Christmas parade set here Saturday

The annual Christmas parade through the downtown business district, sponsored by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, will get underway at 1 p.m. Saturday. Preceding the parade, the Iowa

Park MuleSkinners will be serving chili and beans to the gathering crowd.

The parade will feature both the Iowa Park High School and Junior High marching bands, floats, and a

large delegation from Sheppard AFB, including the drill team, bugle corps, and color guard displaying flags of all 50 states.

Also entered in the parade will be former parade prize winners, the

Boomtown Babes of Burkburnett, pageant winners, Maskat train, numerous car clubs including antique automobiles, and the Roadrunners Motorcycle Club.

But the major feature to the youngsters will be the appearance of Santa Claus, who will ride on a fire truck. When the parade disbands, Santa will receive visitors in the H&R Block office, in the shopping center between Video Care and Lone Star Gas Co.

The parade will form at the junior high, wind its way through the business district, and disband when it

reaches the shopping center.

Police investigating recent rash of thefts

County pecan show slated this weekend

The Wichita County Pecan Show is scheduled tomorrow and Saturday at Sikes Senter Mall in Wichita Falls, with judging of the pecan entries at 10:30 a.m., Friday. Show judges include Dr. Sammy Helmers, Extension Horticulturist; Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist; and Ortha Sober, superintendent of the Montague Experiment Station.

Highlights of the show will include cracking pecans for the public for 15 cents a pound. Cracking will begin at 1:30 p.m. on Friday and continue throughout the show. The pecan pie

contest is 6 p.m., Friday, to be followed by the pecan queen pageant at 7 p.m.

Pecan pie entries should be brought to the area near Penny's Court between 5 and 6 p.m. Friday in disposable containers. Special awards will be given to the grand and reserve champion pies. The top three pies will be awarded cash prizes and will be sold at auction. The auctioneer for the pie auction will be Troy Gilbert of Electra.

Prank could have been disaster

A Saturday night prank caused considerable damage and almost disaster at the Texaco Service Station at Pacific and Expressway.

An automobile containing four or five Mexican males pulled up to the

pumps for gasoline during the early evening. After filling the tank, one of the men took \$8 to pay the attendant, John Sitgreaves.

The attendant explained that the pump registered half price, and \$8 more was owed. The man returned to the car, got more money, and paid Sitgreaves.

As the man was returning to the car, Sitgreaves said the driver acted like he was going to drive away and leave the man stranded afoot in the driveway.

The driver apparently didn't know that the nozzle was still in the car's tank spout. And when he jerked away, the entire pump was torn away from its mounting, some gasoline spilled onto the driveway, and a spark ignited flames.

Apparently panicking, the driver drove away, heading west on the

one-way access road. He drove onto the exit ramp and turned back east on the expressway, stopping long enough to pick up the man who had run up the road's berm. The car sped away toward Wichita Falls.

The gasoline pump did not become dislodged from the automobile until it had cleared the station driveway and was on the access road.

Because the pump is designed for an emergency valve to the storage tank to close when such an emergency exists, very little gasoline was spilled onto the driveway.

The blaze was snuffed out by a volunteer fireman who arrived in his private vehicle and used a small hand extinguisher.

Sitgreaves was able to give a description of the vehicle, but only the first three letters of the license plate to police.

Clayton, Nugent, White to attend Finnell fete

Speaker of the House Bill Clayton and Jim Nugent, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission will join Attorney General Mark White at the Finnell Fish Fry in Holliday Dec. 10, according to committee treasurer Don Talley.

"It is indeed an honor to have elected officials of this stature recognizing this district and the caliber of our representative, Charles Finnell," Talley said.

The fish fry is scheduled for 7 p.m. in the high school cafeteria. Tickets are \$15.

Clayton is completing his fourth term as Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. He is expected to announce his candidacy today for land commissioner.

Nugent, a longtime member of the house, has been railroad commissioner since 1979.

White is completing his first term as attorney general, but has been active in state government since the early 1970's. "These three distinguished public officials have worked with Charles for more than a decade,"

said Talley. "They know the kind of quality representation he has provided 14 years."

Rep. Finnell is garnering his support for the upcoming May primaries and November general election in hopes of representing the newly-created 80th District, consisting of Archer, Baylor, Clay, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Montague, Wichita and Wilbarger counties.

Trustees to consider campus alarm system

School trustees will consider proposals to install burglar alarm systems on some of the campuses, when they meet at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

Because of frequent break-ins, in which heavy losses of food and vandalism have been experienced, especially at Bradford Elementary, Supt. Harold Cowley will have proposals to wire the buildings.

Bids will also be considered for re-roofing the new gymnasium at the high school. Because of poor construction, causing leaking, trustees will consider a new roof on the structure.

Also to be considered will be an

agreement between the school and city concerning tax work. Since Bill Steger is no longer assessing property, because of the newly-formed county tax appraisal district, trustees will ask if the city still wants Steger to handle mailings and collections.

Richard Davis, student job placement officer, will give two reports during the meeting. He will give a follow-up report on former students and propose for the second year adult vocational courses which were so popular last year.

Cowley said the annual audit report might possibly be ready for presentation.

Jimmy Howell will be recognized at this show for having the champion native at the regional show last year. He will be presented a plaque by the Texas Pecan Growers. The awards program for the champion winners of the pecan show will be held as part of the queen pageant.

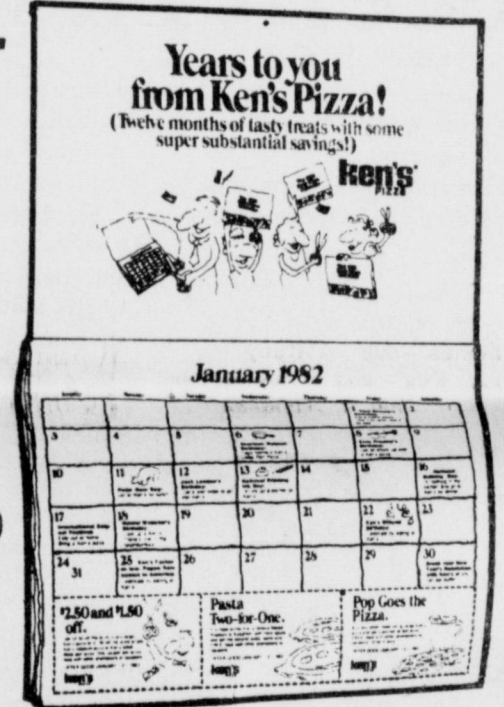
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Daymude, Cluley wedding held Saturday evening

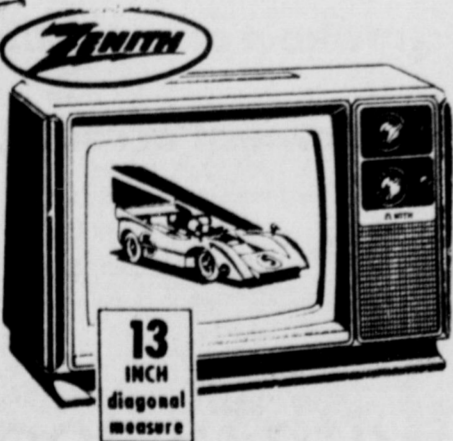
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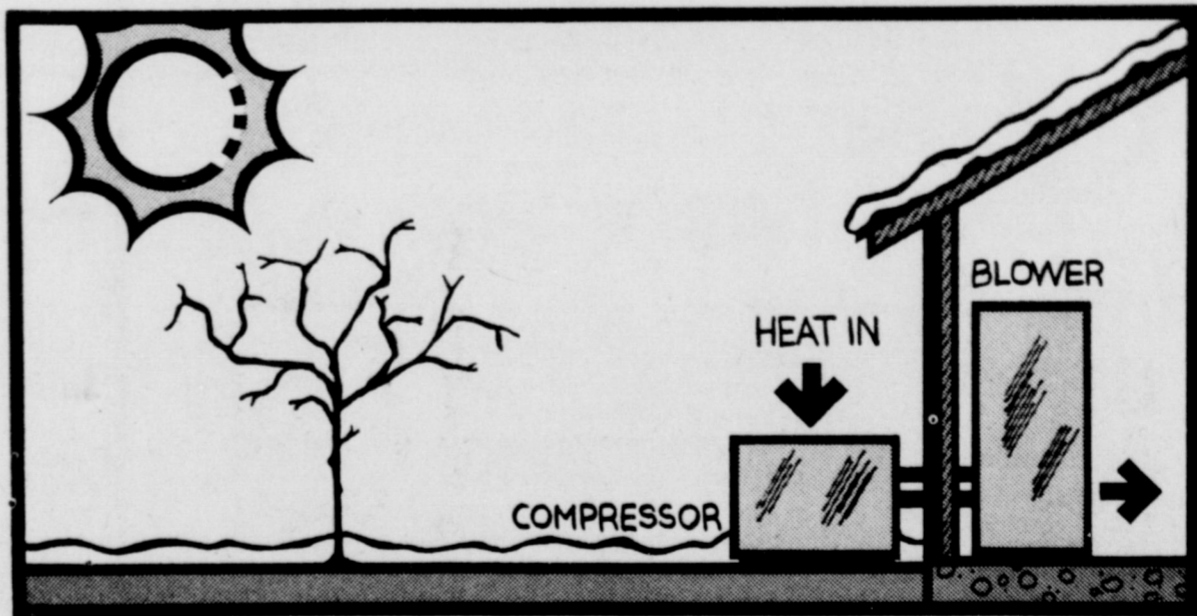
