### Holliday-Pottsboro game here Friday

Holliday's Eagles, sixth-ranked in state and unbeaten through 10 games, will attempt to break their personal bi-district jinx at 8 p.m. tomorrow night in Hawk Stadium when they host the Pottsboro Cardinals.

The Eagles have lost three bi-district games in the past four seasons, falling to Pottsboro 21-15 in 1977, to Celina 13-0 in 1978, and 14-6 to Pilot Point in 1979.

In 1980, an injury-plagued Holliday team fell to 4-3 in district play.

Boyd advanced as district champ last year, beating District 14-AA champ Whitewright 34-27, and losing to eventual state champ Pilot Point 51-7 in regionals.

As far as injuries are concerned, the Eagles have had none to speak of, at least none like last year when a dozen starters were lost at various times in the season due to injuries.

The Eagles depend on a devastating ground attack which has totalled over 3,597 yards this year. Led by senior tailback Ray Looney (3,255 yards in three seasons), the Eagles have a stable full of capable runningbacks, including fullback Joe Chase (855 yards in 103 carries), Brad Harmon (561 yards), Mark Rathman (550 yards), Jeff Selcher, Mike W.

Parker, and Donnie Bridges. Quarterbacks Joel Mankins (senior) and Mike A. Parker (junior) have combined for 390 yards passing

this season, completing 22 of 55 passes.

Even more impressive than the offense is the Eagles' "stonewall" defense, which recorded its eighth shutout of the season last week against Nocona.

The first team unit has not had a touchdown scored against it, and only a 33-yard field goal by Petrolia has blemished an otherwise clean slate. Jacksboro recorded the lone touchdown scored against Holliday, on a 24-yard pass completion against the reserve defense.

Through 10 games, Holliday has averaged 40.1 points per game, and allowed an average of only one point.

Probable defensive starters are A. Parker and Mankins at safety; Gill Gilbert, Looney, W. Parker and Harmon at defensive back; Chase and Belcher at linebacker; and Brian Cunningham, Timmy Stubblefield, Wade Sadberry, Steve Hill, Harold Parsons, Brad Hardin and Kevin Blankenship on the line.

Pottsboro, District 14-AA champ, ended the regular season with a 9-1 record, losing a district contest to Lindsey 20-16. However, Lindsey lost two district games, which gave the title to Pottsboro and the right to continue in the state playoffs.

The Cardinals boast two large backs in Barney Frazier and sophomore David Barrett. Frazier (6-1, 200) is a brutal runner, and is the defensive standout at end.

Complementing the two is senior back Keith Bates, who gets most of his yardage following the blocks of Frazier and Barrett out of Pottsboro's Straight T and Wing T formations.

According to Eagle head coach Don Lucy, the two formations allow both Frazier and Barrett to run straight dives, to fake a dive and pitch to Bates, or lead Frazier and Barrett through the line with Bates following close behind.

"They depend on those two big backs, especially for four, five, or 10-yard running situations," Lucy said.

Southpaw quarterback Dwayne Williams balances the running attack with precision passing, throwing to the likes of Philip Burks, Robert Tol and Jeff Price. "Williams is a very capable back," Lucy said, adding further that Williams is also a strong pitcher for the Cardinal baseball team.

### White's store to add full line of groceries

Whites Store of Iowa Park is not going out of business, but it is to undergo a radical change after the first of the year, according to Mike Robertson, owner.

Robertson initiated a clearance of furniture and appliances some three weeks ago, and the action prompted rumors in the community that the store might be closing.

However, Robertson announced this week that rather than closing, he was converting a major portion of the building space, approximately 13,000 square feet, to groceries.

Equipment has already been purchased, and much of it is in storage here, to complete the conversion. Workmen will commence

renovation of the west side after the first of year, but work is already underway in the back portion.

Robertson said the business, after conversion is completed, will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., seven days a week, and will employ between 15 and 20 people.

The east part of the building will continue to carry a full line of White's merchandise, and three of the automotive service bays will remain open, he said. In addition, the store will continue to carry Whirlpool, RCA and Litton appliances.

The business will assume the name White's Super Store when the conversion is completed, according to Robertson.

## Varsity basketball teams boast maturity

Both Iowa Park varsity basketball coaches are looking forward to kicking off their seasons Saturday, primarily because they have seasoned players on their rosters.

Earnie Reusch will find out in a hurry what his season's prospects look like, when he sends his defending district champion Hawks to Bowie, a traditional roundball powerhouse.

Ray Sefcik will have a mature and experienced starting lineup when his Hawkettes host Electra.

Keynote to the Hawk hopes of improving on their 17-12 season and 7-4 district records is the return of two all-district performers, Steve Page and Steve Smith. Both are seniors.

Both considered potential all-state material, Page towers at 6-7 in his post position while Smith, 6-0, plays forward.

Page is recognized for his strong defensive ability, good quickness, shoots well and is an excellent rebounder. He averaged 14 points per game last season.

Smith, who averaged 15 points, is ball-wise and smart. He is an excellent shooter and makes lots of

buckets by driving to the basket.

Supporting them will be Bobby Bates, who started about half the games last season. The 5-10 senior's major strength is his defensive play, because he usually is assigned the opposing team's best shooter.

Kevin Biddy and Jim Smith, both 5-8, are playmakers. Smith is strong defensively and Biddy's strength is his quickness and ball-handling. Smith is a senior and Biddy a junior.

Two other seniors will lend maturity to the team. They are Steve Harris, 6-2, a strong rebounder, and John Sitgreaves, 5-7, who was a reserve last year.

Five players have been moved up from the 1980-81 junior varsity. All juniors, they include Jeff Cavinder, 5-10; Robby Hausler, 5-11; Marc Klinkerman, 6-1; Wayne Hodges, 6-0; and Jeff Lawson, 5-10.

Reusch delights in frustrating his opposing teams by using a slow, deliberate offensive combined with a tenacious defense. His theory of playing basketball might come straight from a book written by Hank Iba, former Oklahoma State mentor.

At Bowie Saturday, the junior

varsity will begin at 6:30 p.m. and the varsity game will follow. They will return home for games Monday against Notre Dame, and Tuesday will travel to Jacksboro.

#### HAWKETTES READY

Four seniors and a junior will be starting for Sefcik's Hawkettes when they open the season Saturday against Electra.

Back from a 9-15 season, which was well above pre-season predictions, are Tammie Richardson, Kay Stevenson, Lindy Neely, Lisa

Yeakley and Susan Gullatt. All are seniors except Yeakley, a junior.

Sefcik says his team this year will be more solid in their fundamentals and more consistent in their play.

Richardson, 5-10, was honorable mention all-district last season. A four-year varsity player, she is strong in rebounding and shooting and will play high post in Sefcik's tandem post offense.

Stevenson, also honorable-mention, will begin her third year on the varsity. Her strengths are defense

and as a forward, scoring.

Neely has developed into a good outside shooter and is a strong rebounder.

Yeakley, who started as point guard last year, is a good playmaker, has good quickness and is a good outside shooter.

Gullatt was the sixth player on last year's team. She is especially adept in capturing offensive rebounds.

Also on the varsity this year will be Donna Cook, Celina Canada, Lorraine Kirkhart, all seniors; Julie Guyton and Tonda Bayne, juniors; and Rebecca Whisman and Lisa Sefcik, sophomores.

Sefcik said he has considerable talent on his freshman and junior varsity teams. The JV will be playing this weekend in a tournament at Nocona.

Like the Hawks, both Hawkettes varsity and JV will play here Monday against Notre Dame and Tuesday at Jacksboro.

#### Sales taxes slightly increased

Iowa Park's sales taxes are just about keeping up with inflation, having received 7.19 percent more during the first 10 months of this calendar year than last.

The city received a check for \$11,974, representing sales during October, from the state comptroller's

office. That brought the year's sum to \$85,763, as compared with \$80,011 for the same 10-month period in 1980.

Holliday is running 20.18 percent more than last year. That city's rebate for October was \$7,060. For the year Holliday has received \$83,733, up from \$68,843 last year.

## Council meet Monday expected to be brief

Those planning on attending Monday's meeting of the city council can expect to be home early, if no more items are added to the agenda released by Steve Morath, city administrator.

Council members will consider bids on a front-end loader for the sewer treatment plant; act on an ordinance which would remove duties of the city secretary from those of the city administrator; and hear a follow up report on revenue sharing regulations concerning competitive bidding.

Morath will also undoubtedly report on a meeting held yesterday in Wichita Falls, where municipalities that purchase water from that city were told of rate increases.

Prior to the meeting, Morath said Iowa Park's increase would be 12 percent, unless it were altered in negotiations.

Wichita Falls proposed to increase Iowa Park's rate for treated water from 48.4-cents per 1,000 gallons to 54.39-cents.

# Cook of the Week

Most of the holiday menus in American homes will not be complete without the use of the red, sour cranberries in some form. Cranberry sauce and salads are two of the most popular uses of the fruit. However, cranberry bread is gaining in popularity as a dessert or to serve with coffee or tea when guests drop in between meals.

Cranberries were an important food for the Indians, who ate them raw long before the first Europeans arrived in America. The Indians are also credited with having invented the cranberry sauce by cooking them and sweetening them with maple sugar or honey. John Josselyn, who visited New England in 1639, reported that both the Indians and English made a delicious sauce to eat with their meat by boiling the berries with sugar.

Cranberries are reputed to have been the first native American fruit shipped to Europe commercially. Cape Cod cranberries were being sold in London early in the 18th century for four shillings a jar. From there, they spread to the Continent and gained special favor in Germany.

Joyce (Mrs. John) Rentschler shares one way that she uses the cranberries in her Whole Cranberry Bread recipe this week.

A native of Archer City, she was graduated from Archer City High School and Draughton's Business College in Wichita Falls. She and her husband, who owns and operates J&R Well Services, moved to Iowa Park in 1950. They are members of Faith Baptist Church. Before moving here, she worked for the First State Bank in Archer City.

Mrs. Rentschler has been pianist of the Faith Baptist Church for 25 years. She also gives private piano lessons in her home. She is a member and president of the Modern Music Study Club and a member of the 23 Study Club. She is secretary of the Child III Department in her church. Her hobbies are oil painting and crocheting.

### WHOLE CRANBERRY BREAD

Sift together into a mixing bowl:  
2 cups sifted flour  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. soda  
1 1/2 tsps. baking powder  
Stir in:  
1 cup whole cranberries  
1 cup chopped pecans

Combine:  
Juice of one orange plus water to make 3/4 cup  
2 T melted shortening  
1 egg, slightly beaten  
Add liquid mixture to dry ingredients all at once, stirring just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Pour into greased 9x5x3 inch pan. Let stand 20 minutes for better-shaped bread. Bake at 350 degrees 55-60 minutes. Remove from oven and let stand for 10 minutes. Remove from pan and finish cooling on wire rack. Bread freezes well.

### CROCK POT BARBECUE BRISKET

3-4 lb. beef brisket  
2 tsps. meat tenderizer  
1/2 tsp. seasoned salt  
1/2 tsp. garlic salt  
1/4 cup liquid smoke  
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce  
1 1/2 cups barbecue sauce  
Sprinkle tenderizer and seasonings on both sides of meat. Place brisket in crock pot. Combine liquid ingredients and pour over brisket. Cover and cook on low 8-10 hours or overnight.

### CHOCOLATE CHERRY CAKE

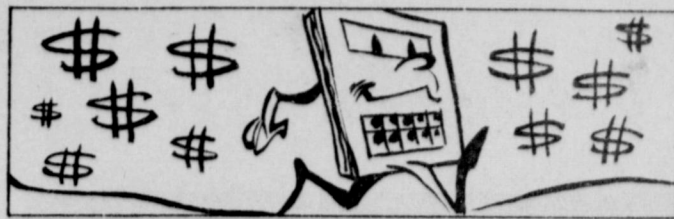
Base:  
1 pkg. devil's food cake mix  
1 21 oz. can cherry pie filling  
1 tsp. almond extract  
2 eggs, beaten  
Frosting:  
1 cup sugar  
5 T margarine  
1/2 cup milk  
1 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 13x9 inch pan. In large bowl, combine base ingredients. Stir by hand until well mixed. Pour into pan and bake 25-30 minutes.  
For the frosting, in saucepan combine sugar, margarine and milk. Boil, stirring constantly, 1 minute. Remove from heat, stir in chocolate pieces until smooth. Pour over warm cake.

### FRUIT SALAD

1 large can fruit cocktail, drained  
2 cans mandarin oranges  
1 cup pineapple tidbits, with juice  
1 pkg. strawberries, with juice  
Sprinkle with 1 small pkg. instant vanilla pudding. Mix and chill several hours. Add sliced bananas before serving.

### SPICED TEA CAKE

Blend in large mixing bowl:  
1 pkg. yellow cake mix  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 T instant tea with lemon (dry mix)  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. cloves  
1 cup orange juice  
3/4 cup cooking oil  
4 eggs  
Beat on high speed of mixer 2 minutes. Pour into greased and floured 10-inch tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees 50-60 minutes. Remove from oven and cool in pan 15 minutes. Remove from pan and spoon orange glaze over cake.  
Orange Glaze: In saucepan, combine 1/2 cup sugar and 1/4 cup orange juice. Bring to boil. Remove and spoon over hot cake until glaze is absorbed.

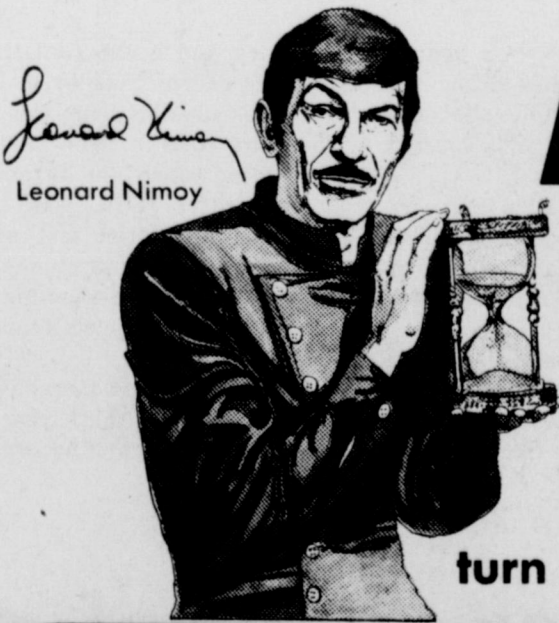

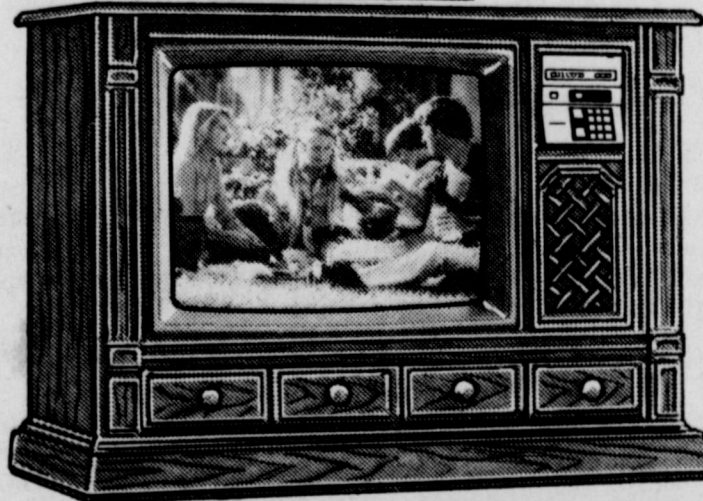

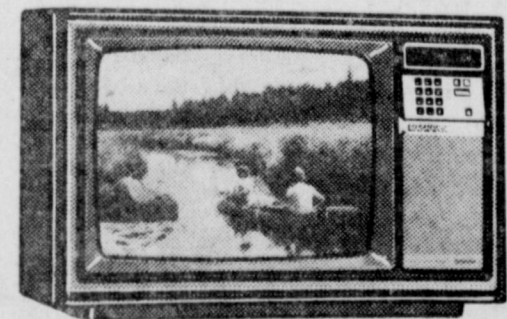
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# Local study clubs hold joint meeting

Approximately 50 members of the three local federated study clubs in Iowa Park attended the annual joint meeting held Monday evening in Texas Electric Reddy Room. Members of the Amity Study Club, the most recently organized, were hostesses.

Mrs. Philip Welch was leader for the program which emphasized Federation Heritage and a special drug abuse talk. Mrs. James Merrick contributed the devotion, using "Thanksgiving" and "A Patriotic Wish," poems by Edgar A. Guest. Both women are members of the Amity Study Club.

Mrs. Vern Horsky, a member of the Philia Study Club, rendered a vocal solo of the Federation Song for the art number.

Mrs. Erwin F. Soell, a member of the 23 Study Club, and president-elect of Santa Rosa District, gave an impressive presentation of Federation Heritage which she introduced with excerpts from an address by Miss Mary Eastman when she spoke at a meeting of clubwomen in 1869. Mrs. Soell noted that the objectives of clubwomen in that period were similar to those of women today.

## Club members honor husbands

The Iowa Park Garden Club members honored their husbands and guests Friday night at a Thanksgiving dinner held at First Presbyterian Church. Hostesses were Mmes. F.M. Wilson, James Sewell, Jack Vestal and Thurman Reitz.

Mrs. China B. Smith was program leader. She presented a reading "What If", then asked those in attendance how they would change their lives if given the opportunity. The answers provided an interesting feature to the program.

Mrs. Charlie Lee served as caller for the bingo games that provided diversion following the meal.

Mrs. W.A. George, president, reminded members of the bake sale to be held Tuesday at Superfine Grocery, starting at 10 a.m. Members brought their gifts for Wichita Falls State Hospital patients to the meeting.

She said that the Sorosis clubs were the earliest study clubs organized in the U.S. and could rightly be called the mother of federation. In giving significant dates of General Federation of Women's Clubs, she said that 1990 would mark the centennial date. She mentioned the general convention that was held in 1980 in St. Louis, Mo., listing a number of treasured gifts that were presented by various clubs throughout the U.S. to the headquarters building in Washington, D.C.

Mrs. Soell gave a brief history of each of the Iowa Park federated clubs. Assisting her were Mrs. Earl F. Watson, member of the 23 Study Club and past president of Santa Rosa District, who showed and explained the programs in the club's 1928 yearbook. Mrs. Sam Hill, also of the 23 Study Club showed the club's first scrapbook which highlighted administrations of presidents from 1945 to 49.

Mrs. Valer Mae Jones, a member of the Philia Study Club, showed the club's 1971 yearbook and Mrs. Earnie Reusch represented the Amity Study Club with its 1979 history book.

The climatic point of the meeting was a talk by Miss Shirley Crawford, regional field coordinator of Drug Alert, who belongs to Dare which is functioning mainly to help children.

"Any legal drug can be illegal if it is abused," she remarked, "but this evening I am concentrating on marijuana because of the alarming rising rate of its use among young people." She stated that the drug had moved into junior high schools, even into some elementary schools where it is passed from friend to friend,

sibling to sibling and many are convinced that it is harmless.

Miss Crawford devoted considerable time to explaining the harmful effects of even moderate use of the drug on the brain, lungs, personality, character, reproductive processes, etc. She said that a recent poll revealed that 32 percent of 14 year olds had tried marijuana at least one time; 51 percent of the 16-17 year group; and 68 percent of those

between 18-21, and that 10 percent of the high school students were using it daily.

In concluding, she mentioned the successful efforts of certain Parent Peer groups that have come together with the common purpose of cooperating to protect their children that are too young and vulnerable to handle the psychological, physical and social hazards involved in drug usage. Refreshments were served from a

table covered with a beige embroidered linen cloth and appointed with pumpkins, turkeys and orange colored candles burning in antique wooden thread spools.

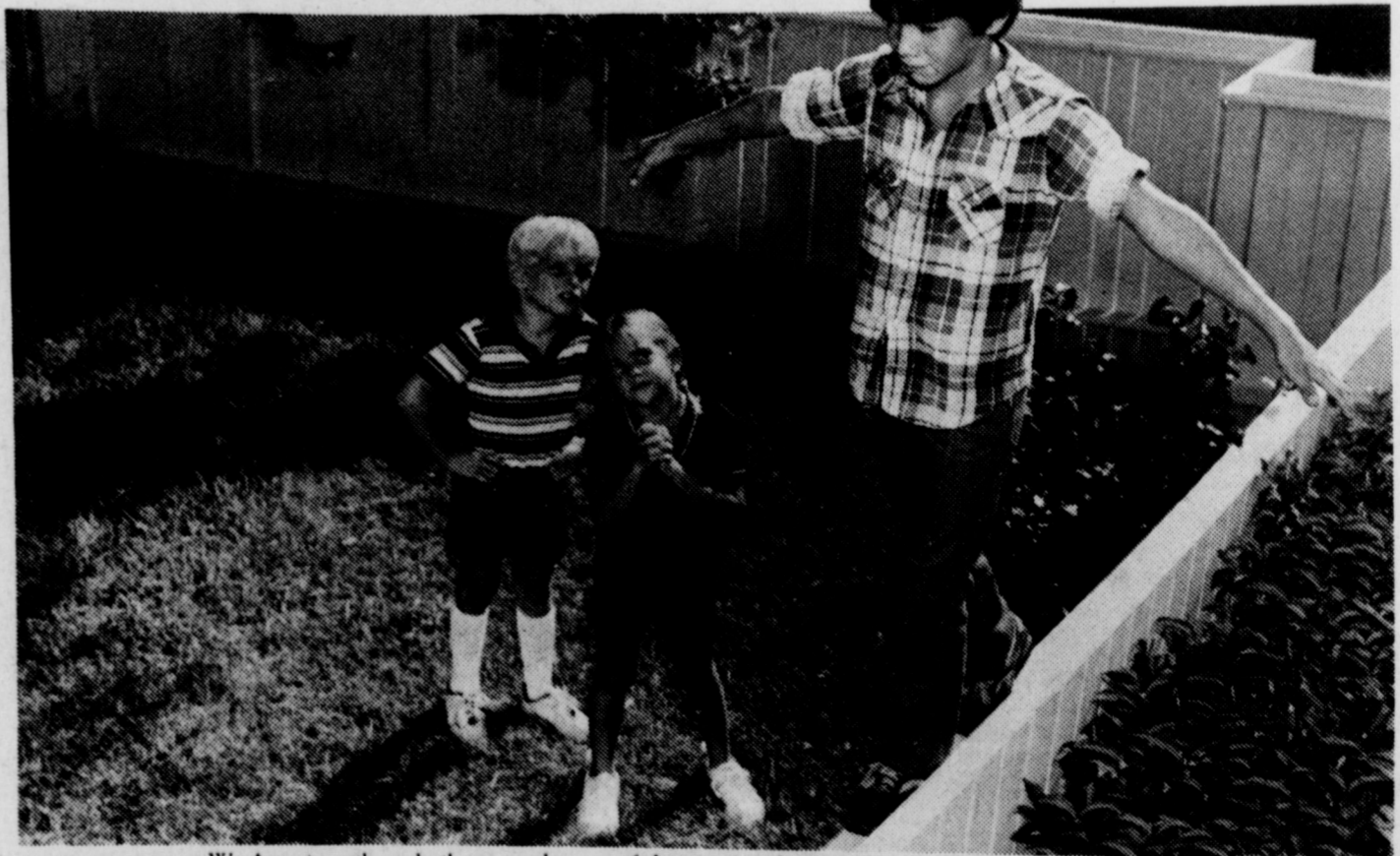

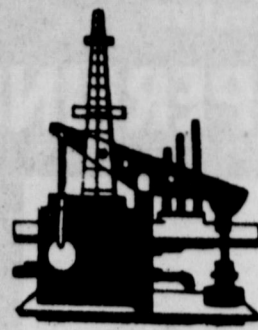

Iowa Park's Hawks made a success of the 1981 season Friday night by defeating Burkburnett, 21-18, even though they finished 3-6-1 for the season and 2-2-1 in district.

Not only was the victory a great season finale because of the arch rivalry between the two schools, but it was made especially sweet for the Mean Green because Burk had won 7-6 in the third game of this season, and because the Hawks came from behind to beat the Bulldogs on Burk turf.

Hawk fans left the stadium, happy with the win and commenting about the character of their team. Iowa Park had fallen behind, 12-0, with 3:50 still remaining in the opening quarter.

It would have been easy for the Hawks to settle back and play out the clock after Burk got its big lead. After all, with four minutes gone in the second quarter, the Bulldogs led 12-0 and held a 9-1 margin in first downs and 147-31 in yards gained.

But that was when the Hawks became aroused. It was at that point the hosts had driven to Iowa Park's 25 and turned the ball over on downs.

Two plays later, senior fullback Chris Nethery broke on a 70-yard touchdown romp and Jeryl Brixey kicked the extra point to make the score 12-7.

Before the game was over, Nethery was to close out his high school football career the way any athlete would dream. He scored all three Iowa Park touchdowns by carrying the ball 21 times and gaining a career-high 197 yards.

Nethery's number was called more times than usual because the Bulldogs were stacking their defense to stop Iowa Park's "bread and butter" wide plays. He was running inside tackle, where "Dog" defenders were spread thin, and combined his strength to shake off tacklers and speed to outrun the secondary.

Burkburnett scored again, after Iowa Park lit up its side of the scoreboard. The Bulldogs took the kickoff and marched 27 yards to paydirt and an 18-7 lead with only 1:28 remaining in the first half.

But 53 seconds later, Nethery was bulling his way over Burk's goal line once more. That 73-yard drive was covered by Nethery and tailback Jim Smith in only five plays. Brixey's extra point was blocked, and the teams went to the locker room at halftime with Burk leading 18-13.

Iowa Park dominated the third period, allowing Burkburnett to run only nine plays from scrimmage.

After their first drive was thwarted at the Bulldog 25, the Hawks began their next drive from their own 18. Nethery punched over from the two-yard line 10 plays later. Marc Klinkerman completed both Iowa Park's successful passes on that series. He hit tight end Steve Harris for a 15-yarder, and then found Jim Smith in the end zone for the two-point conversion. That gave the Hawks their 21-18 lead with 1:18 remaining in the third quarter.

After giving up 137 yards rushing and 95 passing in the first half, the Hawk defense tightened its grip on the game. Burk was allowed only 59 more yards rushing and 31 passing the second half.

Where Burk had great success passing during the first half, connecting on five of nine attempts, only two of nine were completed in the second half, and three were intercepted.

Russell Hayley had a major interception in the first quarter, taking the ball away from a Bulldog receiver in the Hawk end zone. Then in the second half, aerial steals were credited to Lynn Fulfer, Don Sidlauskas and Robby Hausler.

Jim Smith, an all-district selection last year, closed out his career with one of his better games. Despite being caught behind the line of scrimmage three times early in the game and losing 11 yards, he had a net 87 yards on 15 carries.

The game would have been much closer, and possibly even tied, but for Burk's inability to score the extra points.

Ken Heath's kick after the first touchdown was below the crossbar. His second kick was good, but John Ruggles was still walking around congratulating players when the ball



JIM SMITH STRETCHES FOR A 10-YARD GAIN EARLY IN THIRD PERIOD

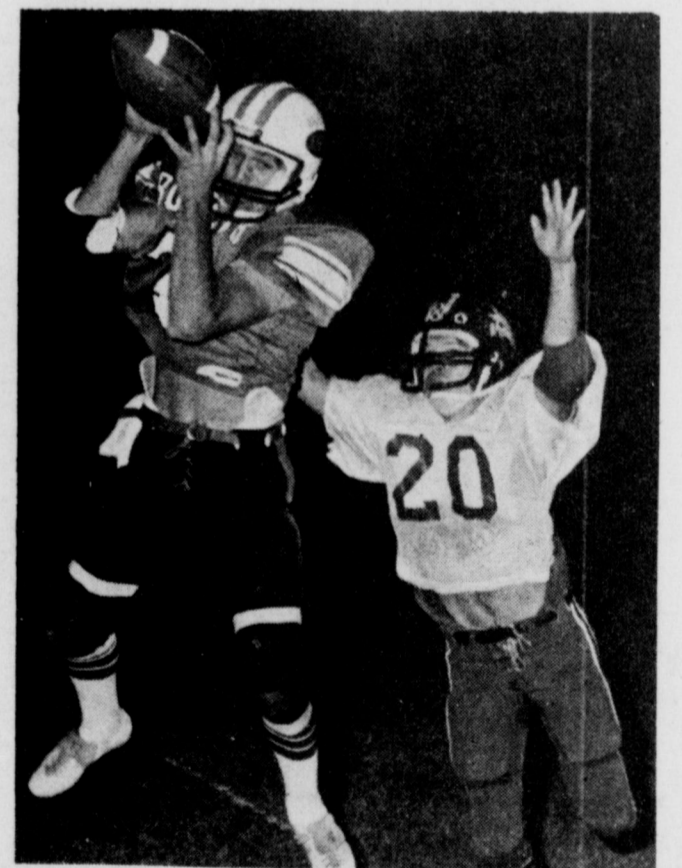
was snapped. And, but for a jarring tackle by Les Smith, a pass for a two-point conversion would have been completed after the third touchdown.

The game was marred midway in the second quarter for senior Keith Mowery. He was ejected from the game for fighting, but insisted Burk's C.G. Robinson, who was also ejected, was doing all the swinging. The incident occurred while Burk was driving for its third touchdown. Mowery has been a mainstay in the Hawk secondary all season.

Friday's game also marked the end of Hawk mentor David Baugh's initial year as a head football coach.

Friday's victory gave the Hawks fourth place in district standings, despite dropping their first two conference games. Hirschi (4-0-1) won the title, Graham and Mineral Wells (3-2-0) tied for second. Vernon placed fifth with a 1-3-1 record and Burkburnett wound up in the cellar, 0-4-1.

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# Nocona 10th victim; Eagles win district

Holliday's Eagles continue to enjoy one of the most successful seasons in school history, thanks to a 33-0 drubbing over Nocona's Indians Friday night.

The win ups the sixth-ranked Class AA Eagles' record to 10-0, and an outright claim to the District 13-AA championship.

Holliday now advances to the state playoffs with a bi-district tilt scheduled against District 14-AA champ Pottsboro at 8 p.m. tomorrow at Hawk Stadium in Iowa Park.

One would be hard pressed to say

whether the Eagle offense or defense has contributed most to Holliday's success—both are impressive at times, phenomenal during others.

The defense, on one hand recorded its eighth shutout of the season against the Indians. Through 10 games, the "stonewall defense" has allowed an average of one point per game, and even less, .428, in district.

On the other hand, the Eagle offense continued to grind out the yardage against a stout Indian defense, without the services of stellar runningback Ray Looney. He watched from the sidelines, nursing a

bruise to the tailbone suffered in the previous week's game.

Filling the void left by Looney was junior Brad Harmon, who carried 14 times for 121 yards and two touchdowns. Fullback Joe Chase finished a close second with 117 steps in 14 carries.

Harmon began the Eagle scoring with a four-yard touchdown run, capping an eight-play, 61-yard drive on Holliday's initial possession.

In the drive, Harmon carried three times for runs of 28, three and four yards. Chase carried three times for runs of five, four and eight yards.

Holliday scored again early in the second quarter on an eight-yard run

by Chase. The score was set up by a poor Indian punt which travelled only 14 yards to the Nocona 33. Chase and Mark Rathman took turns carrying the pigskin on the drive, with Rathman covering 11 yards in three carries, and Chase 22 yards in four. Nocona was forced to punt on its next possession, and Donnie Bridges returned the ball 18 yards to the midfield stripe.

From there, Jeff Belcher and Harmon carried six and 22 yards, respectively, and quarterback Mike A. Parker twice for two. From the Nocona 20, Parker tossed a picture-perfect pass to tight end and Kevin Blankenship for the score. A

Parker's point after kick failed, but Holliday's lead still increased to 20-0 before the halftime whistle.

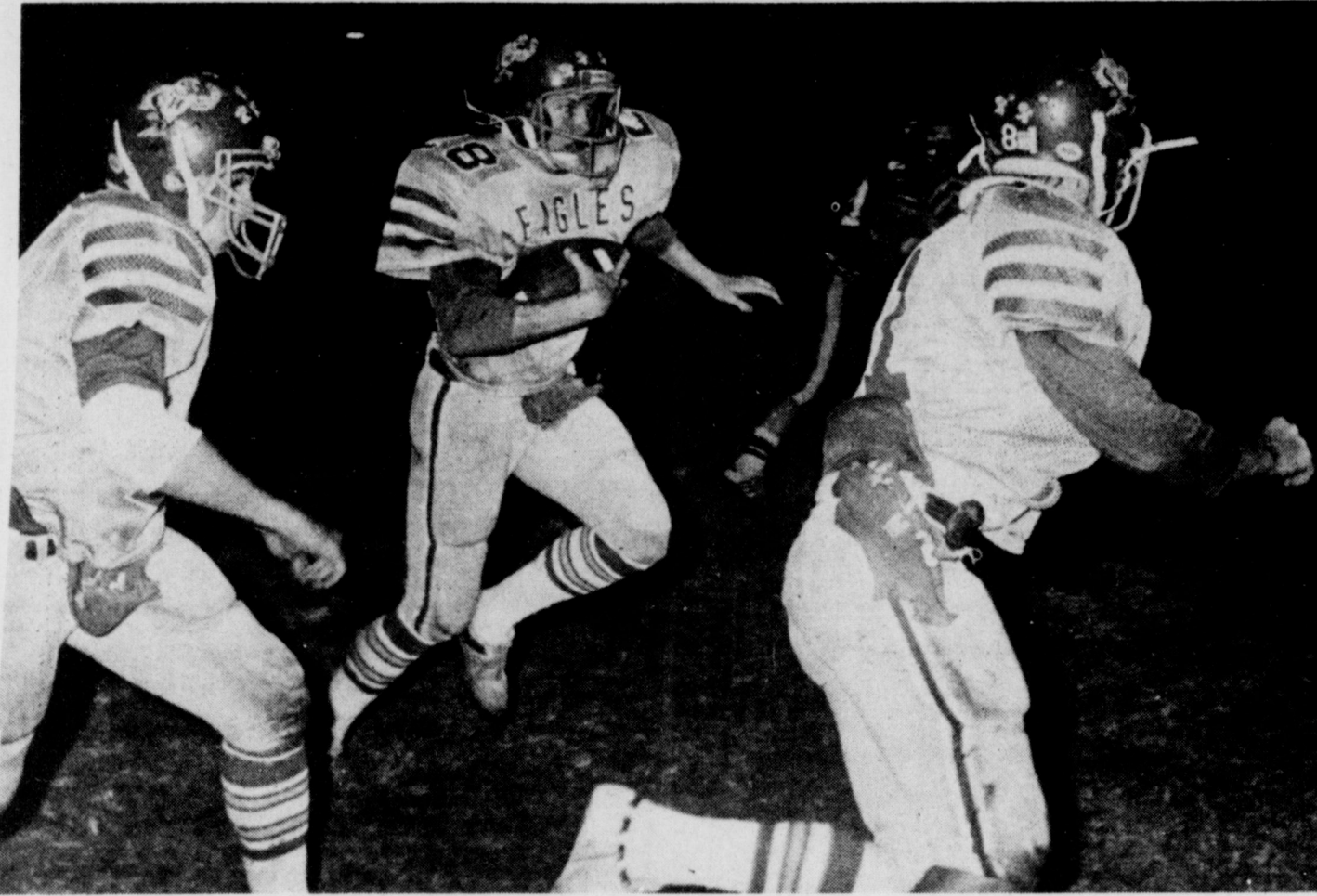
Nocona got the ball rolling on its initial second-half possession, recording two of its three first downs for the game. Crossing into Eagle territory at the Holliday 43, Nocona ran twice for no gain, incompleting a pass, and failed on a fake punt run which came up short at the 36.

Six plays later, Belcher broke through the heart of the Indian defense for a 34-yard touchdown run, with 5:30 left in the third period. A Parker's successful kick put Holliday ahead at 27-0.

Harmon scored from two yards out

on the Eagles' next possession, capping 48-yard, four-play drive. Chase contributed the biggest chunk of real estate on a 43-yard run to the Nocona five. Indian back Rusty Weatherford blocked the extra point try, freezing the scoreboard at 33-0.

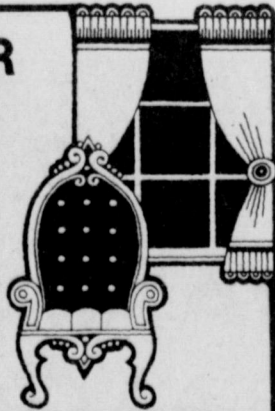
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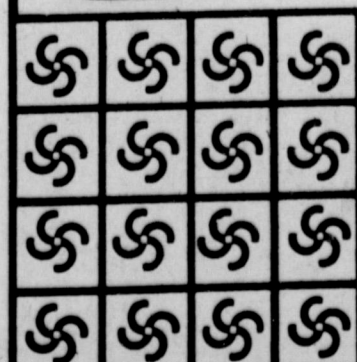
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# Plan offered to city to obtain physician

THE ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE, PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT AND FIXING OF WATER AND SEWER RATES, METER DEPOSITS AND TAPPING FEES FOR THE CITY OF HOLLIDAY; PROVIDING A PROCEDURE FOR COLLECTION OF ACCOUNTS FROM USERS OF CITY WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS; PROVIDING FOR THE OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE CITY WATER, SEWER AND DISPOSAL SYSTEMS; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ORDINANCES, RESOLUTIONS AND ORDERS IN CONFLICT, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY," WHICH ORDINANCE WAS PASSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOLLIDAY, TEXAS, ON AUGUST 24, 1976, AND RECORDED IN THE ORDINANCE BOOK OF THE CITY OF HOLLIDAY, IS HEREBY AMENDED IN SECTION 1 SUBPARA A. 1. THERE OF SO THAT SAID SECTION SUBPARA SHALL HEREAFTER READ AS FOLLOWS:

"A. WATER RATES  
1. CITY RESIDENCE, \$8.50 FOR THE FIRST 2,000 gallons; \$9.50 FOR EACH ADDITIONAL 1,000 gallons."

research firm indicated an additional doctor was necessary to accommodate the citizens of Archer County. Currently, there are two doctors working in Archer City.

One stipulation given by McCord drew lengthy discussion by council members. The doctor, McCord said, would work in Holliday, but would have to reside in Archer City.

McCord and Williams both said it would be more beneficial to the doctor and his patients. "He could make his rounds at the hospital in the mornings, travel to Holliday for work, then return to Archer City to make his evening rounds before going home," McCord said. In addition, the doctor would be more readily available in case of an emergency.

But some councilmen disagreed, as did mayor James Cook. "I would really like to see a doctor working in Holliday, but also living in Holliday," Cook said.

McCord said the doctor would be furnished an office to work out of, some supplies and staff, including a nurse and receptionist. "I think it would be beneficial to the doctor if he hired local people for his staff," said McCord.

State representative Charles Finnell has given his verbal okay for the use of his home office, located on Main between Holli-Tex Supply and Newman's Feed, but other locations are also being considered.

McCord and Williams asked that the council support the hospital board, and enlist help within the community to inform the citizens of the board's plans. If the community

McCord said two physicians were already being considered for the position, including an internist from Albany, N.Y., and another internist who is currently working at Hermann Hospital in Houston.

#### OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, council reviewed salaries in executive session, discussed the notice of a "prehearing conference letter" regarding the quality of service fines levied against General Telephone Company, and discussed a letter of notification from Wichita Falls city manager Stu Bach concerning an upcoming increase in the price of water purchased from the city.

After meeting in closed session for nearly an hour, council returned to open session to extend salary increases to four city workers.

Water superintendent Morganna Thorn was given a \$150-per-month raise retroactive Nov. 6, the end of her six-month probation period.

Merit increases were extended to John Soho and Tony Fernandez at 50-cents per hour.

Animal control warden Allen Monroe was also given a 50-cent per hour raise.

Mayor Cook read a letter from the city manager of Wichita Falls addressed to the late Tom Hall, inviting interested parties to a water rate increase hearing which was to be held yesterday afternoon.

Cook explained that the city has a 40-year contract with Wichita Falls, which in itself is different from other contracts Wichita Falls has with neighboring communities. In addi-

ALL YOU EVER WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT ASTIGMATISM

Patients frequently ask me just what is far or nearsightedness but they seldom ask me what astigmatism is. Briefly, an astigmatic eye is one where the eye instead of being round or spherical in shape, optically speaking, is shaped more like a spoon or an egg or a football. The result of this lack of roundness is that the eye, no matter how hard it tries, can not focus its image sharply so objects tend to be distorted or elongated in one direction, e.g., a circle will look more like an ellipse or a square will look like a rectangle. It has been theorized that the great artist, El Greco, had astigmatism which is why his figures looked long and skinny.

Not being able to see things clearly but constantly trying to do so is what makes a victim of this condition more prone to eyestrain than his [merely] far or nearsighted cousins. The "cure" is to simply have glasses prescribed that neutralize the astigmatism.

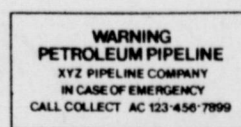

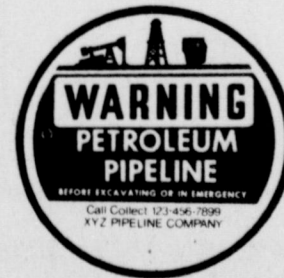

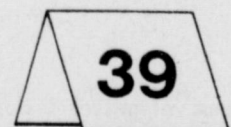

When you see signs like those shown above, they tell you that there's a pipeline nearby. If it's underground, you can't see it, of course. But it's there, working quietly to provide energy for you and other consumers throughout this nation.

Some of these signs list the commodity transported in the pipeline, the name of the operator, and a telephone number where the operator's representative can be reached at all times.

- Although pipelines have an exceptionally good safety record, once in a while a leak can occur. Indications of a leak might include:
- A strange or unusual odor in the vicinity of a pipeline.
- A hissing or roaring sound (caused by petroleum or product escaping from a pipeline).
- A dense white cloud or fog.
- A spot of dead or discolored vegetation.
- An accumulation of petroleum

- Avoid creating sparks or sources of heat which could cause the liquids or vapor to ignite and burn. If you find yourself in a suspected vapor area, do not light a match, start an engine or even switch on an electric light.
- Notify the pipeline operator as soon as you reach a safe area. Call collect. Give your name, a description of the leak and its location. If you do not know who the pipeline operator is, call your local fire, police or sheriff's department, or the state police. Advise them of the nature and location of the emergency. If you see someone digging near a pipeline or doing other construction work... or if you plan to do such work near a pipeline yourself... please call the telephone number shown on the sign and let the pipeline company know so damage can be avoided. It's in your interest... and the nation's.
