Albert Lovell, Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector has announced the arrival of the 1966 auto license plates.

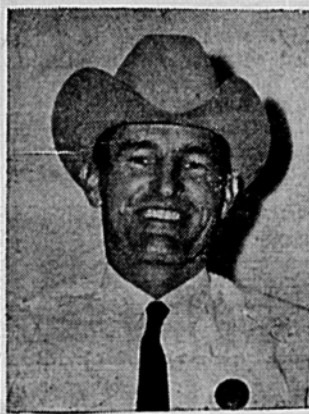
When applying for the plates, you will need to bring your certificate of title and current license receipts, Mr. Lovell said.

Texas sales during 1965 were \$143,972,304 which represent 94 per cent of the state's sales goal of \$152.8 million.

Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee was pleased to learn that the Treasury has announced to raise the interest rate on both Series E and H Savings Bonds. Also, the interest rate will be raised on those bonds now being held. The new interest rate, as yet, has not been announced, but we know the increase earned on Savings Bonds will make them even more attractive, Chairman Farmer said.

## Recreation Center Signing Members

The Baird Recreation Center began its Membership Drive on Tuesday, February 1, with good response from local citizens.

Committeemen working on the drive have reported excellent reception and hopes are

high that the 150 members needed will be secured as an early date.

An account has been opened for the Baird Recreational Fund with the First National Bank, with James Eubanks, cashier, in

charge. All payments or donations may be paid directly to Mr. Eubanks in the future.

As soon as enough members have been secured through pledges, a loan can be obtained from the Farm Home Administration and construction can get underway. The project should be completed in approximately five months.

The center will cost an estimated \$100,000, and upon completion, will feature a complete golf course, with golf instruction available, community building with club meeting facilities, recreation area, picnic area, playground equipment, miniature golf, archery range, driving range, and numerous other family recreational facilities.

The initial entry fee has been set at \$25 and can be paid in a lump sum or in monthly payments of \$5 for five months. This money will be left in the Recreational Fund at the bank until the project is completed, at which time members will begin paying regular dues of \$7.50 per month for family membership.

Initial entry fees will be refunded should the project be abandoned for any reason.

### Veterans To Receive Questionnaires

Veterans and dependants of veterans on Veterans Administration's compensation and pension rolls who have school age children, will receive a special questionnaire with their February checks, Jack Coker, Manager of the Waco Regional Office said today.

He said the checks and questionnaires would arrive about Feb. 1.

Need for the information asked by the questionnaire follows a recent law providing higher rates of education payments for school children, and at the same time raised the maximum age limit from 21 to 23.

The questionnaire also asks for the payee's zip code number in keeping with current postal regulations in order to speed up the delivery of both checks and correspondence.

A space is also provided for the payee's social security number, Coker said. A special addressed envelope is provided for the questionnaire's return.

### Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge Tosses Hat in 63rd District Race

Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge today announced his candidacy for State Representative, 63rd District, in the Democratic primary election -- the seat vacated by Wayne Gibbens, now on Governor Connally's Staff in Washington.

Musgrove has completed six years at The University of Texas, majoring in chemical engineering and business. He was selected in 1963 as "Outstanding Student" from the 24,000 member student body among numerous other honors.

Having lived in Breckenridge for more than 20 years, Musgrove has been considered an outstanding young member of the community. He was awarded the State and National Elk Foundation "Most Valuable High School Student" Scholarship. Breckenridge High School classmates elected him "Best All Round Boy."

Later at the University of Texas, Musgrove, as president of numerous organizations, played an active role in student improvements, including library, language lab and student housing expansion. In recognition of this leadership he was awarded the Sons of the American Revolution Medal of Honor, the Chicago Tribune Award and the Berry Whitaker Leadership Award. He was on the Board of Directors of The University Co-op, a store serving the University community and doing an annual 4 million dollar business.

Musgrove, 25, is the son of Mrs. Dale Musgrove and the brother of Mrs. Phil Pitzer of Breckenridge. On the death of his father, Glenn Musgrove, when Burke was 11, he began the work that carried him through his high school and college years.

Employed by the Graridge Corporation in Breckenridge, he became familiar with the different aspects and problems concerning the oil industry while working after class in high school and during several summers in college. While attending the University Musgrove represented several local and area independent oil operators by securing records and information from the Texas Railroad Commission in Austin.

Widely known in youth development work, Musgrove was the program coordinator for the first statewide Attorney General's Youth Conference in which over 1200 high school leaders participated. The Conference, now annual, has been a key factor in curtailing the state's rising juvenile crime rate.

Musgrove has worked with numerous state officials as the co-ordinator for eight years for the American Legion Boys State program, held each year in the State Capitol Building in Austin. This program has afforded thousands of your Texans -- and young Americans -- with the inspiration to become active, participating citizens. In recognition for his outstanding service to youth, the Breckenridge Lions Club awarded Musgrove honorary membership.

"I desire to be of service to this area," Musgrove said in announcing his candidacy, "in order that I might repay some of the blessings and opportunities

that have been provided me. It is certainly an honor and a compliment to be encouraged by many friends to offer my service in the capacity of State Representative. However, to be successful I will be calling on more and more of my friends, acquaintances, and lots of people I have not yet met to assist with my campaign. This promises to be a long and costly campaign -- one which I cannot win without broad-based support from the many of you interested in good government and effective, energetic representation," Musgrove concluded.

### Sheep Inspection Due in County

Pat Garner announces that the Texas Animal Health Commission assisted by the Annual Health Division of the United States Department of Agriculture, launched an extensive inspection of all sheep flocks within Callahan County, on Jan. 27. All inspections are under the supervision of Dr. James B. Henderson, Area Veterinarian, and will be conducted in Callahan County by Bill Oliver.

As a result of two outbreaks of sheep scabies within the last year, other states have imposed dipping requirements that hamper the marketing of Texas sheep. Relinquishing of these requirements will be considered upon an inspection of all flocks without evidence of scabies being found. Industry cooperation is needed so that necessary inspections may be conducted in an organized manner, with a minimum of inconvenience to the sheep producer.

The County Chairman of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and the Agricultural Extension Service through the local County Agent, are assisting in the cooperative effort.

### Read Carefully It May Not Be True

The Veterans Administration has received complaints that a private insurance company is distributing printed information in a campaign to sell its policies under the guise that they are GI insurance policies.

The material is mailed in a brown envelope similar to the type used by the Federal Government, Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said.

He pointed out that the material, if read carefully, is not misleading. If, however, it is read quickly, the reader is led to believe that premium rates for the private policy are about the same as GI insurance.

The big difference, Coker said, is dividends paid over the years on GI insurance. The net GI premium is therefore considerably cheaper than that offered by the company distributing printed information.

VA officials in Washington have contacted the Insurance Commissioner of the state where the company is licensed and also given copies of material to the Federal Trade Commission for investigation and any action that the Commission deems necessary.

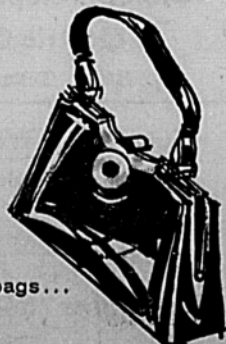

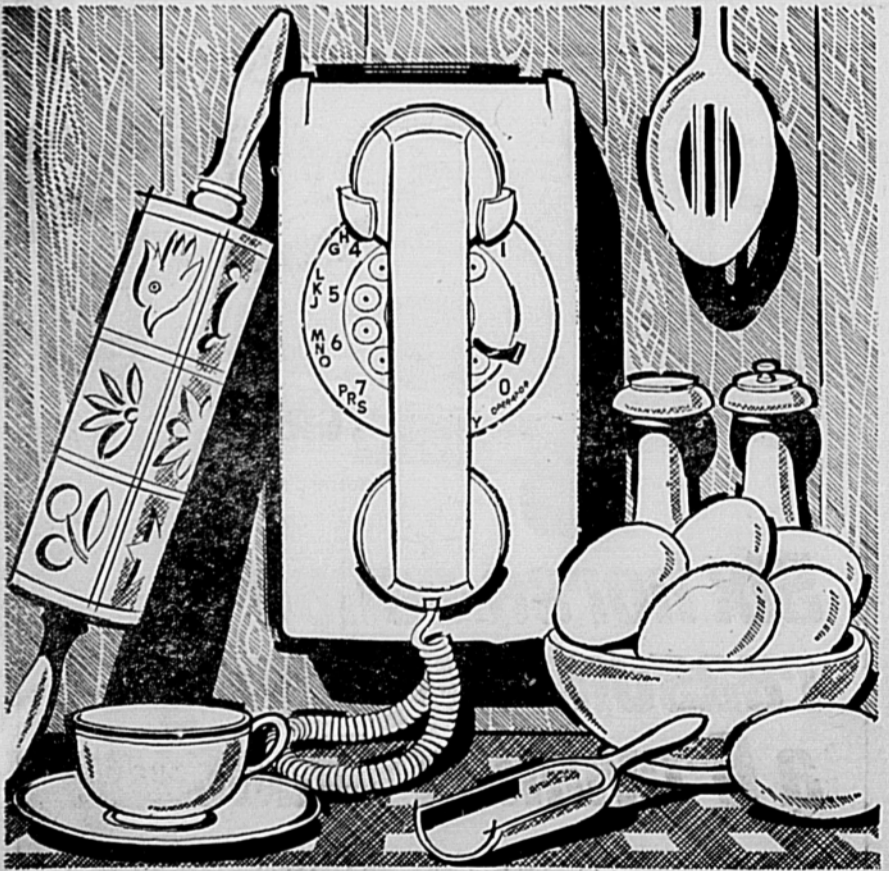

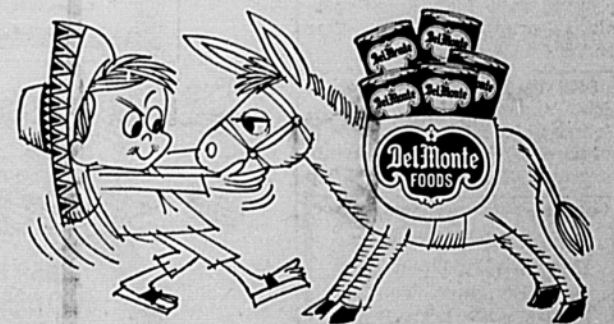
