indoors, each senior is to receive six tickets for family and friends, according to Bob Dawson, principal. Commencement address this year will be delivered by Jim Gotcher, faculty representative.

Presentation of the Senior Class Key will be made by Kent Fehr, class president. Herman Escue, counselor, will make the presentation of honors. Dawson will present the class to

Supt. Harold Cowley who, in turn, will ask board of trustees president Roy Boutwell to present the diplomas.

Invocation will be given by Bill Jeffress and benediction by Jim Hodges.

Special music, as well as the processional and recessional, will be by the high school band, under direction of Greg Miller.

'Moving up' ceremonies Monday

"Moving up" ceremonies for almost 140 eighth graders will be held at 8 p.m. Monday in the high school auditorium.

There will not be reserved seats for any other than members of the class,

according to Jim Alsop, junior high principal.

Principal speaker will be Harold Cowley, superintendent of schools. The class will be accepted by Bob Dawson, high school principal.

Jay Yeakley will give the invocation and Robert DuBoise the benediction. The processional and recessional will be played on the piano by Lynette Flick, and special music will be provided by the eighth grade choir.

City hall renovation project rejected

There will not be a major remodeling of Iowa Park's city hall. At least, not in the near future.

During Monday's called meeting of the city council, aldermen generally could not agree on how much of the proposed project should be done, though generally agreeing improvements were necessary.

And when the vote was called on financing whatever was to be done,

by issuance of certificates of obligation, that means was shot down by a 3-2 vote.

Renovation of the city hall, which includes remodeling the present portion and taking in the old fire station, has been an ongoing topic of city councils more than six years.

Mayor Johnny Crawford told the council he had the proposed plans for the remodeling, and offered a means

of financing the project, which could be accomplished without affecting the city tax rate structure.

Crawford admitted he was not pleased with the cost, established by bids. "While I'm not satisfied with the prices and overall costs, I do believe they are representative of the times and the best we can come up with," he told the aldermen.

Wallace and Raub of Wichita Falls

was the low bidder on the project, at \$74,000, with a Dec. 1 completion date. The project would not only have expanded office space by 100 percent, it included changing the main entrance to the east side, reroofing, covering the exterior walls with stucco, completely redoing the landscaping, included a drive-in window for bill payments, provided a storage room and a paved, off-street parking area.

With all additional costs added, which included architectural fees, audit door, landscaping, financial advisory services and contingencies, the total project would have amounted to \$310,511.

Crawford said the city would have available \$160,000 this year and next through general fund and revenue sharing, and \$57,000 from the sewer improvement fund, which would have required \$103,000 in certificates of obligation to be issued over a five-year period at 9.5 percent interest, to pay for the project.

He said monthly payments on the certificates would have been \$1,320. When alderman Charlie Lee said he couldn't see paying \$103 per square foot for the project, Crawford explained that there were almost as many expenses outside the structure

as inside, and the per-foot cost was deceptive.

Bud Thompson offered a suggestion that the city should pay for renovation as it is done, and not rely on credit through issuance of certificates of obligation. He said the city might remodel the interior, pay cash for it, and also save on costs of the financial advisory (\$7,200).

Lita Watson said she was in favor of the project in general, but not the total project as presented.

Lee suggested postponing two project alternates, the parking lot and stucco on the exterior.

Bill Gilmore said he felt the work could be done for less than any of the four bidders proposed.

After more than two hours discussion on the issue, Crawford said "I can't support a partial project, other than maybe the shelving portion and parking lot. Anything else would be false economy."

He solicited the council's support and asked for any help in changing the project up to get the most of it accomplished.

But before the council could vote on the renovation bids, members first had to provide a method of financing, as required by law.

It was then that Watson moved to

issue \$225,000 in certificates, and Lee seconded the motion.

With four votes required for passage, Thompson, Gilmore and Herman Mahler voted against the motion. Watson and Lee voted for it.

"O.K. That's our city hall project. We'll pay the architect and go on to something else," Crawford stated.

As a formality, the council then voted on the renovation bids. Gilmore, Thompson and Mahler voted to reject all bids and Watson and Lee abstained.

The architectural fees Crawford mentioned amounted to \$19,180. Had the project been approved, the fees would have been an additional four percent of the awarded bid.

City administrator Steve Morath was instructed to have a plan to be considered for demolishing the old water station and basins on the Kamay Road. The plan is to be considered at the next council meeting, which will not be until June 8.

Members of the council are to make their annual tour of city facilities tomorrow morning, it was pointed out. The tour is to begin at 9 a.m.

Amity Club has dinner

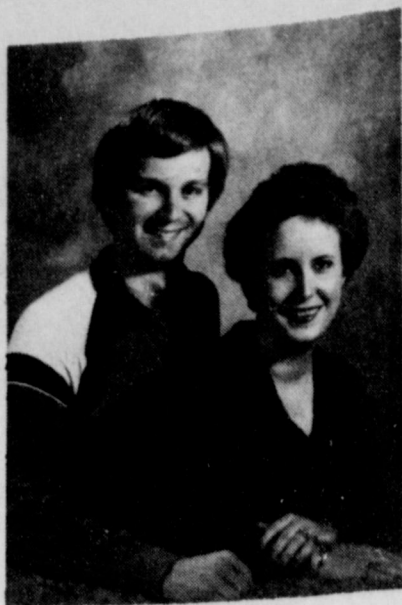
The Amity Study Club held an international dinner at the home of Mrs. Don Rice Tuesday evening to climax activities for the current club year.

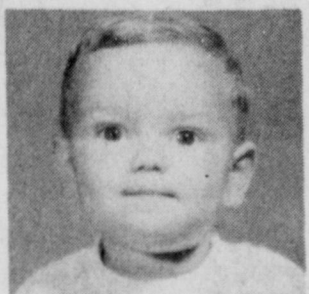

As I See It....

I'd like to observe a tradition, since tomorrow night is graduation time for our senior class, and concentrate this week's column to members of the class.

There's a virtue we must all learn, but it's not taught in textbooks. It comes from the school of hard knocks. And if one doesn't learn it, recognize when to use it and how to apply it, life's road will be bumpy, uncomfortable and often discouraging.

PATIENCE.

You're at the time of your life when you want to get out into the world and get things done. You want all the things you've admired during childhood, and now's the time to do it.

But don't figure on accomplishing them all this summer, this year, or even in the next decade. Some things, especially those really worthwhile, take time.

Some of you already have a jump on life. You've been working for money with which to buy your own car, pay your activity expenses, and even buy your own clothes.

Some of you are already married, or planning to marry, and join others of us who made the plunge long before you.

The reason I've brought up patience as a topic, is because for many years I've witnessed the frustrations, and even serious problems that developed, when young people attempt to achieve too quickly.

I'm not talking about doing all the things adults do, but more explicitly,

earning and acquiring almost immediately what has taken those of us before you years to achieve and acquire.

Don't become frustrated during your first few years of employment if you can't reach a level of employment it took others decades to earn.

Protect your valuable credit rating by not overextending your ability to pay for those things you want.

Oftentimes, young people want one or two new cars for their new family. And, of course, they want their own home, or at least to rent one as nice as their parents' home. And they want to dress well, which is understandable.

But be patient. Those things you really want can be earned, at the

right time and place.

This is not to say goals shouldn't be set high. Nor is it to say one should just resign one's self to do as little as possible and one day in the future those things can be obtained.

Not at all. Be aggressive, but be smart. Recognize what you are and who you are, and where you want to be in the future, and make plans on how and when you want to reach your goal.

We're all proud of you for your accomplishments thus far, and we have every confidence our pride will continue as you come into adult society.

Lilley, Holt top graduates

Kenton Wayne (Kent) Lilley was named valedictorian and Laura Lea Holt salutatorian of the 1981 Holliday High School graduating class, Bill Lee, principal, said.

Lilley is the son of Rev. and Mrs. Larry D. Lilley. He maintained an average of 96.23 during his four years at H.H.S. Miss Holt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G.W. Holt Jr., averaged 96.18 in her four years of high school, .05 less than Lilley's.

Lilley's academic honors include Who's Who in accounting, civics, Typing I, and math two years; voted Most Likely to Succeed and Most Studious two years; competed in regional UIL competition in debate, ready writing and typing; student council representative senior year; National Honor Society member three years and president his senior year; UIL number sense competition three years; annual staff member three years; and, honor student four years.

Lilley has also been active in the Eagle band and other areas of music. He is a four-year band student, and was treasurer this year.

Water, trash rates raised for Holliday residents

Holliday city council Monday night raised water and sanitation rates in an effort to keep the city's water department from operating in the red.

Councilmen voiced concern when it was found the water department was receiving funds from the general operating fund to pay its bills, and was therefore insufficient to break even with money from water and sewer revenue.

Council raised the minimum rate for the first 2,000 gallons of water from \$6.15 to \$8.50, and garbage pickup from \$2.50 to \$4.00 per month. Sewer rates were unaffected.

Rates for water after the 2,000 gallon minimum was raised to 95-cents per thousand gallons.

The raises were not made without reservations, though, when some councilmen indicated the raises would place a burden on the city's senior citizens. However, it was pointed out the raise is the first in several years, and that certain exemptions for senior citizens passed by former councils has eased any financial burden placed on them by the city.

Mayor James Cook said that the city was having to transfer funds-at times as much as \$10,000-from the general fund to the water fund to pay bills from the water department. Cook also pointed out that increased

transportation costs, including fuel, were the main factors in raising the sanitation rates.

The increases in rates will appear on the consumers' May bill.

In other business, councilmen officially hired Mrs. Morganna Thorn as Holliday's waste water and water superintendent, abandoned an alley easement south of Holli-Tex, agreed on specifications in leasing a city lot to Holliday Cablevision, set a speed ordinance for emergency vehicles operating within the city, and heard the second of three public readings of a proposed Lone Star Gas Co. ordinance.

Mrs. Thorn was hired by councilmen in open session, after aldermen met in closed session for approximately 30 minutes to discuss personnel. Her salary was set at \$1,000 per month.

Aldermen agreed to abandon an alley easement located on the south edge of Holli-Tex Supply Co. on Main. Freddie Crampton of Holli-Tex indicated the alley is no longer in use, and has no outlet. Holli-Tex is expanding its offices, and construction overlaps the existing alley. Councilmen had the option to abandon the existing alley and obtain a new alley easement, but it was deemed unnecessary.

Council agreed to lease Holliday

Cablevision a city lot at \$1 per year, with an agreement that any structure placed on the lot or other improvements would become the property of the city if the franchise forfeits its contract within 25 years. The city would then have the option to either keep the existing structures, or demolish the structures to take the lot back to its original condition.

Council instructed city attorney Gary Southard to contact Holliday Cablevision's attorney to discuss the lot lease agreement.

A speed ordinance for emergency vehicles, excluding police, was set at 10 miles per hour above the existing speed limit.

Finnell receives humanitarian award

State Rep. Charles Finnell was presented the Humanitarian Award of the Year at the Sixth Annual Banquet of the Wichita County Humane Society.

The award, presented to Finnell by John Hoyt, president of Humane Society of the United States, was given for his work on passage of an euthanasia bill in the Texas legislature.

The legislation, passed by the house by record vote of 142 to three, was endorsed by the Texas

Veterinary Medical Association, the Texas Animal Control Association, the Humane Societies of Texas and the United States, and the American Humane Association.

"It was indeed an honor to receive this award from this fine group of dedicated people," said Finnell.

The bill, signed by Governor Clements Apr. 30, will become effective Sept. 1. It allows local animal control units to use denatured sodium pentobarbital for the euthanasia of animals.

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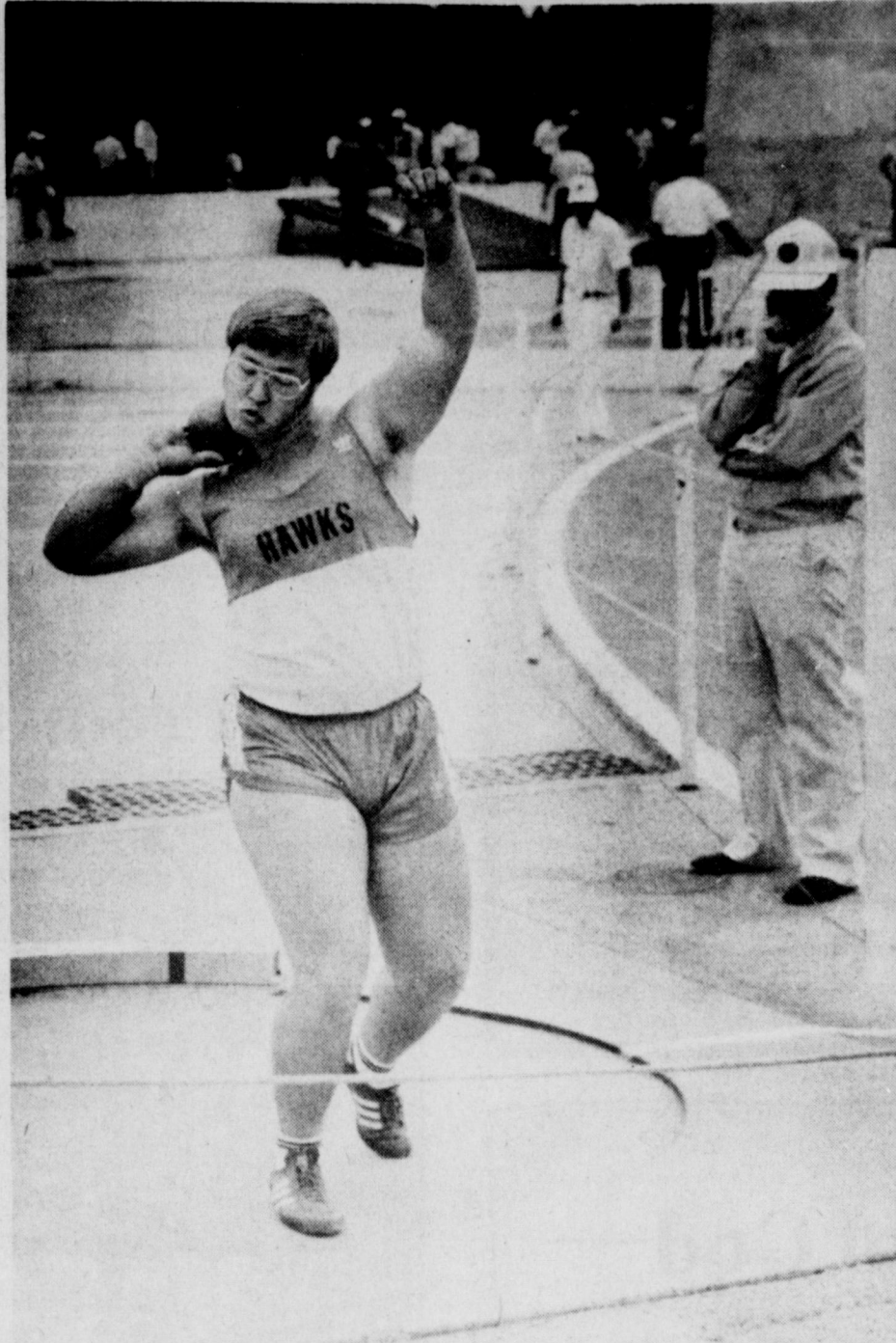

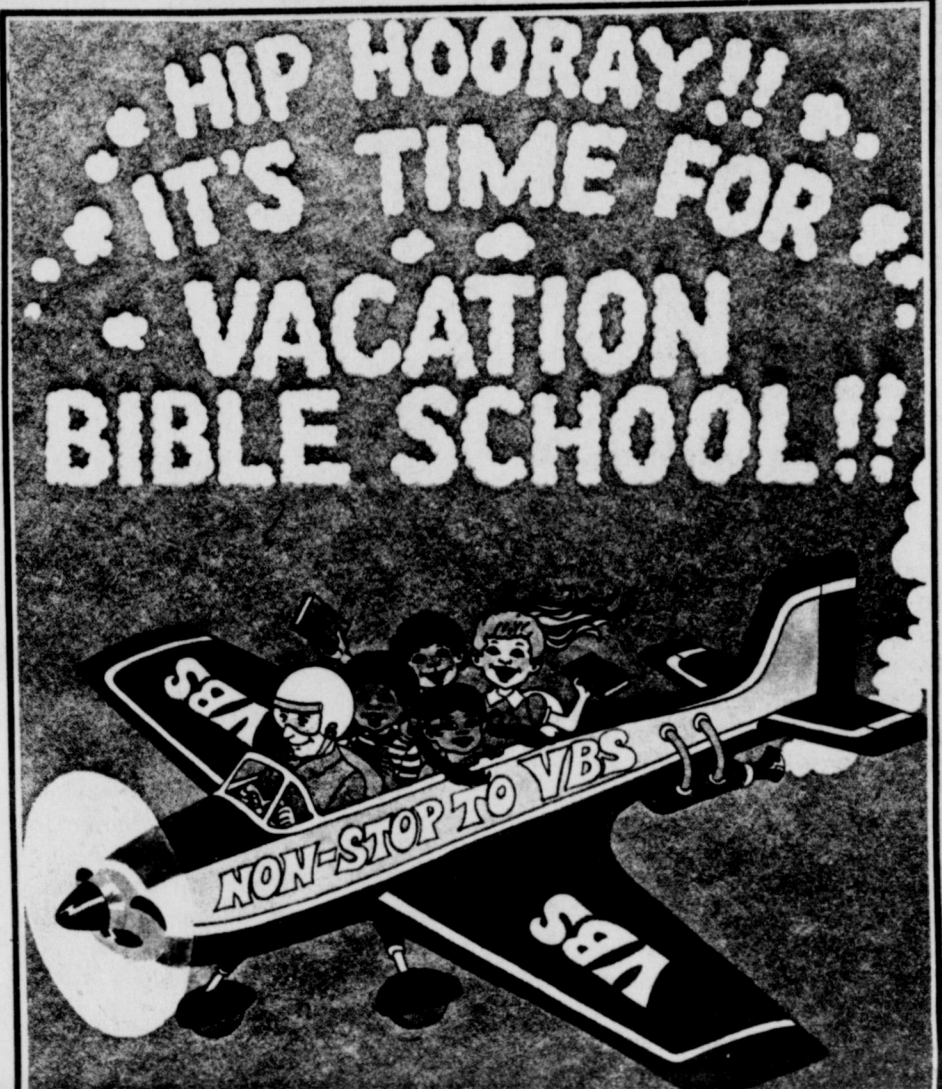

They like it whole, ground or in candy forms, and a recipe submitted by Mrs. Stephen Kinsey today attests to the popularity of cinnamon candies in salads or desserts.

Cinnamon has the reputation of being the world's greatest sweet spice, and it has been a precious commodity throughout the ages. It has been used not only as a flavoring for foods, but as medicine, perfume and, quite often, in love charms.

The Chinese, forty centuries ago, believed that cinnamon was the Sacred Tree of Life which grew up in Paradise, up in the Tibetan Mountains. They believed that anyone who ate even a small bit of this tree or its fruit would live forever.

At the time of the Crusades, many people in Europe thought spices, such as cinnamon, came from the Garden of Eden, and that they were carried out of Eden by the Ganges River and the Tigris. Romans used cinnamon for their religious ceremonies. It is the bark of an evergreen tree, a native of the Far East. Today we get it from Indonesia and South Vietnam.

Sift flour once and measure it; add baking powder and salt to flour and sift three more times. Set aside. In large bowl, cream shortening and sugar together gradually, keeping mixture light and fluffy. Add dry ingredients alternately with milk and vanilla, beating after each addition. Fold in egg whites. Pour equal amounts into three 9" cake pans. Cook at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

PINEAPPLE FILLING

3 egg yolks and 1 whole egg
1 cup sugar
1 T flour
Juice of 1 lemon
1 can crushed pineapple
2 T butter or margarine

Mix together and cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thick. Spread between layers of the white cake.

ICING

2 cups sugar
Dash of salt
1/2 cup condensed milk
1/2 cup water

Cook in saucepan until soft ball will form in a cup of cold tap water (or use a candy thermometer and heat to soft ball mark). Take off heat. Beat, then add 1 tsp. vanilla and 2 T butter or margarine. Spread over cake quickly.

SOPAPILLAS

4 cups flour
4 tps. baking powder
1/2 cup shortening
2 tps. salt
Water
Powdered sugar
Sift flour, salt and baking powder into mixing bowl. Cut in shortening. Add a little water, just enough to hold dough together. Roll thin and cut in squares. Fry to golden brown in deep, very hot shortening. They will puff up (be sure dough is covered by oil when cooking). When cool cover with powdered sugar. Pull off corner and fill with honey to eat.

QUICK SWEET & SOUR PORK

1 15 oz. can pineapple chunks
1 T vegetable oil
1 1/2 lbs. pork, cut in cubes
1/2 cup light Karo corn syrup

1/4 cup maple syrup
2 T catsup or barbecue sauce
2 T soy sauce, or Worcestershire sauce
1 clove garlic, minced
1/4 cup sliced carrots, optional
Salt and pepper
2 T Argo corn starch
1/2 cup green pepper pieces
1/4 cup vinegar
Heat oil in skillet; brown pork. Add pineapple, syrups, vinegar, catsup, soy sauce, garlic, carrots, salt and pepper. Bring to a boil, simmer 10 to 12 minutes. Mix cornstarch with 2 T water; add cornstarch and green pepper to mixture. Boil 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Serve over rice and Chinese noodles.

RUSSIAN TEA CAKES

1 cup soft butter
1/2 cup sifted confectioners sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
2 1/4 cups sifted flour
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup finely chopped nuts
Mix first three ingredients thoroughly. Sift flour and salt into mixture. Mix in nuts. Chill dough for 1/2 hour. Roll into 1" balls. Place on ungreased baking sheet (cookies do not spread). Bake until set but not brown. While still warm, roll in confectioners sugar. Cool. Roll in sugar again. Temperature for baking 400 F. Time: 10 to 12 minutes.

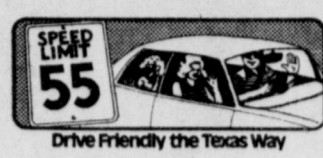

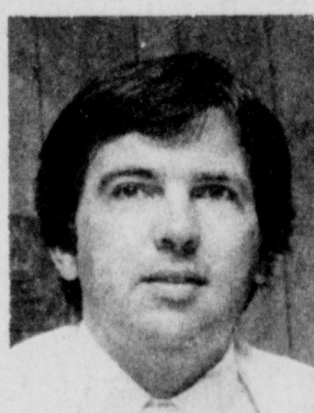

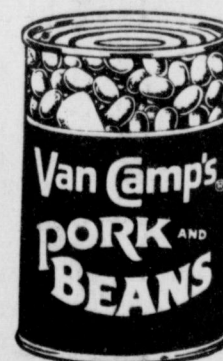
