Aldermen shaken by rate proposal

A report indicating the city of Wichita Falls might increase the price of treated water by as much as 30 percent overshadowed passage of an ordinance regulating speed of trains through the city, when the city council met Monday evening.

Aldermen received copies of a 12-page report from Wichita Falls, prepared by a subcommittee of aldermen, which recommends water rates be increased to all purchasers outside Wichita Falls.

"Needless to say, this comes as quite a shock to me," commented Mayor Johnny Crawford. "How are we going to explain to our citizens if this goes through and we have to raise (water) rates 30 percent?"

Crawford, City Administrator Steve Morath and Alderman Bud Adams attended a meeting the following afternoon in Burkburnett, concerning the proposed rate increase.

All members of the council were encouraged by Crawford to attend a work session of the Wichita Falls council tomorrow morning at 8:30 in council chambers, where the report will be reviewed and discussed. Notice of that meeting was made by letter from Gerald Fox, Wichita Falls city manager.

Iowa Park has been under contract for several years to purchase a maximum of a million gallons of treated water a day. The proposed rate to be charged, according to the report, would be 74 cents per 1,000 gallons.

Aldermen unanimously approved passage of an ordinance which restricts speed of all railroad traffic to 15 miles per hour through the city.

A representative of the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad, B.C. Bidwell, spoke briefly to the council, primarily pointing out that barricade crossing guards cost between \$40,000 and

\$60,000 per unit, and Iowa Park has five crossings. His company has not the money to provide crossings at all places the railroad runs, he explained.

Bidwell suggested that federal monies might be available to purchase crossing guards, and gave names of persons who could be contacted in making application.

About the speed limit placed on trains through Iowa Park, the rail representative emphasized that all trains would observe the law, but he mentioned that traffic would be held up more at crossings as trains passed through at slower speeds.

Trains were observed Tuesday passing through the city at the new limits. They have been traveling at a self-imposed 35 miles per hour, according to Bidwell.

During a discussion on a sanitary landfill which would be purchased and used jointly by Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Wichita Falls and the county, Morath said he has committed participation of the city, if the location is within a 10-mile radius of Iowa Park.

Crawford estimated the city has between one and two more years worth of space to be used at its present landfill. He says he feels the joint site would be large enough to provide up to 20 years use.

After a letter from the Chamber of Commerce was read, asking the council to reconsider painting the outside of the city hall building, Alderman C.A. Hicks and Johnny Lee said they were both against such a project, but encouraged any work be done to keep the building in proper repair.

No vote was held on the issue, however.

Mrs. Charlie Lee, representing the Iowa Park Garden Club, asked the city's encouragement on an anti-litter project her organization proposes to initiate here. She received it.

Alderman Hicks, referring to a column in the Leader last week concerning a request for police help from an out-of-town resident, said he felt the police should at least respond. He said even if their hands were tied by law, their presence could be very helpful. Other members of the council agreed.

Local man charged assaulting officer

A Saturday night fracas at a service station here resulted in assault charges being filed on an Iowa Park man.

Terry Phillip Hatcher was charged with aggravated assault on a peace officer. Bond on Hatcher was set at \$5,000 by Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill.

Darwayne Wilson, an attendant at Ayres Tire Co. at Johnson Road and Expressway 287, told police three men drove to the east side of the business about 10:45 p.m. Saturday. Wilson said the men appeared to be intoxicated and that they were loud and boisterous. He said one of the men took the nozzles from two gasoline pumps and began running fuel onto the ground.

When police responded to the incident, the assault charges against Hatcher resulted.

OFFICER INJURED

Iowa Park Police Officer Emmett Mayfield was hospitalized after a three vehicle mishap about 3 p.m. Sunday at the intersection of E. Washington and Victoria.

The police cruiser Mayfield was driving collided with a car being driven by Larry Dale Britt of 301 E. Lafayette.

The crash also involved a parked vehicle owned by Robert Johnny Brown of 402 E. Washington.

Mayfield was later released from the hospital, but the 1978 model police car sustained heavy damage to the right and left sides and frame.

Iowa Park police recovered two stolen vehicles Monday.

Bill Fox and Sid Foster of F&F Motors at 312 E. Highway told police Monday morning that two cars had been stolen from their shop. Burglars broke through the building's doors to

obtain keys to the cars which were stolen.

One of the cars was located on East Highway and the other on FM 368 near the expressway, police said. Neither car was damaged, police said.

Police here received reports of criminal mischief and vandalism last Thursday.

Mrs. Pat Shown, 913 Foley, told police that someone had poured some type of oil on three vehicles.

Ivan Muskowitz reported that someone had pushed 20 to 30 food carts onto the parking lot of a grocery store at 300 W. Bank.

Volleyball may be on way out

Enrollment at junior high and high school stands at 1,026, down 70 from this time last year, according to reports of principals made Tuesday before the school board.

Trustees heard Principal Jimmy Alsup report his enrollment was 50 fewer than last year. He said he had 131 in the seventh grade and 167 in the eighth.

High school Principal Bob Dawson indicated his building's enrollment was down some 20 students, at 728. That figure is estimated to be even lower next year, because this spring's junior high graduating class will be the smallest it has been in a number of years, according to Alsup.

Both principals told trustees there have been no major problems at either school this year, and that "everything has been running smoothly."

Volleyball appears to be on its way out at both schools, according to the principals. The junior high could find only one school, Notre Dame, with which to compete this season, and participation is down to only 14 players at the high school.

Alsup said volleyball would continue to be offered in the physical education classes, but without other schools having teams to play, there appeared no reason to continue it on a competitive schedule.

Dawson said interest was extremely high in girls' basketball, but participation had dwindled to such a low in volleyball that there seemed little reason to continue the program.

The high school principal suggested that, with more and more additional extracurricular programs being offered, some of the minor programs might be eliminated in the future, staying with those which offered activities to the greatest number of students.

He pointed out his records for last year showed some 10,000 individual classroom hours were missed by high school students away from the campus.

Answering frequent criticism that football was the major cause of missing classes, Dawson pointed out the varsity players this year missed only two classes, to travel to Weatherford. But members of the golf team last spring missed eight days of school, he added.

Alsup emphasized two programs at his school in which he was particularly pleased: corrective math and reading program.

New instructor Bob Needham brought with him from Andrews a new corrective math program Alsup said was working with outstanding success and he said the students were learning at an impressive rate.

The reading program consists of a 30-minute period set aside each Friday, during which every student is

encouraged to read whatever they wish. He gave examples of the program's success.

Other business included:

* A discussion on future sites for building trades class projects, with no action taken;

* Heard a report of conflicting surveys where property purchased by the schools in 1964 allegedly overlaps with property purchased recently by individuals;

* Heard a report that the Kidwell P-TA has some \$3,000 available to purchase on a cost-sharing program airconditioning equipment for the cafeteria, but no action has been taken awaiting recommendations on size and cost of equipment to be required;

* Heard a request from the Bradford P-TA that a fire plug might

be desirable nearer to that campus;

* Approved a proposal to allow the Home Furnishings Class at high school to remodel interiors of mobile homes as a project, with the home and all supplies furnished;

* Approved a trip Friday for 97 junior high students to Fort Worth where they will see the play "Legend of Sleepy Hollow" at Casa Manana;

* Approved hiring of Delores Stevens as a teacher aide at Holiday for the West Wichita Co-op;

* Approved the 1978 textbook committee composed of Faris Nowell, James Ward, Dawson, Betty Dearen, Sandra Mitchell, Holle Humphries, Alsup, Patsy Todd, Meredith Long, JoAnn Ratcliff, Margaret Roddy, Janet Walker, George Taylor, Rebecca Moore, Bob Cole, Helen Burrell and Armilda Hickey.

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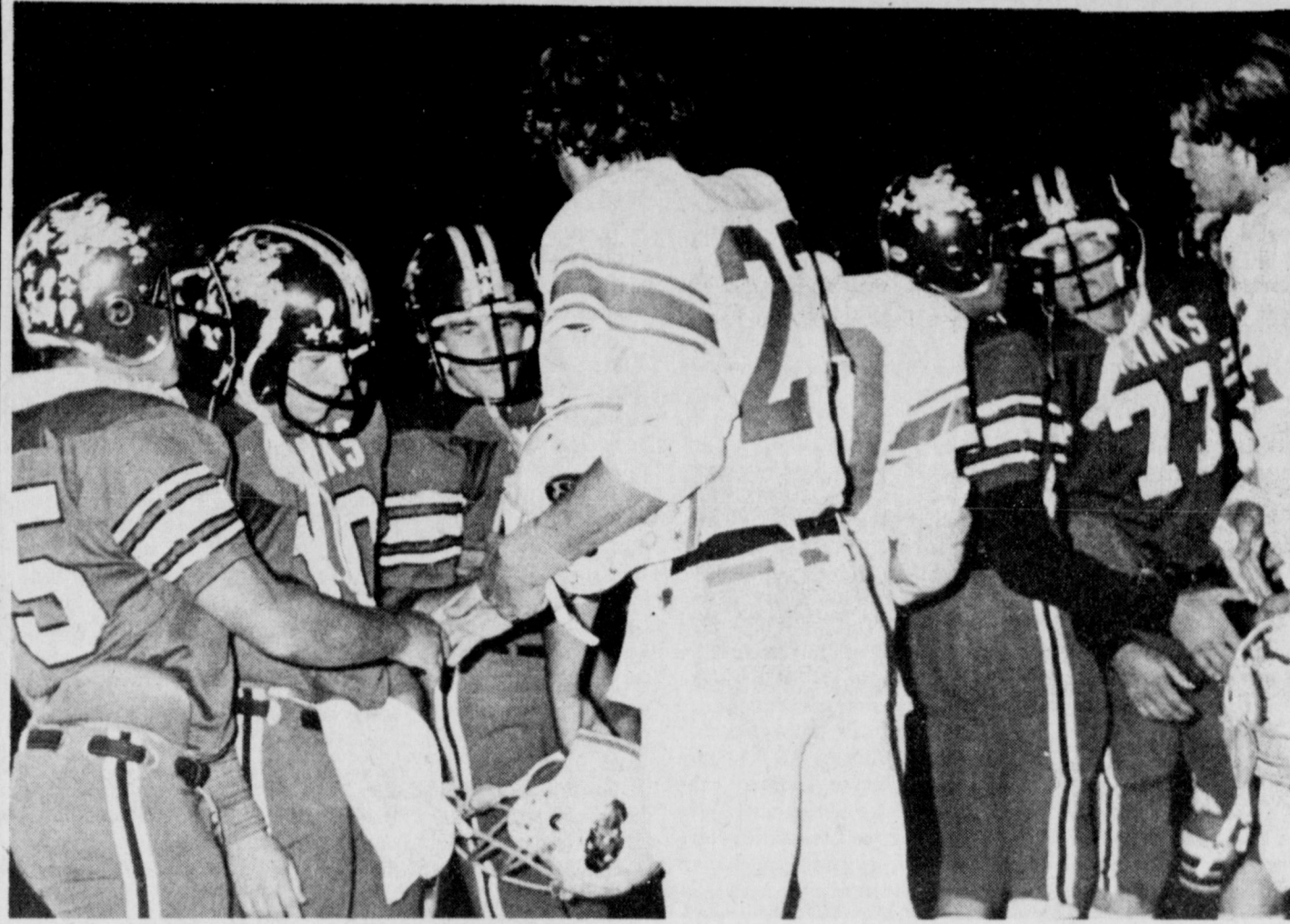
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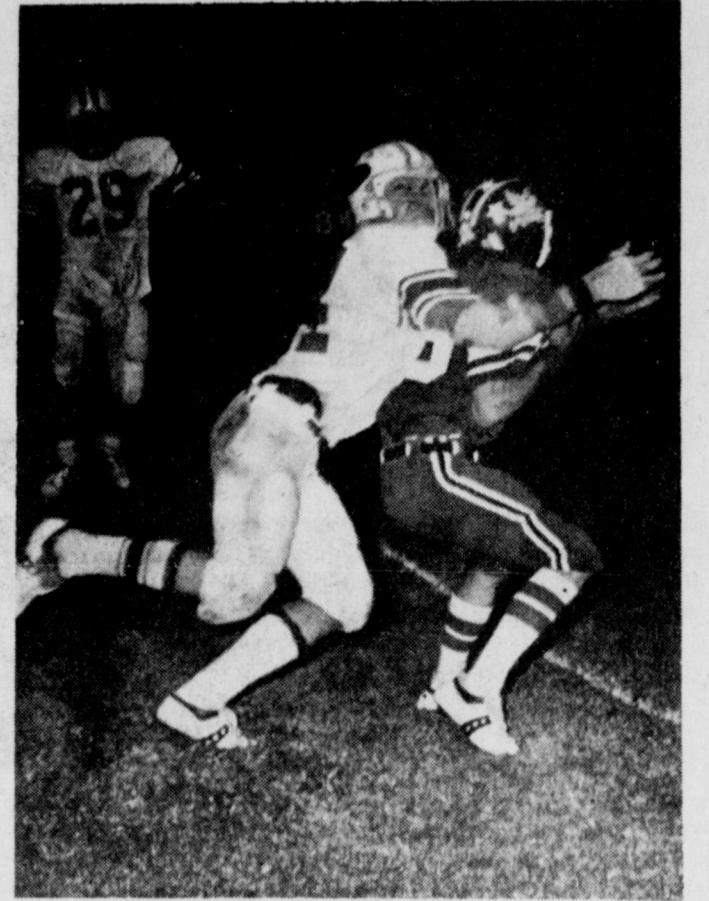
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HAWK SENIORS SHAKE HANDS WITH BURK CAPTAINS IN PRE-GAME MEETING

'Dogs edge Hawks 20-7 in game 9

The Burkburnett Bulldogs dined a share of the Dist. 4-AAA title and a state playoff slot when they shot down Iowa Park's Hawks 20-7 in Hawk Stadium

Friday. Playing before the largest crowd to pack the Iowa Park facility since the Brownwood game in 1972, Burk capitalized on five Hawk

turnovers to offset a blizzard of penalty flags thrown against them. The visitors were charged with 12 infractions of rules for 124 yards, which made

the game statistically close. Iowa Park finished with a total of 202 net yards gained on offense, while Burkburnett had 256 yards.

Iowa Park marched steadily to the Bulldog 20 where the drive stalled, and Ron Taylor's 37-yard field goal attempt was carried wide by a strong northerly wind. Burk scored on its next drive and went to the dressing room at halftime with a 13-0 lead.

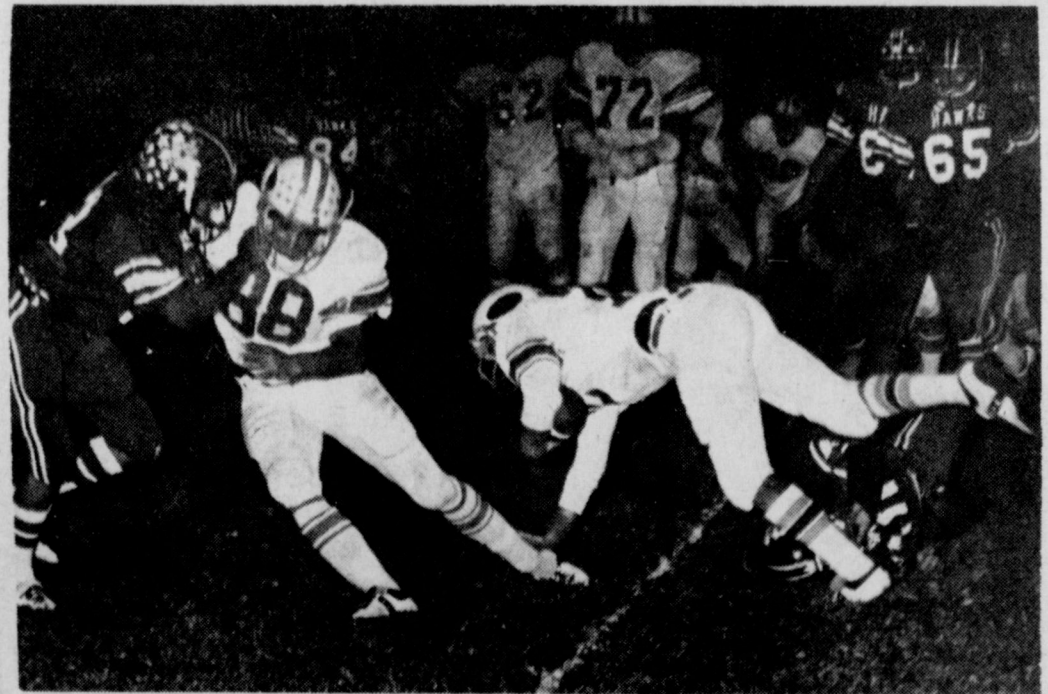
remaining on the scoreboard clock. The Hawks were without the services of their leading ball carrier, Troy Thompson, who was ill and missed the entire week of practice.

In the third period the Hawks covered Burk's second fumble at the Bulldog 46, and marched to the 10 yard line, where a fumble was covered by a visitor on the nine yard line. The third pass interception came on the third play of the final period, giving Burkburnett possession on its own 47. Unable to pick up a first down, the Bulldogs punted to Iowa Park's eight yard line.

Blackerby emerged the leading gainer for the Hawks, with 56 yards for the evening, 43 coming in the final period.

Robert Hastings was pressed into service as a running back, and turned in 33 yards on eight carries. Troy Linthicum had 26 yards and Mike Ray 25. All three are sophomores.

Blackerby also completed five of 16 pass attempts, two to Randall Schram for 14 yards, 15-yards each to Linthicum and Robert Brown, and eight more to Hastings. After giving up 189 yards in the first half to Bulldog runners, the Mean Green defense held Burk to 50 yards in the third quarter and a net eight yards in the final stanza.

Turnovers were the principal factor in the final score, however, as the Hawks lost the ball twice in the first period, once in the third and twice more in the fourth.

After the Bulldogs scored on their first possession, both Hawk drives were thwarted by interceptions. Burk was not able to score on either turnover, however, as the 'Dogs lost possession with a fumble on the Hawk 33 and were forced to punt on the second possession.

Two plays later the fourth interception was returned to the Hawk four, and the visitors made it 20-0 despite a stubborn goal line stand by the Mean Green defense.

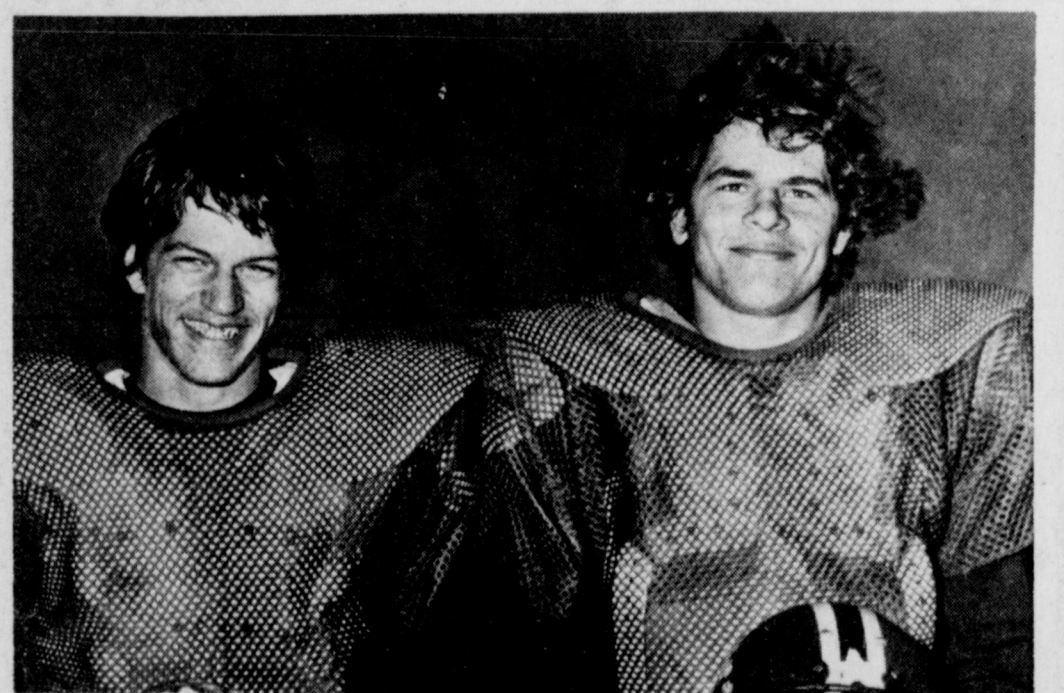

School to purchase video tape machine

Holliday school trustees
earmarked \$2,000 Monday
night to go toward the
purchase of a video tape
machine.

The Booster Club has
indicated it would pay \$1,000
toward the cost of the
equipment. The total cost

elementary school principal

Dan Owen, acting superin-

have scored 79.

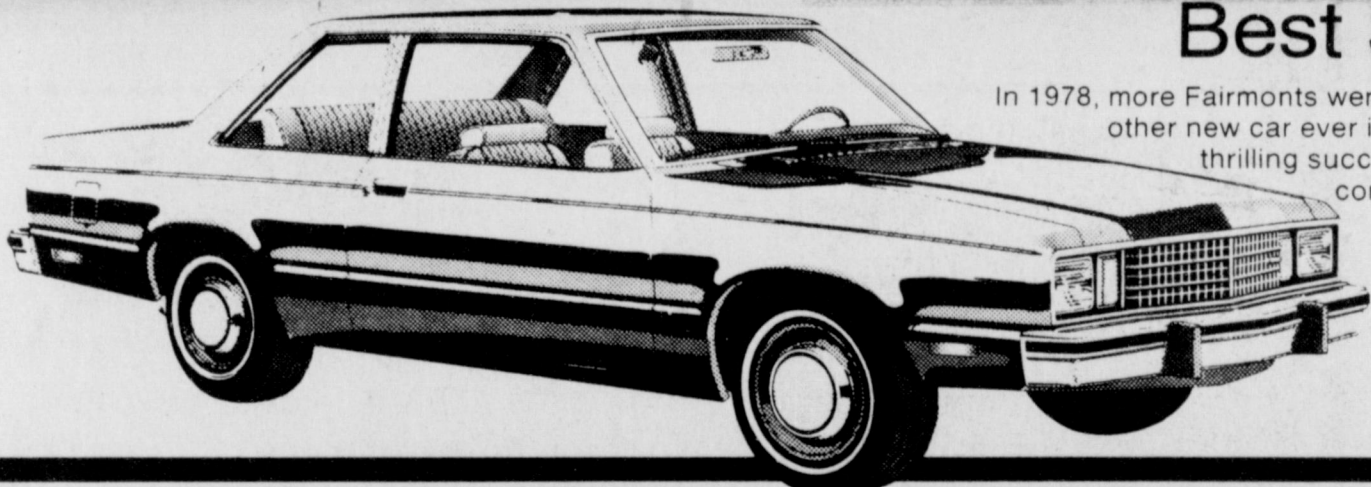
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Big Red county champs, beat AC

After fumbling through the first 24 minutes, the Holliday Eagles pulled off a halftime reincarnation victory Friday night to upend Archer City 35-12 and maintain their hold on county gridiron supremacy.

All did not look well for the hometown team during the early going as the Archer City Wildcats clawed at Holliday's offense causing the Eagles to fumble three times in the first half.

The first fumble came on Holliday's second possession

when the Eagles were forced into a punting situation. The snap soared over the head and hands of Eagle punter Mark Wells who chased the pigskin down to the Holliday four yard line, only to have it knocked loose again and recovered by Archer City which punched it across a play later.

Archer City's extra point try failed, but they held on to the slim lead for the remainder of the first half. The Eagles fumbled again

in the first and second quarters while the Wildcats fumbled once. It was recovered by Greg Dillard, although the Eagle offense could not get untracked.

A breath of hope surfaced in the fading moments of the half when Gerry Graves intercepted an Archer City pass and returned it 75 yards for what would have been an Eagle touchdown. But a clipping penalty on Holliday nullified the touchdown.

There was a lot of

speculation on what might happen in the Holliday dressing room at the half.

But what ever happened, it worked, because coach Don Lucy's red birds regained possession of the championship style during the respite.

Holliday got its first possession of the third period 47 yards from paydirt. Excitement flowed from the stands as Stanley Craddock, Johnny Jones, Rusty McDaniel and Rusty McDaniel garnered four first

downs to sustain the drive before Craddock delivered the TD from four yards out.

Wells split the uprights and the Eagles pulled out front 7-6 with 6:41 left in the third period.

Jeff Coats, Dennis Holt, Jim Ezzell and Kent Lemons spearheaded the Eagle defense to stop Archer City's next drive, turning it over to the hands of the Eagle offense.

Barry Lawson passed to Wells for a quick first down. Then McDaniel found Joey Kincaide open for a 28 yard

aerial.

From seven yards out James Porter -- the game's leading rusher with 130 yards -- scampered in for another Eagle TD. Wells was on target and the Eagles were ahead 14-6.

Inside the final minute of the third stanza Porter sprinted 49 yards for a single game to set up Holliday's next touchdown made by McDaniel from nine yards out early in the final quarter. Wells kicked the PAT as the Eagles increased their lead to 21-6.

The Wildcats, aided by two fifteen yarders against Holliday, came back to score four minutes later.

The favor was returned on the ensuing kickoff when Porter was whiplashed on a facemask call as he returned

the kickoff.

The Eagles sustained a 50 yard offensive drive capped by Porter's two step TD run. Wells did his thing and it was Holliday 28, Archer City 12.

Graves picked off another Archer City aerial miscue moments later, but the Eagles apparently couldn't penetrate the Wildcat defense to sustain a drive.

Forced into a punting situation on Archer City's 40, quarterback Barry Lawson took the snap and ran it in for an apparent touchdown, however, a flag on Holliday nullified the effort.

Holliday punted on the next play, but the Wildcats fumbled and Kirk Styles was there to recover it for the Eagles.

Friday's action. Number 26 is Holliday's Joey Kincaide.

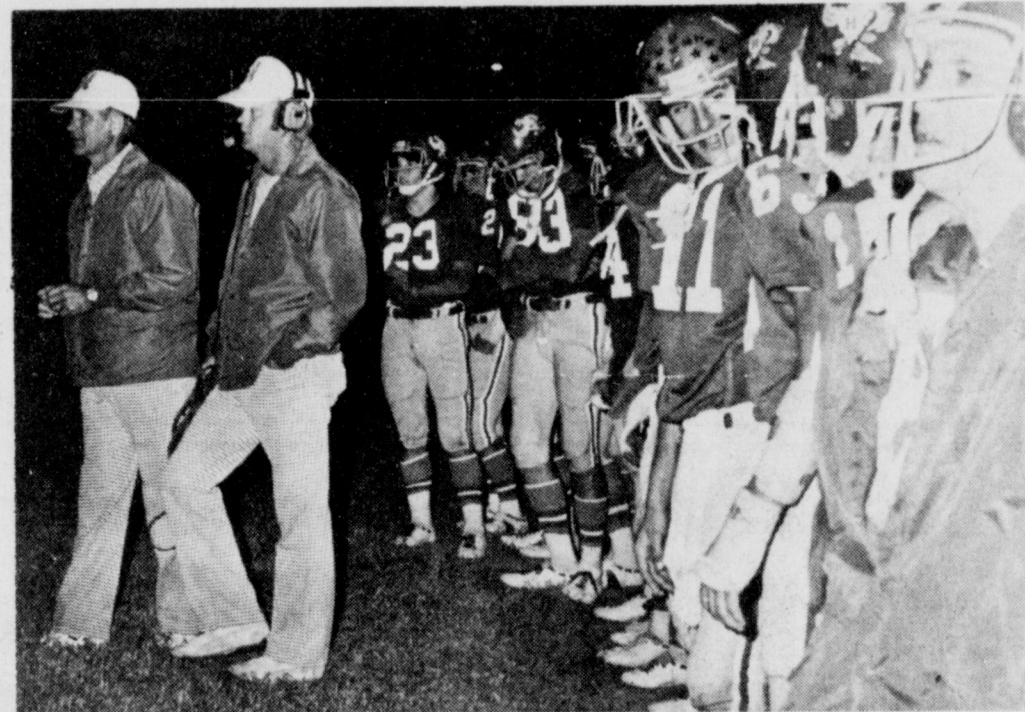
Boyd school easy find

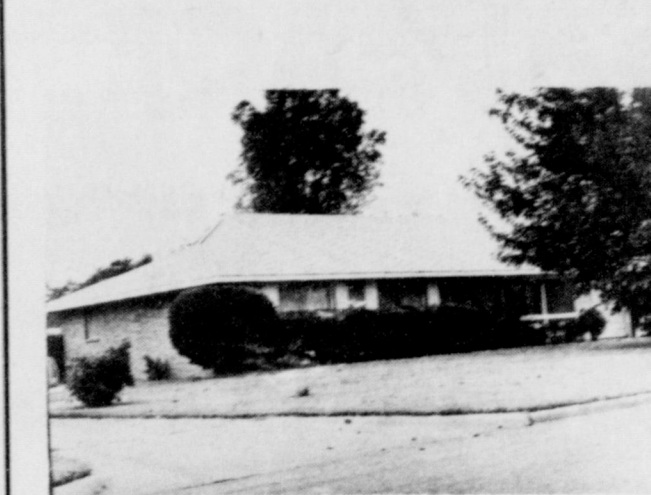
