Voters Saturday will elect two school trustees and three city aldermen.

But, as indicated by the light absentee voting turnout, only a handfull is expected to do the

Five each absentee ballots were cast by the deadline Tuesday in the

city and school elections. Polls are to open at 7 a.m. Saturday and close at 7 p.m.

There will be two polls for those voting in the city election, and three for school district voters.

Two of the polls will be in Iowa Park. Residents of the city will vote either at Kidwell Elementary, for those living north of the railroad tracks, and at Bradford Elementary, for those living south of the tracks.

The Kidwell building will be the poll for all residents of voting precinct 32 who are voting in the school election. Bradford will be the poll for school voters residing in precincts 33, 42 and 60.

The third poll will be at the Valley View school campus, where residents of precincts 34, 35, 59 and Archer County precinct 9 will vote for school trustee candidates.

The order in which trustee candidate names will appear on the ballot is: Jerald Brown, Bob Goodknight, Rex Wells and Tom Venhaus.

Brown is the only incumbent seeking re-election, since Delbert Catlin, the dean of the board, has chosen not to run again. Brown is an independent oil producer.

Goodknight is a former vocational teacher, currently employed as a technical writer at Sheppard AFB. Wells is a farmer and rancher who is heavily involved in various agriculture organizations. Venhaus was previously on the Iowa Park school faculty but is now a guidance counselor for Region Nine Service Center, working with Bellevue, Byers and Midway schools.

On the city alderman ballot, the order in which candidate names appear is: Herman Mahler, Harold Phillips, Jim Voyles, Bill Gilmore, George Hammonds, Michael J. Sargent and Charlie L. Lee.

Hammonds and Gilmore are both incumbents. Bud Adams resigned last month and has moved from the city. Hammonds works in Civil Service





Dear Mr. Hamilton,

I feel it necessary to correct one statement in your report of teacher salary increases, (Mar. 19, 1981). You said that the state was considering proposals to increase salaries between 15 and 33 percent. At one time this might have been true, however, the Texas House Public Education Committee has recommended to the House Appropriations Committee only a 6.8 percent per year increase, plus increments. By contrast with this meager salary recommendation, the Education panel proposed increased funds for maintenance and operation in local districts by some 60 percent.

By way of information, let me also give additional light on the issue of teacher salaries.

First, teachers are not considered state employees, and therefore reap none of the benefits accorded state employees, such as a proposed 14.3 percent salary increase, social security, and health insurance.

The smoke from John Hinckley's .22 caliber pistol was still in the air Monday afternoon, when television personalities started suggesting that maybe now a gun-control law would be enacted by the congress.

And in the following reports concerning the shooting of Pres. Reagan and the other three men on the sidewalk in Washington D.D., while pointing out all the past presidents who had been either assassinated or attempts made on their lives, the personalities brought out other big names who had been shot in recent years. They were so thorough in their reports, they even mentioned Malcom X in the same

No one, in their right mind, could condone the shooting of the president, or anyone else. But there is no call for all this bad-mouthing of the National Rifle Association, which has been the leader in lobbying against a gun control law.

To assume a national law against owning a handgun would have prevented Monday's assassination attempt on Reagan is foolish. The shooting occurred in the nation's capitol, which has the strictest law of any state concerning guns. But it didn't help.

It's obvious that anyone who attempts to shoot a person like the president didn't do it just because he happened to possess a handgun. The point is, a law against guns wouldn't stop someone from breaking the law by shooting at a president.

Equally obvious, drugs are against the law, and they are being hauled into the United States by the tons.

No, a gun-control law is not the answer. The real answer to such shootings, whether it be the president or his gardener who is the victim, is swift, sure and extreme punishment.

For instance, who would be against a law which called for the death penalty for anyone attempting to assassinate a president?

Probably those same people who want gun control.

One side point which keeps bugging me concerning Monday's incident: the frequency with which Texas keeps popping up.

We're still smarting from the assassination of John Kennedy in Dallas.

Now, Hinckley is a former resident of Texas; he bought his gun in Dallas: one of his victims, Press Secretary James Brady, formerly lived in Texas and ironically moved his family to Colorado, where the Hinckley family now lives); and Vice Pres. George Bush, a Texan, was in the state at the time of the shooting.

This will surely give the Yankees something to talk about besides oil deregulation.

Special Dependency Rules Apply to Divorced Parents

Separated and divorced parents should be aware of special dependency requirements when claiming children as dependents on federal tax returns. A dependency exemption for a child may be claimed only on the tax return of one of the parents. Generally, the parent having custody of the child for the greater part of the year is allowed the dependency deduction, according to

Frequently, however, the terms of the divorce or custody decree or other written agreement define parent may claim the dependent child. Also, if the parent without custody of the child contributes most of the child's support, that parent may generally claim the deduction.


