## Governor-backed tax bill met with mixed emotions


#### Abstract

Governor Dolph Briscoe this week said he is very interested in a proposal which could effectively reduce property taxes levied by Texas school districts. But the But the proposal has been met with mixed emotions and considerable mixed emotions and considerable doubts in the Iowa Park school district. The governor's office senı out a publicity release over the weekend concerning the proposal, as put forth by Representatives Jim Nugent of by Representatives Jim Nugent of Kerrville and Lynn Nabers of Kerrvile and Lynn Nabers of Brownwood. The release was received by news The release was received by new media of the state in Monday morn ing's mail. But when contacted by telephone, Rep. Charles Finnell said his office did not receive a copy of the his office did not receive a copy of proposal until late that day. The proposal, as currently worded, would dedicate one-fourth of the revenue from the State's general sales and use tax to reduce school ad valorem taxes throughout the state. It's not the proposal that raised local eyebrows, however, but rather the formula used for distribution of the funds. No one argues lower taxes would be helpful. would be helpful. Preliminary Preliminary statistics from the governor's office indicate Iowa Park governor's office indicate lowa Park school taxes would be reduced 43 per cent, with the state sending an additional $\$ 37,957$ to take up the addition slack. The eyebrows went up when it was noted Burkburnett would noted Burkburnett would receive whopping $\$ 431,728$ after having taxes reduced 50 per cent. That's the most any school district in Wiet most any school district in Wichita County would receive, under the formula used by the state office. $\$ 274,854$ after having its taxes reduced 47 per cent; City View $\$ 21,854$ after having its taxes reduced
