Soil Conservation
According to unofficial rain gauges, 2.65 inches of rain fell on Iowa Park and on an area north and west. Where this rain went and its benefits are interesting to study.

The old lake at Iowa Park caught about 5 feet of water from a watershed that has several farm ponds. The new lake west of town caught 4 feet of water. Joe Cunningham of Wichita Falls, who owns a ranch 3 miles west of Iowa Park, reports that seven ponds on his ranch filled. Water for city and farm use is indispensable, however, water is just as necessary for field crops and pasture grasses.

Technicians for the Soil Conservation district made some observations the day following the rain on depth of water penetration on different ranges. On a mixed land site in fair condition and moderate grazing, it was found that rain had penetrated two feet. Just across a fence on the same site and condition but severely overgrazed, rain water had wet to a depth of one foot. Both of these sites had lost water but overuse had accounted for a 50 per cent increase in water loss.

On another farm a mixed land site in excellent condition which was not grazed in 1952 was examined. Here it was found rain had wet to a depth of 32 inches, however across a fence on pastureland that had been grazed heavily enough in past years to destroy perennial grasses, it was found that rain had wet only six inches, or this site had received only 20 per cent as much effective water.

Water requirements for buffalo grass show that an inch of rainfall used by the plant will produce about 575 pounds of air dry grass per acre. Thus a loss in runoff water means less grass and less beef per acre.

Seymour won only two event compared to Bowie's 5 first place winners, but the Panthers placed a man in every event except the broad jump to edge the Rabbit 41 points to 36.

Hugh Sullivan sparked Arche City to third place with 24 1/2 points by personally scoring 18 points for high point man of the meet. Sullivan won the discus, broad jump, 100 yard dash and 2nd in the 220 Bobby Morris of Seymour was second high point man with 9 3/2 points.

Other teams scored as follows: Burkburnett 19, Electra and Oline, 12 1/2 each, Iowa Park 5, Holliday 2, Paducah 1, Valley View 1/2 and Henrietta 0.

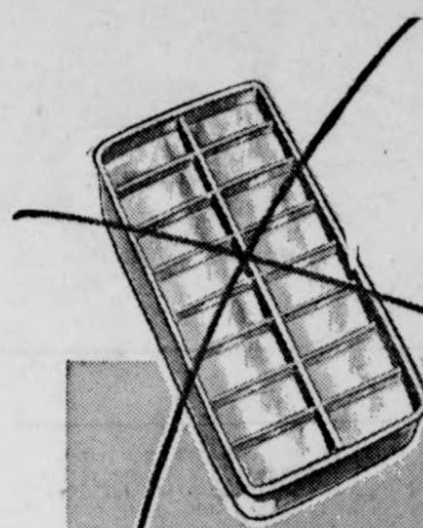

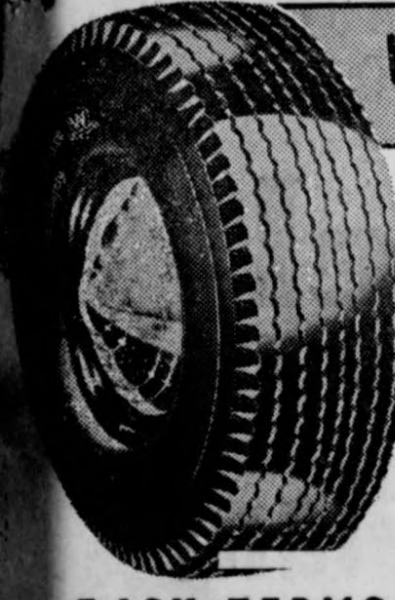

Hunt Home Hazard While Cleaning House Says State Doctor

Spring is the time for a home hazard hunt, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. Accidents in the home are the second leading cause of accidental death in Texas. Each year about 1000 persons die as the result of accidents in the home.

Spring house cleaning time is a good time to remove the common hazards that cause so many home accidents. Attics, basements and closets accumulate piles of junk. Piles of papers, magazine, broken furniture and other combustible material are dangerous fire hazards. In addition, rats, mice, cockroaches and other pests thrive in trash heaps.

Throw rugs are notorious for causing falls. Toys and other objects scattered over the floors and stairway often cause falls. Check the electric cords and see that they are in good repair. Frayed electric cords have caused fires and fatal shocks.

While rounding up piles of junk to throw away, don't forget to look into the garage, backyard and alleys. In your spring clean-up check your garbage can. Be sure it is of metal and see that it has a tight fitting lid. Co-operate with your

neighbors in seeing that the community disposes of all garbage and trash in a sanitary manner.

Thorough clean-up, if carried on through the year, will reduce home accidents and sickness or death from such diseases as polio, typhoid fever, malaria typhus and others.

ARE YOU WORRIED ABOUT THE FARM PROGRAM OUTLOOK?

Figures that have been published by the Department of Agriculture now forecast the farmers' share of the 1953 national income will be the lowest in our national history except for the year 1932.

In 1953 farmers who make one out of each six of the population, will receive but \$1 out of each \$15 of national income. Farm commodities on the average have dropped 12 per cent since just a year ago. Everybody's income is up but the farmers'; theirs are down more than one-fourth.

National Farmers Union thinks Congress should take immediate action to put a solid mandatory legal floor under farm prices to stop the decline and to relieve the pressure of the economic pinners. We feel that as a minimum the present law providing 90 per cent of parity supports for the basic storable commodities should be extended for several additional years and should be expanded to include the feed grains, soybeans, grain sorghums, beans, and the perishable commodities such as beef cattle, hogs, milk, eggs and so forth, as was indicated by Eisenhower in his campaign speeches.

"A quarter-century's worth of farm programs; are they in danger?" is the program planned for Wichita Valley Farmers Union meeting Monday, April 6 at 7:30 p.m., at the Community Center.

The practice of spring burning of last year's crops and litter that cover the ground prior to planting and plowing is as old as the stone hoe of ancient times—and as unmoded.

Time was when land was to be had for the taking in America. Vast prairies and endless miles of virgin forest lay waiting for the man with the axe, the plow and the firebrand. Many years' collection of litter covered the soil and plowing was difficult until the covering was removed. Once crops were planted and harvested the early farmer found it expedient to burn each spring, and did until it became a rural custom.

So the American farmer plowed and planted, harvested and burned. He ruined farm after farm and moved into the West to clean others, taking and burning and putting nothing back into the soil that would be the heritage of his children. Came the advent of the machine age and farming became a mass production business. Entire states became one vast wheat field. Wind and water raged at the exposed soil, cutting ditches that nature couldn't fill in a thousand years and the entire Southwest became a great dust bowl. America was moving fast; so fast that she had done as much damage to her soil in 300 years as China had to hers in 3000.

Somewhere along the line a few began to learn and teach. Today the average farmer is increasing the fertility and productivity of his soil year by year, and it's a long hard fight.

Admitting that sometimes there is a need for burning, authorities suggest going about it in the safest possible way. Most forest and brush fires in the spring result from "controlled burning" out of control. Those who have made a study of fires and their control find that burning in the evening is far safer than in the morning. Reason is that in the morning the temperature rises while the humidity falls. After 5 p.m. the temperature falls and the humidity increases, both of which make for easier control and management of burning brush, grass and weeds.

In almost every tackle box in the corner somewhere is a lure seldom used. Sometimes because it was tried once and didn't take fish, perhaps it just didn't seem to have the desired action, or maybe the reason it isn't used is because it was simply overlooked. In the Forbis tackle box it was the same. We had a couple of gleaming beauties given us by friends that had never been tried and for months they had been carried still wrapped.

On a recent trip we had tried everything else in the box and finally unwrapped our two neglected friends. The wrapper revealed them to be "Sparky" lures; we tried them dubiously. About the third cast the lake exploded as a hefty bass struck. A couple of hours and we had our limit. Since then we have tried them a number of time and got fish, so it can't be just coincidence.

Perhaps Confucius said something about this, we haven't found it if he did. At any rate the next time they won't bite, check the neglected lures. You may have a Sparky in there somewhere.
