City approves gas rates

City aldermen, meeting Monday night, approved an ordinance establishing new rates for natural gas service in the city by Lone Star Gas Co.

The new rate calls for a minimum rate of \$2.50 per month for residential customers and \$5 for commercial.

There is a difference in summer and winter minimum amounts, however. Residential and commercial minimums are 3.007 Mcf in a winter month and 2.757 summer.

New rates for reconnections and other services were also established in the ordinance.

Among budget adjustments considered by the council, only one called for an additional expenditure. The

other adjustments required no additional funds, Steve Morath, city administrator, explained.

The additional funds included \$7,000 for the police department, caused by more vehicle maintenance expense than had been anticipated, Morath said.

During a session of general discussion, various topics were discussed but no action taken. They included:

- * a new build-up in abandoned vehicles, with the neighborhood of Ruby and Victoria mentioned specifically;

- * a bad mud area where paving should be applied near the First Methodist Church;

- * ignoring a resignation submitted by Mrs. Charlie Lee from the parks board since her husband was elected to the city council, and giving her a vote of confidence;

- * asking that a request for water extended to property in the northeast part of the city be put on the next meeting agenda.

Two members of the council were absent from the meeting.

The host Iowa Park department set up the situations for the visitors to solve, primarily providing "victims" and their areas of locations. A map of the "tornado" path was issued to each department as it responded to the "emergency" call, and their areas of responsibility designated. "Victims" were found in trees, under park tables, in construction ditches and even in wrecked automobiles, all the way from the city hall to Gilmore Welding in the northeast corner of the city. Judgements rendered on local tax cases

Seven delinquent tax auctions are scheduled late this summer, and possibly 12 others at a later date, according to Mays, Hart and Co., a Greenville law firm which represents the Iowa Park city and school district. Judgements were rendered in

seven cases against owners of seven properties in the district. If the taxes, as well as penalty and interest and court costs are not paid, the properties will be sold at public auction in either July or August, the firm reports.

Owners in the suits included James Cates, Dorothy Cates and Cates Engine Works, Inc.; Cecil Longley; Robert Fulfer; Glen Harwell; Thomas Lewis; Glenn McWhorter; and Elbert Owens and Frances E. Owens.

Delinquent tax suits have been filed against 12 other owners, and judgement is pending.

The owners include: William A. Bartow; Preston Giles d/b/a Discount Foods; Lindy Lasseter; Harold Phillips; Tommy Pruet; Craig Shook; Harry Lee Skinner; John Toler; James D. Uselton; Gale Whitaker; Jerry Whitaker; and T. Eugene Williams.

All the properties are located in Iowa Park or the Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District, according to the law firm.

Rabies Clinic set Saturday

The Iowa Park FFA will sponsor its annual Rabies Clinic from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday at the Iowa Park High School vocational agriculture building.

Everyone is urged to bring their small animals and have them vaccinated for rabies. Even though the main purpose of this clinic is for rabies, other vaccinations such as distemper, hepatitis, parvo-virus, and feline-distemper will be offered.

New ambulance firm serves area

A new ambulance firm will be serving Iowa Park, along with Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and the rest of Wichita County.

The change came fast and quick for Iowa Parkans. City aldermen were called into an emergency session at 5:30 Friday

afternoon and informed of the change, which would become effective at midnight.

Iowa Park has been served several years by Gold Cross Ambulance Service through a joint subsidy agreement with the other three entities, and all four cancelled their contracts with the firm some two months ago.

The new contractor is Plumlee Ambulance EMS, Inc., based in Weatherford.

Wichita Falls and county officials announced earlier Friday they had accepted Plumlee's offer, and it was up to the local officials to either accept the same provisions, or seek another service.

Wichita attempted to contract Gold Cross service another two weeks, giving Plumlee an opportunity to obtain vehicles and personnel. However, Gold Cross owner Bob Coburn reportedly agreed, at a cost of \$650 per day, and his offer was rejected.

Plumlee had one ambulance stationed in Wichita Falls by midnight Friday, and another en route. The new firm had one emergency medical technician (EMT) working, and a Wichita Falls fireman as a driver when the changeover took place.

At present, fire stations in the city are serving as bases for the ambulance.

According to the contract, Plumlee will serve the area with a minimum of four ambulances at all times. Two of the units are to be purchased by the governmental entities and leased to Plumlee for \$1 each per year. The two units are already ordered and expected to be in service by the end of this week.

Emergency equipment and crews are to be located at a base station and two substations, all in proximity to high accident and high personal

injury locations in Wichita Falls. The nearest substation is to be located so a unit can reach any area within Iowa Park in a maximum of 15 minutes, according to the contract.

Any area in Wichita Falls is to be reached in not more than eight minutes; 18 minutes in Burkburnett; and not more than 25 minutes to any point in the county.

Iowa Park's portion of subsidy to the ambulance service is three percent of the total cost. After the first year, the cost is expected to be \$70,000 in subsidy for all four entities, but may be adjusted annually.

The Plumlee contract is about \$200,000 less than what Gold Cross wanted, County Judge Tom Bacus is quoted as saying.

The emergency telephone number for ambulance service is 322-5611, it was announced during the council meeting.

Bloodmobile here Monday

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be at the Faith Baptist Church between 2:30 and 6:30 p.m. Monday, according to Connie Hrcirik, spokeswoman for the sponsoring Epsilon Eta Chapter.

Blood donations will be processed and distributed to 42 hospitals in the 31-county area, when needed. Iowa Park's quota is 50 pints.

"A continuous supply of blood is needed to meet the daily disbursement, plus insure any possible emergency. It takes only about 45 minutes to give a pint of blood and it doesn't hurt. In fact, it will make you feel good to know you have helped save a life," Mrs. Hrcirik said.

MACAROON FILLING:

1/2 cup water
1/2 tsp. peppermint extract
6 drops green food coloring
Beat eggs, water and oil together. Add chocolate packet. Pour half the batter into a bundt pan that has been sprayed with Pam. In a separate bowl, mix macaroon packet, water, peppermint extract and food coloring. Spoon over top of chocolate batter. Add remaining chocolate batter and cook on medium high 12-14 minutes. Let stand 10-15 minutes.

CHOCOLATE MINT GLAZE

1 pkg. (5 oz.) chocolate mint patties. In a two-cup measuring cup, place the chocolate patties. Insert probe into the center of the patties. Set temperature to 140 F. on medium power. Stir and pour over cooled cake.

NEW POTATOES AND PEAS IN A MORNAVY SAUCE

1 lb. small new potatoes
1 pkg. frozen green peas (10 oz.)
2 Tbsp. margarine
1 Tbsp. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup milk
1/2 cup Swiss cheese
1 tsp. lemon juice
Cayenne pepper

Place package of frozen peas in oven and cook on high 2-3 minutes; drain. Scrub the potatoes and cut off a band of skin around the middle of each. Place potatoes in a cooking bag. Fold open end under potatoes loosely. Cook on high 8 minutes. Turn potatoes over after 4 minutes.

In a 4-cup measuring cup, melt margarine on high 30 seconds. Stir in flour, salt, pepper and milk. Cook on medium 3 to 5 minutes, stirring halfway through the cooking time. Add cheese and lemon juice and stir to mix. Place potatoes and peas in a casserole. Pour cream sauce over and stir to coat.

PEPPERED RIBEYE STEAKS

1-1/2 lb. ribeye steak
Garlic powder
Cracked pepper
Olive oil
Worcestershire sauce
Sprinkle both sides of meat with seasonings. Preheat browning dish approximately 5 minutes or according to manufacturer's directions. Cook on medium high for: 7 minutes rare; 8 minutes medium; 9 minutes well done.
Place steaks in browning dish for 30 seconds to 1 minute, allowing them to sizzle. When the sizzling begins to die down, flip steaks over and return to oven and cook as previously mentioned. Do not cover.

9-INCH PIE SHELL

9-inch frozen pie shell
1 Tbsp. margarine
1 Tbsp. vanilla
Place margarine into small custard cup and cook for 30 seconds on high until melted. Blend in vanilla and brush onto pie shell. Prick shell several times. Cook pie shell on high 3-4 minutes. Rotate one time while cooking.

FREEZER TO TABLE CHICKEN & DRESSING

1 pkg. (6 oz.) Sauce Pan Stuffing Mix
1/2 cups chicken broth
1 cup (4 oz.) mushroom pieces, drained
1/2 to 1 1/4 lb. chicken pieces
2 to 3 Tbsp. melted margarine
Salt, pepper, paprika
Combine stuffing mix, water and mushrooms in 1 1/2 qt. glass utility dish. Arrange chicken pieces, skin side up, over stuffing. Drizzle margarine over chicken and season with pepper and paprika. Wrap for freezer. When ready to cook, program the oven to: defrost 10 minutes; hold 10 minutes; and cook 10 to 12 minutes on high. Season with salt to taste.

[Cut liquid 1/4 cup for cake mixes. Do not use electric mixer, do by hand]
1 box Pillsbury Chocolate Macaroon Bundt cake mix
3 eggs

1/2 cup sugar
1 Tbsp. cornstarch
1/2 cup water
1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen sliced strawberries, thawed
1 qt. fresh strawberries, washed and hulled

Child abuse cases told

Charlotte Risinger, one of six Wichita County welfare workers involved with community resources, parents, politics and children, spoke to the Iowa Park Lioness Club Thursday evening and focused attention on physical, sexual and emotional abuse of children. She cited some almost inconceivable cases of child abuse that have occurred in the county.

"The community has a great responsibility both in helping to break down the problem of families isolating themselves to where the public is unaware of child abuse, and to be willing to become involved to the point of testifying in court to protect children from abuse," she said.

The speaker stated that child abuse in the home was largely due to poorly-parented people who are not adequately bonded to their children. She also said that many, many times when parents had been abused at home they are inclined to follow the same pattern in bringing up their children. Mrs. Risinger remarked that very often they will take a dislike for one child and abuse him or her to the degree of permanent injury or even death.

Mrs. Roy B. Smith, another guest, contributed the devotion on "God's Dust People," emphasizing his love for his creation from the time of Adam who was formed from the dust of the earth down through the ages in spite of their rebellion and rejection of his son, Jesus Christ.

Friday will be a special day at the Friendly Door when the fourth anniversary of the organization will be observed with a covered dish luncheon and party for members who will celebrate their birthdays during May. During the meeting, volunteer workers will be given special recognition.

Myrna Robinson, site manager stated that the membership dues for a year were \$2. The price of the newsletter is \$1, if picked up, and \$2 if mailed.

May is Older Americans Month, and the goal of the program is to help meet the social needs of millions of persons aged 60 or older, as well as their nutritional needs. Other goals are to reduce the isolation of old age, offering older Americans an opportunity to live their remaining years in dignity, according to the Older American Act.

In 1972, legislation establishing a nutrition program for older Americans was passed, and the program has expanded rapidly since its launching in 1973. The number of meals served in 1980 was approximately 167-million, and 40-million of them were home-delivered.

The volunteer workers play an important part in delivering the meals nationwide and locally. Volunteers outnumber paid staff by eight to one, 256,000 volunteers to about 32,000 paid staff nationwide.

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

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Worth Quoting

Although I generally attempt to avoid arguments on such cliché topics as abortion, nuclear power, euthanasia and capital punishment, the recent assassination attempt on President Ronald Reagan and three others rekindled debate on hand gun control.

As usual, I find myself somewhere in the middle of the two extremes.

However, as the owner of several firearms including a hand gun, I tend to lean toward the side of gun owners.

I oppose the idea of a weapons round-up by the government. On the other hand, something should be done to curb senseless murders, assaults and robberies involving use of firearms.

In order to reach a solution to the

dilemma, the people representing each extreme of the argument must be willing to examine the other's reasoning. There doesn't seem to be much communication between the two camps because neither seems willing to compromise. And neither of the two extreme arguments presents an equitable solution.

I'll admit right here that part of my reasoning for owning firearms is for self-protection. However, I know enough about guns, their effectiveness and my own abilities that I would opt to use my twelve gauge sawed-off shotgun rather than my pistol in the event of a life threatening situation.

The gun control advocate's third suggestion was that there be an approximate three-week waiting period between application and receipt of a hand gun. The idea is to give authorities time to investigate individuals who wish to purchase a gun. If something in the applicant's background indicates he would not exercise prudence, then the purchase could be denied.

The prospect of a waiting period does not alarm me. I spend a much longer period of time than that just shopping around while comparing calibers, models and brands before seriously contemplating the expenditure a good item of weaponry requires.

While I do not pretend to have any workable solution to the hand gun dilemma, columnist Art Buchwald devised an unusual answer.

He suggested that both extremists would be satisfied if the manufacture of bullets was outlawed. Gun owners would be happy because they could keep their guns. Gun control advocates would be happy because weapons would be useless without projectiles to fire through them.

The only folks who would be dissatisfied would be bullet manufacturers, who Buchwald contended could use the same equipment to produce suppositories.

As I See It...

Where do you turn when you have a major fire loss?

Most would seek help from their relatives and friends. Others might go to the Salvation Army, Red Cross or churches. Many might look toward some governmental agency.

But where does a home for unwanted girls turn?

To us, the general public, that's who. And our help is needed now for some very deserving young women.

Bob Sefcik brought the plight of Girlstown to my attention last week. He's been a supporter of the facility located just outside Whiteface a number of years. But he realizes his help is only a drop in the bucket to the real need.

You may remember a wire story earlier this month about a Girlstown

dormitory burning, leaving 55 residents and staff members not only homeless, but without any personal belongings. Cost was set at \$500,000.

"We have 44 girls with no place to put them," stated Mrs. Wanda Cooper, administrative assistant.

Girlstown is the female answer to Boys Ranch, up near Amarillo. That facility is so impressive, a movie was once made about it.

Well, Girlstown hasn't received the publicity it deserves, but it has a fine reputation for caring for the needs of young girls who, for one reason or another, must be cared for until they are ready to go on their own.

Sefcik recalls having several of

them in his home for holidays, and visiting their campus at Whiteface. He was most impressed with them.

What he would like, is to find one or more organizations in Iowa Park that would be willing to contribute to the immediate, and maybe long-term, needs of the facility, during its dire period.

Sefcik speculates one or more organizations might want to have a fund-raising project that could raise the money needed.

Communities up on the South Plains have for years been contributing to Girlstown, which receives no tax monies. Volunteers up there have been doing it for years, and many of them have stretched their abilities as far as they can on an annual basis.

Sefcik is hoping that for the immediate and major needs, someone here might want to join him in helping.

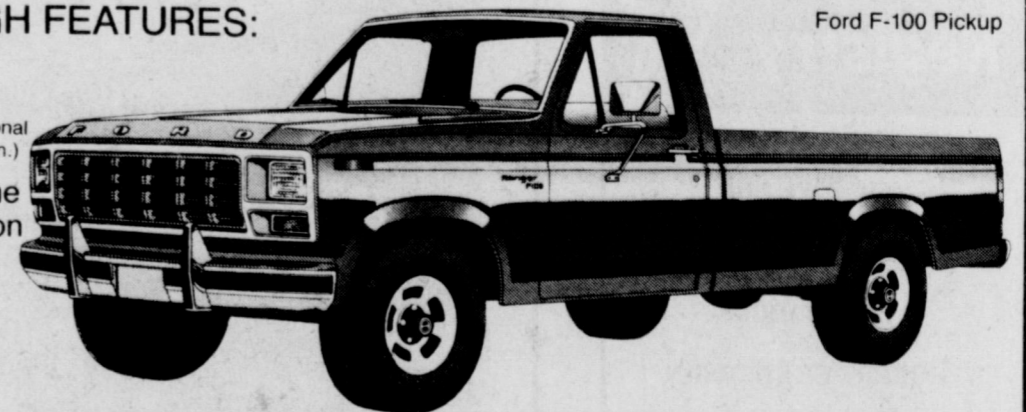



Holliday obtains ambulance service

Quick action on the part of the Holliday city council, mayor James Cook, city administrator Jim Hamill and the Archer County Commissioners Court has kept the city from having virtually no ambulance service at all.

Holliday city fathers were pressed into action last week after Wichita County switched ambulance services and awarded a contract to Plumlee Ambulance EMS Inc., leaving Holliday without ambulance service.

The city formerly had ambulance service with Gold Cross Ambulance Service Inc., which lost its contract with Wichita County, Wichita Falls, Iowa Park and Burkburnett to Plumlee last week.

Terms of the contract with Plumlee call for three ambulances to stay inside Wichita County at all times until Oct. 1, when four ambulances will be required to stay in the county. In addition, Plumlee cannot answer a call outside the county, and can only provide services outside the county if the terms of the contract are met. Cook said Holliday now must rely

on the Archer County Ambulance Service in Archer City and a rescue unit to be located in Holliday.

Archer County Commissioners Monday voted to provide Holliday with a converted van formerly used

as the county ambulance. Terms of the agreement state that the County will maintain the title and insurance on the van, and Holliday will provide the personnel and maintenance.

"The commissioner's court has been very cooperative with us," Hamill said. "We have never lost ambulance service to Holliday."

According to Hamill, the van will be officially called a rescue unit, since it will be used only in emergency situations, and not to transport in any other style.

"It takes a little longer to respond from Archer City which is 22 miles, whereas Wichita Falls is only 14 or 15 miles," Cook stated. Hamill added it will depend on the situation as to where the rescue unit will transport the victims.

A heavy duty electrical system has been ordered for the van and several disposal items must be replaced, according to Hamill. Barring any unforeseen delays, the rescue unit will be operational within the next two weeks.

PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 81-1

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING AN EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE TO HOLLIDAY CABLEVISION, INC., A TEXAS CORPORATION, TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN A CABLE TELEVISION AND CLOSED-CIRCUIT ELECTRONICS SYSTEM IN THE CITY OF HOLLIDAY; PROVIDING FOR UNLAWFUL ACTS OF MAKING UNAUTHORIZED CONNECTIONS OR TAMPER WITH CABLE TELEVISION FACILITIES; PROVIDING A PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOLLIDAY, TEXAS:

SECTION ONE. Short Title.

This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Holliday Cablevision, Inc." Ordinance.

Service Standards.

The Company shall, at all times, provide at least twelve (12) channels of service.

Company Rules.

The company shall maintain as one of its rules that there shall be no installation fee for service for any customer sixty-two (62) years of age or older.

Rights of the City.

(1) City Rules. The right is hereby reserved to the City to adopt, in addition to the provisions herein contained, valid, applicable ordinances and such additional valid, applicable regulations as it shall find necessary in the exercise of the police power, provided that such regulations or ordinances shall be enforced only if within the power of the City pursuant to law.

SECTION FIFTEEN. Unlawful Acts; Penalties.

(1) It shall be unlawful for any person to make any unauthorized connection, whether physically, electronically, acoustically, inductively or otherwise, with any part of Company cable television system for the purpose of enabling himself or others to receive any television signals, radio signals, pictures, programs, sounds, or any other information or intelligence transmitted over Company's cable system without payment to the Company.

(2) It shall be unlawful for any persons, without the consent of the Company, and with intent to harm or damage said property, to willfully tamper with, remove, or injure any cable, wires, or other equipment used for the distribution of television signals, radio signals, pictures, programs, sounds, or any other information or intelligence transmitted over Company's cable system.

(3) It shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$200.00, for any person to violate any provisions of Section 15 of this Ordinance.

SECTION SIXTEEN. Acceptance to be Filed.

The Company shall file a written acceptance of this ordinance and the terms and conditions thereof with the City within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this ordinance.

Bidding will be on various phases of the project, allowing council members to determine whether to do part of the work, or have it all done at once.

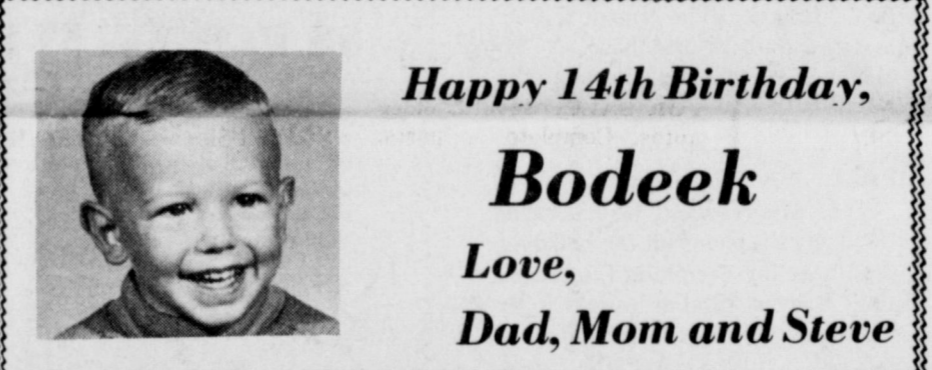
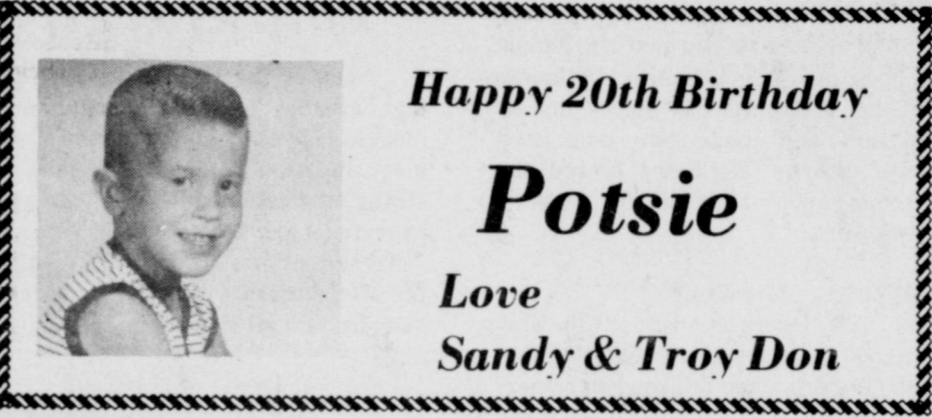
