Aldermen delay action on project

The city council delayed until next Monday taking any action on bids to remodel the city hall.

When the council meets again at 7 p.m. Monday, Mayor Johnny Crawford said he would have recommendations both on alternates the council might accept for the remodeling, as well as a means of financing the project.

Meanwhile, aldermen approved unanimously a proposal to authorize issuance of certificates of obligation to finance the work. Crawford urged the members to approve the issue "to leave the door open as a method of financing."

Though the certificates cannot be issued unless the city hall project is approved, passage of the proposal was necessary from a paperwork and legal standpoint, Crawford said. He urged aldermen to "not shoot down the project now" after so many years planning and work had gone into it.

Lowest of four bids to remodel the city hall's interior, exterior, grounds improvement and pave a parking lot was submitted by Wallace and Raub, at \$244,344. Other bids ranged, on the same basis, from \$270,900 to \$318,397, to the highest of \$331,181.

Wallace and Raub gave a base bid of \$152,700. The first alternate, to

remodel the existing offices, was \$22,730. For doing the exterior of the building, foundation work and canopies, the bid was \$44,582. Site work bid was \$10,762, and the parking lot bid was \$13,570, said to be an excellent bid according to Crawford.

Crawford told council members the State National Bank had already given an offer to purchase the certificates of obligation for 10 years at 9.5 percent. He said he would have a plan Monday for paying off the certificates.

Another agenda item tabled for more consideration was an ordinance

changing the council's procedure of hiring and firing police chiefs and officers.

City Administrator Steve Morath proposed the city's policy of any naming of a chief or police officer be brought before the council for action be changed, and that he be given that authority, as he is over other city employees.

Almost without exception, aldermen said they wanted to retain the authority of accepting any applicants for the police department, or rejecting them.

Another, amended, ordinance will be offered at Monday's meeting which will ask that authority to dismiss a police officer be given the city administrator. Morath explained the change would take most of the opportunity to allege "politics" in the police department out of any future situations.

Council members approved a proposal to change the city's group insurance policy. Morath said the insurance company now carrying the employee hospitalization policy had notified him of an 18 percent increase in premiums.

The change aldermen approved was to downgrade the policy to where premiums would be about the same as they have been. But Morath said the change would still provide coverage "better than in 1978" when the city initiated insurance coverage for employees.

Morath explained the change was not sought by employees because of the cost to the city, but rather the premiums personnel have to pay to have their dependents included.

Action also was postponed on a proposal by Walter Berbee that the city abandon a portion of North Alcott. He explained that the home he purchased is partially located in the city's property.

A delay on the proposal was made while utility line locations are studied.

Hiring of three temporary personnel to work in the parks

Aldermen agreed to hire Terry Davis, who will join the high school faculty this fall, as a "working foreman" as well as two students. Total cost for the summer work would be \$3,500, Morath told aldermen.

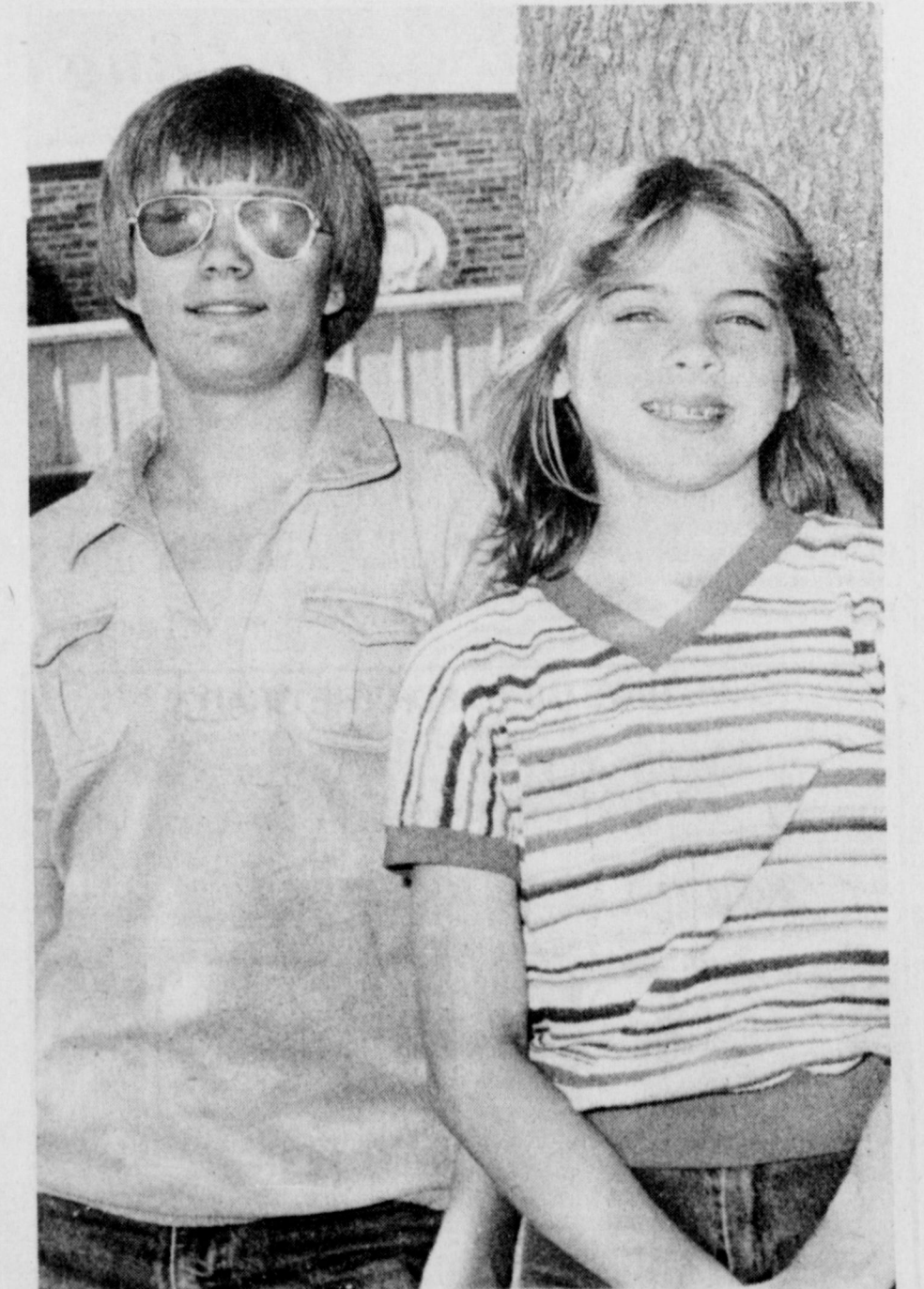

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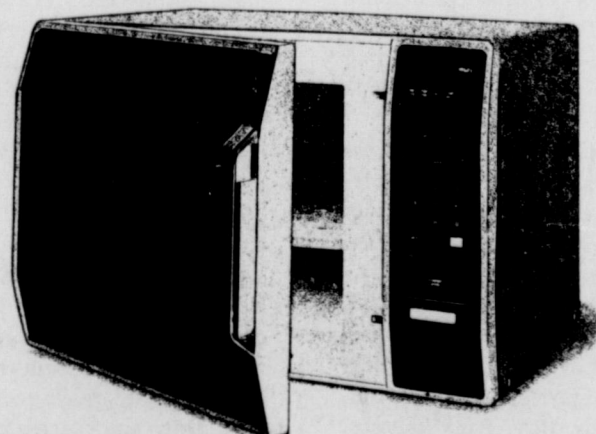

Cook of the Week

The name of Mrs. Stanley Hoye, who lives at Kadane Corner can be added to the list of those who think that microwave cooking is one of the most exciting advances of the age.

In a pamphlet put out by Texas Electric a short history of microwave cooking is given. In the early 1940s when Dr. Percy Spencer was doing some work for the military at Raytheon Corp., he found a melted candy bar in his pocket. He was working with high-frequency radio waves generated by a magnetron, a form of vacuum tube, used for radar technology.

He experimented and found that the waves, when confined to a metal cavity or "oven" would quickly penetrate food and vibrate moisture molecules within it. The vibration actually cooked the food. Research in the discovery continued and the first consumer microwave ovens were marketed in the 1950s. However, the real beginning of microwave ovens in the American kitchen was in about 1967.

Laverne Hoye agrees wholeheartedly with the advantages of microwave cooking: speed, energy saving, safety, easy cleaning, nutrition, economy, simplicity, convenience, flavor and appearance.

Mr. and Mrs. Hoye, who are engaged in extensive farming and ranching, moved to the area three years ago from Iowa and purchased a farm near Kadane Corner. He and his brothers own a business, Hoye, Inc., in Villisca, Iowa, a farm in Guatemala and one near Houston.

The Stanley Hoyes are members of the Iowa Park First Baptist Church. She is chairman of the Wichita Falls Christian Women's Club, which she helped to organize in July 1980. In Iowa, she worked for a time in advertising and served as a 4-H leader. She was graduated from high school in Atlantic, Iowa, attended college at Cedar Falls, Iowa and Midwestern State University.

The couple's children are Terry Hoye of Dalhart, Texas, Cathy Yunag of Fremont, Neb., Forest Hoye of Scotts Valley, Calif., Sally Payne of El Paso, Texas, Laurie Murray of Messana, Iowa and Joe Hoye, a student at Iowa State University. They have six grandchildren.

HAM BALLS

2 lbs. smoked ground ham
1 lb. hamburger
2 eggs
1 cup quick oatmeal

Form into balls

325 degrees and bake 15-20 minutes more.

QUICHE LORRAINE

5 eggs
2 bunches fresh spinach (or 1 box frozen)
1 cup Swiss cheese, cubed
5 T milk
1/2 cup dried beef or ham
1/2 tsp. chili powder
1/2 tsp. salt and a little pepper
Put all in blender except 1/2 of the cubed cheese and the dried beef. Blend well; then add rest of cheese and beef.
Pour into 9 inch pie shell and bake in 350 degree oven approximately 30 minutes or until firm in center.

QUICK PEACH DELIGHT

[For Microwave oven]
4 large canned peach halves
1 1/4 tps. butter or margarine
4 tps. brown sugar
Vanilla ice cream
Drain peaches. Place in 1-qt. baking dish (or 4 individual dishes). Put 1/4 tsp. butter in center of each peach half, sprinkle with brown sugar. Bake uncovered on high for 3 minutes. Serve warm with a small scoop of ice cream in center of each peach half.

CHILDREN'S FINGER FOOD FAVORITE

6 pkgs. unflavored gelatin, dissolve as usual
Add:
12 oz. frozen fruit juice, any favorite flavor (cranberry is nutritious and colorful). Add enough water to juice to total one quart. Pour into shallow dish and cut in little cubes when firmly set.

CHERRY DELIGHT

18 graham crackers, crushed
1/2 cup butter, melted
1/2 cup sugar
22 large marshmallows
1/2 cup milk
1 pkg. Dream Whip
1 cup powdered sugar
8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, room temperature
1 can cherry pie filling
Mix cracker crumbs, butter and sugar and press into 9x13 inch pan. Melt marshmallows in milk and cool.

Prepare Dream Whip according to directions, or use Cool Whip. Beat in powdered sugar and cream cheese. Whip all together and spread on cracker crumbs. Then spread the cherry pie filling over top and let set overnight in refrigerator.

BAKED CUSTARD [Serves 5]

[For microwave oven]
3 eggs
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 1/4 cups milk
1 tsp. vanilla extract
Cinnamon to taste
Beat eggs until fluffy. Add sugar and salt and continue beating until thick and lemon-colored. Beat in milk and vanilla. Divide mixture into five - 6 oz. custard cups. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Arrange custard cups in baking dish about half full of water, if desired. If a drier custard is preferred, eliminate the water in dish. Cook on simmer for 9 to 10 minutes. Remove and let stand 5 minutes.

FROSTED BROWNIES

1 cup shortening
3 cups white sugar
6 eggs
Mix above ingredients and add:
3 squares chocolate, melted
2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1 cup pecan halves
1 tsp. vanilla
Bake at 350 degrees for 30-40 minutes. This is a large recipe for one large cookie sheet pan or 2 smaller pans.

FROSTING

When Brownies are done, remove from pan and drop spoonful of marshmallow creme (approximately 5 ozs.) over them and let stand 3 or 5 minutes for easy spreading.
Mix in bowl: 2 cups powdered sugar, 4 T cocoa, 2 T butter, melted and enough milk to stir to right consistency. Spread over marshmallow creme. Top with pecan halves.

I'd have given a lifetime subscription to have been at Lake Buffalo Sunday evening and seen the expression on an 11-year-old boy's face when he extracted a five-pound carp from the waters with his fishing line.

Danny Easter lives in Childress. He was visiting relatives, his aunt Elizabeth Stephens and grandfather Major Morrow; when he made his big catch.

To watch any child accomplish in sports is a true pleasure. But what makes this youngster special is the fact that he has to move around either on crutches or in a wheel chair, because he is paralyzed from the waist down.

Maybe Danny will give me another chance to see him "catch the big one" sometime in the future.

After having worked a good portion of my adult life with farmers, I have a pretty good idea about how they feel, right here at harvest time, every time a weather front moves clouds overhead.

Farmers of this area are two and three weeks away from harvesting what may be an all-time record yield wheat crop. For all practical

purposes, the crop is made, and it's a good'un.

But for the farmers, year after year watching to see if they get enough rainfall to plant a crop, whether it rains enough to make the crop grow, and then whether a storm misses or hits the crop when it is ready to harvest... just points out what an amazing breed farmers are.

You won't hear many farmers talking about how good this year's crop is. They've learned not to count their eggs until they're hatched.

Additionally, they haven't much to brag about, because the price of wheat is so low, it's ridiculous. It's so low, in fact, that a bumper crop of... say, 40 bushels... will show very

little profit after cost of plowing, buying seed, planting, fertilizing, spraying for insects, and then the high cost of harvesting.

If the price of wheat were to double, well, you would easily see some real smiles. And you know what it would do to the cost of your bread? If all the middle men held their prices, a loaf would increase about a penny.

This has been an unusual season, weather-wise. I hope it's just as unusual, farmer-wise, and that the bumper crop is harvested without weather problems, and someone decides the crop is worth more than they are currently offering to pay for the grain.

Our farmers need it, and deserve it.

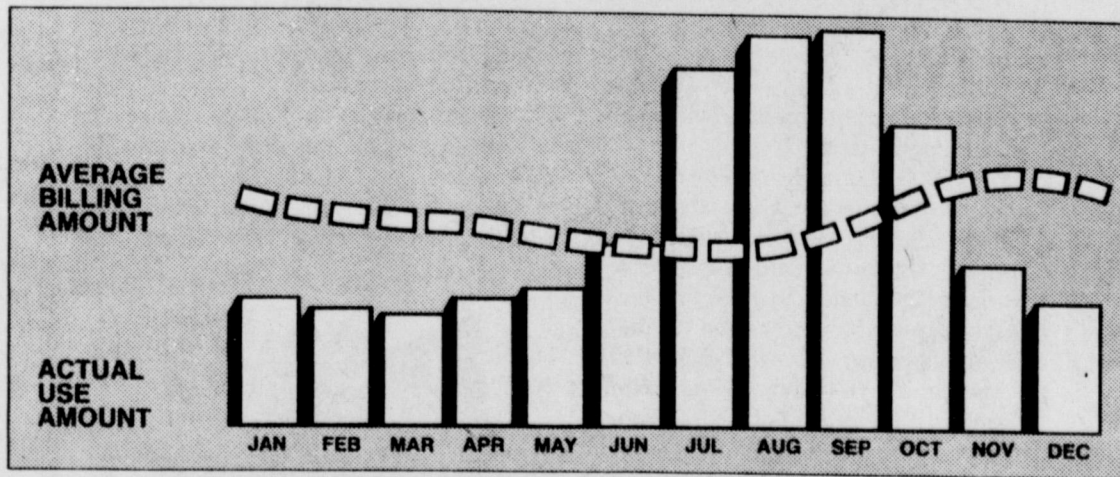

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Trustees give second teacher salary increase

Twenty-eight Holliday faculty members were present at Monday night's school board meeting, where trustees extended teachers their second salary increase for the 1981-82 school year.

Trustees awarded classroom teachers—excluding coaches—an additional \$300 above state base, which, added to an increase of \$500 to \$700 above state base approved by trustees during their March meeting, brings their salaries to \$1,000 above state base.

Supt. Ray Coe added discussion of teachers' salaries to the agenda after visiting with a faculty committee before the meeting, where committee members discussed at length their salaries, then made recommendations.

In addition to the salary increase, teachers will be issued free passes to all school functions.

In other business, board members accepted the resignation of Connie York effective May 29, hired Stephen McIlhaney of Knox City to coach girls' athletics, approved athletic and band budgets, and issued the oath of office to Gene Harmon.

McIlhaney was hired by trustees at \$4,000 above state base, and begins his duties in August as girls' volleyball, basketball and track coach. McIlhaney has coached girls' athletics at Knox City for six years, and, according to athletic director Don Lucy, comes highly recommended.

Both the athletic and band budgets were approved by trustees, with athletics receiving an increase of \$8,194 over the previous year's proposed budget. The total proposed budget for athletics, \$44,639, includes a \$4,000 increase in basketball, \$2,000 in football and track, \$500 for golf and \$400 for volleyball.

The total proposed band budget, \$17,193, is an increase of \$2,733 over

last year's figure. "This includes regular replacements and new equipment," band director Tom Woody said.

Harmon was sworn in to fill the unexpired term of Jake Cottrell, who accepted a coaching position in the Holliday schools. Harmon was chosen on the basis of his third place finish in April's at-large trustee election, where Mrs. Alice Bishop Carver became the first woman trustee for Holliday. Board president W.T.

Mankins issued the oath to Harmon. In other business:

* trustees motioned to hire an additional vocational agriculture teacher for the 1981-82 school year;

* accepted Archer County's estimate to resurface the school's parking lots at their costs of materials; and,

* approved a contract with West Wichita Cooperative for 1981-82 school year.

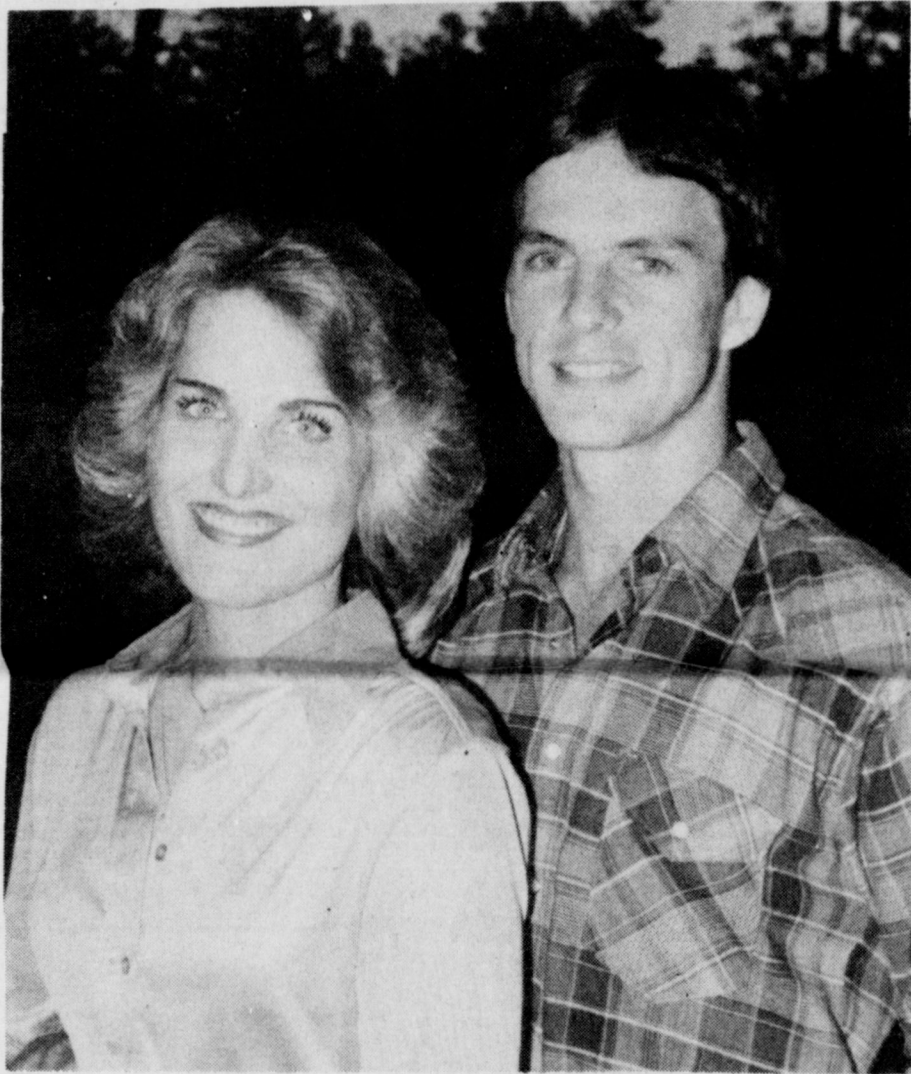
Holliday city council will discuss her salary Monday at 7:30 p.m. during their regular meeting.

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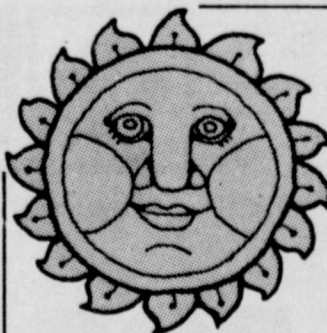
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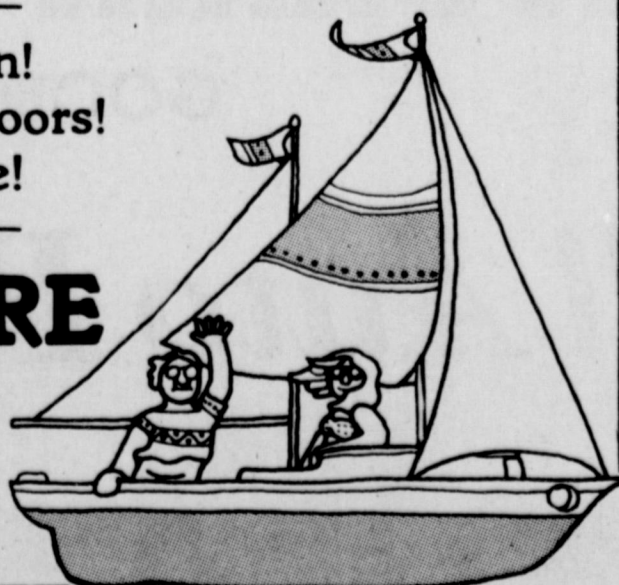

The eyes and thoughts of Iowa Park sports enthusiasts will follow two Hawks into Memorial Stadium on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin tomorrow evening. Mike Ray and Troy Linthicum will be representing Dist. 3-AAAA and Region One in the state track meet. This will be the second time Ray has competed in the state shot put competition. He was not at all pleased with his fifth-place finish in the state's capitol last year, posting a heave of

54-3 after earlier in the season having a throw measuring 56-10 1/4. Linthicum, who the past few years has been only a spectator at the pole vault runway, will be competing in the giant meet for the first time. Both athletes are seniors. 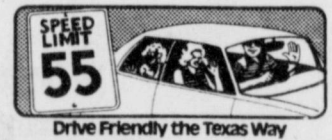

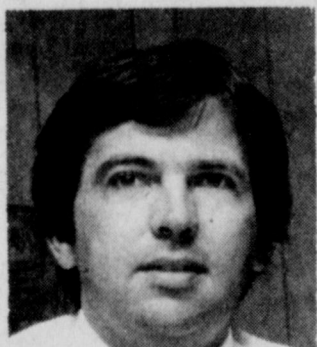
