Adjustments board has four new faces, council steps out of car wash issue

As had been expected, a hearing has been set concerning construction of a car wash structure at the corner of West Highway and Third Street, but it will be a different board of adjustments that hears it.

In an unusual move Monday night, the makeup of membership of the board which hears appeals for variances from building codes in the city was changed.

Iowa Park's city council, which has been serving a dual capacity as the board of adjustments, voted to disband and name a new board.

In a split vote, two for disbandment, two against and one abstaining, the mayor cast his vote to disband, and approve a new board which the mayor had nominated.

Mayor Johnny Crawford told the council and a near-capacity audience that he had learned the city council could not sit as the board of adjustments, because it violated the intent of the city's ordinances.

Crawford said the ordinances call

for members to be appointed by the mayor, with council approval. "With all this before us (referring to the possible litigation which could result in a dispute over the location and construction of the car wash), I don't feel as if this (the present board) is legal," he said.

He then appointed a five-member board consisting of Charlie Lee, a member of the city council; John Brown, member of the traffic safety board; Donald Hill, long-time volunteer worker of the city and other organizations; David Padgett, member of the planning and zoning commission; and Rip Smith, former alderman and housing developer.

Lee and Lita Watson voted for the new board, Bill Gilmore and Herman Mahler against it, and Bud Thompson abstained. With a tie vote, Crawford's vote was called on, and he voted for the new board.

Afterward, those voting against and abstaining the motion explained they were not voting against the new

board's membership, but questioned that the change should be made before the question of the car wash was resolved.

All newly-appointed board members were present, with the exception of Padgett. David Pace was in the audience, and he asked Crawford if he were not to be named after his telephone conversation with the mayor.

Crawford expressed embarrassment over the confusion, and said he thought he was talking with David Padgett during an earlier conversation over the telephone, and confirmed he wanted to appoint Padgett.

After the council had completed its agenda, the new board of adjustments met and elected Hill as chairman.

A hearing on the car wash was set for 7:30 p.m. July 10, with a work session preceding the hearing to be held at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow. Both are to be held in council chambers, and

both are open to the public. Two appeals are to be heard at the July 10 meeting.

One is from James Morris and Mrs. Kenneth Garrett, who live across Alameda Street to the north and have lodged a complaint against the location of the car wash at the site, based on six points, according to their motion of appeal.

The other appeal to be heard is from Cecil Longley, who will seek a variance from the building code which requires any structure in a "CAR" zone to be set back a minimum of 50 feet from any front or back street.

The two neighbors opposing the business' location cited a violation of the zoning ordinance which requires the city secretary to issue a zoning clearance permit before a building permit can be issued; the zoning clearance permit violates due process rights in now giving notice or hearing for nearby landowners.

Also claimed is the land has been vacant for many years and has been used by Little League baseball teams, and no change in use can be made until a zoning clearance permit is issued. They also claim a zoning clearance should not be issued because the proposed use of the land would create a traffic hazard.

The new business will create a noise and litter nuisance, the pair claim, and proposed use of the land should conform to a section of the code requiring a screening fence around it.

Longley points out that he presented a drawing of his land, how the structure would be located on it, and it was seen and approved by the planning and zoning commission, city administrator who issued the building permit and the individual members of the city council.

Longley's son Mike, said at an earlier meeting the mayor went to the site where construction was underway and informed him it would have to stop until the issue was settled.

Crawford denied he gave the order to stop construction.

At last week's meeting, however, Crawford told the owners they had two choices: move the work that has been done to comply with the zoning ordinance; or not do any more work until a variance from the ordinance is obtained from the board of adjustments.

The ordinance requires a structure in a CAR zone to be at least 50 feet from the front and back streets. The

southwest corner of the structure will be approximately 21 feet from the property line, Steve Morath, city administrator, told council and board of adjustment members.

Mike Longley bitterly announced at Monday's meeting that there would be no need for a future hearing, because his people would be pouring concrete the next day.

However, Morath said he was informed the next day that the statement was made in haste and nothing would be done at the site until the board of adjustments has held its hearing.

Potential legal problems concerning the proposed car wash apparently were the cause for the city council to hold two separate executive sessions Monday night. The first lasted from 7:19 to 8:30, and the second from 9:11 to 9:20. The public is excluded from executive sessions and the audience is required to leave the chambers for their duration.

Also, council members voted to appoint new legal council, if advice is needed with the two legal appeals to the board of adjustments, since Morris has served as legal council for the city.

Named was Lonny Morrison of a Wichita Falls law firm.

Commissioners' court to meet here

Wichita County commissioners' court will hold a called meeting Monday in Iowa Park.

When the court convenes in the county agriculture building, 220 W. Park, at 10 a.m., it will be the commissioners' second in a series of meetings outside Wichita Falls. Last month they met in Electra.

Purpose of the meetings in other cities besides the county seat in order to give all county residents an opportunity to meet county officials and see county government in operation.

The meeting, as are all meetings of elected officials, is open to the public. Extra time is anticipated for public comment or someone wishing to address the court, according to Tom Bacus, county judge.

Tonight will be the second of two preliminary budget hearings for the commissioners court. It is to begin at 7 p.m. at the court house.

Tonight's appearances will be the county commissioners, county attorney,

district attorney, county courts, district courts, constables, justices of the peace and family court services. Appearing at Tuesday's hearing were county clerk, district clerk, tax

assessor-collector, plat department, county treasurer, veterans service officer, sheriff, auditor, civil defense, building superintendent and janitorial.

New city policy initiated for response to complaints

A new procedure in handling complaints has been implemented by the city, designed to respond to the citizens.

Steve Morath, city administrator, provided a written format for "Project Follow-up" to all members of the city council during Monday's meeting.

"In an effort to improve communication between the city and the citizens, Project Follow-up will be initiated as part of the procedure to be used in handling routine complaints," Morath stated in the memo.

He explained that when a complaint is registered by a citizen, corrective measures are to be taken by the particular department concerned. A follow-up call will be

made by the department head, or designated employee, explaining what corrective steps have been taken or will take place.

At the time the complaint is registered, the citizen's name, telephone number and address, if needed, as well as details of the problem will be written down. If the complaint is registered to a department other than the one concerned, it will be forwarded to the proper department.

A work order form will be sent to the department, and a follow-up telephone call is to be made within 24 hours after it is registered, informing the citizen of the status of their complaint.

Response time to correct the problem will vary, depending on the nature of the complaint and the availability of equipment and labor, Morath said.

Former resident freed on bond

Former Iowa Park resident George L. Teel is free after posting \$7,500 bond in Wichita Falls on a narcotics charge.

Justice of the Peace R.L. Stewart set the bond Monday after Teel was charged with "intentionally and knowingly possessing a useable quantity of amphetamines with intent to distribute."

Members of the Midwestern State Univ. police staff reportedly obtained a search warrant and went through his dormitory room in Pierce Hall at MSU, finding the prescription drugs there and also in his automobile.

Also found, but on which no charge was filed, was an amount of marijuana. Some 100 yellow capsules reportedly tested and proving to contain amphetamine were taken as evidence.

Wreck kills Iowa Parkan

A young Iowa Park woman was killed and another injured when the car in which they were riding rolled over shortly after 7 p.m. Monday about three miles north of Archer City on Texas 79.

Killed was Debra Helen Hixon, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M.J. Hixon of Iowa Park. She was thrown from the vehicle.

Carolyn Copas, 19, was the other occupant. She received a broken leg, among other minor injuries, and was taken to Sheppard Regional Hospital.

The two are employed by Sand Beach Swimming Pool as lifeguards and swimming instructors, which also has a facility at Olney. They were returning from work at Olney, and were still in their bathing suits when the accident occurred.

Their vehicle apparently failed to negotiate a curve and Miss Hixon lost control of her car and it rolled.

Miss Hixon was graduated from Iowa Park High last month. Miss Copas graduated a year earlier.

the job again. Currently the idols of all Americans, the professional baseball players, are striking. It's tough to read about how much money a millionaire loses when he misses a day's work, don't you think.

Then, of course, the traffic controllers at the air terminals were making all kinds of noise up through the weekend about going on strike Monday. Understand that one was

called off, or postponed, prompting dancing in the streets.

Have you ever noticed how many more unions strike in the spring and summer than in the fall and winter? Apparently it's much more convenient that way. Papa striker doesn't have to sit around the house while he's away from his job, just because it's too cold outside to enjoy himself. Now the postal workers are making strike noises again.

I wouldn't have known about it, had I not received a form news release from Marilyn Reeves, steward for the local American Postal Workers Union of the AFL-CIO.

In it she says "Our postal unions nationally, and the three members of the Iowa Park Local..." were tired of the Postal Service representatives "stalling and stonewalling."

Did you know it's against the federal law for a federal employee, such as the postal workers and air traffic controllers, to walk out on a strike, for any reason?

To hear a federal employee threaten to strike if a contract negotiation isn't to the union's liking is like listening to a bank robber threaten to boycott the courts if they don't change those silly laws against robbing banks.

Maybe the new creed for unionism should be: I'm going to strike until I win, and then I'm going to strike again. Never mind who gets hurt, or what they lose, this is America, and I can do as I choose.

I'm going to get what I want, and then ask for more, and if they don't pay me, I'll just lock their door.

After all, what's a free country for, if not to strike, and then strike some more?

It's not what I need or earn that make striking appeal. It's flexing my muscle... and making the boss kneel!

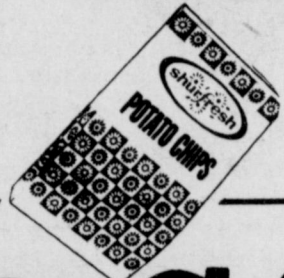

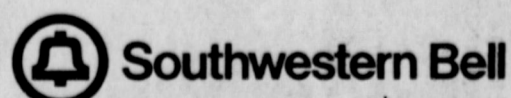

School board calls special meet Monday

Holiday school board will meet at 7:30 p.m. Monday for a special called meeting to open bids for painting of the high school and athletic buildings.

The area to be painted, according to project specifications released by school administrators, will be the exterior walls of the high school building, which includes the auditor-

ium, and the athletic complex, consisting of approximately 12,864 square feet.

Surfaces to be painted are concrete and masonry blocks with some wood and galvanized metal flanges.

The porous exterior walls of the high school building, which were found to be the major cause of water damage in the building, were finally sealed by an acrylic latex coating. Contractor for the project was Larry Ledbetter Enterprises, an Oklahoma firm specializing in sealants.

Yet, despite having the porous walls sealed, school officials found the tint of the sealant less than desirable for the final coat. In addition, the wood and galvanized metal flanges along the top of the school were unpainted.

The firm trustees choose for the project will have to conform to existing colors as near as possible, according to the specifications, and final approval of the color samples will come from school officials.

Trustees will also discuss the possibility of adding a restroom in the elementary building for kindergarten students and installing an outside exit for the science room, located on the north side of the elementary building.

To help keep the cost of ambulance service down, and to upgrade our service to Advanced Life Support System (ALSS) which would allow your City and County to have Paramedics on our ambulances; Plumlee Emergency Medical Service, Inc. is offering to the residents of the cities and county with which we have contracted, a membership program for ambulance service.

This program is for Emergency and Doctor ordered ambulance service to Wichita General Hospital and Bethania Hospital only. Transfers and non-emergency ambulance service will remain the same.

At this time, the base rate for ambulance service to the hospital is \$65.00. The base rate for service from the hospital is \$55.00 plus \$1.50 per loaded mile.

However, if you become a member, you will join at a rate of \$50.00 for a single membership (individual) or \$65.00 for a family of four (including two dependents under the age of 18 living with you). If you have more than two dependents living with you, there will be an additional charge of \$10.00 for each dependent. There is no limit on the number of emergency or doctor ordered calls you may have during the year.

As a member, you will be charged 75¢ per loaded mile instead of the regular price of \$1.50 per loaded mile. We would still have to charge for supplies that are used during the call.

If you have Medicare or other insurance that would pay the ambulance charge, as a member we will file one claim so that you could be reimbursed for your membership fee.

For transfers to other hospitals, as a member you would be charged one half the regular cost of the transfer.

In order for this membership to be made available, we must have a minimum of 15,000 members. All memberships that are received will be put in escrow and at the end of the deadline, if our goal has not been reached, your money will be refunded.

It can be used in so many ways from a hamburger to an elegant steak. Regardless of how it is cooked the aroma is enticing. A pot roast cooked with vegetables makes a nutritious meal for family and guests. Of course, the quality of cooking is always important in the preparation of meat. Someone has said that a good and experienced cook can overcome even the limitations of poor materials and inadequate recipes, but a bad cook can ruin the finest of the best. We are convinced that Mrs. Topper is capable of the highest quality of cooking.

PIE CRUST

2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1/4 cup Crisco
4 Tbsp. cold water
Mix above ingredients until a dough is formed. If more water is needed, add it sparingly. Take dough in hands and press gently into a ball of dough. Roll into two flat rounds. Use one half of recipe for a single crust because recipe makes two crusts.

CHOCOLATE PIE

Use 1/2 of the above pie crust.
1. After rolling out into a flat round, place into a 9-inch greased with Crisco pie pan, flute edges, prick all over with a fork.
2. Bake in hot oven, 450 degrees, until golden brown.
3. Remove from oven to cool and turn oven down to 350 degrees.
4. Use following to make chocolate filling:

1/2 cup flour
1 cup sugar
4 Tbsp. cocoa
1 stick oleo
2 cups milk
Pinch of salt
1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs
Mix flour, sugar, cocoa together, add milk, cut up oleo, egg yolks only (save whites for meringue). Stir in salt and vanilla. Cook, stirring all the time until it thickens. Pour into pie shell. Beat egg whites for meringue, add 1/2 cup sugar and beat until stiff but not dry. Place on pie filling in crust. Bake until tipped with brown.

BANANA-SPLIT CAKE

1 8 oz. cream cheese
1 egg
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
Combine and beat for 15 minutes. While mixing, combine 1/2 cup margarine and 2 cups graham crackers. Pat into 9x13 pan. Spread filling on top.

POT ROAST

3 or 4 lb. chuck, rump or round roast
1 envelope Lapton Beefy Onion Soup Mix

1 can of mushroom soup
4 potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks
4 carrots, cut into 2-inch pieces

Place roast in Dutch oven or roasting pan. Add salt and pepper to taste. Pour Beefy Onion Soup over roast, then add mushroom soup and two cans of water, using soup cans to measure water.

Place in oven and let cook 30 or 40 minutes. Then remove and add 1 or 2 cans of water and the potatoes and carrots. Cook at 350 degrees for 2 hours. There is no need to make gravy because soup mixture and water make a perfect gravy. When done, remove from oven and serve.

OLD-FASHIONED FRUIT SALAD

2 medium-size oranges
1 medium-size apple
1 1/2 oz. can chunk pineapple, drained
1 1/2 oz. can fruit cocktail, drained
1/2 cup coconut
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup chopped pecans
2 medium-size bananas
Peel oranges and dice into mixing bowl. Combine pineapple, fruit cocktail and apple with oranges. Add coconut and chopped nuts. Mix together with sugar, then add sliced bananas. Let chill and serve.

EASY ICE CREAM

2 pkgs. vanilla instant pudding, small size
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
Mix sugar and eggs. Prepare pudding by direction on box. When pudding is set, add eggs and sugar mixture (well blended). Then add 1 pint of half and half milk. Place in freezer can and add whole milk to level needed in freezer can (usually 2 or 3 inches from top). Freeze cream and serve after frozen. You may use other pudding flavors instead of vanilla; chocolate and lemon are very good.

Slice 2 large or 3 medium bananas over this. Sprinkle 1 medium-size can crushed pineapple over this. Top with small-size carton Cool Whip, garnish with coconut, pecans and cherries.

County attorney Lions' speaker

A glimpse into the office of the county attorney was provided for Noon Lions Club members Tuesday by Harold Lerew, who now holds the office.

While most laymen would believe prosecution of criminals would be the county attorney's main priority, Lerew said it was not. His top priority is family court, in which children may be separated from their parents.

He explained that his thought on separation of families should be done soon after a complaint is lodged, rather than delaying long periods of time during which the children are forced to live in foster homes.

His thought is to either resolve the problem through counseling, or in cases where it is necessary, completely remove the children from their parents.

A major workload in the county attorney's office is collection of hot

checks. He receives between 200 and 300 each month, and has some 3,000 cases on file currently, either for collection or prosecution.

Thus far this year his office has collected \$24,894 on 876 checks, plus a fee for collections, he told the Lions. Maximum amount of a check his office can handle is \$199.99, he said.

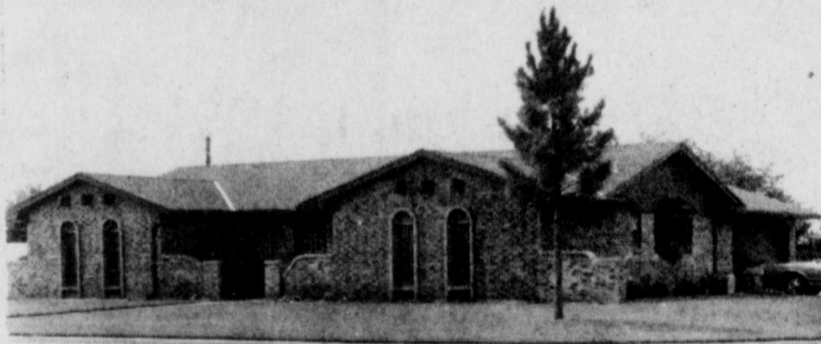
