Gilmore resigns

The regularly-scheduled meeting

of Iowa Park city council had been

Gilmore's move, the word had Alderman Bill Gilmore, after all apparently been sent out, because agenda items had been heard, more than 80 persons, including two submitted his resignation and then television camera crews and newspaper reporter from Wichita

> "I hereby submit my resignation to the Iowa Park City Council, effective at midnight on this date, July 26,

"I leave the council with regret, yet at peace with myself, knowing I have performed my duties to the city in an upright manner, and have strived to serve the people to the best of my ability."

Prior to the announcement, Gilmore said he thought a "minority will like to hear what I've got to say, which is my resignation."

The resignation came prior to commencement of a three-year prison term Gilmore received recently in federal court after pleading guilty to mail fraud. He is to report Aug. 16 to begin serving his sentence.

Gilmore accused city administrator Steve Morath and city attorney Roger Lee of conspiring to have him removed from the city council and said he wanted both relieved of their

He also called for the city to force the resignations of four members of the police department: Capt. Robert Dean, Tommy Adams, Teresa Spruill and Roy Messick. He said the police chief (Billy Hamilton) had "not had full cooperation."

Gilmore accused Morath of approaching the volunteer fire department, of which he has been a member 18 years, to "try to get him taken off' the force.

Gilmore than asked that his wife be given an opportunity to speak, to which Mayor Charlie Lee agreed. She read from a prepared stattement,

saying in part: "Some 18 months ago, Bill Gilmore came to me, telling of his involvement in padding invoices. He asked my forgiveness, and I gave it. Since that time, we have been subjected to indignities and abuses that few people have been aware of. For legal reasons, we were forbidden to make any attempt to explain the situation. The facts have been totally ignored by all involved, for the express purpose of sending Bill Gilmore to prison. . . not for what he did, but because of who he is.

"It's immaterial at this time whether or not you believe the truth. But for those of you who have been worrying about the shame on the city, I want to make it clear that Bill Gilmore is not responsible for the publicity. At this time, I believe those who are responsible for inciting anger among the citizens need to answer for their own mistakes. . . '

She then called for Morath's resignation and gave six reasons. most of which are undocumented.

Mrs. Gilmore listed the purchase of

a "computer" by Morath and former mayor Johnny Crawford which is used in city hall for posting, billing and producing financial statements. She said the purchase was without the consent of the city council.

"I deny all the allegations made," Morath commented yesterday, saying they "... were an attempt to discredit

He qualified his statement, saying he did purchase the posting machine, but at the direction of the mayor. Morath pointed out that all checks are co-signed with him by either the mayor or mayor pro tem, and he could not make any purchases without council knowledge.

Mrs. W.A. George, president of the library board, also spoke in Gilmore's behalf, concerning some sand which had been reported missing from the old hotel site, which Gilmore had put

She said, "The city had nothing to do with it. It was the library board that paid for every yard (of sand) and to level it. It was the decision of the library board."

OTHER BUSINESS

Other business carried on by the council included:

* responding to a request by the Pacific Ave. Missionary Baptist Church, instructed Morath to draft an ordinance abandoning alley easement in Block C, Manes Subdivision;

* appointed Jimmy Duggins to the parks board;

* selected the low bid of Shaw Motor Co. for purchase of a truck chassis-cab; \$13,261 was lowest of three bids submitted;

* approved adjustments to the current budget which reduced the anticipated year-end balance from \$147,530 to \$133,790;

* authorized discontinuing the property tax discounts after it was pointed out that only 331 senior citizens took advantage of the program at an average of \$3 each;

* authorized the city's participation in a joint study of the Lone Star Gas rate increase request, joining the Texas Municipal League; Gilmore cast the only nay vote;

* authorized acceptance of the overhead water tank painting and repair work and making of a final payment of \$62,385.

Chief Hamilton asked the council to act on filling two vacancies he has in the police department, explaining he had put in four days of 15-16 hours during the shortage and he didn't ". . .know how many more days I can hold up to it."

The first vacancy was when Hamilton was moved to chief after Charlie Whittingstall's retirement, and the second was when Messick resigned to accept a position on the Tarrant County sheriff's department.

Mayor Lee said he was unaware of the second opening, and agreed with Alderman Bud Thompson's request for a called meeting at 7:35 p.m. today to fill the vacancies. The specific hour was within the 72-hour requirement for posting a called meeting under the open insettings law.



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

The machine in question was not purchased from a Burkburnett firm, but rather the city of Burkburnett. Price tag was \$4,500, some \$4,000 less than retail for a new machine of that

Replacement of the old and inadequate posting machine had, in fact, been discussed by the full council. There was no mention in council meetings after the purchase of its acquisition, however.

For someone to make the allegation that Morath purchased the machine is slightly incorrect. All checks issued by the city are countersigned by either the mayor or mayor pro tem.

Morath tells me he was instructed by former mayor, Johnny Crawford, while he was still in office, to purchase the machine. I was unable to get in touch with Crawford after the meeting, but Morath's statement could make sense: what employee is going to argue with his employer when he is told to do something.

A point brought out in the meeting was than an ordinance of the city limits the city administrator to purchases of \$1,500, and the \$4,500 exceeds that limit.

The ordinance was written to limit the administrator from making purchases limited to \$1,500, at a time when no one wrote checks on the city other than the administrator or city secretary. They were not co-signed then, as they are now.





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Cook of the Week

A two-crust raisin pie is a nostalgic dessert item for many people whose mothers and grandmothers baked it quite frequently. They were delicious, mouth-watering desserts in days gone by, and still are in contemporary times. Mrs. Pauline Singleton has a tried and tested recipe for the pie and shares it with the Leader readers this week.

Raisins, some dark purplish red, others white, are various kinds of grapes dried in the sun or by artificial heat. They might be described as concentrated grapes, for drying removes only the water, leaving the other constituents of the fruit, particularly the sugar, practically in tact. The dried grape is sometimes called the currant because the best of the ancient world came from Corinth.

Raisins were probably first produced in Asia Minor by the simple process of burying grapes in hot desert sands. The Romans grew special kinds of grapes, differentiating between those designed to be converted into raisins. Columella explained that these were made from the largest and sweetest grapes.

Mrs. Singleton and her late husband, Elmer, moved to Iowa Park in 1942. They operated Auto Supply Stores in Iowa Park and Wichita Falls for about 25 years.

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
Keeping In Touch This is the first of what I intend to be a number of weekly columns from me, discussing various topics of importance to Texans. During the coming weeks, we

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
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


