THREE WEEKS REMAINING

United Way one-third way to goal

With three weeks remaining in the annual United Way campaign, the updated tally at the last report meeting showed the drive a little over a third of the way to its goal of \$1,508,993.

Iowa Park Chairman O.N. Newman commented on the 34.32 percent reported at the meeting and stressed the United Way meaning. "Our local volunteers are working hard to insure the success of this campaign. It's very important that our citizens know what the United Way does for our community and the

North Texas area," he said.

He explained that, locally, elderly people are provided services through the Senior Citizens Center, the Friendly Door. "Not only can they eat their noon meal throughout the week, but special programs such as periodic blood pressure checks (which were conducted Tuesday) and other health related events are examples of the efforts to keep our elderly more vital in our community. These services to senior citizens are assured because of United Way funding," Newman said.

Another Iowa Park agency funded

by the United Way is the Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center where programs from adult exercises to ceramics to Girl Scout meetings are conducted.

"But our local agencies are not the only United Way funded groups that directly effect Iowa Park citizens," Newman said.

"Emotionally and physically handicapped persons from the Iowa Park community may be employed at the Individual Development Center in Wichita Falls. Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts receive the majority of their

funding from the United Way. "In fact," he said, "there are 34 agencies funded by the United Way, and Iowa Park citizens are eligible for services through any of these, if they so choose."

Assisting Newman in the campaign are Phil Welch and Harold Cowley. Mrs. Gladys James is chairman of the Advanced Gifts division, Ron Barnes, Major Firms A Chairman, Steve Morath and J.B. Merrick, Public Employees, Rev. Mike Jackson, Professional and Bill Steger, Metro.

The last report meeting showed the combined divisional score of the three cities, Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and Iowa Park at Advance Gifts, \$200,544; Major Firms A, \$159,776; Major Firms B, \$30,828; Commerce and Industry, \$11,183; Public Employees, \$36,000; Professional, \$18,790; Metro, \$12,878, and the Combined Federal Campaign, \$58,715. The total dollar amount reported was \$517,909.

The 32 agencies that receive United Way funding in addition to the two local groups are American Red Cross, the five Boys' Clubs in Wichita Falls, Boy Scouts, Burkburnett Boys' Club, Burkburnett Child Development Center, Burkburnett Senior Citizens, Burkburnett Youth Center, Camp Fire Council, three Child Care centers in Wichita Falls, Children's Home, Community Council, Eastside Girls' Club, Girl Scouts, Individual Development Center, Mental Health Association, Northside Girls' Club, SAFB Youth Activities Center, Salvation Army, five Senior Citizens centers in Wichita Falls, Southside Girls' Club, Wichita County Association for Retarded Citizens, YMCA, YMCA, east branch, YWCA, United Ways of Texas and the USO.

The next report meeting for all volunteers from the three cities will be 10 a.m. Wednesday in the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Wichita Falls.

Rams first hurdle in route to title

The race toward the Dist. 3-AAAA crown begins tonight when Iowa Park hosts Mineral Wells in Hawk Stadium, starting at 8. Though the Hawks were supposed to be rested and ready for the conference opener, after taking a week off with an open date, it appears they will be hobbling about as much as they have at any time in the first five weeks of the season.

Starting senior guard Joe Spruiell is apparently lost for the season with a leg injury, and both tailbacks may be less than 100 percent when the kickoff whistle is blown.

During a workout last week, Spruiell dislocated a knee cap and stretched the ligaments, and he is expected to remain in a cast most of the rest of the season.

Troy Linthicum and Jim Smith, leading ground gainers on the offensive unit, are said to be hobbling, but will be playing anyway.

The two alternate at the tailback position, and will be starting on

defense as well. Linthicum has been starting defensively through the season, and Smith has been injected at the defensive halfback position for this game.

Iowa Park will be seeking its first win over Mineral Wells. The two clubs began playing each other in 1976, when the Rams dropped from the large school division after a decline in enrollment.

The Hawks came closest to winning last year, but the Rams pulled into a 14-14 tie.

Though Mineral Wells was hit hard by graduation last spring, with several of the Rams going to college teams, they still have considerable talent and size.

Fullback Ray Mata, a 228-pound junior, was named the outstanding sophomore of the district last season. He also handles the kicking off chores, besides being a strong runner and blocker.

And the district's sprint champion, Jay Morris, plays beside him at

halfback. He is a 176-pound senior, and scouting reports indicate he is just as effective a blocker as a carrier.

While the Hawks have won only one game while losing three and tying one, the Rams have won twice out of five non-conference games.

Mineral Wells has defeated Fort Worth Brewer 21-14 and Cleburne 29-17, but was shut out in its three losses: 24-0 by Stephenville, 20-0 by Weatherford and last week 41-0 by Dallas Bishop Dunne.

On the season, the Hawks have outscored the Rams, 99-50, and given up fewer points defensively, 93-116. Smith is the leading gainer for the Hawks, averaging 5.0 yards per carry by picking up 474 yards on 95 calls.

Linthicum, thanks to a big 163-yard game against Fort Worth North Side, is averaging 6.5 yards on each of his 69 carries, having gained 450 yards.

Wingback Robert Hastings is by far the favorite receiver of quarterbacks Curtis Martin and Tim Smith. He has caught 17 passes for 216 yards. Only five other receivers have registered any receptions.

Turnovers and big plays against the Hawk defense have proven to be their major problems. They have lost the ball five times on pass

interceptions and four on fumbles for a total of nine turnovers to their opponents' seven.

And it was two big plays by North Side, a kickoff return and a 102-yard

pass interception return for touchdowns, that spelled the difference in that game's outcome.

The team has been working hard on both subjects during the past two weeks.

New gymnasium problem studied

Almost two hours of Tuesday night's school trustee meeting was devoted to discussing the status of construction of the new high school gymnasium, and means of completing the structure after a year's time on the project.

Trustees heard reports from architect Don Daugherty and attorney James Morris as they discussed progress and proposed steps required to get the job completed.

A letter to a bonding company and manufacturers of the steel building is to be drafted by Daugherty and Morris this week, and trustees expect to have some indication as result about when and how completion will be achieved.

Major issue at the present is

correcting a seven-inch offset in beams at the south end of the structure. Who is responsible for the work is uncertain because the original general contractor is no longer on the job.

The structure was originally scheduled for completion at the end of October, 1979.

Trustees, after hearing a report on a proposed concrete walled structure to be used as a physical education building at the Bradford Elementary campus, said they liked the idea and would like to see some plans drawn on it.

Anticipated cost of the structure, which would also double as a storm shelter for students on the campus, would be approximately \$100,000.

Several buildings built by a pre-stressed concrete method were toured in Oklahoma last week by trustees Delbert Catlin and Rusty Rusk along with superintendent Harold Cowley and Daugherty.

Sale of two lots which had been advertised by the school was approved. Ernest Bottles was the highest bidder with \$851. Bids ranged as low as \$302.

Trustees approved a new per-mile rate for transportation using school buses at 97 cents.

Participation at the school cafeteria has increased from an average of 1,350 students daily last year to between 1,490 and 1,570 per day this year, Bill Steger reported to the

board. But he added that the district would be fortunate if meal prices could be maintained at the present levels the rest of the year, due to inflation.

A request for approval of a fund-raising project and a trip change by the high school choral department was approved.

The A Cappella choir requested its annual trip to competition in Amarillo be changed to one at Dallas.

No action was taken on a proposal by the Kidwell P-TA that the board consider providing crossing guards at that campus in the mornings and evenings.

A study of Bob Cole, principal, indicated fewer than 20 students walk to the school each day, and trustees said finding someone who would work less than two hours a day would be very difficult.

Board chairman Roy Boutwell suggested Cole seek input from his faculty for alternate suggestions on hiring crossing guards.

Trustees approved hiring of Jhonna Adams to replace Nan Dean as Bradford girls' physical education instructor for the balance of the year. Mrs. Dean has requested a year's leave of absence.

Also approved to be hired was Pamela J. Poulos, to teach a half a day schedule at Electra in the West Wichita Coop.

Council approves bid, changing area zoning

The city council Monday night approved a bid to construct a storage building for equipment, and a zoning change which would permit construction of a new shopping center in the north part of town.

M&F Litteken Co. of Wichita Falls was the lowest of three bidders to construct a 30 foot by 40 foot metal storage building near the water treatment plant.

The successful bid was \$14,482. Highest bid on the project was \$17,793.

Aldermen accepted the recommen-

dation from the Planning and Zoning Commission and approved changing the zoning of an area in the north part of town for a proposed shopping center.

All of block 22 and a part of block 17, First Addition, which is approximately 11 acres south of the expressway and between Gordon Lake and Pacific, was affected by the zone change.

During a public hearing on general revenue sharing funds, Hal Farnsworth suggested water pressure on North Park could be improved. "When our neighbor is drawing a glass of water, we can't brush our teeth," he told the council.

Mayor Johnny Crawford responded that sort of situation should be brought up any time, not just at this sort of hearing, and instructed Steve Morath, city administrator, to have the problem looked into and fixed.

Alderman Bud Adams suggested that the sewer rate schedule be changed. He pointed out that residents were being charged a higher rate for sewer use when they were using water on their lawns.

Adams suggested taking the first three months of 1981 to establish a basis on amount of water used by a household, and that being used as a basis for sewer rate for the house. The new rate could be put into effect in April.

A general agreement by the council indicated the study and change would be put into effect.

Stolen car recovered

Whether officials here will file charges against Allen Sutherland for theft of an automobile belonging to Deryl James has not yet been decided.

Police Sgt. Robert Dean said yesterday information concerning Sutherland's arrest in Bay Saint Louis, Miss. has not yet been received. When it is, Dean said he would discuss the situation with the local District Attorney's office concerning filing charges.

Sutherland, Dean said, faces seven various charges, including felony, by authorities where he is now held. Most of the charges are for offenses

which reportedly occurred prior to his living here.

The accused thief is reported to have been employed by James Garage three weeks before he took the automobile and several tools and left town with his recently-acquired wife.

James went to Mississippi over the weekend to claim his automobile. He said the vehicle, which appeared undamaged, had been driven some 800 miles since it left his garage.

Another theft case reported to have taken place early last week is under investigation by local authorities.

Sharon Gregory said someone took two rings valued at \$350 from her home at 1314 Sunset. One ring had a \$5 gold coin as a setting, and the other was a class ring with mother of pearl setting.

There were no signs of forced entry, according to the report.

Sales tax rebates continue to rise

Iowa Park and Holliday sales taxes continue to show increases over 1979, according to a report by the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park holds a 11-percent gain over the same nine-month period of last year, while Holliday's increase is a whopping 77 percent.

Holliday's sales taxes have drawn to within \$6,700 of that which has been rebated to Iowa Park, \$60,015 to \$68,733.

Holliday's rebate check for September sales was \$4,744.88, as compared to Iowa Park's \$4,491.52.

Absentee voting now underway

Absentee voting for the Nov. 5 general election began yesterday, and will continue through Oct. 31.

Absentee voting can be done at the county clerk's office in the Wichita County courthouse.

Those eligible to vote absentee are persons who are registered in this county but residing elsewhere;

persons over 65 years of age; and those with a written statement from a doctor that they are too ill to go to the courthouse or poll.

Applications for a ballot can be made by mail or writing Jerry Padgett, Wichita County Clerk, Box 1679, Wichita Falls, 76307. Absentee ballots will be accepted until 7 p.m. Nov. 4.

Students hurt in accident

Two Holliday High School students were injured, one seriously, in a major wreck one mile west of Wichita Falls on US 82 Sunday evening.

Carla Cottrell, daughter of school board trustee Jake Cottrell, W. Siesta Lane, suffered a fracture to the

fifth vertebrae in her neck, according to informed sources. She is listed in stable condition at the Wichita Falls General Hospital.

Driver of the car, Larry Boydston, received lacerations to his scalp, but refused treatment at the Wichita General Hospital emergency room.

Boydston was allegedly in the inside lane of US 82 traveling west. As an eighteen wheel tractor-trailer attempted to pass the couple, Boydston slowed to change lanes. A pickup driven by an unidentified man then hit Boydston's vehicle from behind.

According to sources, the fifth vertebrae in the spine when broken usually causes some form of paralysis. But, fortunately for Miss Cottrell, doctors have found no evidence of paralysis.

Car-tractor wreck fatal

A young Iowa Parkan was fatally injured in an accident south of town about 9 p.m. Monday.

Roy Garza Duran, 23, was reportedly south-bound on FM 368 about half a mile south of the city when he collided with a north-bound tractor being driven by Ross Cantrell.

Cantrell was reportedly working for Fred Daume and was moving the equipment from one field to another at the time of the incident.

Members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department were called to free Duran's body from the wreckage with the jaws of life equipment.

As I See It....

When the Wichita County Tax Appraisal District board of directors meets today, one of the items on their agenda is to discuss methods of allocation of budget.

That budget runs slightly over \$600,000, but not everyone will be paying their fair share.

And I'll put the blame squarely where it belongs: the county commissioner's court.

That gutless bunch didn't want the blame for shouldering a major portion of the district's financing. It's understandable. They're politicians, and therefore whenever they can tell their folks back home they held down the cost of government, they stand a good chance of being re-elected.

But there are some points which need to be understood by the public, because apparently no one else is going to bring them out.

The fact of the matter is, those political entities such as the Iowa Park schools and city which have

very little supplemental income but are up to their ears in debt trying to provide the best in facilities and services will be paying more than their share under the proposed financing method.

At issue is whether the formula for an entity's contribution to the budget should be based on tax parcels or on taxes imposed.

Because the districts board is made up under a "three-quarters rule" which allows better representation than a four-man board, three-quarters of the political entities must approve the budget formula if it is not based on the taxes imposed method, as provided by the legislature.

Well, they can't get three quarters of the entities to approve the tax parcels formula, primarily because of the commissioner's court. . . and the Burkburnett school and city leaders.

So, as it now stands, the county will fund only \$96,723 toward the budget instead of \$202,325. That saves the county \$105,602. Looks great, doesn't

it.

Well, whichever formula is used doesn't really affect Iowa Parkans that much. Under the parcel formula, our city and school would put up \$36,026, or \$2,604 more. The city loses \$1,697 under the formula and the school \$909.

But. . . Burkburnett comes out smelling like a rose.

That city will be contributing \$11,515, which is \$10,484 less than the parcel formula. And the school's bill will be \$18,545, a savings of \$7,999.

What's unfair about this is the fact that our legislature, in all its wisdom, specifically wrote into the bill that any supplemental income could not be figured into a tax appraisal board's funding formula.

This does not allow the board to consider Burkburnett school receiving hundreds of thousands of dollars each year from the federal government for educating Sheppard AFB students. They are paid on a national cost average, and you can imagine the per-student amount there.

Then, the city sales taxes are not allowed to be used in the formula. Burkburnett, in the first nine months of this year, has received \$185,390 in sales taxes. Electra has received \$167,034. Iowa Park has received \$68,733.

So, you see, taxes are taxes, and they should all be used. Not just a portion here and a portion there. After all, the bill was specifically intended to equalize taxes. And you can't do it by looking at only a portion of the information.

Our commissioner's court has earned a big Bah Humbug for this Christmas. . . and several more in the future. That's about all we will be able to afford.

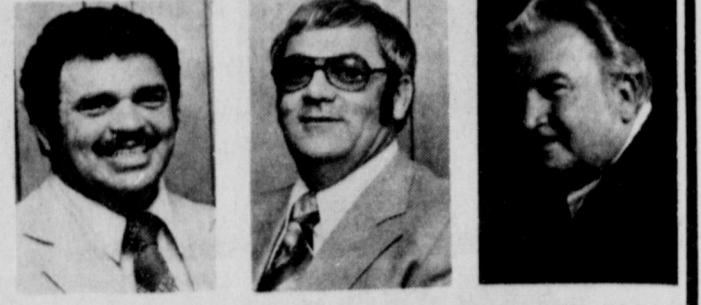

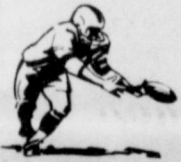

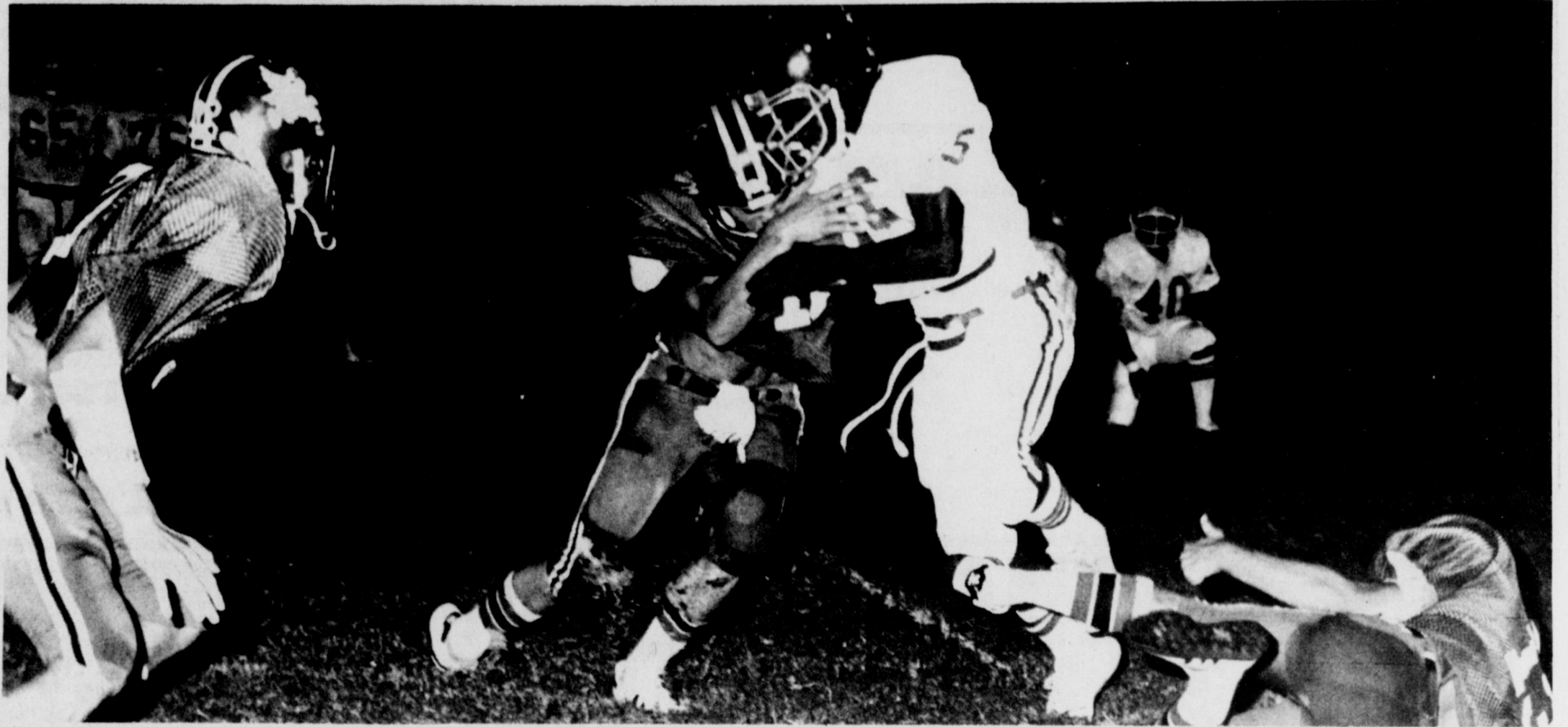

Eagles swamp Chico, 61-0

Three touchdown runs in the first six offensive plays of the game for Holliday was more than enough Friday night, as the Eagles recorded a 61-0 TKO over the Chico Dragons in a District 13-AA contest.

A standing room only homecoming crowd on Holliday's side of the field witnessed an offensive explosion the first five minutes of the game. Junior runningback Ray Looney raced 74 yards on the first play from scrimmage for the Eagles' initial score.

Looney finished the evening with 169 yards in 9 carries, well over 18 yards average per carry.

A stunned Chico team failed to record a first down on their initial

offensive series, and attempted to punt from their 16. A bad snap from center was recovered by the Eagle defense at the 16, and, two plays later, Looney tallied from eight yards out for his second of three touchdowns in the game.

Looney's third score of the evening came on an 18 yard scamper on the third play of the Eagles' third possession, giving Holliday a 20-0 lead a little over seven minutes into the mismatch.

Eagle head coach Don Lucy mercifully pulled Looney from the game after a 14-yard run on the Eagles' next possession. But even Good Samaritan actions sometimes backfire.

Looney's replacement happened to be John Dyer, who rushed for 106 yards and two touchdowns, in addition to playing one of his best defensive games of the year.

Fullback Carl Martin was his usual best, becoming the third Eagle rusher to gain over 100 yards in the game with 126 yards in 16 carries, as well as providing timely blocking on Holliday's sweeps.

The Eagles managed 510 yards rushing and 13 passing in the game, and set a season record for first downs with 18.

Even with 14 first downs, 147 yards rushing and 37 passing, the Dragons from Chico pulled the trigger themselves, fumbling four times after

sustained drives, and, according to Lucy, playing the wrong kind of defense.

"I don't know what possessed them to think they could defend against us with a gap defense," remarked Lucy. In a gap defense, the main objective for the lineman is penetration and holding the inside run. But, as the Dragons soon found out, you expose yourself to the outside rush.

The Eagles had to swallow some bad news along with the good, as has been the norm for this season. Two offensive linemen were injured on Looney's 74-yarder at the start of the game. Tackle Jeff Eastman suffered a strained knee after being tackled from behind by a Chico defender, while center Jerry Jones fractured the big toe on his right foot.

According to Lucy, both are doubtful for the Windthorst game.

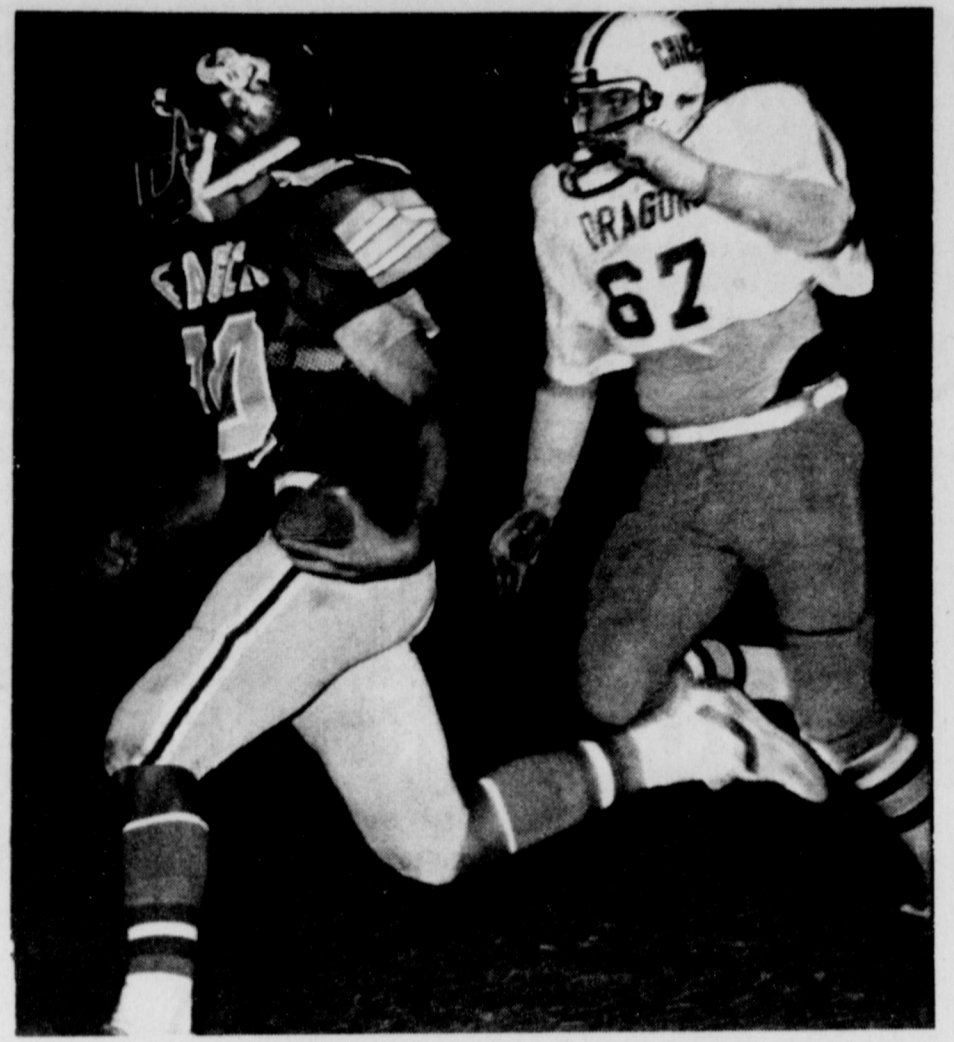
Dyer recorded the Eagles' fourth touchdown of the night with three minutes left in the opening period. The three-yard run by Dyer capped a 49-yard drive.

On Looney's previous touchdown, a major penalty set the Eagles back 10 yards for the PAT, and Mike Parker's kick missed the uprights, giving Holliday a 20-0 lead. After Dyer's run, the PAT was good, and Holliday held a 27-0 first quarter lead.

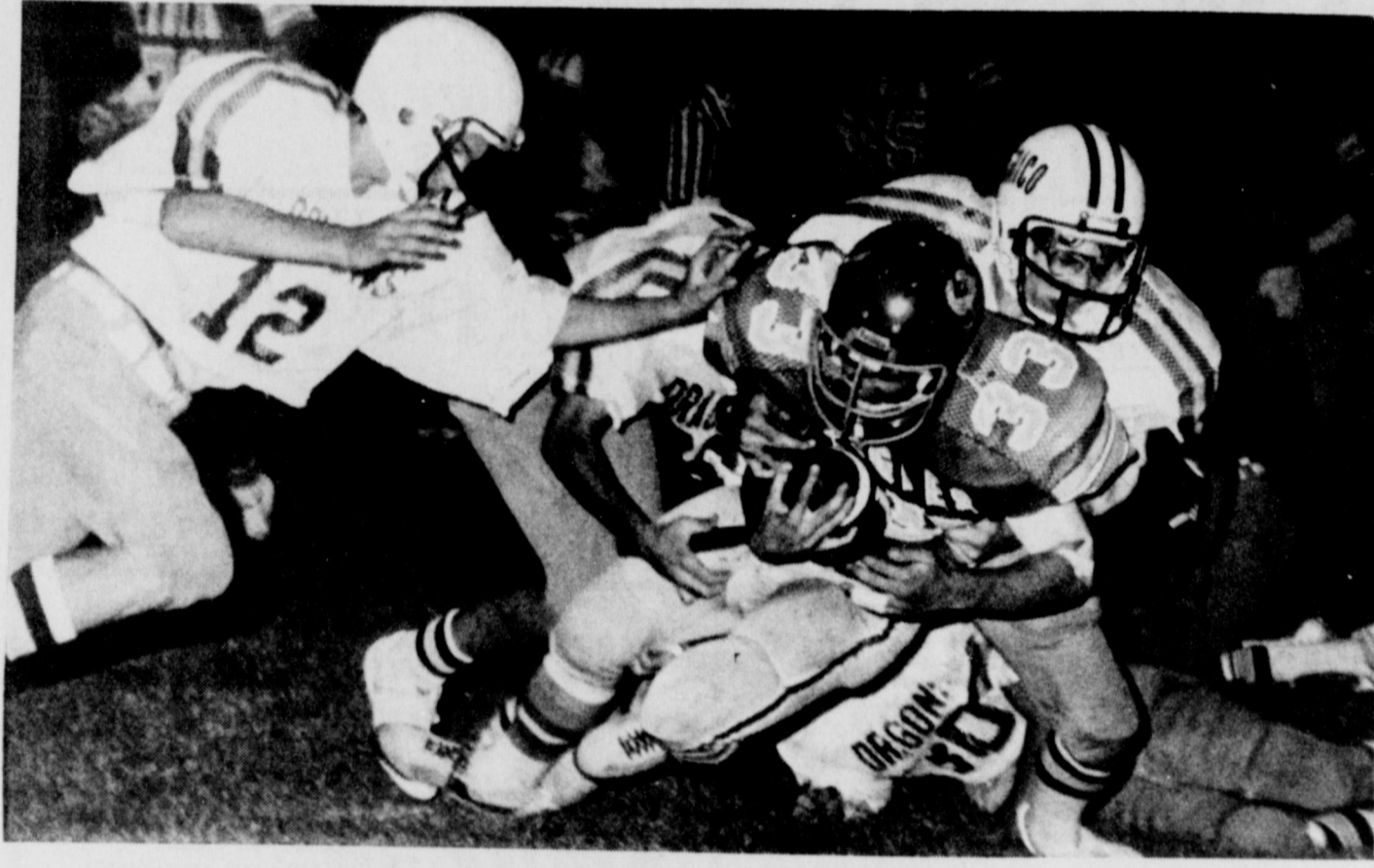
With over nine minutes left in the second quarter, Dyer rushed for his second touchdown of the night, this one a 31 yarder to highlight a 62-yard drive. With the PAT good, the Eagles led 34-0.

On the kickoff to Chico, Joe Chase made his third solo tackle in four returns inside the Dragon 20. After dropping the quarterback for a 12-yard loss to the Dragon six, Dyer recovered a Chico fumble at the seven. Martin ran in on the next play for the score. With the PAT good, the Eagles ran up a 41-0 score.

Holliday scored once more before halftime on a five-yard run by Chase,

giving the Eagles a 48-0 cushion going into intermission.

One advantage the lopsided score provided for Holliday was the playing time given to the second and third team players.

With most of the first team players out in the second half, Chico managed a 44-yard drive, their longest of the evening. But Weldon Nichols recovered a Chico fumble at the Eagle 30 to kill the third quarter drive.

Chase scored his second touchdown of the night halfway through the final period, this one a 20-yard scamper. The PAT was off to the left, giving Holliday a 54-0 lead.

With less than a minute left in the game, Larry Boydston ran one yard

for the Eagles' final score, capping a 68-yard drive after a Chico fumble. A successful PAT froze the scoreboard with Holliday ahead 61-0.

The Eagles regained possession with 18 seconds left at the Dragon 16, but elected to run the clock down to end the game.
