## Businesses suffer losses as vandals go on rampage

In what was described by one victim as a "rock party" vandals caused an estimated \$3,000 worth of chanages over the weekend and an individual reported the theft of almost \$1,000 worth of tools from his

The largest single loss occurred at Shaw Motor Co., 600 W. Highway, in what owner Luther Shaw described as the results of a "rock party."

Rock wielding vandals attacked seven new pickup trucks and a new car on Shaw's show lot Saturday night. Windshields and windows were broken and the auto bodies were attacked with damages totaling

Apparently the work of the same vandals, Ray Copening reported \$1,100 in damages to the Dairy Queen at 505 Expressway. Damages to

broken windows on the northwest side of the business totaled \$350, while a cash register sustained \$750 in damages.

Another attack occurred Saturday night at The Wash House, 309 W. Bank. Owner Carl Davis said windows were broken and a set of scales had been turned over breaking the mirror causing \$220 in damages.

Rocks were thrown through a southeast window at E&S Exxon, 612 W. Highway. Owner Jim Sargent estimated damages at \$160.

Police also received a report Sunday from James Anderson, 513 W. Rebecca, that a rock had been thrown through the windshield of his parked car causing \$150 in damages. A similar report was received Monday from Richard Thomas, who


estimated the value of his broken windshield at \$125.

## Firemen credited for quick action

Quick action by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department Tuesday afternoon was credited with saving at least one home, and possibly a good portion of the Garden Valley Addition.

Fire, which started in a coastal bermuda field on the south edge of town, was fanned into the back yards of several homes by a strong South wind. One home was so threatened that a pumper truck was summoned.

However, quick action by the firemen and volunteers snuffed out

the fire in the shorter lawn grass and two trucks then turned their attention to extinguishing the fast-spreading field blaze.

Vincent Rains was harvesting the grass when the fire broke out. He called the fire department, and said their quick response not only saved the homes, but much of his equipment.

Rains was operating a swather. He said some the dry grass apparently blew up on the hot motor and ignited. When he noticed the fire, grass in the machine was not only afire, but it had spread over the area he had just covered.

The swather, valued at \$3,000, was lost, as were more than 200 bales of hay, which brings \$1.50 in the field. About 10 acres of grassland was burned in a field about 40 acres in size. A large rear tire on the tractor was also ruined.

Rains and Bud Singleton operate a hay operation in partnership. Singleton was not at the field at the time.

The land is owned by Deryl James and leased by Joe Noel, Rains said.

instilled in all schools in the near future.

Ward said final testing of the program will be held in the near future, with those tests to be compared with two earlier tests to evaluate the program.

Vocational counselor Carl King said 486 of the 726 students in high school were enrolled in vocational courses. He added there was some duplication of Home Economics students enrolled in Home and Family Living, but emphasized the total number of vocational students was outstanding.

When he talks with eighth graders before they enter high school, King told the board, he tells them Iowa Park High is outstanding in the state both in vocations and academics, and

all they need is initiative to take advantage of the large offerings available to them the next four years. IPHS students do much better than the national average in all testings, King said. They average in the upper

60 percentile in overall testing. New Job Placement Officer Richard Davis explained his program, how he works both with present and graduated students, and with prospective employers.

He reaches students through their English classes, spending time with them to tell how to seek jobs to gain both part time and full time employment.

## Johnson's mother confirms he's alive

"He was Bobby," she said. "I'd know him anywhere."

With those words Mrs. Ruth Johnson, mother of fugitive Iowa Park agri-businessman Bobby Johnson, verified suspicions that her son did not fall off a fishing boat and drown in the Gulf of Mexico almost two years ago.

Investigators have believed many months that Johnson was alive. In September the FBI produced a photograph of Johnson with a beard and disclosed he had escaped their dragnet in August at Clarkston,

But they couldn't get anyone to testify under oath that they had seen or heard from the fugitive.

Not until Monday, anyway, when Johnson's mother signed a 26-page sworn deposition in which she admitted having talked with him by telephone about a year ago and having stayed overnight with him last

The deposition was taken Nov. 21 in the office of Wichita Falls attorney Charles Oldham, who represents two insurance companies that had issued Johnson 11 life insurance policies totaling \$3,475,000.

The deposition, filed Monday afternoon with the district court clerk in Wichita County Courthouse, was taken by notary Johnelle Donnell. Others present when the deposition was taken included David Henry Johnson, the fugitive's father, and Tom Renfrow of Fort Worth representing the receiver in the involuntary bankruptcy suit involving the Johnson family's business.

The deposition includes questions asked by Oldham answered by Mrs. Johnson. Her husband also is quoted, however, he was not sworn in under

Early in the interview Mrs. Johnson said she and her husband maintain homes in Iowa Park and the Gulf Coast town of Palacious. She answered various questions about where other family members now reside and their occupations.

Then the questions focused on Mrs. Johnson's contacts with her fugitive

Mrs. Johnson said she saw her son last June. She couldn't recall the town or the state, but that it was somewhere in the Northwest.

Oldham: How did you happen to see him in June?

Mrs. Johnson: I heard where he was, and I went there. Oldham: From whom did you hear

where he was? Mrs. Johnson: Someone told me. Oldham: Who told you? Mrs. Johnson: I don't have to tell

you that, do I? Oldham: Yes, you do. Mrs. Johnson: I can -- well, my daughter.

Oldham: Which daughter? Mrs. Johnson: The only one I have. Oldham: That's LaJuana Vanek? Mrs. Johnson: I think he called her

or something. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson said they drove to Idaho to see their son, who she said was living in a trailer home. Oldham: Did you go over to his

Mrs. Johnson: Yes, I did. Oldham: Was he at the trailer? Mrs. Johnson: He was.

Oldham: Anyone else? Mrs. Johnson: There was a woman

Oldham: Do you remember her

Mrs. Johnson: He called her DeDe. After spending the night with their son, Mrs. Johnson said she was contacted about the serious illness of her brother in California. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson left Idaho to be with her brother in California.

Oldham: Now, there isn't any question in your mind that the person you saw in Idaho was your son? Mrs. Johnson: He was Bobby.

Oldham: All right. And he admitted to being Bobby, and you recognized him, both?

Mrs. Johnson: I'd know him anywhere. He didn't have to admit it. Oldham: Now, had he changed his appearance any?

Mrs. Johnson: Nothing, only a beard. She said she hasn't seen her

fugitive son since the June meeting in Mrs. Johnson said her first contact

with her son since his Jan. 3, 1977,

disappearance was about Christmas last year. She said her daughter-in-law, Mrs. H.C. (Jody) Johnson took her to a pay telephone somewhere on Old lowa Park Road. She indicated Bobby Johnson called the number of the pay

telephone and she spoke to him.

Mother of the fugitive said she had learned a short time before that he was still alive. She didn't recall who told her.

Oldham: What was the substance of your (telephone) conversation?

Mrs. Johnson: I don't really think that that would be -- it was real - he was telling me how much he loved me and things like that that I don't feel like anybody else would be interested

She said on neither occasion did they discuss what may have transpired on Jan. 3, 1977, when her son allegedly fell off a fishing boat and drowned in the Gulf of Mexico or the subsequent legal ramifications surrounding the family business.

Although H.C. Johnson had not been convicted when the telephone conversation transpired, he had begun serving his 16 year sentence for furnishing false statements to the Commodity Credit Corporation when Mr. and Mrs. Johnson met with their fuigitive son last summer.

H.C. Johnson began serving his time at Leavenworth, Kan., but since has been transferred to the federal facility at El Reno, Okla., according to the FBI.

Although Mrs. Johnson's statements only serve to verify the suspicions of law enforcement authorities, it has accomplished the goal of the insurance companies Oldham represents.

Occidental Life Insurance Company had issued Johnson 10 policies totaling \$2,475,000, and American General Life Insurance Company

carried a \$1,000,000 life insurance policy on Johnson. Various members of Johnson's relatives were named as beneficiaries.

Oldham said some of the policies

seeking to have the policies rescinded in 30th District Court.

Some of the defendants - family

members who could have collected as beneficiaries - have already agreed not to contest the suit and 30th District Judge Calvin Ashley has entered three judgments in favor of Occidental.

Although no final judgments have been entered in connection with the other defendents, Oldham indicated motions to that effect are in the process of being filed.

### Charges filed against woman

The woman believed to be the companion of missing Iowa Park agri-businessman Bobby Johnson has been charged with harboring a federal fugitive.

"Federal harboring charges were filed on Dec. 4, 1978, before a U.S. Magistrate at Yakima, Washington charging Irene Mary Olson, also known as Dee Dee Olson, Mrs. Darrell Dean Olson, with harboring federal fugitive Robert Mascil Johnson, also known as Bobby Johnson, Darrell Dean Olson,' according to the FBI.

The whereabouts of the couple are

unknown, the FBI said. "Investigation has determined that Mrs. Olson was with Johnson in Clarkston, Washington, and on Aug. 18, 1978, Johnson fled Clarkston. Mrs. Olson then moved to Billings, Montana, and investigation revealed that she subsequently left Billings to

join Johnson," the FBI stated. The FBI described her as 39 years old, 5 feet 2 inches and weighs about 122 pounds. She has blue eyes, brown hair and has previously worked as a waitress, the FBI said.

The Padgetts have reverently set up a Nativity scene to show their love for the Holy Child born in Bethlehem so many years ago on a special table in the living

Other decorations in the living room center around a tall green Douglas fir tree decked with red and gold baubles and gold tinsel. A tiny Santa Claus on the tree has been used for 35 years ornament considered with the tenderest attachment by parents and children alike.

Another object of affection in the Yuletide decorations is a small artificial lighted tree decorated with holly berries and leaves and gold foil nuts, which was given to Jerry and Nancy by his parents for their second Christmas following their marriage. A sprig of mistletoe hanging from the ceiling is a reminder of "kissing the one who stands beneath it."

The Elm Fork of the Red River has salt seeps and springs which produce an Cong. Ray Roberts of average of 842 tons of salt each day. Natural salt load of 495 tons per day is produced by the Estelline Springs, site of the Corps of Engineers experimental project.


The North Fork of the Wichita River in Cottle County carries an average of 307 tons per day, and the South Fork 322 tons.

From 10 identified sources along the Wichita River basin and Red River basin, 3,600 tons of salt is produced daily.

Systems completed, under controlling the salt springs vary, depending on the amount of water to be handled.

One source of the polluted water was also on the tour. Located about eight miles northeast of Guthrie, the visitors saw a natural spring which flows 500,000 gallons of water daily, and is more than three times as salty as the ocean. His Ralgro treated steers averaged 1.44 pound daily gain compared to 1.32 pound daily gain on the check steers. The daily gain is important because the cattle must be gaining at least one pound per day in order for the growth stimulate to be effective.

Ralgro is a growth stimulate which causes little to no side effects. It causes no raised tail heads, prominent jaws, nor udder development. Occasionally, there can be some teat enlongation in heifers. Other growth stimulates include DES and Synovex. None of these should be administered to heifer or bulls to be kept for breeding purposes.

Ray Arthur of Friberg Cooper will be Ralgro implanting his 475 pound steers on wheat pasture. Placement of the implant is critical in order to get maximum results from the treatment.

The Ralgro pellets are placed behind the ear beneath the skin. Care is needed to deposit the pellets one inch from the base of the ear. The implant should be placed to avoid the cartledge and blood vessels.

animals system. Crushing can be eliminated by backing off the pellet gun needle for 3/8 inch before pulling the

trigger. Growth stimulate implanting can be administered in a few seconds while the cattle are being worked. It can be given to steers and heifers not intended for breeding purposes. The implants are also effective nursing calves.

An implant works for about 100 days. Animals can be reimplanted when they go to the feedlot and they still get the same amount of additional boost.

Cattle nutritional requirements cannot be met when feeding hay below seven percent crude protein, according to Dr. Whitney Rounds, Extension beef

specialist. Local cattlemen can use the forage test to determine their hay quality. A protein analysis at the Forage Testing Center at Texas A&M University costs only \$5. This will let a producer know where his hay "stands" as far as it comes to meeting the nutritional requirement of his cattle.

Only two hay samples in the recent Wichita County Fair Hay Show had crude protein percentages above seven percent. On a statewide basis, only 39 percent of the Coastal and 35 percent of the sudan sorghum - Johnsongrass hay tests above seven percent

crude protein. Forage testing kits and instruction are available from my office.

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
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

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






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
