racks, and at Bradford Elementary for those living south of the tracks.

Dear Mr. Hamilton, 1 feel it necessary to correct one
tatement in your report of teacher salary increases, (Mar. 19, 1981). You aid that the state was considering proposals to increase salaries time this might have been true, however, the Texas House Public Education Committee has recommended to the House Appropriations Committee only a 6.8 percent per year increase, plus increments. By
contrast with this meager salary contrast with this meager salary proposed increased funds for maintenance and operation in
districts by some 60 percent. districts by some 60 percent. By way of information, let me also give additional
teacher salaries.
First, teachers are not considered state employees, and therefore reap none of the benefits accorded state
employees, such as a proposed 14.3 employees, such as a proposed 14.3
percent salary increase, social percent salary increase,
security, and health insurance


Secondly, Texas now ranks 33 rd or maybe 35th, by now, in average leacher salary, with $\$ 14,000$. The U.S. Department of Labor reports that the of $\$ 16,000$ amounts to teacher saly 78 percent of the $\$ 20,517$ that was required in the fall of 1979 for a a amily of four to live in a middle class, but not affluent fashion.
