Hamilton named chief

Iowa Park Police Department has a new chief, Billy Hamilton, but his appointment by the city council Monday night was not without opposition and surprise.

Council members began an executive session at 6 p.m., an hour before the regular meeting was to begin. The closed meeting, which was listed on the agenda, lasted until 7:36, which left more than 30 people standing outside who wanted to attend the meeting.

During the executive session, five of six applicants for the position were interviewed, and four of those were members of the local force.

Besides Hamilton, Robert Dean, Pat Hannah and Roy Messick was James Johnson of Wichita Falls, who reportedly is a veteran of 20 years with the Department of Public Safety.

The sixth applicant, Kenneth York of Oklaunion, could not be contacted for the interview, it was explained.

When the meeting was opened to the public, Mayor Charlie Lee explained that the majority of the council had expressed two weeks earlier a desire to name the new chief as soon as possible.

Lee said he would like to wait, until response from some state-wide advertisements could be received. However, he said he would act on the wishes of the majority of the council, though he did not name those in the

majority.

Prior to opening the floor for nominations, Lee further explained that the mayor could not vote or make motions, but he wanted to express his recommendation that Dean be hired as chief.

Dean, who has been on the force longer than anyone else in the department, has been the number two ranking officer under former chief Charlie Whittingstall, and has served as temporary chief since Whittingstall's retirement some three weeks ago.

Alderman George Hammonds was the first recognized when the floor was opened to motions, and he nominated Dean. His motion died for lack of a second, however.

Hammonds then moved that the naming of a chief be tabled for further consideration, and alderman Johnny

Coker seconded it. But their two votes were out-weighted by nay votes cast by aldermen Bill Gilmore, Bud Thompson and Herman Mahler.

Gilmore then nominated Hamilton, and Thompson seconded the nomination.

Gilmore, Thompson and Mahler voted for the nomination, Hammonds against it and Coker abstained.

At that time, Dean, who was in the audience, asked for another executive session "to give information on Hamilton" and said he wanted him (Hamilton) present for it. The mayor said he would call the session, but at the end of the meeting.

Prior to the second executive session, Hammonds asked Lee to veto the vote for chief. Lee responded by saying that the majority of elected officials had voted on the issue and he did not feel he should take any veto

action. No change was registered after the second closed meeting.

HAMILTON IS CHIEF

The new chief, whose nickname is "Sparky", has been on the force since February of 1979. He has served as sergeant about a year. Prior to joining the local force, he was 3 1/2 years on the Vernon police force, three years in the Central Intelligence Agency and five years on a county sheriff's posse.

The 52-year-old Hamilton is a veteran of 21 years military service, holds an associate degree in criminal justice and expects to complete his bachelor's degree in criminal science within a year.

Born and raised in the Vernon area, Hamilton lives at 909 Foley. He has three children, ranging in age from 17 to 25; two are boys and one girl.

Paving, water towers, library get action

With every seat in council chambers filled and 19 persons standing or sitting around the walls, Iowa Park aldermen signaled a go-ahead to seek bids to pave the 500 block of West Coleman, authorize additional work on water towers and approved an architecture firm for the renovation of the new library building.

Bids will be sought to pave one of the last remaining major residential streets, at an estimated total cost of \$28,072. Property owners of the block, if bids are accepted, are to pay for the cost of curb and guttering as well as the paving materials. Cost of the paving labor will be paid by the city, which will finance the project for the property owners over a five-year payout, at eight-percent interest.

Agreement by leaders of Missionary Baptist Church to participate in the paving project was also a signal that construction with required inspections could resume. The church owns the entire block north of Coleman and is building a new structure there. The building permit had been suspended until paving was approved.

Inadequate inspection of the three city overhead water tanks failed to recommend all the work which is needed to be done, according to Kerry Maroney, city engineer. An

adjustment in materials to be used will finance most of the increased costs, he said.

The interior of towers at Lake Gordon and at the city hall will require work not indicated in the preliminary inspection report. Maroney said the interior, below the water levels, was bare metal and would require surfacing. The city has approximately \$10,000 remaining for the project which could fund the work, city administrator told the council.

Approval of an architecture firm to draft plans and specifications for renovation of the Burnett home for a new library was needed both for the work to be done and for soliciting funds from foundations, Mayor Charlie Lee told the council.

Don Daugherty of Killebrew-Rucker Associates in Wichita Falls, has been working with the library board and knew the needs and the structure. He met with the council Monday, explaining his fees and the work which would be provided. The firm was accepted to do the work.

To be determined by the city within the next two months is whether the city will act as its own contractor and hire work done or hire a general contractor.

Daugherty explained that he would have to know which path would be chosen before he completes his

work, because details for a general contractor would be more detailed. The highest fee which would be charged for the work would be 12 percent of the total cost, it was explained. It could be lower, depending on the work required of the firm.

Lee told the council that soliciting funds from foundations to help pay for the library required the plans of an architect. "Foundations want to know how much money is needed and some want to see the floor plans," he said.

In other business, the following actions were taken:

- * approved appointment of Mrs. Sam Hunter and H.J. Cannon to the parks board, and also to amend the ordinance permitting an unlimited number to serve on the board.

- * tabled a request by alderman Bill Gilmore to name the city council as the board of adjustments;

- * approved advertising for the purchase of a two-ton chassis-cab for a dump truck;

- * heard a report by Morath that a council-approved agreement had been reached for the purchase of land from Wichita Falls at a 12.35 percent increase instead of a 38.1 increase. The lower rate would be retroactive to Jan. 1 with interest, if the neighboring council approves the proposal;

- * authorized hiring a full-time maintainer operator for the street department;

- * heard a request through the mayor from railroad officials asking that at least two streets crossing the rails be closed and that the officials approach the council formally in the future on the subject;

- * instructed the city administrator to have on the next meeting agenda the topic of permitting handicapped individuals to drive on city lake dams to fish.

Gilmore pleads guilty in two separate courts

Iowa Parkan Bill Gilmore entered guilty pleas in two different courts, one in district court Friday and the other in federal court Monday.

He pled guilty to theft over \$200 and under \$10,000 before 89th District Judge Temple Driver in a case concerning some equipment owned by Petro-Lewis Corp. of Denver.

As result of plea bargaining, 10 indictments were reduced to one which was also reworded, and he pled guilty before U.S. District Judge Eldon Mahon.

Gilmore was given a five-year probated sentence and fined \$2,500 by Judge Driver.

He is to be sentenced by Judge Mahon at 1:30 p.m. July 19 on one count of mail fraud, aiding and abetting. Maximum penalty in the case is five years in prison and a fine of \$1,000.

The federal charge was also connected with Petro-Lewis. Gilmore was indicted for billing the firm for work not performed.

The original indictment charged that Gilmore and Raymond Eugene Key, area production superintendent

for Petro Lewis in Bowie, "devised and intended to devise a scheme and artifice to defraud and to obtain money. . . by means of false and fraudulent pretenses. . . from Petro-Lewis. . ."

The offenses were alleged to have begun in August 1980 and continued until January 1981.

Gilmore explained he was forced to comply with Key's demands and that all the money went to Key. In return, Key said he would allow Gilmore continue doing work for his firm.

Concerning the equipment Gilmore was accused of stealing, he said the equipment was delivered to his shop for repairs and a man which reportedly was authorized to return them took them after the repairs were completed.

Key is to be sentenced in court the same time as Gilmore, according to the court docket. He earlier entered a guilty plea.

NO EFFECT ON CITY POST

Numerous inquiries have been received by the city hall and the Iowa Park Leader, concerning the pleas of guilty by a city alderman and whether that position would be declared vacant by law.

According to the legal office of the Texas Municipal League, a convicted felon cannot seek election but conviction is not grounds for vacating the elected position, unless the felony is connected with the office.

The Texas election code states "No person shall be eligible to be a candidate for, or to be elected or appointed to, any public elective office in this state. . . (if he has) been convicted of a felony for which he has not been pardoned or had his full rights of citizenship restored by other official action. . ."

Gilmore, in a letter published on page four of this issue, has stated he will resign as alderman if the majority of citizens contacting him request it.

"I leave the final decision to the majority. If more people request my resignation than those who want me to stay, I'll abide by your wishes. Please indicate your opinion in writing."

He was last elected to the city council in April 1981 and will complete his term of office in April 1983.

Emergency food pantry being established here

The Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance has set up an emergency food pantry to help alleviate the needs of people in the area, as well as transients.

Composed of ministers from Christ the King Catholic, Assembly of God, First United Methodist, First Presbyterian, First Christian, Faith Baptist and First Baptist churches, the Alliance has established qualifications for those to receive food boxes.

Qualifications include: a family out of work and no unemployment check being received; a welfare family which has lost its check, either stolen or discontinued; a food stamp recipient waiting for the initial check to arrive; special referrals where a family is affected by death or illness; and special cases where everything has been lost by theft or was destroyed.

Baking to many cooks is a satisfying way of self expression as well as a relaxing pastime. The sights, pleasures and aromas of cakes, pies and cookies make for wonderful eating in any season of the year.

It is a lucky thing for Debbie (Mrs. Jimmy) Green that the members of her family like sweets because she confesses that her "first cooking love" is desserts, and her recipes today attest to that.

Each recipe calls for sugar, a product that is so easily obtained now that it is hard to realize that in the 18th century, sugar was such a rare and highly prized commodity that it was included in a list of jewels and precious gems and presented as a wedding gift to Maria Theresa, the future Queen of Hungary and Bohemia.

Hundreds of years before the birth of Christ, the people of India learned how to make sugar from sugar cane. Not until the time of the Crusades was sugar introduced by the Arabs into Europe. At first it was considered a rarity and was even used as a medicine.

HEAVENLY HASH CAKE

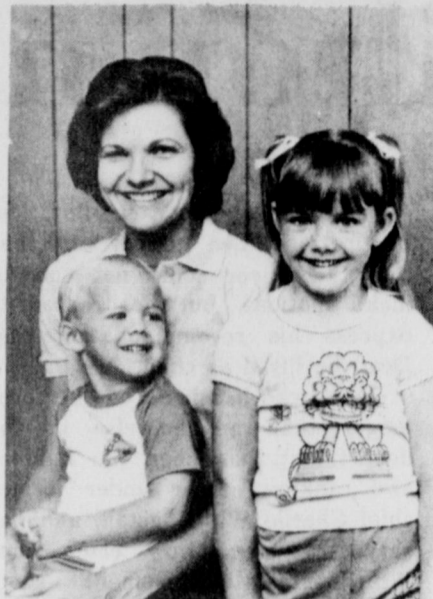
- 2 sticks margarine
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 large pkg. mini marshmallows
- 4 T cocoa
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 cup nuts
- Vanilla

Mix all ingredients together well except marshmallows. Pour into greased and floured baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. When done, cover cake with mini marshmallows and set in oven until marshmallows melt enough to look fluffy. Pour icing onto marshmallows and mix together.

ICING:

- 4 T cocoa
- 1 box powdered sugar
- Vanilla
- 1 stick margarine
- 4 T milk

Mix butter and cocoa; add sugar and milk alternately and mix until creamy.

CHESS CAKE

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 1 stick oleo
- 1 egg

Mix and press into 13x9 inch pan

FROSTING

- 1 box powdered sugar, sifted
- 1 8-oz. cream cheese
- 2 eggs
- 1 T vanilla

Mix well and pour onto cake mixture. Bake in 350 degree oven about 40 minutes.

COCONUT PIE

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 T flour
- 2 eggs separated
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 3/4 cup flaked coconut
- 3 T butter
- Pinch of salt

Mix flour and sugar; add well-beaten egg yolks, then add milk gradually. Cook over low heat until thick. Pour into cooked pie shell. Top with meringue made from egg whites beaten until they hold a peak, add 6 T sugar and beat until stiff. Cook in 325 degree oven until brown.

CEREAL COOKIES

- 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- Pinch salt
- 1 cup oatmeal
- 1 cup Rice Krispies
- 2 cups Corn Flakes
- 1 cup pecans

Mix shortening and sugar well. Add eggs, flour, baking powder and salt. Mix well; add cereals and pecans. Bake at 400 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes.

EASY COOKIES

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup Karo syrup
- Bring to boil
- Add:
- 1 cup crunchy peanut butter
- 2 cups corn flakes

Stir and let corn flakes melt, then blend and drop on wax paper

FUDGE COOKIES

- 3 cups minute oatmeal
- 1 cup chopped pecans or coconut
- 1 tsp. vanilla

In a large saucepan, bring to a rolling boil over medium heat:

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 stick margarine, sliced

Pour first mixture into second

mixture. Stir thoroughly, and drop by tps. onto wax paper. Cookies are ready to eat when cool.

'Operation Motorcide' set to begin Friday evening

The Department of Public Safety today estimated that as many as 47 persons could die in traffic accidents during this July 4th weekend unless drivers are exceptionally careful.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said the risk of traffic accidents will increase during the 78-hour holiday period as more drivers take to the streets and highways for the holiday.

"As in many weekend traffic accidents, alcohol, excessive speed, and failure to use seat belts are the

major contributing factors in the traffic deaths," he said.

DPS statistics show that 63 persons were killed during the last 4th of July holiday and 25 of those fatalities resulted from accidents in which driving while intoxicated was a factor.

"We know that drinking may have been involved in more of the traffic deaths, but since state law does not require blood alcohol samples from traffic victims, we are uncertain how

many more of the deaths may have involved drivers impaired by alcohol," Adams noted. "Additionally, 59 persons were seriously injured during the last holiday in traffic accidents."

The DPS director said additional troopers would be assigned to areas where heavy volumes of traffic are expected.

"Our troopers are working during this holiday period to assist travelers

and to watch closely for drivers who may have had too much to drink or who insist upon exceeding the speed limits," he said.

The DPS says many municipal police and county sheriffs' officers will also work local traffic safety programs during the holiday period.

The DPS Operation Motorcide counting period begins at 6 p.m. Friday and continues through midnight Monday.

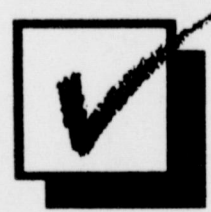

A checklist to help you save energy and money at home.

Energy Conservation Practices

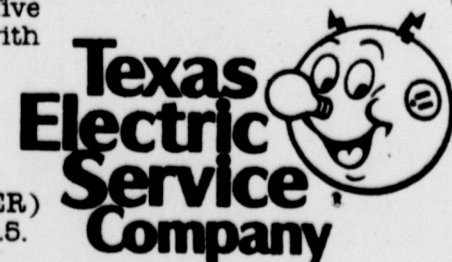
Electricity is costing more this summer mainly because the fuel to make it is costing more. The following low- or no-cost home conservation practices can help you save energy and money.

- Do not use air conditioner unless absolutely necessary.
- Keep your thermostat set no lower than 80° in the summer. Use ceiling or oscillating fans to circulate the air.
- Check your air conditioner filters each month to see if they need cleaning or changing. And make sure that the outside unit is free of grass, leaves and trash.
- When leaving home, turn off air conditioning. If away for two days or more, turn off water heater.
- If you have a dishwasher, set water heater to 140°; otherwise, set temperature to 120° or lower.
- Use scrap insulation to plug air leaks in attic, around fireplace dampers and window air conditioners.
- Repair water leaks in pipes and faucets, and seal air duct leaks.
- Use drapes, blinds, shades, awnings or plants to block sunlight.
- Try to minimize traffic through outside doors.
- Economize in the kitchen. Plan meals so several dishes can be cooked in the oven at the same time.
- Save when you do laundry. Wash and dry only full loads of clothes.

Energy Conservation Measures

These home installations and modifications require an investment, but may return their cost to you in the form of savings on utility bills.

- Caulk and weatherstrip around doors and windows to reduce air leaks.
- Add insulation to ceilings, walls and floors.
- Insulate ducts, especially in the attic.
- Insulate hot water pipes in attic.
- Install insulation blankets on water heaters, especially in garage or basement.
- Investigate cost-effectiveness of storm doors and windows.
- Add solar-reflecting materials to doors and windows on east/west exposures.
- Install a clock thermostat to automatically set air conditioner and heating unit to desired temperature. Even when you're away from home, the clock thermostat can control your air conditioner for more economical operation.
- Investigate replacing your central air conditioner, especially if unit is more than five years old, with a new unit that has a Seasonal Energy Efficiency Rating (SEER) of at least 8.5.

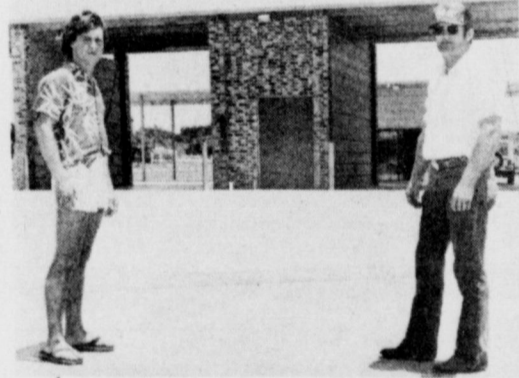

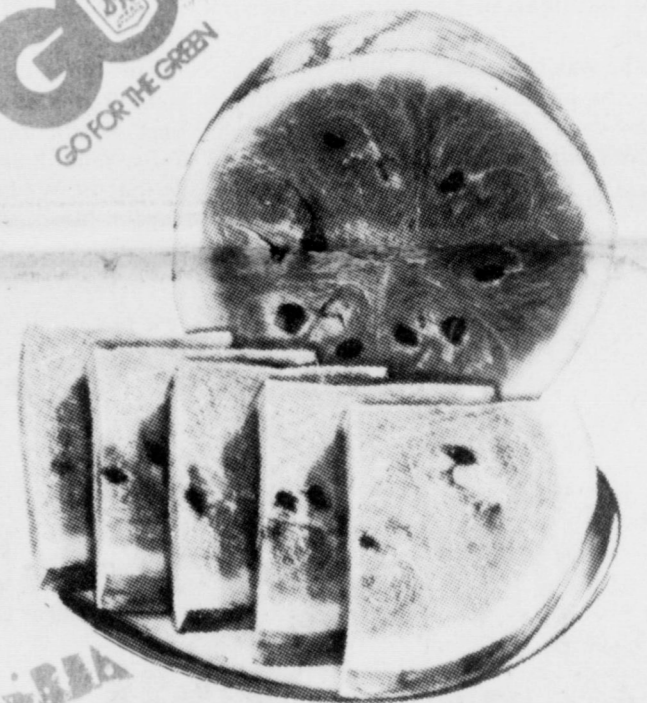

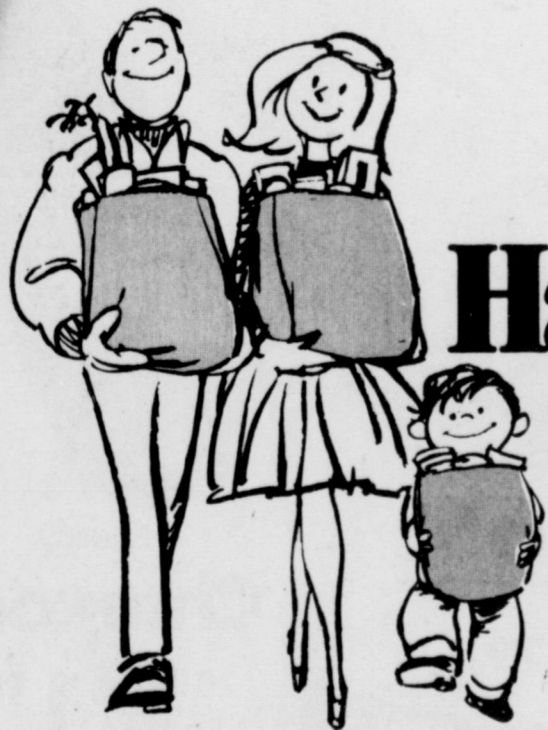
