Party primaries Saturday

Both the Democratic and Republican parties will hold primaries and precinct conventions Saturday.

Polls will remain open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Those voting in the Democratic Party primary will vote at one of the following polls: precinct 32, ASCS building; precinct 33, Faith Baptist Church; precinct 34, Valley View school; precinct 35, Kamay community building; and precinct 60, Valley Farms community building.

Democrats will hold their respective precinct conventions at 7:15 p.m. at those polling places.

Republicans residing in precincts 32 and 33 will cast their votes at the First Christian Church. Precincts 34, 35 and 60 will vote at the Valley View school.

Republican precinct conventions will begin at 7:05 p.m.

Without question, the hottest race in the county is for county commissioner of precinct 3. Incumbent Buck Voyles opted not to seek re-election, and the opening attracted seven Democrats and one Republican.

One other local race, for constable of precinct 3, is contested.

County-wide, two races have drawn heated competition: county attorney

and county tax assessor-collector. All candidates are Democrats.

DEMOCRATS

Vying for county commissioner are, as their names appear on the ballot, Gordon Griffith, Harold Phillips, Sidney Smith, Louis Sefcik, Junior Guthrie, Boyd Curtis and Virginia Klinkerman.

Incumbent A.L. Bohannon is being contested by former Iowa Park policeman Gideon (Gene) Swedberg, for precinct 3 constable.

Ann Kremp, Harold Lerew, Charles Perry and Deloyd Bailey are competing for the county attorney's

post. Candidates for county tax assessor-collector are C.M. Pool Jr., Miles Graham and Monte Beasley.

Timothy Eyssen is uncontested for district attorney as is Jim Hogan for county court at law judge, and John Gibson for sheriff.

A heated race has developed on the state level for state representative of the 53rd district, where Charles Finnell is the incumbent. He is opposed by Harold Bonham and William Sherrill Burba.

Other state office positions contested include: Buddy Temple and John Poerner for railroad commissioner; James Nugent and Jim Hightower for rail commissioner; James P. Wallace, John C. Phillips and Wayne Scott for place one, state supreme court; Sears McGee and Lawrence E. Bergman, place two, supreme court; Marvin O. Teague and Leon Douglas, place one, court of criminal appeals judge; W.T. Phillips, John Humphreys and Mike McCormick, place two, court of criminal appeals judge; and Tom Davis, Walter Boyd and Edith Roberts, place three, court of criminal appeals judge.

Uncontested state offices include: Robert M. Campbell, place three, supreme court; C.L. Ray, place four, supreme court; W.W. Carter, 13th district state board of education; Joe Spurlock, district two, court of criminal appeals; Larry Lambert, 78th district judge; and Temple Driver, 89th district judge.

Jack Hightower is uncontested in his bid for re-election as U.S. representative for the 13th district.

While Democrats will cast their votes for the preference of presidential candidate, the outcome is non-binding. Candidates whose names appear on the ballot are incumbent Jimmy Carter, Edward Kennedy, and Jerry Brown, who has withdrawn. Voters will also have a chance to vote "uncommitted."

REPUBLICANS
Voting will not take members of the Republican Party long Saturday.

Only two candidates on the ballot for county office. Small E. Hart is candidate for commissioner of precinct three, and Elton Winton is candidate for county tax assessor-collector.

Ron Slover is candidate for U.S. representative of the 13th district.

Three candidates oppose each other for the railroad commissioner position. They are Henry C. Grover, E.W. Kidd and John Thomas

MOBILE HOMES ARE ISSUE

City council's meeting crowded

There wasn't even much room left to stand at Monday night's city council meeting, it was so crowded.

The council was discussing a mobile home ordinance again.

All those in the audience were given an opportunity to express their situations or opposition to any type of ordinance which would restrict mobile homes in the city.

Mayor Johnny Crawford told the audience, several times during the meeting, that the council was only taking input from the public at the present and was not ready to enact any new ordinance governing mobile homes.

Steve Morath, city administrator, told the council that a study of the existing ordinances by the city attorney had brought about discovery that two ordinances concerning mobile homes were in conflict, and that the situation should be

corrected.

He suggested repealing sections 11-5 and 11-7 of the code of ordinances, which permit mobile homes to locate on individual lots under certain circumstances. After the sections were repealed, the original zoning ordinance would govern mobile homes in the city, he explained.

The zoning ordinance, which covers the entire city, would not permit mobile homes to be located in the city other than in mobile home parks. It would not, however, affect those already located on individual lots, it was explained. But future influx of mobile homes would be subject to the zoning ordinance.

Morath, at the suggestion of the Planning and Zoning Commission, also suggested an ordinance be drafted which would govern all mobile homes in the city: "placing

additional requirements on mobile homes including underskirting, removal of wheels, permanent foundation, no storage under mobile home, provisions for a detached storage building, and the owner of the mobile home must be the sole owner of the lot that the mobile home is placed on for all isolated, nonconforming mobile homes. Two years would be provided for all persons to comply with the regulations above."

Morath was instructed to have the ordinances drafted for consideration at the next council meeting, May 12.

The council has been attempting to come up with a plan which would restrict all future mobile homes locating in the city to mobile home parks or sub divisions. One plan which was discussed would have allowed those "non-conforming" mobile homes to remain where they are located, and be replaced if for any reason. But the plan did not allow ownership to be changed, and the mobile home would have to be moved if it were sold.

One owner told the council that the lot with a concrete slab for a mobile home would be worthless on the market, if he were required to sell it for a conventional home site, because of the cost of site preparation in clearing the slab.

serve as protection for vehicles parked there.

Rules and regulations for city parks established a standard of conduct which must be observed in parks, and mainly prohibits any type of motorized vehicles from straying from established roads and parking areas. Fines will be issued to violators.

The ordinance in its entirety is published on page 14 of this issue.

After the council assured a Wichita Falls man who has contracts with funeral homes in his city that Iowa Park was not going to compete with him for grave digging services, the mayor was authorized to sign the contract with Tanner-Aulds Funeral Home.

The new water rate to be paid Wichita Falls, effective today, will be 48.41 cents per 1,000 gallons. Iowa Park has been paying 50 cents for several months. The contract extends to April 30, 1981.

Council members, after a lengthy executive session during which the audience was required to leave council chambers, approved a five-year lease to Iowa Park Ready Mix to remain located at the sewer treatment plant site.

Mayor Crawford reappointed Lita Watson mayor pro tem, as well as commissioner of parks. Other commission appointments were Bud Adams, water and sewer; Bud Thompson, streets; George Hammond, police department; and Bill Gilmore, sanitation department.

Many of those who spoke were concerned about losing money invested on their lots and mobile homes if the ordinance were passed.

Some asked the council if any type of ordinance governing mobile homes were necessary. They said they felt they were being discriminated against.

One man suggested the city should have mobile home owners on the committee when planning any ordinances of this type.

When a woman suggested that older citizens and young couples could not get financing for homes with today's cost of construction, L.S. Whisnand asked to speak to the audience.

Whisnand was appointed to the Planning and Zoning Commission last month. He is a real estate agent and building contractor.

He explained that there are federal assistance programs, such as Farmers Home Administration and 235, which allowed persons to buy a home with a total move-in cost of \$900, and payments were tailored to the person's income.

THREAT TO OTHER PROPERTY

Whisnand told the audience that one reason for restricting mobile homes from their continued spread

throughout the city was that the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) will not appraise a conventional house if a mobile home is on the same block or across the street from it.

"It's not our (the city's) doing," he said. "This is the rule of the federal government."

Almost 80 percent of all homes mortgaged in Iowa Park are either FHA or VA financed, Whisnand said. If a person wants to sell such a home, and a mobile home is within the described distance, FHA and VA financing will not be available. It could only be sold by conventional financing, he explained.

When one person in the audience suggested that deed restrictions in the neighborhoods would prevent mobile homes from locating there, Whisnand pointed out that different additions have varying deed restrictions and periods in which they apply.

Some deed restrictions expire after 20 years, Whisnand said, though he admitted he did not know the limitations of the various housing additions in Iowa Park.

When this was explained, Alderman Lita Watson said she did not understand why conventional home owners were not attending meetings, if they had so much at stake.

Other council actions almost overshadowed

Several important actions acted on Monday by the city council were almost completely overshadowed by discussion of mobile homes.

Council members designated West Cash Street as one-way, passed rules and regulations for public parks, approved a contract for digging graves at Highland Cemetery and approved an agreement for purchasing water from Wichita Falls, at a cost less than what the city now pays.

Steve Morath, city administrator, told the council it would require about two weeks before work could be completed for changing West Cash to a one-way street.

He said markings for parking would have to be changed from 30 degrees to 60 degrees and signs posted.

Islands on the four corners will be extended into the street, on which traffic signs will be posted, and also

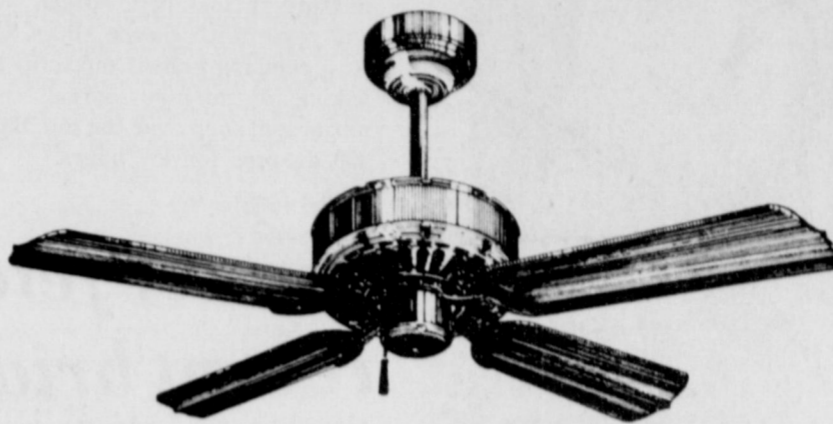
The Amity Study Club which was organized last fall was presented a charter by Mrs. Harold Green second vice president of TFWC. It was

Cook of the Week

Mrs. Preston Bayne modestly admits that desserts are her favorite. The dessert recipes that we chose from several of hers for use this week sound like lush creations that would easily identify one as a dessert expert.

Her recipe for Zucchini Bread, a dessert, attests to the versatility of vegetables. Zucchini is a variety of squash, which is a native of the New World where it was widely cultivated by the Indians long before European settlement. Roger Williams, the founder of Rhode Island, described the Indian vegetable as "vine apples of several colors." The name "squash" is taken from the Indian word askutasquash, meaning "eat raw or uncooked". The Indians and early settlers probably never dreamed that a squash variety would someday be the main ingredient in a dessert.

Mr. and Mrs. Bayne moved to Iowa Park last June from Vernon. He is store manager for Norriss Bros. Lumber Co. in Wichita Falls. They are longtime residents of Paducah where they owned a hardware and appliance store for a number of years.

Mrs. Bayne was graduated from Paducah High School. She worked as secretary-cashier for Coca-Cola Bottling Co. and cashier for West Texas Utility Co. and at their hardware and appliance store in Paducah, and as manager of Vernon Savings and Loan Apartments in Vernon.

STRAWBERRY SWIRL

1 cup graham cracker crumbs
1 T sugar
1/4 cup butter, melted
2 cups sliced fresh strawberries
1-3 oz. pkg. strawberry jello
1 cup boiling water
1/2 lb. marshmallows
1/2 cup milk
1 cup whipping cream, whipped
Mix crumbs, sugar and butter. Press firmly over bottom of 9x9x2 inch baking dish; chill until set.

Sprinkle 2 T sugar over fresh berries; let stand 1/2 hour. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Drain strawberries, reserving juice. Add water to juice to make 1 cup; add to gelatin and chill until partially set.

Meanwhile, combine marshmallows and milk; heat and stir until marshmallows melt. Cool thoroughly and then fold in whipped cream. Add berries to jello, then swirl in marshmallow mixture to marble. Pour into crust, chill until set. Cut in 9 or 12 squares.

Fresh berries may be substituted with 1-10 oz. pkg. frozen sliced berries, thawed.

SHRIMP CREOLE

1 cup sliced peeled onions
1/2 cup diced celery
1 peeled clove garlic, minced
3 T butter
1 T flour
1 t salt
1 t sugar
1 T chili powder
1 cup water
2 cups canned tomatoes
2 cups canned peas
1 T vinegar
2 cups canned or cooked fresh shrimp
4 cups boiled white rice

Cook onions, celery and garlic in butter about 10 minutes. Add flour, salt, sugar, chili powder which have been mixed with 1/4 cup of the water. Add remaining water and simmer uncovered over low heat for 15 minutes. Add tomatoes, peas, vinegar and shrimp. Heat all thoroughly. Meanwhile, pack hot rice into a qt. buttered ring mold, then turn out on serving tray. Pour shrimp into center and around edges of rice mold.

ANGEL NUT PIE

3 egg whites
1 cup sugar
3/4 t baking powder
1/2 cup chopped pecans
12 crushed graham crackers (1 cup)
Beat egg whites until stiff, add sugar and baking powder. Fold in graham crackers and pecans. Pour into greased pie pan and bake 25 to 30 minutes at 350 degrees. When cool, top with whipped cream.

RED HOT APPLESAUCE SALAD

Melt 1/4 to 1/2 cup red hot candies in 1 cup hot water. Pour over 1 box cherry jello. Add 1 can applesauce; stir and let set.

ZUCCHINI BREAD

2 cups sugar
1 cup Wesson Oil
3 eggs beaten
2 cups grated zucchini squash
2 t cinnamon
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1/2 t salt
1 t vanilla
2 1/2 cups flour
1/2 t baking powder
1 t soda
Mix all ingredients by hand. Pour into greased and floured loaf or bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees until tests done, about 1 hour.

MARVELOUS MEAT LOAF

2 lbs. ground beef
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
1/4 cup catsup
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 t Worcestershire sauce
2 t salt
1/4 t pepper
1/4 cup soft bread crumbs
American cheese slices

Preheat oven 350 degrees. Lightly grease loaf pan (8"x4"). In large bowl, combine ground meat, onion and catsup. In medium bowl, beat eggs slightly, add milk, sauce, salt, pepper and bread crumbs. Add to meat mixture. Mix well. Place half the mixture in loaf pan; spread evenly and cover with cheese slices. Cover with remaining meat mixture. After baking 20 minutes, spread can of mushroom soup over the top. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/4 hours.

Boutwell starts doctorate program

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article, written by Minnie Jo Pope, appeared in Tuesday's issue of The Wichitan, Midwestern State Univ. campus newspaper. Roy Boutwell lives on South Bell Road near Iowa Park, and is presently serving as president of the Iowa Park school board.

The Green philosopher Epictetus said, "First say to yourself what you would be; and then do what you have to do."

Roy K. Boutwell, personnel director for MSU is doing just that. Boutwell has received a Bachelor of Business Administration and a Master of Business Administration from Midwestern. He is aiming for a Doctor of Philosophy through the Nova program.

Nova University, accredited by the Southern Association, has offered a successful field based, non-traditional program since 1972, Boutwell explained.

The program was designed to make doctoral study available to employed professionals whose careers and personal obligations make a traditional program virtually impossible because of the lengthy residency requirements.

Nova is designed on a three-year completion schedule and involves seven separate modules of study that touch virtually every phase of college and university operations - five practicums, week-end cluster meetings each month at Mountain View College in Dallas, and the completion of a major applied research project which relates closely to the

traditional dissertation.

Participants in Nova must also attend two seven day summer seminars.

"I attended a summer seminar in San Diego in July 1979 and will attend one in Fort Lauderdale in August," Boutwell said.

All activities and requirements of the program are scheduled to avoid conflict with activities and full-time employment responsibilities of a participant in his institution.

As personnel director for Midwestern some of the activities Boutwell is responsible for are: filling 220 staff positions and 147 faculty positions, health care enrollment, retirement, counseling, safety committee chairman, and faculty/staff payroll servicing and reporting.

As if he doesn't have enough to do, Boutwell also is a coach for Little League football and baseball teams. You guessed it, he has two sons.

Hamilton named WTCC chairman

Jack Pilon of Brownwood, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has announced the reappointment of Bob Hamilton, Iowa Park, as chairman of the information

Sirens to sound for tornados

It was decided that upon notification that a tornado has been identified by a qualified spotter within 10 miles of Iowa Park and the direction of travel presents a possible threat to the city, the police dispatcher will activate the sirens.

When this occurs, every citizen should take immediate cover, Bud Thompson, CD coordinator, said.

Mark Wilson, CD director for Wichita Falls, talked to the committee, giving information based on his experience on last year's tornado in that city.

Next meeting of the committee will be in June.

Gym construction progress discussed

Iowa Park school trustees in a called meeting Monday heard a report from Don Daugherty, school architect, on progress of construction of the new high school gymnasium.

Daugherty detailed areas he has covered with the contractor which are in need of correcting, and said the building will probably be ready for a "walk through" next week, prior to acceptance by the school.

The structure will be completed as a shell, with electrical work yet to be done, as well as installation of a flooring. No decision has yet been made on the type of floor which will be put in the gymnasium, according to Harold Cowley, superintendent.

Stolen pickup found in Bowie

An Iowa Park businessman was undoubtedly surprised when he was asked if he knew his pickup was in Bowie, when he thought it was parked outside his office.

If you think all the political campaigning of the county commissioner candidates will be over Saturday, when the party primaries are held, you are probably wrong.

That's why we have so much poor legislation.

And that's the reason why we often times get such poor representation from our politicians. Voters not paying any attention to what the candidates stand for and how they will vote.

In case you've forgotten, you won't be able to jump around from party to party on the primary ballots

Saturday. This voting is by party members only. If you're not declared as a party member, you become one if you vote.

This means, that if you want a Republican candidate for president, but you want to decide among which of the seven candidates on the Democratic party's ballot you like best, you will have to decide which party primary you will vote in Saturday.

The jumping around from one party line to another will have to wait until the general election.

I'm going to have to agree with some of my fellow editors. If you haven't taken the time to study the candidates who are on Saturday's ballots, maybe you should just stay home and work in the garden, go fishing, or something else.

But the best thing would be to get busy, study each and every candidate on the ballot, learn everything you can about them, and vote.

Henderson. H.J. Blanchard is candidate for railroad commissioner; Jim Brady is candidate for place one, supreme court; Will Garwoods, place four, supreme court; and Keith Nelson, 78th district judge.

Unlike the Democratic Party, Republicans will vote their preferences of candidates for president, and the voting will be binding. Voting will be between George Bush and Ronald Reagan.

Two referendum issues also appear on the Republican Party ballot. They are:

"Under the supervision of a judge, the state police should be able to use electronic surveillance methods, such as wiretapping, in cases where suspected drug dealers are involved.

"Texas should have initiative and referendum, a way for the public to vote directly on issues and make law in elections rather than depending only on the state legislature.

Due to the lack of rainfall it is important to turn our attention to watering the garden. If less than 2 inches of rain has fallen you will need to water during the growing season every 7 to 10 days. When you do water, water early and thoroughly. The best time is after picking the vegetables in the morning before the heat of the day. If possible avoid putting water directly on the plants, instead allow it to soak into the soil. This along with a good mulching program will enable you to have a good supply of vegetables from your garden.

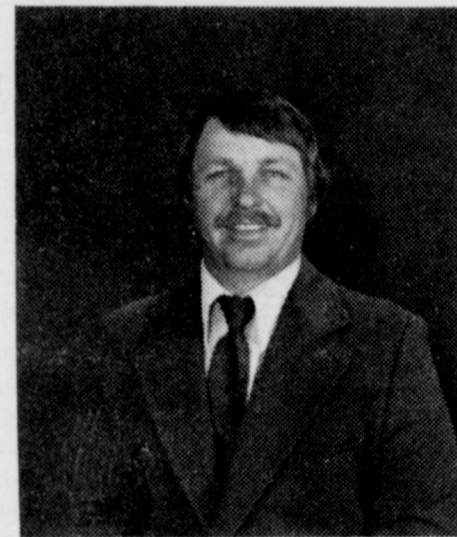

Natural fiber artisan to demonstrate work

Margaret (Mrs. Buddy) Henderson, well-known natural fiber artisan, will present a spinning and weaving demonstration at Country Collections Art Gallery Saturday, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Margaret, who lives in Iowa Park with her husband and their five children, has had extensive training

in all phases of fiber techniques from various teachers in the Dallas-Ft. Worth area, as well as from Mary Ruth Smith of Houston, whom she considers the most versatile and inspiring of all her instructors.

Skilled also in wood carving and basketry, the artist received national recognition in the latter, with her baskets being featured in Basketry Today, by Dana Z. Meilach and Dee Menagh. Her interest in basketry developed as a result of working with her sons in Boy Scouts.

A student at Midwestern State University, Margaret served as an instructor in primitive craft in the 1979 ROTC Wilderness Survival at MSU.

The local artist has acquired much of her knowledge in spinning as a member of the Wichita Falls Fiber Guild. The wheel on which she will be spinning has been classified as a pre-colonial wool spinning wheel, which belongs to the gallery. It was bought by Maryanne Gilmore in 1960 from a family friend, to prevent its being sold to strangers. It had been in the family of Mrs. John West as long as she could remember. Mrs. West is now near 100 and resides in a rest home in Kansas.

This will be the fourth show for Mrs. Henderson this spring, having

exhibited at North Texas Federal Gallery, and Lubbock Garden and Art Show, as well as performing a weaving demonstration at Spring Fling last weekend.

The demonstration will be open to the public at no charge. Country Collections is located on the north side of Expressway 287, between Peterson and Bell Roads near Iowa Park.

Local library in state-wide Reading Club

The Iowa Park Library is among nearly 400 libraries throughout Texas participating this year in the Texas Reading Club. The program is sponsored by the Texas State Library and participating libraries.

Young readers will take part in activities built around "Sports Splash," the theme selected for 1980. The nearly universal interest in sports that range from solitary activities like jogging to team sports like baseball and football gives them appeal for most young readers. And libraries have books about sports that range from books on how to play the games through biographies of famous players to novels and stories with sports themes.

Most important of all, young Texans who participate will sample the fun of recreational reading. Today's public libraries include a wide range of books and other printed materials for young readers. Summertime is vacation time, but skills honed by vacation time reading will be sharp for the year ahead.

"One of the most serious problems we face today is the deterioration of reading ability among young people," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library. "We know, however, that people of all ages who develop the habit of reading for recreation become good readers. Reading is a recreational activity with both immediate and long-term benefits."

In recent years, school libraries and learning resource centers have undergone major improvements. As a result many youngsters have developed sophisticated skills in using libraries. The Reading Club encourages them to use these skills and the library materials they find for recreational purposes.

Special activities that encourage regular visits to the library have been planned by James L. and Carol H. Thomas of Denton. He teaches in the North Texas State University School of Library and Information Sciences, and she recently completed a doctorate in special education at the University of Virginia. They are the parents of two sons.
