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Soil Conservation

Trial plots of Midland coastal bermuda grass have been sodded in this area. Midland coastal bermuda has the growth habits of coastal bermudagrass, but is more winter hardy.

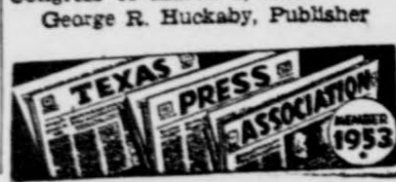
Fred Parkey, manager of the Water Improvement districts, secured the springs from Dr. Harper of the Noble Foundation at Ardmore, Ok. Fred gave Lester Brooks, superintendent of the Texas Experiment Station, a portion of the springs and the others to the W-W SCS co-operators.

Earl Lehman and Gordon T. West sodded the plots for the district. Each of these plots will be adjacent to a plot of coastal bermudagrass, thus growing conditions will be the same and field observations can be made.

A large stockwater pond was completed for Lige Reid, manager of the Burnett ranch, during the past week. Hughes and Streit had the construction contract.

Waterways that were seeded to adapt grasses have some grass up. Among those having grass up now are B. H. Whiteside, Herbert Detmer, and Juanita Douglas of Electra, Henry Wolf of Iowa Park and Roller estate of Bacon Switch. Albert Brockreide of Electra is seeding blue panic and buffalograss. Blue panic has been a good grass for some co-operators. Earnie Shaw, soil scientist of the Soil Conservation Service, has been added to the staff at Iowa Park. He will make land capability maps for work units at Burkburnett, Henrietta and Iowa Park.

If this citation is not served with-in ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

Clara Lutheran Church Has Part in National GI Service Program

Trinity Lutheran church of Clara will join with the 5,000 congregations of the Lutheran church—Missouri Synod next Sunday, Mother's Day, to receive an offering for the church's Armed Services Commission, as announced by F. W. Behrmann, pastor of the Clara congregation.

The commission which has offices in Washington, D.C., ministers to the spiritual welfare of Synod's 35,000 young men and women in the military.

Its program has been hailed by church and military leaders as the "most comprehensive and effective service" carried on by any church today among the armed forces. A lead article in a widely circulated national news magazine recently lauded the commission for its outstanding job to service people.

The commission's ministry begins with each individual member when he first enters the service. He is sent an initial packet containing a Lutheran identification tag, Service Prayer Book, Scripture pocket calendar, and several tracts.

The serviceman's name and military address, sent to the commission by his home pastor, is forwarded to the nearest chaplain or contact pastor of the church. One hundred twenty-six chaplains and 400 contact pastors are co-operating in this effort. In addition, the commission with the assistance of 142 hospital pastors, serves Lutherans confined to Veterans Administration hospitals.

Each month an order of service with sermon and hymns, "Loyalty to Christ and Country," along with a folder "Directory for Service People," listing the locations of Missouri Synod Lutheran chaplains, is mailed to the service people. "Double Time," a pocket news magazine containing pictures and items of Lutheran service interest, is mailed quarterly.

Forty-five Lutheran Service Centers, located in the US and overseas, are being supported by the commission for the purpose of spiritual counseling and informal hospitality to service people during their off duty hours.

This comprehensive service program is financed solely through the Mother's Day collections taken in Synod's churches throughout the US and Canada.

Delegates from central and north Texas gathered in Abilene, Monday and Tuesday to hear and ask questions about the future for farmers in 1955.

John C. Lynn, head of the Washington office of the American Farm Bureau Federation, was on hand to explain the Agricultural Act of 1949. This law, our basic law on price supports, has never been put into action. The last administration did not put it into effect because of an election year.

It is a permanent legislation, and provides for a system of variable price supports. The basic philosophy back of this act was a desire to set up a system of price supports which would (1) take account of the differences that exist between commodities, (2) permit producers to choose the type of program best suited for their particular commodity, and (3) adjust automatically to changing conditions.

It is a plain fact that when the farm supply gets above demand by too large a margin, the farm economy becomes shaky. It is not the nature of farmers to cut down on production. The prosperity of the nation has reached its highest peak in history because of high production.

The Agricultural Act of 1949 provides the means for the farmers to control the problem of too much production. It presents a workable mechanism of free enterprise for the farm industry with the least amount of government control and subsidization.

There are a lot of things involved in this Act. Don't decide you don't like it from the few paragraphs written here. As Mr. Lynn has said, every farmer in the nation should think about, study and develop in his mind the type of farm program he would want for himself in 1955. We have time to study in 1953; we must act in 1954. This doesn't mean just the farmers in Kansas or in other parts of Texas. This means every farmer in this county; every farmer in Iowa Park.

We intend to talk and listen to every farmer in this county. This fall when the resolutions are taken up by the Farm Bureau, we intend to have them representative of all farmers, Farm Bureau members or not.

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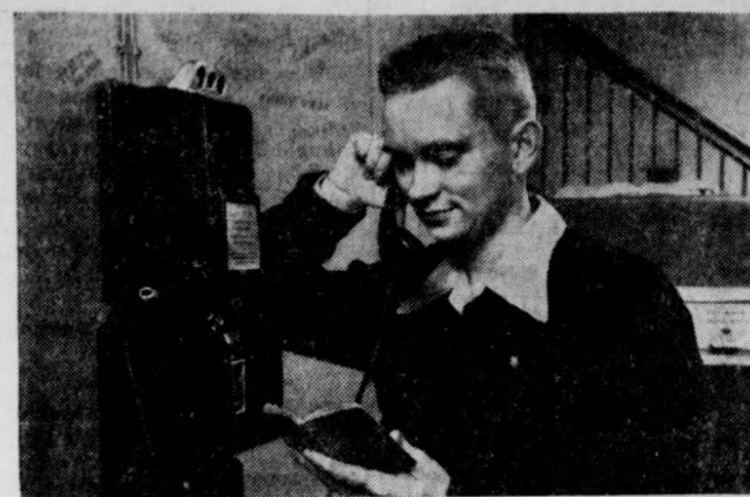
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
