## Child abuse cases told

Charlotte Risinger, one of six
Wichita County welfare workers Wichita County welfare workers
involved with community resources parents, politics and children, spoke to the Iowa Park Lioness Club Thursday evening and focused attention on physical, sexual and emotional abuse of children. She cited
some almost inconceivable cases of some almost inconceivable cases of
child abuse that have occured in the county.
"The community has a great responsibility both in helping to isolating themselves to where the public is unaware of child abuse, and to be willing to become involved to the point of testifying in court to protect children from abuse," she said.
The speaker stated that child abuse in the home was largely due to poorly-parented people who are not
adequately bonded to their children She also said that many, many times when parents had been abused at home they are inclined to follow the same pattern in bringing up their children. Mrs. Risinger remarked that very often they will take a disilike
for one child and abuse him or her to the degree of permanent injury or even death.

The prospect of a waiting period does not alarm me. I spend a much longer period of time than that just shopping around while comparing calibers, models and brands before
seriously contemplating the expenditure a good item of weaponry requires.
While I do not pretend to have any workable solution to the hand gun dilemma, columnist Art Buchwald He suggested that bot He suggested that both extemists
would be satisfied if the manufacture of bullets was outlawed. Gun ownere would be happy because they could keep their guns. Gun control advocates would be happy because
