70-House Area Slated at Clyde

Plans have been announced for a \$700,000 housing development on the south edge of the Clyde city limits.

Developers are Lynn Lee and C. E. Bentley Jr. of Abilene. The B. and L. Development has been formed to build the project.

The 70-house project will include three - bedroom houses with 1 1-2 to 2 baths in the \$8,000 to \$11,000 price range, Lee said.

An FFA approved subdivision, houses will be built on a 20-acre section of property acquired two months ago from the Bryant Estate.

Lots also will be offered to other builders. There will be 25 lots on the east side of the property in a heavily wooded area available for development of more expensive houses ranging up to \$30,000.

Lee said the first house should be completed in 60 days for showing to the public.

Engineering work on the property now is going on. Abilene Ditching Co. of Abilene, which has been awarded contract for sewer and water facilities, is expected to start work this week.

The area will be paved and will have city sewer and water and street signs. Houses will be of wood frame and veneer construction.

It is located in an area bounded on the west side by F-M 604, on the east by F-M 18, on the north side by the Clyde city limits, and on the south by open country.

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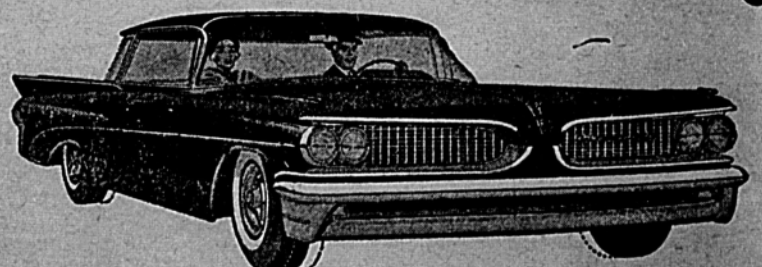
