

Wichitan drowns in Lake Buffalo

A 30-year-old Wichita Falls man drowned Sunday morning while fishing alone at Lake Buffalo.

Thaddeus Thomas was fishing in a small, flat-bottomed aluminum boat directly between the shore and the overflow flume, when the craft tilted, throwing him in the water.

His problem was noticed by five the dam. They rushed to his assistance, and one extended a tree limb to for it," said one of the men. No one attempted to enter the water to rescue him.

Council delays action on new tax exemption

City aldermen Monday night delayed taking any action on its option to allow a tax exemption on inventories of local manufacturers.

A newly-passed state constitution permits political entities to exempt products from taxes which are to be shipped out of state within a prescribed period of time.

The entities must act on the exemption by Jan. 1, or it will automatically go into effect and can never be repealed, according to the law.

However, it was explained, the entities can deny the exemption, and at a later date, if they desire, permit

Loss of several thousands of tax dollars in revenue is the cause for the city's delay, as it also was for the school board which met earlier this month.

Both bodies of leaders said they wanted to take a longer look at the potential losses and the effects on their budgets. Both will have at least one more meeting before the end of the year.

Primary loss to both the city and school would be on the inventories of products produced at Cryovac.

Eventhough the plant is not actually in the city limits, the firm has had a contract with the city to pay a percentage of what its actual taxes would be if it were in the city, in return for in-city water rates.

City Administrator James Barrington said the loss to the city, just for Cryovac's part, would range from \$21,000 to \$37,000, which would be .025 to .04 on the tax rate.

"The free port tax article, which many people believed to effect only coastal 'port' cities," Barrington told the council, "was designed to stimulate economic development."

However, Barrington told him Allen Shewmake, local tax collector, had explained to him that the law affects every part of the state, not just those on the coast with ports. Mayor Tim Hunter proposed that

a meeting be set up with Cryovac officials to "negotiate terms of the contract that would benefit both

"If we adopt it," he continued, "it would benefit a few, but the other industries and individuals would have to pick up the (tax) slack."

A meeting with officials from Cryovac is being sought, in time for the council's Dec. 4 meeting.

Aldermen unanimously approved authorizing City Secretary Janice Newman to appoint local mortician Larry Dutton as the city's deputy registrar of births and deaths in Iowa Park.

Dutton, owner of Dutton-Tanner-Aulds Funeral Home, had offered to take the responsibility as a service to residents, but council members had wanted to discuss the proposal.

All municipalities were given the responsiblity of naming a registrar after passage of a law by the state legislature in 1983, but not all comnunities have yet done that.

Aldermen wanted to know if Dutton had the necessary storage for



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
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

Right now, Marsha is painting sweat shirts, and every December she and her sister, who owns an arts and crafts shop in Crowell, get together and make Christmas gifts.


Marsha grew up on a farm near Vernon. She is a graduate of Vernon High School and has taken computer courses at Vernon Regional Junior College.






