad trip for the past 18 years.

Mr. Bradford has never failed to try to help any graduate to get jobs or go to some kind of school to train himself. He was never too busy to talk to and encourage them.

It can truly be said Mr. Bradford has given the best years of his life to the boys and girls of Iowa Park school district.

Mr. Bradford has also been civic and school minded, and has been Mr. Bradford's "right hand man."

She is a former teacher and has been elected as a substitute teacher in the Wichita Falls school system for next year.

The Bradfords have one daughter, Bobbie Jo, now Mrs. John P. Guthrie of Denver. They had one daughter Mary Kathrine who died in infancy.

Mr. and Mrs. Bradford are moving to their home in Wichita Falls in the near future. He will commute to Randlett each day.

Mr. Bradford was presented a beautiful wrist watch by the school personnel and school board Monday morning in the closing chapel program of the year.

McIntyre Opens Shop As Part of Home Building Project Here

Iowa Park is due for more residential expansion if plans of J. B. McIntyre work out. He and Mrs. McIntyre, who lived in Iowa Park in 1935, have returned and opened for business at 204 North Jackson.

Mr. McIntyre has commitments to build 8 houses which he has already started, and has contracts for 30 houses. He has built 17 homes here the past two years.

He gives free estimates on new homes or remodeling and makes arrangements for FHA loans. He is building two-bedroom homes and the kitchen cabinets and baths are finished in ceramic tile. He is also dealer for Sherwin-Williams paints.

Along with contracting, he is building book cases, mantels, kitchen cabinets, telephone cabinets, china cabinets, picture frames and novelties.

Mrs. McIntyre as a girl lived northwest of Iowa Park and will be remembered as Viola Heaton.

They have five children. John is working here with his father. A daughter Evelyn works at Bowie.

The other children are of school age and live with the parents. They are affiliated with the Baptist church and plan to make Iowa Park their home soon. At present the family home is Bowie.

THE STATE OF TEXAS

To: Ulysses Barrows, Defendant, Greeting:
 You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 78th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 8th day of June A.D. 1953, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Second Amended Original Petition filed in said Court, on the 24th day of April, A.D. 1953, in this cause, numbered 50,398-B on the docket of said court and styled Doris Lee Barrows, Plaintiff, vs. Ulysses Barrows, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:
 After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about September 12, 1950 and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about November 1, 1951, when they separated; that the defendant would get drunk and leave her, and the defendant has not contributed anything toward the support of plaintiff for more than two years; by reason of this cruel, harsh and tyrannical treatment on the part of the defendant toward this plaintiff without cause or provocation, their further living together is insupportable; that there is no community property and that there were no children born of this marriage;

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon trial hereof she have judgment for divorce and for such other and further relief, in law or in equity, to which she may show herself justly entitled.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

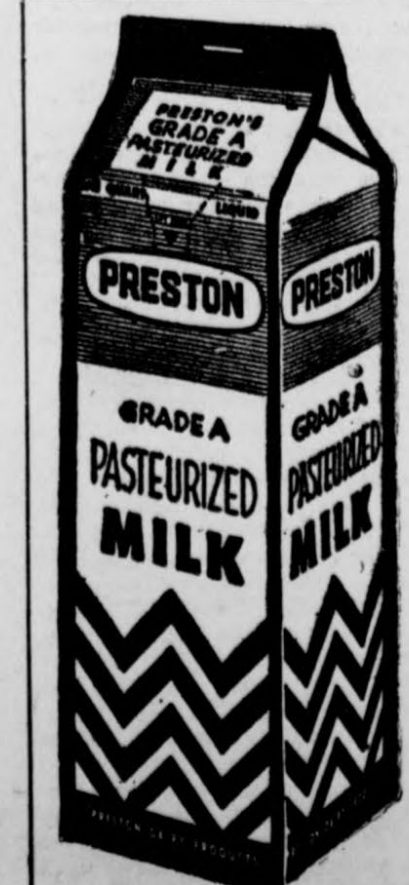

Soil Conservation

Supervisors of the W-W Soil Conservation district have started plans for a stepped-up mulching program. The supervisors with the assistance of farm machinery dealers and local chambers of commerce plan to have a Field Day soon after wheat harvest to study stubble management as done by various plows.

It is believed by soil technicians that soil condition or tilth is the greatest problem to be reckoned with for movement of water, air and plants. Under these conditions, leaving large amounts of crop stubble on the surface intercepts the falling raindrop and reduces its impact on the soil.

Decay of these residues opens up the surface of soil to allow greater water penetration. Bare ground often gets 30 to 35 degrees hotter than the air temperature; this can be reduced by having a mulch of residues on the surface. A reduction of soil temperature reduces loss of water from evaporation.

The district program does not maintain that stubble mulching alone will give total conservation, but that it, with proper conservation rotation, and needed mechanical practices applied according to the land's capabilities and needs will give conservation and increased production.

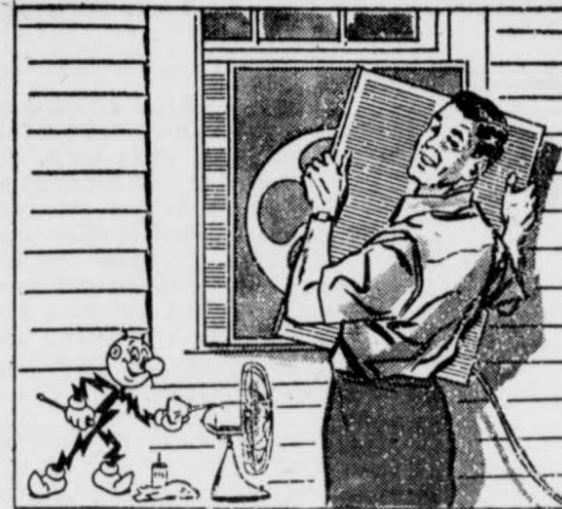

Farmers Union speaks

By L. B. Lovell

James G. Patton, national president of the Farmers Union, last week sent out a nationwide appeal to grassroots farmers to tell Congress immediately how they feel about appropriations for vital federal farm programs.

The crippling cuts in farm program funds to wreck farm progress are being continued full force despite the fact that farmers today face the worst economic conditions since 1914—with worse to come.

The department of agriculture's prediction of the lowest net income for farmers since 1941 was reported last week. Total net this year will be \$1,900,000,000.00 under the net of last year.

An official USDA report revealed that farm land dollar values have declined 2 per cent in four months since November 1952 — reflecting falling prices and the expectation of continued poorer returns to agriculture. Top USDA officials have indicated repeatedly in public statements they think an economic "shakedown" in agriculture is desirable as a device to reduce farm production.

The boldest expression of this viewpoint came when Undersecretary Morse told a conference of farm newspapermen that price supports prevent the normal healthy adjustments which would force the small "inefficient" farmers to get off their farms and let their land grow up to grass and trees.

Congressional leaders immediately blasted this as a plan to plow under the family farmer and encourage the transition of American agriculture to big-scale corporation farming.

The axe of Morse's "adjustments" will fall on beginning farmers—the young war veterans and others who are trying to make their way under the load of heavy debts, long before it begins to weed out those whom he calls "inefficient."

The so-called surpluses of today are no larger than at several times in the recent past when they proved to be life-savers for the nation.

So-called subsidies to agriculture are far smaller than similar grants to other industries. The department of agriculture alone among civilian departments has already taken severe reductions. While the 1952 USDA expenditures were 40 per cent under ten years ago, the department of commerce was up 300 per cent.

Fate of agricultural conservation payments, rural electrification and telephones, farmer-elected committees, soil conservation service, crop insurance, credit for beginning farmers, school lunch—all depends on action by Congress to repair crippling cuts in the department of agriculture budget.


