# Swimming pool opening slated this Saturday

Iowa Park's Bicentennial Swimming Pool will open its gates Sunday afternoon, signaling its sixth season of service to residents of the community and area.

Built as part of the community's observation of the nation's 200th anniversary, the pool was located at the school to utilize the established parking lot, as well as having full-time school maintenance personnel to do the work.

A joint committee of representatives from the school and city establish policy for the facility, such as hiring personnel, setting season dates and rates for admission.

Dick Wineinger will again serve as

pool manager, as he has since the pool was opened.

Pool hours will be 1-6 p.m. every day except Thursdays, when it will remain open until 9 p.m. to accommodate working patrons.

General admission this year will be \$1.75, but the pool committee has two options to cut the cost to families.

A fee of \$80 was set for families, allowing all members of the immediate family to swim the entire season without paying an additional tab.

Books of 10 tickets are also available: \$12.50 for children; \$15 for adults.

The pool can be rented during hours it is not open to the general public. Wineinger said the charge will be \$20 per hour, plus salary for the attending life guard, which is required.

Two sessions have been set up for Red Cross certified swimming lessons, and another may be established later if the demand is indicated.

Wineinger said the first session will be weekdays of June 15-26, and the second July 13-24. Lessons will be given from 6 to 7 p.m., and a pool usage fee of \$10 will be charged. Classes will be limited to 30 per session, he said.

## Storm dumps 2 inches

A late-developing spring storm Tuesday night dumped more than two inches of moisture over the area, awakened numerous residents from their sleep, and caused obvious concern to farmers and agribusinessmen.

The storm which reportedly developed near Childress late in the evening, arrived in this area around 1 a.m. Wednesday.

It wasn't hard to miss, because it provided a chilling display of lightning and thunder.

Official rainfall measurement at the Experiment Station southeast of town was 2.07 inches, but Virgil Woodfin recorded 2.17 here in the city.

No damage was reported in Iowa Park, other than one telephone line behind Park West Shopping Center being broken, and numerous burglar alarms being set off by the lightning's electricity.

Wheat fields, promising bumper yields once ripe enough for combines to pull into, could pose a problem.

The heavy rains and hard winds often take their toll on ripe and heavily-loaded wheat straw. Some areas in fields have been observed as

lying down. Should the straw not return erect, and because of the thickness of the crop, combining operations could be slowed. Very little wheat has yet been harvested.

When cutting wheat that is lying on the ground, combines not only have to handle much more straw in the

in one direction, in order to pick up the fallen crop.

Tuesday's rainfall brought the week's total to 3.63 inches, and the month's total to 4.4 inches.

For the year, 13.48 inches have been recorded at the Experiment Station, more than twice the 6.36

## Practical experience supplements textbooks

While the nation's news media investigates reasons for the supposed lack of proper education in public schools today, Mrs. Ann Southard and Holliday elementary's second and third grade teachers are on the right track in practicing "the right way to do it." They have a class project that entails both background research and practical experience for their students.

This year's project was raising silkworms.

The idea for the project came quite by accident, said Mrs. Southard, second grade teacher. She was given about a teaspoon full of silkworm larva from a friend in Wichita Falls last summer, and kept them refrigerated until this spring. After researching silkworms, Mrs. South-

ard found that the larva are taken out of refrigeration in the spring and hatched, and the four-stage life cycle of the silkworm begins.

The complete life cycle of the silkworm takes less than two months to complete, so Mrs. Southard took the larva to class in early March,

where both the students and teachers soon became engrossed in the project.

The silkworm is a caterpillar, or larva, of a certain kind of moth called the Bombyx mori. Bombyx comes from the family of moths, Bombycidae, and mori from the scientific name of the mulberry tree upon which the silkworm feeds, morus multicaulis.

The Bombyx mori is a rather large white moth with black-lined wings. The body is short and the wings stout. From wing tip to wing tip the moth measures about two inches. Wild silk moths lay their eggs in mulberry trees, and the newly hatched worms or larvae are left to fend for themselves.

But the Bombyx mori is pampered like a newborn baby. It is raised in the silk farmer's own home, under carefully controlled temperatures. It is protected from mosquitos and other predatory insects, and during the period the worm is spinning its cocoon, the whole family must speak in whispers and avoid shouting, or the worm stops its work.

China was the first country to produce silk from silkworms, and today the Chinese and Japanese are the world's leading producers of silk. In the early 1800s, the first silkworms were introduced in America, but failed when prospective silk farmers had trouble finding cheap labor to harvest and process the silk.

Early in the summer months, the female moths lay 200 to 500 eggs on special strips of paper provided by the farmer. The farmer takes the eggs and puts them in cold storage to be kept until the following spring, when he wants the eggs to hatch. The moth soon dies.

In the spring, with the mulberry trees showing their first leaves, the farmer takes the eggs from storage. In some villages in China and Japan, there is a community incubator where small silk farmers take their eggs to hatch. Larger silk farmers have their own incubator.

The eggs hatch out into small black

worms, from an eighth of a quarter inch long and no thicker than a hair. With the aid of a microscope, the second and third graders at Holliday were able to see this process more clearly.

After the larvae hatched, the students fed the worms leaves from the mulberry tree. The worms eat the mulberry leaves steadily for the next five weeks, consuming their own weight in leaves each day. During this time, they grow so fast they shed their skin four times.

At the end of five weeks, the silkworm is about three inches long and nearly half an inch thick. Its body is divided in 12 sections. It is supported by three pairs of true legs, and has five pairs of hooked leglike bits of flesh called prolegs, on the hind sections.

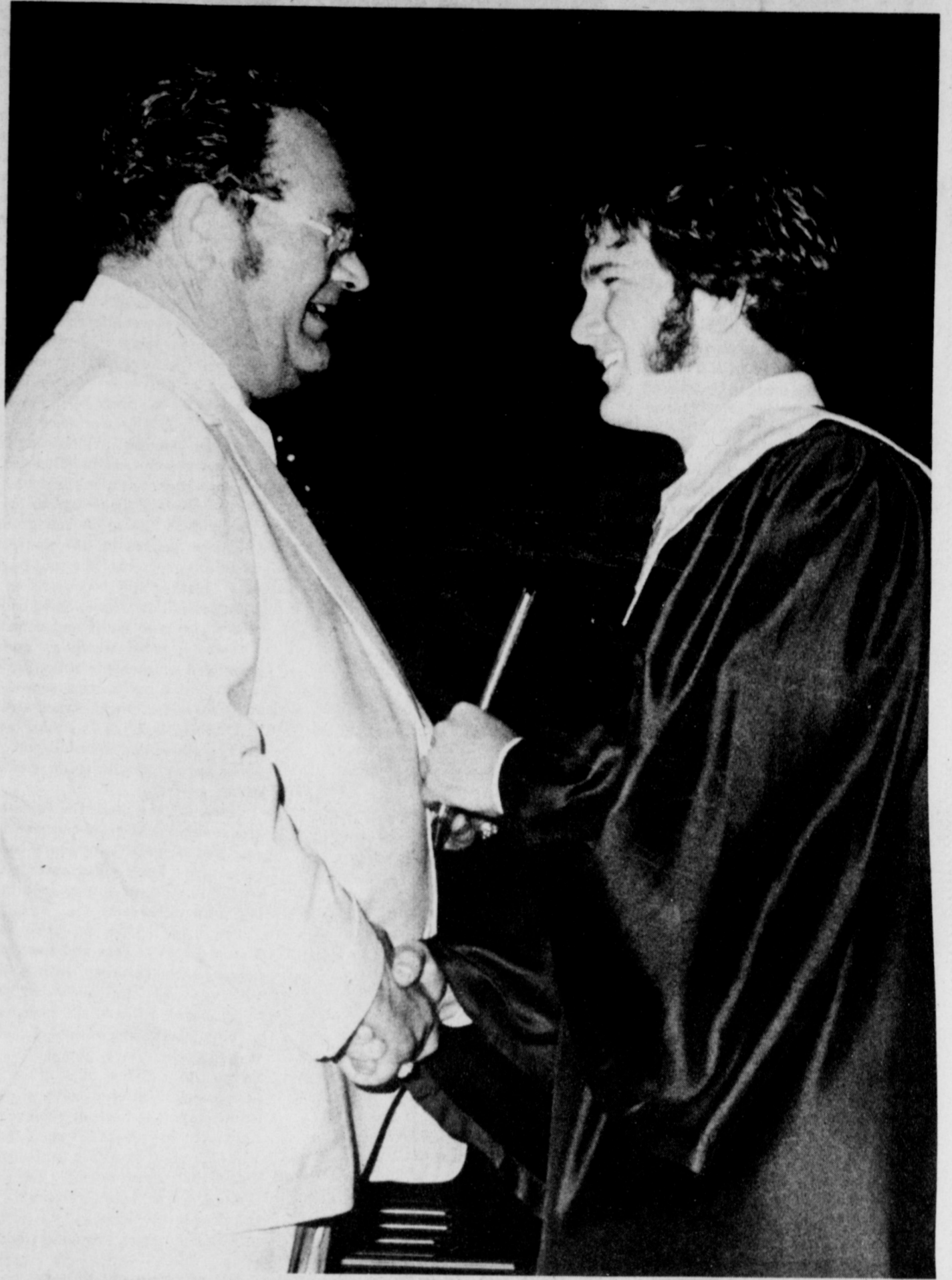
The silkworm is now at its largest size, and begins to spin its cocoon. Although Mrs. Southard could only guess, there were approximately 1,000 silkworms at that time, and several students were given two worms apiece to take home and study. During class period, the worms were viewed daily to mark their progress.

When spinning its cocoon, the silkworm searches for something to fasten the cocoon to. While most silkworms stayed in the box in which they were carried, other more adventurous worms found refuge on the walls underneath the wooden trimming in the classroom.

The silkworm then begins to spin its cocoon, using two glands in the worm's body which emit a glue-like fluid which comes out of an opening in the worm's upper lip. As the spray of fluid hits the air, it hardens into fine silk thread. First the worm spins the floss, or outer covering, of its cocoon. Then it begins to wind the long, continuous thread of silk around its body.

As the worm spins on, it shrinks smaller and smaller, until hidden from view. If left undisturbed, the

The altar decorations for the service consisted of a variety of potted mums in shades of orchid, yellow and white.

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# Malfunctioning crossing signals subject of proposed legislation

State Rep. Charles Finnell announced this week that HB 1939, establishing a state-wide system for reporting any malfunction of the

approximately 3,500 electronic warning devices located at dangerous rail crossings has successfully passed the Texas House of Representatives.

"In Texas the number of motor vehicle/train accidents consistently surpasses the national average. In 1980 there were 95 deaths, 983 injuries, and \$65 million in property damage in railroad crossing involved motor vehicle traffic accidents in Texas," stated Finnell.

Finnell's bill calls for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Department of Public Safety to establish a toll-free 24-hour telephone number for citizens to report disorders with warning devices that involve flashing lights, bells or barriers. In turn, these reports would be forwarded to the railroad responsible for the maintenance of the warning devices.

"This bill will require no additional state funding," stated the 53rd District Rep., "as the highway department has already budgeted the funds for placing the toll-free telephone number signs at the 3,424 crossings that have active warning devices."

The proposed legislation now goes to the senate where it will be carried by Sen. Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls.

worm will turn into a tiny moth, or pupa, and bore its way out of the silky covering in two to three weeks. During their last week of school, the second and third graders were treated to this eventful moment.

But silk farmers don't let this happen. Instead, if to be used for silk, the insect is killed before it attacks its cocoon in a hot oven or giving it a steam bath. The farmer, however, does keep a certain number of moths alive for the next season's batch of larvae.

The next process in making the silk is unwinding the cocoon, which is still done by hand in many parts of China and Japan. The very delicate job is usually handled by women. First the cocoons are separated by color, either golds, bright yellow or white. The cocoon is then soaked in warm water to loosen the gums, and then the threader finds the start of a long string and slowly unwinds it, with some threads extending as much as 1,000 feet. It takes approximately 1,000 miles of thread to make one pound of raw silk. "Throwing" is the term used for the series of processes which raw silk undergoes from the time it leaves the threader's skein until it is woven.

According to Debbie Gove, second grade teacher, the students were mainly taught the four stages of silkworm production "...which followed right along with our science books." Students learned that the silkworm doesn't respond when introduced to any other vegetation, and that before the worm goes into the cocoon, it sheds its legs and appendages. Some worms failed to spin a cocoon, though, but Mrs. Gove responded to student's confusion by saying "...the ones that didn't make cocoons didn't listen to their mothers."

The larvae left from this year's project will be refrigerated until next spring, when the teachers plan to introduce the worms to first graders. "These kids probably won't forget this project," said Mrs. Gove. "It was as much a learning experience for ourselves as it was for them."

Other teachers besides Mrs. Southard and Mrs. Gove participating in the project were the third grade teachers; Mrs. Rexanne Hardin, Linda Johnson and Cossette Mark. Approximately 120 second and third graders were involved.

The reason the Postal Service is raising its rates is because some of their people are over paid.

Maybe all of them, for all I know. Remember a few months ago, when our first class postage stamp fee was raised to 18 cents? You'll probably also remember statements made by postal officials that they really needed 20 cents, instead of 18, and that they'll be back within a year asking for the other two pennies.

I had no idea what employee salaries were, until recently. A few years ago, in response to another column, I printed a letter from a postal employee that would have brought real tears to your eyes. . . the way he wrote it.

This week I received a "news release" from the Fort Worth sectional center management, announcing they were going to accept applications and give examinations to fill some 200 vacancies over the next two years in this part of the country. "Starting salary is \$9.38 per hour."

states the news release.

People, with the possible exception of hiring someone to defuse an armed atomic bomb, there's not a person on the face of this earth worth that kind of money for a starting salary.

And, the news report points out, "No experience is required." Of course the postal service is hurting for operating money. My gosh, there's not a hand full of people owning their own businesses right here in Iowa Park making that kind of money!

Maybe in the big cities like New York and Washington, it takes a \$10 an-hour salary to live on. But not here in Iowa Park, or Holliday, or Electra, or even Wichita Falls.

It's not right to figure a salary base that gives a person a liveable wage in one area, but gives them the

opportunity to live like kings in others.

And there are scheduled increases in salaries, after that starting salary, once they are there long enough to learn where the bathroom is.

Obviously, employees locally have nothing to do with what they are paid, and I'd be just like them and gladly accept such compensation for my efforts.

But when you're on the outside, looking in, it's a different story.

So, if anyone wants a \$19,510.40 starting salary, who knows absolutely nothing about what a clerk or carrier does, and will accept the fringe benefits of vacations, sick pay, etc., etc., there's some good government jobs available.

Us postal patrons will do our best to keep you in shoes.

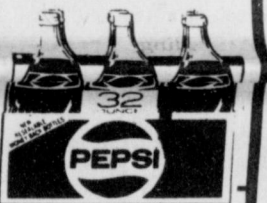

He challenged the county chairmen and committee members to "let's get after it like we always have before."

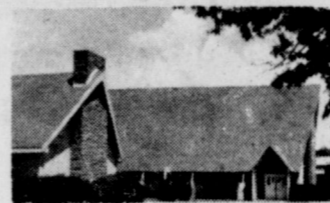
Chairmen and committee members will be going to ranchers and farmers asking for donations of livestock, money or merchandise to benefit the

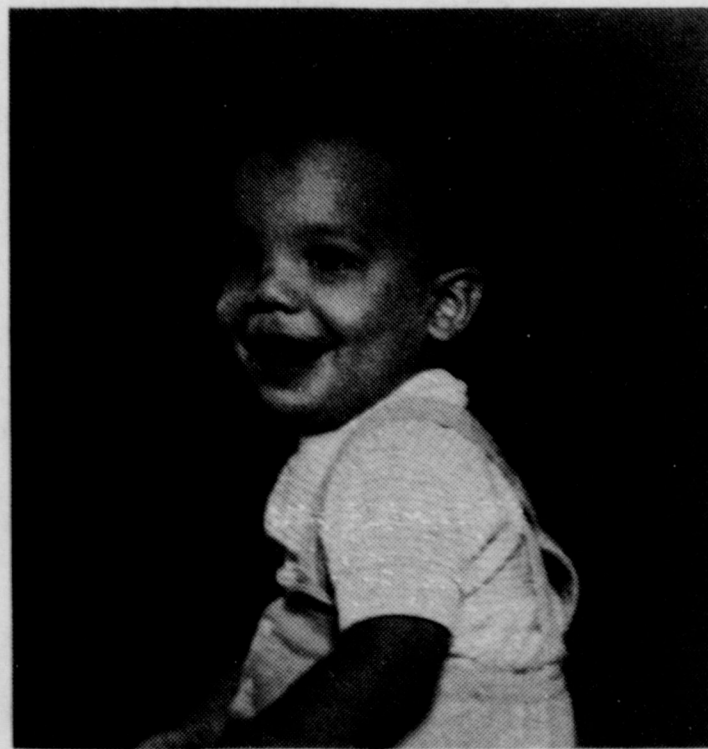

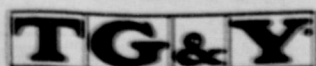

Mix together well. Press into cookie sheet. (You must use a cookie sheet which has the small rim around it.)

1, 8-oz. package cream cheese, softened  
1 box powdered sugar  
2 eggs

Beat well. Pour onto cake mixture. Bake at 350 degrees 35 minutes. Cool slightly before cutting into squares.

### GROUND MEAT MEXICAN CASSEROLE

1 lb. ground meat

1 can mushroom soup  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1 can enchilada sauce (10 oz.)  
1 cup milk  
Chopped chilis or jalapeno pepper to taste

1, 10-oz. package Doritos  
1 cup grated cheese  
Brown ground meat. Line dish with Doritos. Mix soups, chilis, enchilada sauce and milk. Place browned beef on chips, pour soup mixture over meat. Sprinkle grated cheese over the soup mixture. Place in 400 degree oven 25 minutes.

### MARINATED CARROTS

2 bunches of carrots, sliced or one 20-oz. package frozen carrots  
1 large onion, sliced  
1 large green pepper, sliced  
1/2 cup salad oil  
1/2 cup vinegar  
1 can tomato soup  
1 cup sugar  
1 t mustard  
1 t Worcestershire sauce  
Cook and drain carrots. Mix other ingredients together and then add to the carrots. Refrigerate. These are really better if they are refrigerated overnight.

### LEMON FRESH PICKLES

2 large green cucumbers  
1 green pepper  
1 onion  
1 t salt  
2 t celery seed  
1/2 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice  
1 lemon, thinly sliced  
Mix all ingredients together. Refrigerate.

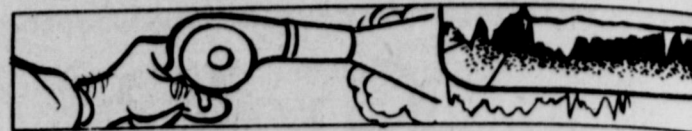

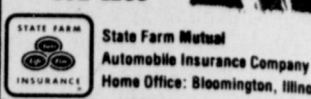

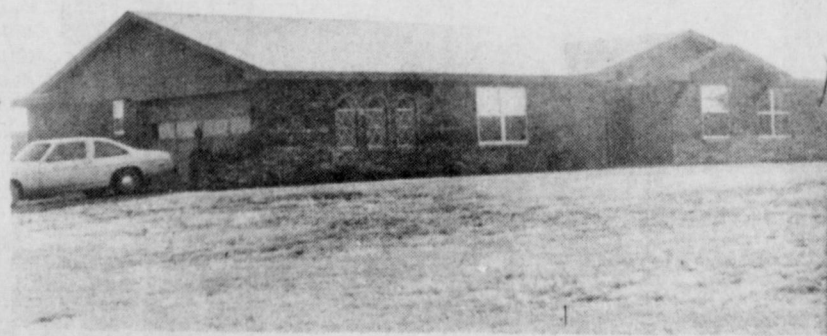

Effective Jan. 1, 1981, all property shall be assessed at one hundred percent (100%) of its appraised value, in accordance with Title One, PROPERTY TAX CODE, Sub-Title D, APPRAISAL AND ASSESSMENT. Chapter 26, Section 26.02 of Vernon Annotated Tax Statutes.
