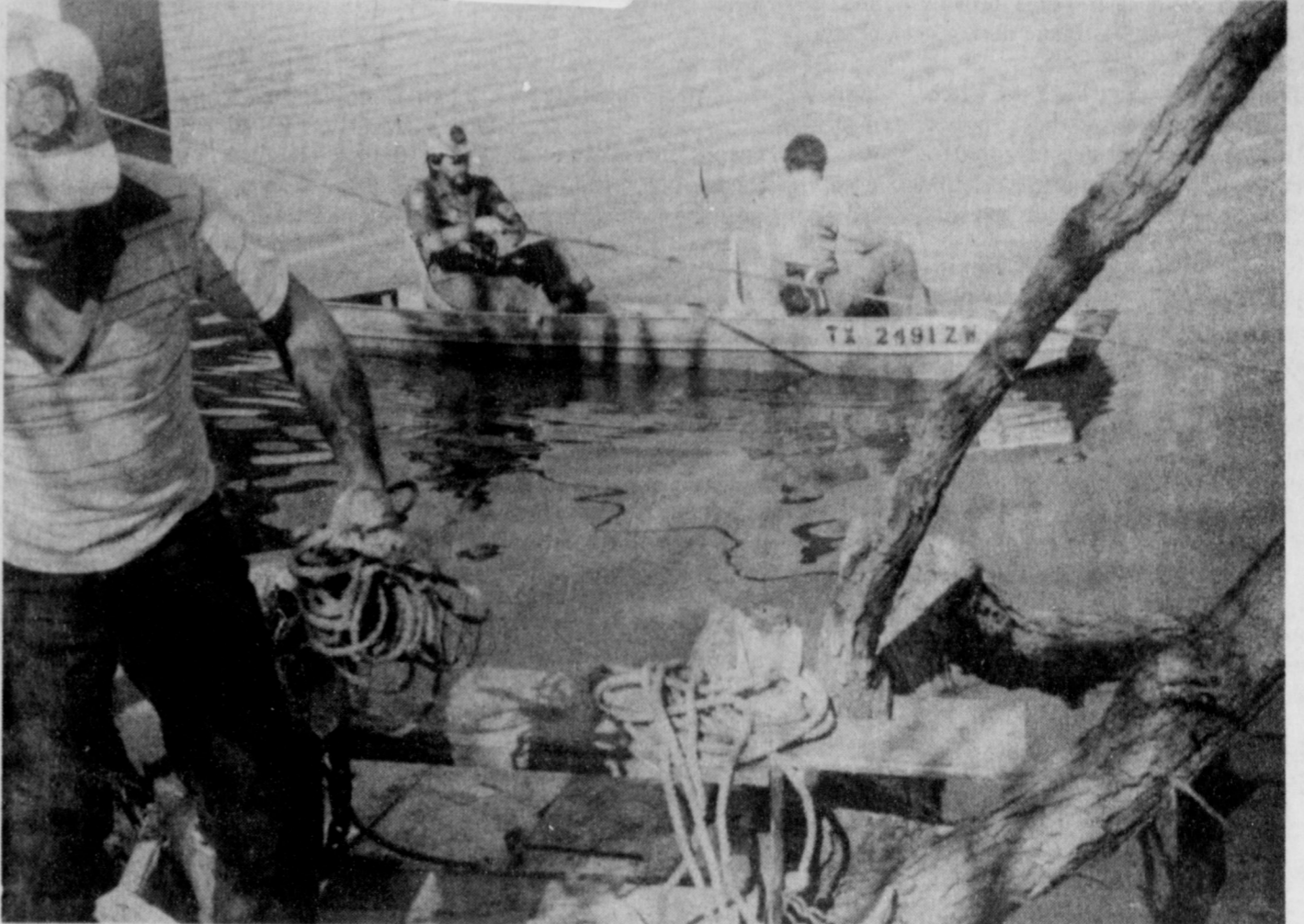

Council delays action on new tax exemption

City aldermen Monday night delayed taking any action on its option to allow a tax exemption on inventories of local manufacturers. A newly-passed state constitution permits political entities to exempt products from taxes which are to be shipped out of state within a prescribed period of time. The entities must act on the exemption by Jan. 1, or it will automatically go into effect and can never be repealed, according to the law. However, it was explained, the entities can deny the exemption, and at a later date, if they desire, permit it. Loss of several thousands of tax dollars in revenue is the cause for the city's delay, as it also was for the school board which met earlier this month. Both bodies of leaders said they wanted to take a longer look at the potential losses and the effects on their budgets. Both will have at least one more meeting before the end of the year.

Primary loss to both the city and school would be on the inventories of products produced at Cryovac. Eventhough the plant is not actually in the city limits, the firm has had a contract with the city to pay a percentage of what its actual taxes would be if it were in the city, in return for in-city water rates. City Administrator James Barrington said the loss to the city, just for Cryovac's part, would range from \$21,000 to \$37,000, which would be .025 to .04 on the tax rate. "The free port tax article, which many people believed to effect only coastal 'port' cities," Barrington told the council, "was designed to stimulate economic development." However, Barrington told him Allen Shewmake, local tax collector, had explained to him that the law affects every part of the state, not just those on the coast with ports. Mayor Tim Hunter proposed that a meeting be set up with Cryovac officials to "negotiate terms of the contract that would benefit both

parties." "If we adopt it," he continued, "it would benefit a few, but the other industries and individuals would have to pick up the (tax) slack." A meeting with officials from Cryovac is being sought, in time for the council's Dec. 4 meeting. Aldermen unanimously approved authorizing City Secretary Janice Newman to appoint local mortician Larry Dutton as the city's deputy registrar of births and deaths in Iowa Park. Dutton, owner of Dutton-Tanner-Aulds Funeral Home, had offered to take the responsibility as a service to residents, but council members had wanted to discuss the proposal. All municipalities were given the responsibility of naming a registrar after passage of a law by the state legislature in 1983, but not all communities have yet done that. Aldermen wanted to know if Dutton had the necessary storage for

Wichitan drowns in Lake Buffalo

A 30-year-old Wichita Falls man drowned Sunday morning while fishing alone at Lake Buffalo. Thaddeus Thomas was fishing in a small, flat-bottomed aluminum boat directly between the shore and the overflow flume, when the craft tilted, throwing him in the water. His problem was noticed by five different men fishing on the bank of the dam. They rushed to his assistance, and one extended a tree limb to within his reach. "But he just kept flapping his arms to the sides and never grabbed

for it," said one of the men. No one attempted to enter the water to rescue him. A call was made to the Wichita Falls Police Department, and later Iowa Park police radio dispatcher was notified and a call for emergency workers was sent out at 11:58 a.m., according to the police blotter. The men in the area said Thomas apparently was reaching for his life vest, in the bottom of the boat, when he noticed his craft was taking on water. That is apparently when he fell from the boat.

Either he was unable to swim -- he was about 20 feet from the dam -- or he was weighted down with clothing and unable to swim, authorities theorize. Using the victim's boat, Iowa Park firemen and Butch Shoop, state game warden, were able to retrieve the man's body, shortly after they arrived on the scene. Thomas, the father of two children, was an employee of CertainTeed. Funeral services are to be held at 11 a.m. Friday at the Morning Star Baptist Church in Wichita Falls.

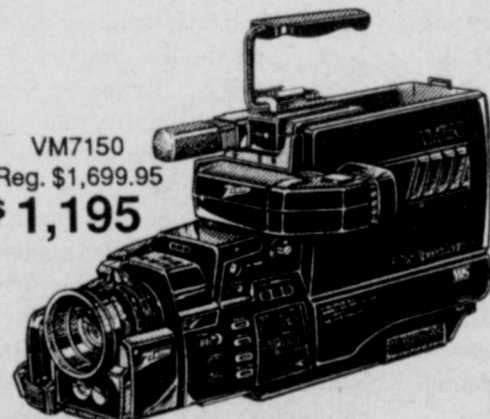

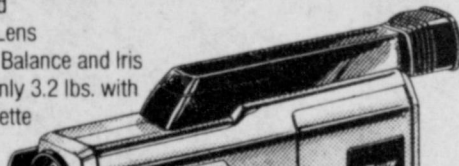

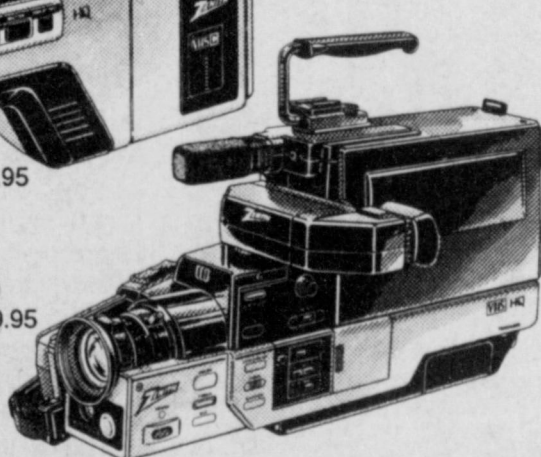

Japan is topic of Baptist women's meeting

Mrs. D.O. James introduced "Japan: the Challenge and the Promise," a Foreign Mission study book by Gene Hines, at a meeting last week of the Thelma Smith Baptist Women.

The meeting was held in the Fellowship Hall of First Baptist Church and the hostesses were Miss Helen Reed and Mrs. Roy Smith. Fourteen members attended.

"Beginning Again" was the title

of the first chapter Mrs. James' reviewed. It began in August 1949 when Japan was an orphan nation and the American occupation brought the missionaries back into the country. She said the beginning for first Southern Baptist missionaries in 1859 and for others who came later was fraught with many hardships and tribulations.

Continuing, she said the second beginning after World War II was not easy when they found so many churches and Christian schools destroyed, pastors and members killed, and found that Japanese culture and traditions stood in the way of evangelism. She described the work of several missionaries and Japanese during the last 40 years that has made a difference in a land where fewer than one percent of the people are Christians.

Mrs. V.I. Woodfin was in charge of business. Members made monetary offerings for the Volunteer Services at Wichita Falls State Hospital to help provide Christmas gifts for the patients there. Mrs. E.T. Patterson had charge of the missionary birthday prayer calendar.

The long refreshment table with its colorful turkey napkins was

headed with a small table which depicted Thanksgiving at the prettiest through a cornucopia spilling out an abundance of fruits, vegetables, nuts and small pumpkins onto the table. It was backgrounded by a tall, slender shock of grain ready for the harvest. The table decor was completed by miniature bales of hay, more small pumpkins and pilgrims.

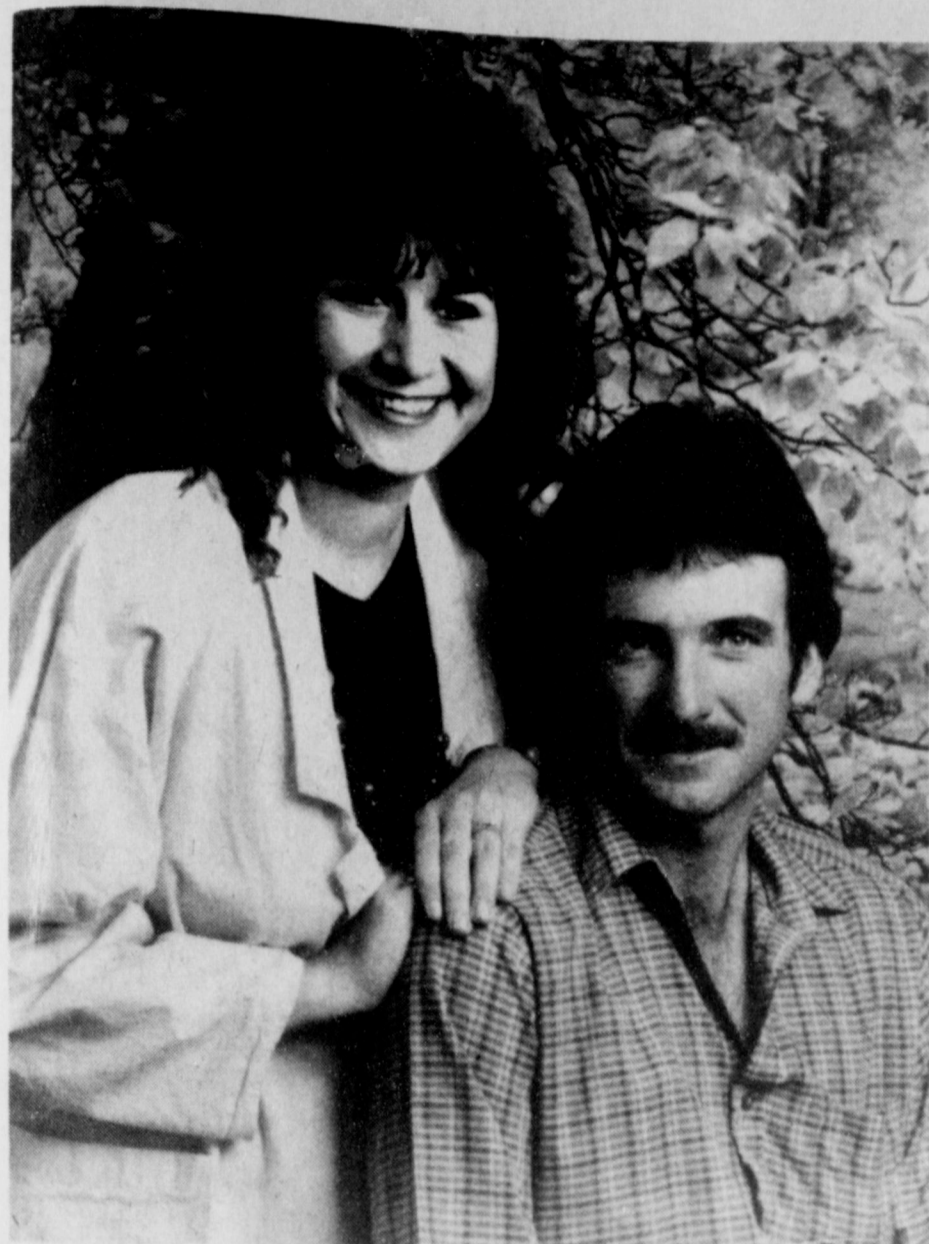



If you're looking for a hobby that is productive, extremely satisfying and, frankly, time-consuming, I've got a suggestion. How about joining the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department? Rarely in the history of this fine organization has there ever been any openings available. There usually has been a waiting list. But, because of long-service members retiring, some movings, a few giving up the activity, and very little publicity of openings, the local group is just about short-handed. Until recent years, most of the volunteer firemen here were business people. But the number of businesses and changes in their operations has about done away with that. Also, we are in a period when volunteering seems to appeal to only a few people, percentage-wise. Some firemen may take a dim view of my suggestion that being a non-paid fireman could be looked at as a hobby. But I think I can justify the term. Most of us take up some sort of activity or another that is not our vocation, primarily to have something to do in our expendable time. But we usually want a challenge, and we usually want to see something

useful produced from our efforts. Most hobbyists are dedicated to their chosen activities. That is what it takes to become a volunteer fireman. Dedication. Like any hobby, it can consume about as much time as you will allow it. As to satisfying, there can be no greater satisfaction than saving some one's home, or life. Volunteer firemen today are far from being amateurs. Eventhough regulations require regular training, the members undergo these sessions gladly, because they realize they can become more effective, and they can do the task with greater safety. Volunteer firemen have always been looked up to, and appreciated, by their neighbors. In the past, it was a badge of honor to be known as a member of a volunteer department. Our Chamber of Commerce just a few years ago, in appreciation for all their work and effort, recognized the entire department as the "Citizen of the Year," which is ordinarily a recognition for an individual.

There are other benefits not yet mentioned. Volunteer departments are, in effect, a fraternity. The members and their families are generally the closest of friends. And why not? Each member's life can be in the hands of his fellow members. And though it's not much, there's a retirement fund for those who serve a required number of years. It's not much, but I'm told it helps and is appreciated by those who do retire. Members are needed not only in Iowa Park's department, but about all of those in the area, I suppose. I noticed in a recent article in the Decatur newspaper that virtually every department in Wise County was needing more personnel. If you're under 50 years of age, and in generally good physical health, and looking for an activity, fill out the form on this page and send it in. It could be the most satisfying thing you ever did. the documents. He said he did, and added that all such records continue to be recorded at the county clerk's office, as well as in Austin. Three other proposals also were approved by the council. One was the purchase of a night vision device for the police department, costing less than \$5,000. Another was approval of a project to add a floating ramp and installation of lights at Lake Iowa Park, in the area where the boat ramp and parking lot were installed last summer. Three-fourths of the cost is paid state and the balance by the city, it was explained. The city's share of the additional work is \$825, Barrington told the council. Funds were authorized for travel to a meeting in San Antonio of the Texas City Managers Association.

Marsha said she has several recipes that belonged to her grandmother. A particular family favorite when she was growing up was a cookie recipe called "Nannie's Cookies." After her grandmother passed away, they couldn't find the recipe, and although they tried, they couldn't come up with a cookie that tasted the same.

When Marsha and her sister decided to put a cookbook together, they were going through some recipes, and tucked in the pages of a cookbook printed in 1954, was their grandmother's cookie recipe. It is included in the recipes that Marsha is sharing with us this week.

CHOCOLATE SHEATH CAKE

2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1 stick oleo
1/2 cup Crisco
4 Tbsp. cocoa
1 cup water
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs (slightly beaten)
1 tsp. cinnamon

Mix sugar and flour in large bowl. In medium sauce pan, bring oleo, Crisco, cocoa and water to a boil. Pour over sugar and flour and mix well. Add buttermilk, soda, vanilla, eggs and beat. Pour batter into greased and floured 11x16" pan and bake 20 minutes at 400 degrees.

ICING

Five minutes before cake is done start icing.
1 stick oleo
4 Tbsp. cocoa
1/3 cup milk
1 box powdered sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup pecans

Mix oleo, cocoa and milk in saucepan and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and add powdered sugar. Beat until well mixed; add vanilla and pecans, and pour over hot cake.

NANNIE'S COOKIES

3 cups flour
1/2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. soda
1 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup white sugar
2 eggs
1 t. vanilla

Sift flour, baking powder, salt and soda together. Cream butter, sugars, eggs and vanilla together. Combine with flour mixture and mix thoroughly. Shape into a roll and wrap in wax paper. Chill. Slice and bake at 375 degrees until brown on top.

BROCCOLI-RICE CASSEROLE

1 cup celery, chopped
1/2 cup onion, chopped
2 Tbsp. oleo
1 pkg. frozen broccoli, chopped
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 (8 oz.) jar Cheez Whiz
1 cup cooked rice
Paprika

Saute celery and onion in oleo. Cook and drain broccoli. Combine soups and Cheez Whiz; heat until blended. Combine onion and celery mixture, soups, broccoli and rice. Pour into 8X11-inch casserole. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 375° 10 minutes or until brown.

BANANA NUT BREAD

1/2 cup chortening
1 1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
2 cups flour
1 tsp soda
Pinch salt
3 ripe bananas
1 cup nuts
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Mix together well. Bake one hour at 325° in a well-greased pan.



MEXICAN DISH

Brown:
2 Lbs. hamburger meat
Add:
1 can taco sauce
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can chopped green chiles
Soup can full of milk
Corn tortillas
Grated cheese

Mix together, then layer meat mixture and tortillas in a large, greased baking dish. Bake one hour at 325 degrees. While still hot, top with grated cheese. Makes a lot.

HOT ROLLS

1 yeast cake
2 tsp. salt
2 cups lukewarm water
1 egg well beaten
6 Tbsp. sugar
2 Tbsp. melted shortening
6 1/2 cups flour

Soften yeast in lukewarm water for five minutes. Add salt, sugar, egg and shortening. Mix well. Add flour a little at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Knead on lightly floured board until dough is smooth and elastic. Cover dough with a warm damp cloth. Set in moderately warm place and allow to stand two hours. Form into rolls. Bake at 425 degrees until brown.

BREAD PUDDING

1 quart milk
3 eggs (beat together)
1/2 cup sugar
Pinch salt
2 cups bread crumbs (broken in small pieces)

1 tsp. vanilla
2 Tbsp. butter
Scald milk. Add bread crumbs. Let cool. Add other ingredients. Bake 1 1/4 hour at 225 degrees. Set bowl in pan w/water. Top with a dab of tart jelly when served.

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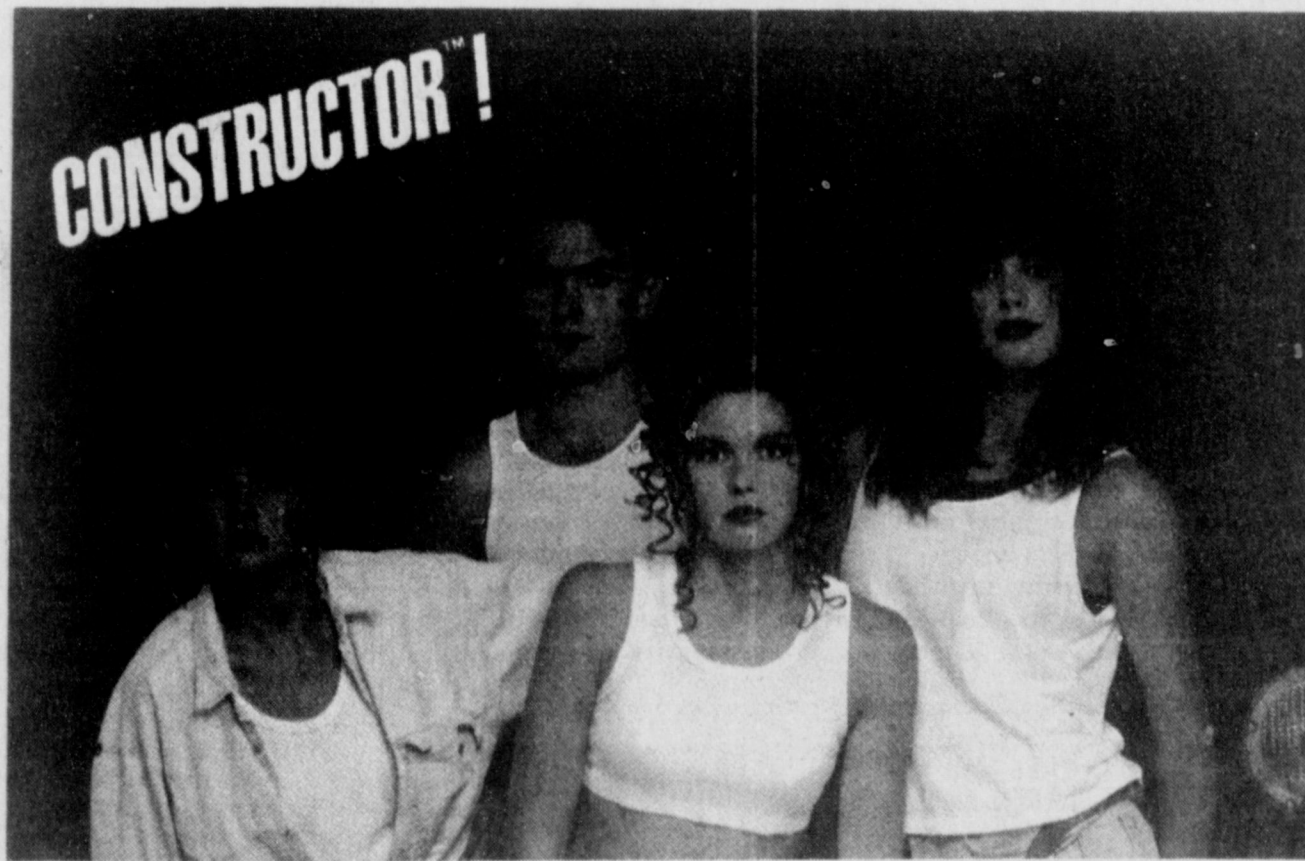
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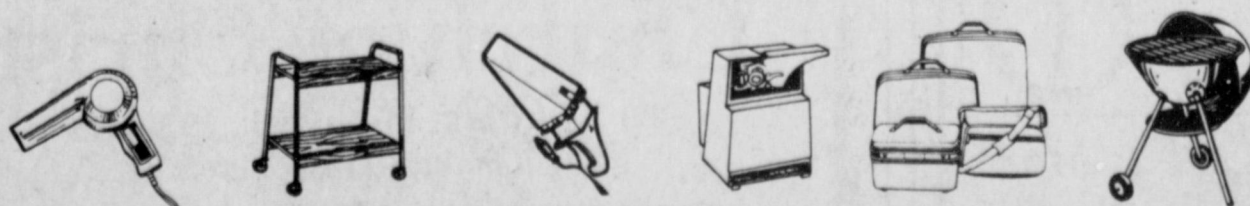
