

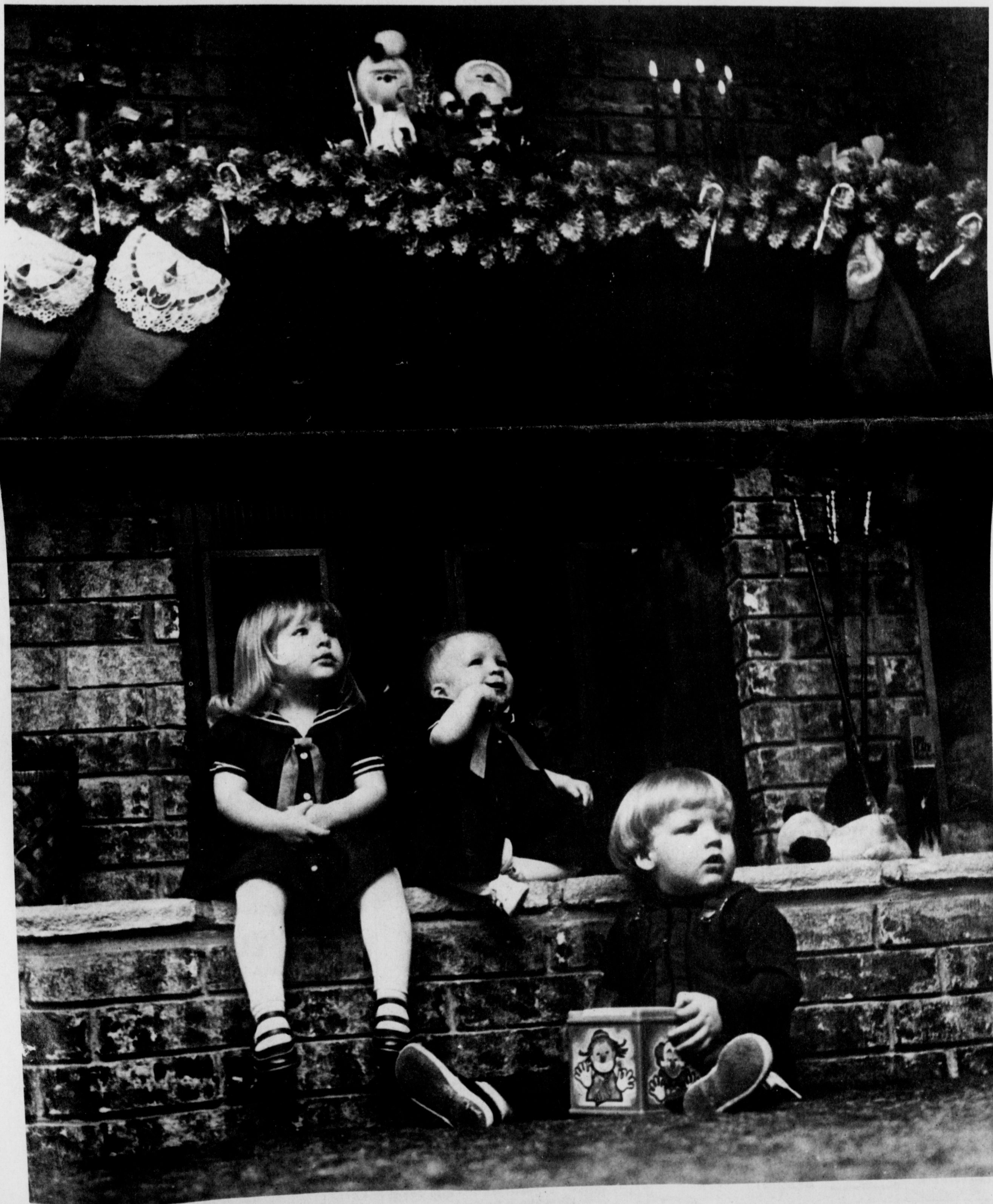

Robison, Hallford vows are exchanged in Virginia

Red and green, the traditional Christmas colors, were highlighted in decorations for the nuptial setting and reception following the wedding ceremony performed Saturday in which Miss Linda Lee Robison and Lt. Charles Wayne Hallford plighted their troth.

Dr. Dwight Christenbury officiated the double-ring service in the First Presbyterian Church in Virginia Beach Va. During the exchange of rings, the bride was given two solid gold bands and the groom a single wide gold band.

Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Arley Robison of Virginia Beach, Va., Mrs. Richard Wolfe of Archer City and Charles O. Hallford of Wichita Falls.

The altar decorations featured three full red poinsettias flanked by seven-branched candelabra trimmed with Christmas greens and red satin bows. A towering Christmas tree and wall scones accented with greenery and burning candles lent impressive interest in the outer altar. Pews were marked with seasonal greenery and red satin bows.

The vocal wedding music by Miss Diane Borgesser, cousin of the bride, reflected the joy and peace of the season. For prelude selections, she sang "Silent Night," "Angels We Have Heard On High," and then "O Holy Night" while mothers of the couple were ushered and seated.

David Kunkel, church organist, presented a concert of classical pre-nuptial music which included "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring," "Canon in D," "Pastorale," "Wake, Wake the Night Is Flying." He played "Trumpet Voluntary" for the bridal attendants to enter the nuptial space, Wagner's processional composition for the bride to walk to the altar. For the recessional, the organist played "Trumpet Tune" and "Theme from Masterpiece Theater."

The bride was presented in marriage by her father. She wore an exquisite formal ivory satin gown embellished with reemboirdered Alencon lace and English net. The chic corselet bodice of the lace was designed with an off-the-shoulders sweetheart neckline embroidered with Brussels lace, and adorned with tiny seed pearls. The beauty of the gown was enhanced with a full ruffled overskirt of English net showered with pearly Alencon lace appliques and a scalloped hemline of Brussels embroidery that extended around the chapel length train.

Her complementary headpiece was a wreath of silk-faced satin rosebuds on a pearl stamen interwoven with satin ribbons that fell in streamers to which a chapel length illusion veil was

Jessica Beauchaine, the flower girl, wore a long-sleeved frock with white lace trim on the bodice, collar and sleeves.

The groom and father of the bride wore black tuxedos with tails, black vests and ties. The best man, groomsmen and father of the groom wore black tuxedos without tails.

1st Lt. Steven B. Poteet of Oceanside, Calif. served as best man. Groomsmen and ushers were Lt. Duane Beauchaine, Lt. Mark A. Harris, David R. Hanby, all of Virginia Beach, and Capt. David Sterling Noble of Newport, N.C.

The bride's mother chose an Irish lace taffeta gown designed with a fitted bodice and spaghetti straps covered with a nylon sheer jacket accented with a shirred jeweled neckline and pleated taffeta cummer

bund. The full skirt swooped to floor length. She wore a hair comb of cream roses.

The groom's mother was attired in a rose suede polyester gown graced with a crystal pleated flowered chiffon cape. She wore a large white orchid on her shoulder for a finishing touch.
