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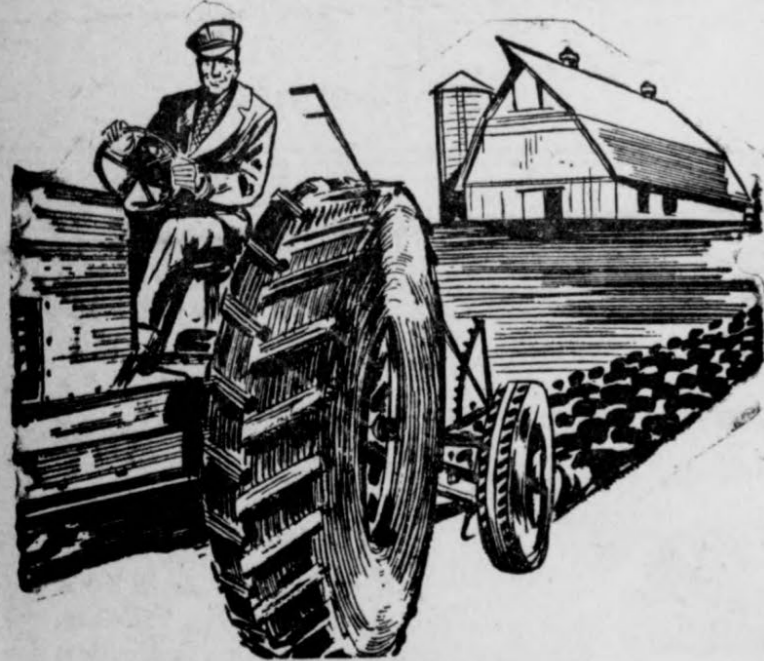

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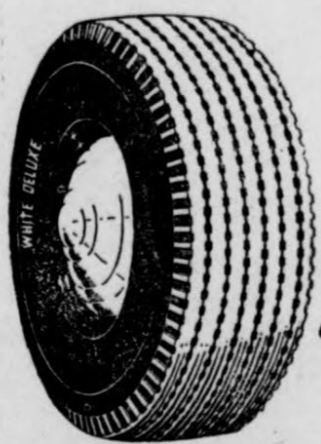
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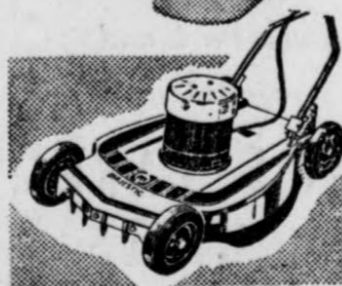
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Wichita County Home Demonstration women held a dress revue at the Community House, Monday night. Some 45 dresses were modeled by members of the various clubs.

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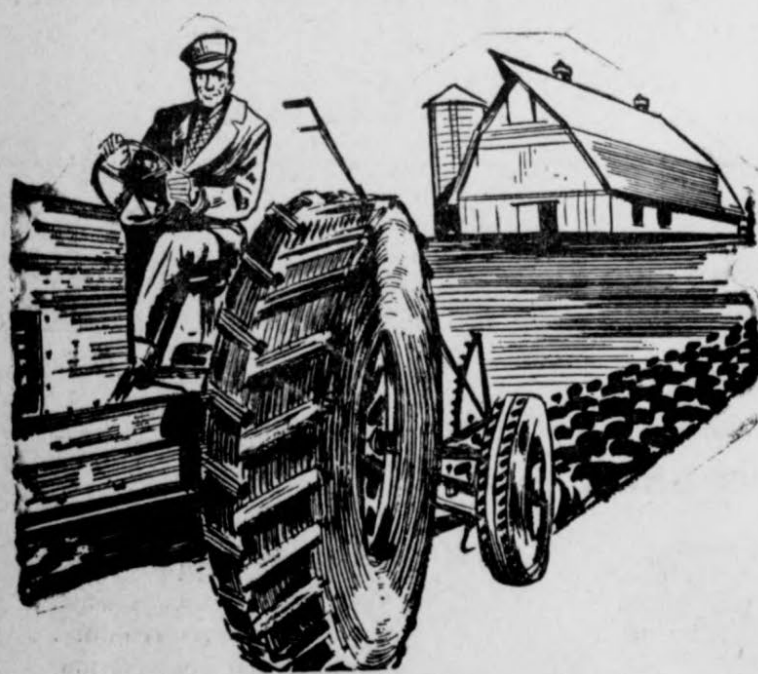

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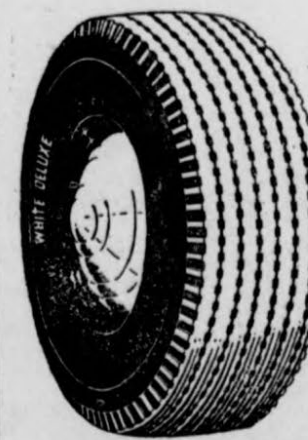
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
