Officers search for tire slashers

Local, and possibly federal, law officers have launched an investigation into a rash of tire slashing which occurred here sometime Sunday morning.

Iowa Park police have received reports of tires being slashed at three different locations sometime Saturday night.

The major incident was at the U.S. Post Office, where 18 of 20 tires mounted on Jeeps were slashed and ruined, police were told.

Assistant Postmaster Wayne Williams said sometime between 5 and 8:05 a.m. Sunday the tires were punctured. One estimate was that the cost to the Postal Service was \$1,035 for tire replacements and labor.

Destroying any federal property is a felony offense against the federal government.

Two tires on each of three vehicles

parked at E&S Exxon were also punctured sometime around the same hours. Additionally, a window on one overhead door was broken, according to owner Jim Sargent.

And, sometime between 1:30 and 9 a.m. Sunday, two tires on a Dr. Pepper trailer parked at Park West Shopping Center were punctured. The trailer had been used by the Jaycees for a public dance they had sponsored earlier in the evening to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy fund.

One case of theft and one of criminal mischief were alleged to have taken place at the Sonic Drive In recently.

Wednesday evening of last week, three displays were damaged, valued at \$50. Tuesday, Brian Allen Cockburn, an employee said 40 cassette tapes valued at \$200 were taken from his vehicle while parked in the rear of the business.



1980 Iowa Park High School Hawks

Hawks open season Friday against tough Buckaroos

Coach Tommy Watkins picks some dandies for season openers for his Hawks. Two years in a row, now, he has scheduled the top-ranked team in the state to inaugurate the season.

Last year, it was the Bowie Jackrabbits, who were the pre-season picks to win the state class AA title. But the Hawks won 21-0.

Tomorrow night at 8, Iowa Park travels to Breckenridge where the host Buckaroos are said to be the team to beat among AAA schools.

And there's lots of reasons why the Associated Press and Texas Football Magazine have the Buckaroos at the top of their lists.

Watkins has always held to the theory that tough non-conference competition is the best route to take when you are developing your team to meet stiff district competition. It's during those rebuilding years that you schedule the easier teams.

Breckenridge hasn't been on the Hawk schedule since 1970. The last time the two teams met, Iowa Park won 42-20.

In two of the last three years, the Buckaroos have lost in the state championships. In 1977 it was on the final play of the game to Wylie. Last year unheralded Van edged Breckenridge on penetrations after the score was tied.

The Buckaroos, headed by pure blue chippers Brent Parker, quarterback, and Dale Dixon, a receiver, have 15 lettermen back, including seven starters on both defense and offense.

Parker is the son of Breckenridge head coach Larry Parker, who is a former star for the Buckaroos during his high school days. Coach Tommy Watkins says without hesitation that Parker is the finest running quarterback in the northern half of Texas, regardless of school classifica-

tion. And he can throw with the best of them.

The scouting report on Dixon is that he has speed, sure hands and goes after the ball when Parker puts it in his direction.

This will be the third year for Parker, who is about 5-10 and weighs 160, to start at the helm of the Buckaroos, so he is tested and experienced, Watkins says. "Our biggest job will be trying to control him," he said.

Breckenridge's offense is the veer formation, which gives a quarterback like Parker the opportunity to run, but he can't catch the ball, depending on "our problem is that we can't run the big play threat for the long gainer on any one play," Watkins said, "but we have a team that can play a lot of people real close."

Watkins has all his backfield back from last year except Troy Thompson and Mike Ray. Thompson was lost by graduation, but Ray injured a knee the first day of practice in pads and will be out at least three to five more weeks.

But he has Curtis Martin at quarterback, Robert Hastings at wingback, Jim Smith and Troy Linthicum at tailback, both of whom got a lot of experience last season behind Thompson, and Toby Smith, a senior, and Steve Stewart, a sophomore, at fullback.

Most of his experience on the offensive line is in two people, Tim Blackwell and Joe Spruiell.

A lot of people will be surprised at what Watkins has for a center, after moving Kent Fehr to end. It's Bob Rice, a 275-pound player up from the junior varsity who has developed into a sound football player, according to line coach Earnie Reusch.

"I feel more confident with our

defense, especially with the improvement we had last week and now, since the scrimmage," Watkins said.

The coaches, using the film of Friday's scrimmage with Lawton MacArthur, were able to point out mistakes which have helped the defense, and offense, considerably.

"A lot of our kids have made tremendous improvement," said the Head Hawk.

If the Hawks have a major weakness, it has been the development of their punting game. Linthicum has been called on to replace graduated Ronnie Taylor, who was one of the best Watkins said with their punt coverage.

Finding a nose guard to replace the injured Ray on defense was a major concern to the Hawk coaching staff. Watkins admitted they were shifting into another defensive alignment from the five-man front until senior Spruiell showed them he could handle the assignment, and handle it well.

The Hawks will have several more opportunities to improve as the season progresses beyond Breckenridge. Going along the same idea of playing good opponents, Watkins has scheduled, in order, Fort Worth Trimble Tech, Burkburnett non-conference, Wichita Falls Rider, and Fort Worth Northside.

City, school agendas light

Unless something changes between not and Friday's deadline, members of both the school board and city council face very light meeting agendas next week.

Both have until tomorrow afternoon to make additions other than those reported at midweek.

Besides their various departments head reports, school trustees will hear a proposal for all trips planned by the high school vocational departments, and they will discuss progress of construction of the new high school gymnasium.

City aldermen will consider two ordinances, both pertaining to the

Texas Municipal Retirement System. One is authorizing participation and the other is to participate in the system's supplemental benefits fund, for insurance.

Aldermen will hold a public hearing concerning the city's increased property taxes, as required by law.

City Administrator Steve Morath explained that individual taxes are not being increased, because the rate will remain at \$1.75 per \$100 evaluation. But because the rate will generate more than three percent more money than it did last year, the hearing and public notice are required by state law.

Republicans set rally

Potential voters from 26 counties are expected to participate today in Texas "Roundup for Reagan-Bush" events scheduled for Sherman, Vernon, Wichita Falls and Graham.

Gov. Bill Clements and former Gov. John Connally are being featured in the 23-city "Roundup" tour. It is being sponsored by the Texas Victory Committee, on behalf of the Reagan-Bush ticket. It is aimed at registering Reagan-Bush supporters before the Oct. 3rd deadline and encouraging them to vote on Nov. 4th.

Today's activities begin with a seven-county rally in Sherman in the Municipal Building ballroom at 9:30 a.m. That will be followed by a 10:30

a.m. press conference with Clements and Connally, who will then fly to Vernon for a noon luncheon in the Wilbarger County Auditorium.

A rally at Sikes Senter Mall and press conference are scheduled for 2:30 p.m. in Wichita Falls. The day's activities will be climaxed with a free barbecue, expected to draw participants from nine counties at the Courthouse Square in Graham at 7 p.m.

John Armstrong of Kingsville, the Roundup chairman, said Clements and Connally have been drawing enthusiastic crowds at all the Roundup events, which began in the Panhandle Aug. 27.

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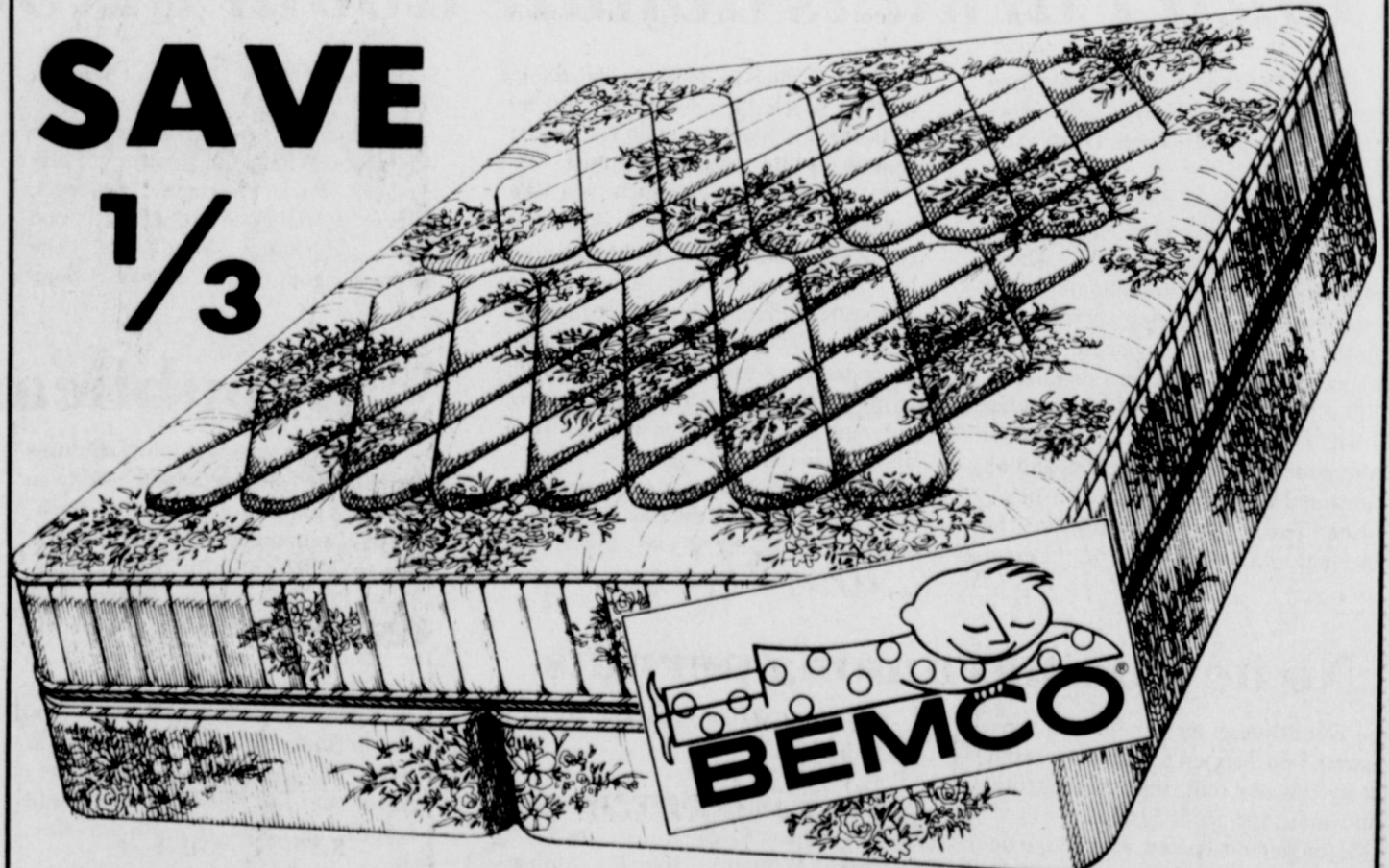

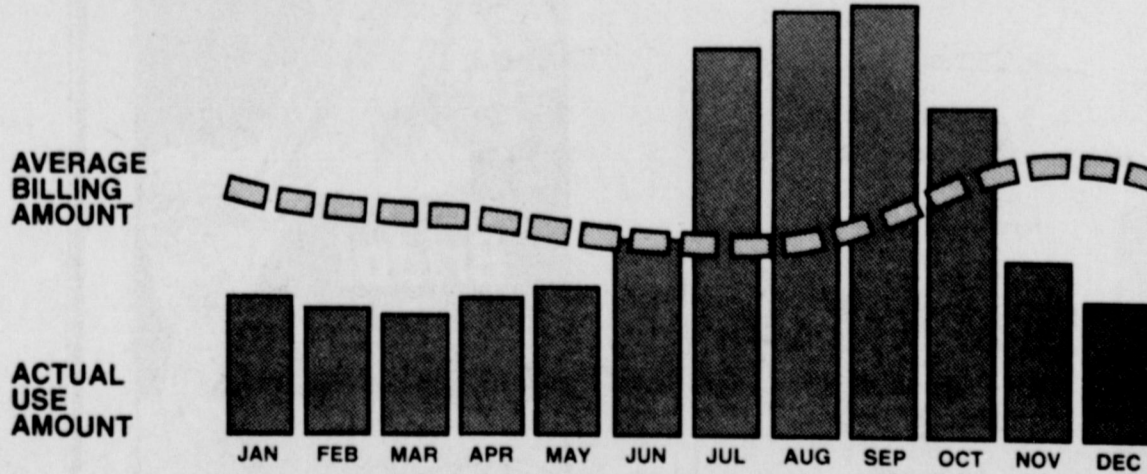
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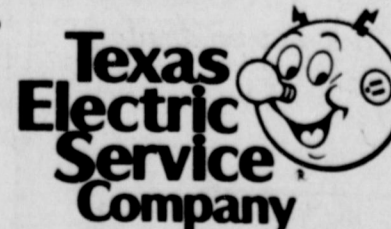
