



Another one of our favorite sophs is engaged. Congratulations, Mona Ruth.



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

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

It is interesting also that the Greeks developed and used about that time a bronze fish hook almost identical to the ones in use
today. It would seem then that the modern fly is but a development and refinement of an ancient achievement.

price paid for some materials the average fly can be tied for a few cents and only the iabor cost is responsible for the price of the finished product. To those who might take up the nobe art of fly tying. I give fair warning. Fly tying is like fishing itself. Once an angler gets the "bug" it is something he has diffi-


