Gilmore resigns council position

The regularly-scheduled meeting of Iowa Park city council had been billed in advance to be "short, tame" but it was anything else.

There was nothing on the agenda for the bomb that was to be dropped. Alderman Bill Gilmore, after all agenda items had been heard, submitted his resignation and then

called for the resignations or dismissals of numerous city-related personnel.

Though there was nothing on the agenda which would have indicated Gilmore's move, the word had apparently been sent out, because more than 80 persons, including two television camera crews and newspaper reporter from Wichita Falls.

"I hereby submit my resignation to the Iowa Park City Council, effective at midnight on this date, July 26, 1982.

"I leave the council with regret, yet at peace with myself, knowing I have performed my duties to the city in an upright manner, and have strived to serve the people to the best of my ability."

Prior to the announcement, Gilmore said he thought a "minority will like to hear what I've got to say, which is my resignation."

The resignation came prior to commencement of a three-year prison term Gilmore received recently in federal court after pleading guilty to mail fraud. He is to report Aug. 16 to begin serving his sentence.

Gilmore accused city administrator Steve Morath and city attorney Roger Lee of conspiring to have him removed from the city council and said he wanted both relieved of their offices.

He also called for the city to force the resignations of four members of the police department: Capt. Robert Dean, Tommy Adams, Teresa Spruill and Roy Messick. He said the police chief (Billy Hamilton) had "not had full cooperation."

Gilmore accused Morath of approaching the volunteer fire department, of which he has been a member 18 years, to "try to get him taken off" the force.

Gilmore than asked that his wife be given an opportunity to speak, to which Mayor Charlie Lee agreed. She read from a prepared statement, saying in part:

"Some 18 months ago, Bill Gilmore came to me, telling of his involvement in padding invoices. He asked my forgiveness, and I gave it. Since that time, we have been subjected to indignities and abuses that few people have been aware of. For legal reasons, we were forbidden to make any attempt to explain the situation. The facts have been totally ignored by all involved, for the express purpose of sending Bill Gilmore to prison. . . not for what he did, but because of who he is.

"It's immaterial at this time whether or not you believe the truth. But for those of you who have been worrying about the shame on the city, I want to make it clear that Bill Gilmore is not responsible for the publicity. At this time, I believe those who are responsible for inciting anger among the citizens need to answer for their own mistakes. . ."

She then called for Morath's resignation and gave six reasons, most of which are undocumented.

Mrs. Gilmore listed the purchase of

a "computer" by Morath and former mayor Johnny Crawford which is used in city hall for posting, billing and producing financial statements. She said the purchase was without the consent of the city council.

"I deny all the allegations made," Morath commented yesterday, saying they " . . . were an attempt to discredit me."

He qualified his statement, saying he did purchase the posting machine, but at the direction of the mayor. Morath pointed out that all checks are co-signed with him by either the mayor or mayor pro tem, and he could not make any purchases without council knowledge.

Mrs. W.A. George, president of the library board, also spoke in Gilmore's behalf, concerning some sand which had been reported missing from the old hotel site, which Gilmore had put there.

She said, "The city had nothing to do with it. It was the library board that paid for every yard (of sand) and to level it. It was the decision of the library board."

OTHER BUSINESS

Other business carried on by the council included:

- responding to a request by the Pacific Ave. Missionary Baptist Church, instructed Morath to draft an ordinance abandoning alley easement in Block C, Manes Subdivision;
- appointed Jimmy Duggins to the parks board;
- selected the low bid of Shaw Motor Co. for purchase of a truck chassis-cab; \$13,261 was lowest of three bids submitted;
- approved adjustments to the current budget which reduced the anticipated year-end balance from \$147,530 to \$133,790;
- authorized discontinuing the property tax discounts after it was pointed out that only 331 senior citizens took advantage of the program at an average of \$3 each;
- authorized the city's participation in a joint study of the Lone Star Gas rate increase request, joining the Texas Municipal League; Gilmore cast the only nay vote;
- authorized acceptance of the overhead water tank painting and repair work and making of a final payment of \$62,385.

Chief Hamilton asked the council to act on filling two vacancies he has in the police department, explaining he had put in four days of 15-16 hours during the shortage and he didn't " . . . know how many more days I can hold up to it."

The first vacancy was when Hamilton was moved to chief after Charlie Whittingstall's retirement, and the second was when Messick resigned to accept a position on the Tarrant County sheriff's department.

Mayor Lee said he was unaware of the second opening, and agreed with Alderman Bud Thompson's request for a called meeting at 7:35 p.m. today to fill the vacancies. The specific hour was within the 72-hour requirement for posting a called meeting under the open meetings law.

Kevin Parker appears ready to step into a starting backfield role."

Cathey, Bowerman rites are solemnized Friday

The rose window in the University United Methodist Church in Wichita Falls formed an impressive background for altar decorations for the Friday evening exchange of nuptial vows by Miss Jan Cathey and Chris Lee Bowerman.

The double-ring ceremony, where the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney J. Cathey of Wichita Falls and the son of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Bowerman of Iowa Park were joined in holy matrimony, was officiated by Rev. Gene Gordon.

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As I See It....

I was very disappointed when rumors and hearsay were allowed to be brought out in public during Monday's council meeting. It was totally uncalled for. One of them was hint that former mayor Johnny Crawford might have

used city equipment and personnel to install his yard sprinkler system. In checking with H.M. Nipper at State National Bank, he confirmed that the system was installed at least four years before Crawford was elected mayor.

Nipper should know. He bought the system through a friend, as he has for a number of local residents, and helped Crawford install it. To say that someone told you something might have happened, and say it in an official meeting of an elected body, is wrong. There were several other allegations which do not warrant mention, because none was supportable.

Twice it was mentioned in the

meeting that Steve Morath, city administrator, had purchased a "computer" without council approval. First of all, any machine that adds two and two is not a computer, in my book of definitions. But if one wants to call the city's machine a computer, okay.

The machine in question was not purchased from a Burkburnett firm, but rather the city of Burkburnett. Price tag was \$4,500, some \$4,000 less than retail for a new machine of that type.

Replacement of the old and inadequate posting machine had, in fact, been discussed by the full council. There was no mention in council meetings after the purchase of its acquisition, however.

For someone to make the allegation that Morath purchased the machine is slightly incorrect. All checks issued by the city are countersigned by either the mayor or mayor pro tem.

Morath tells me he was instructed by former mayor, Johnny Crawford, while he was still in office, to purchase the machine. I was unable to get in touch with Crawford after the meeting, but Morath's statement could make sense: what employee is going to argue with his employer when he is told to do something.

A point brought out in the meeting was that an ordinance of the city limits the city administrator to purchases of \$1,500, and the \$4,500 exceeds that limit.

The ordinance was written to limit the administrator from making purchases limited to \$1,500, at a time when no one wrote checks on the city other than the administrator or city secretary. They were not co-signed then, as they are now.

I think we've had enough charges, enough squabbling, enough fighting, enough dissension, enough witch hunting.

What we need now is cooperation, understanding, harmony and progress. Without them, our losses will surely mount.

To the Editor:

Recently a computer was purchased from a Burkburnett firm for the sum of \$4,500, also \$1,335 for the programming of this computer and another \$1,000 for computer forms.

There is a city ordinance prohibiting the City administrator from purchasing any item for more than \$1,500 without the approval of the city council.

It is my understanding that our City administrator did not at any time inform the city council of this purchase and was in direct violation of the City Ordinance on this matter.

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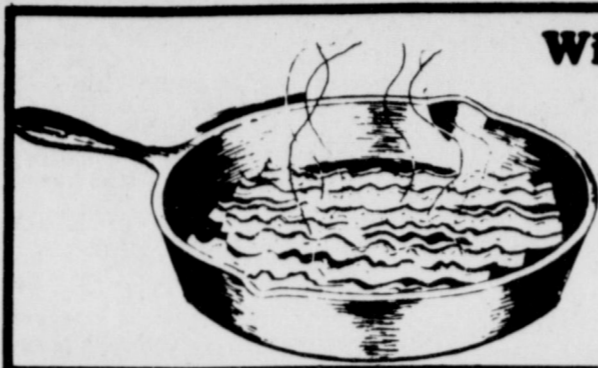

Cook of the Week

A two-crust raisin pie is a nostalgic dessert item for many people whose mothers and grandmothers baked it quite frequently. They were delicious, mouth-watering desserts in days gone by, and still are in contemporary times. Mrs. Pauline Singleton has a tried and tested recipe for the pie and shares it with the Leader readers this week.

Raisins, some dark purplish red, others white, are various kinds of grapes dried in the sun or by artificial heat. They might be described as concentrated grapes, for drying removes only the water, leaving the other constituents of the fruit, particularly the sugar, practically intact. The dried grape is sometimes called the currant because the best of the ancient world came from Corinth.

Raisins were probably first produced in Asia Minor by the simple process of burying grapes in hot desert sands. The Romans grew special kinds of grapes, differentiating between those designed to be converted into raisins. Columella explained that these were made from the largest and sweetest grapes.

Mrs. Singleton and her late husband, Elmer, moved to Iowa Park in 1942. They operated Auto Supply Stores in Iowa Park and Wichita Falls for about 25 years.

She is a native of Spanish Fort and attended high school there. In Iowa Park, she is a member of First Baptist Church where she is chairman of the committee responsible for serving meals to bereaved families. Mrs. Singleton is an active member and Step worker of Friendly Door. One of her hobbies is quilting and she has helped other members of Friendly Door turn out some beautiful specimens of quilting. She also likes to crochet and embroider.

She has one son, Oscar of Iowa Park, two daughters, Lila Sims of

Iowa Park and Evelyn Hollingsworth of Vernon; 14 grandchildren, and 24 great-grand-children.

RAISIN PIE

- 2 well-beaten eggs
- 2 Tbs. flour
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 1/2 cups raisins
- 2 cups sugar
- Butter size of an egg
- 1 1/2 cups sour milk

Mix all ingredients together, pour into 9-inch unbaked pie crust and top with crust. Bake at 350 degrees until done.

PINEAPPLE UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar.
- Melt butter and sugar in skillet, then add 1 can of drained crushed pineapple.

- Make a batter of:
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 5 Tbs. pineapple juice

Separate eggs; beat sugar in yolks, add juice, flour and fold in beaten egg whites. Pour on top of pineapple mixture in skillet. Bake 40 to 45 minutes at 300 degrees. Turn cake upside down when cool.

BANANA CUSTARD PIE

- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 bananas
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/4 cup coconut

Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, salt, nutmeg and milk. Put bananas through a sieve, then add custard mixture and lemon juice. Pour into an unbaked pie crust, sprinkle with coconut. Bake until firm.

LEMON CAKE PIE

- 2 egg yolks
- 1 cup sweet milk

- Juice of two lemons
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 Tbs. flour
- 1 T melted butter

Mix sugar, flour, egg yolks, lemon juice and milk. Fold in egg whites which have been beaten stiff. Pour in unbaked crust and bake in a slow oven.

FRUIT COCKTAIL CAKE

- 2 eggs
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 1/2 tsp. vanilla
 - 2 cups flour
 - 2 tsps. soda
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1 can fruit cocktail
- Mix as for any cake. Bake in 350 degree oven.

TOPPING

- 1/2 cups sugar
 - 1 stick butter
 - 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- Boil approximately 5 minutes and pour over cake.

JELLO SALAD

- 1 box Jello (dry)
 - 8 ozs. cream cheese
 - 8 ozs. whipping cream, whipped
 - 1 can crushed pineapple or 1 can any fruit
- Cream cheese, add Jello, pineapple and whipped cream. Set in refrigerator for at least 10 minutes.

Health Views

THE OLDER WE GET, THE HARDER WE FALL

None of us likes to think of ourselves as an "older person." You may be one of the lucky ones who feels nary a twinge as the years progress. Your pace hasn't slowed much and you exercise regularly. Nevertheless, time does take its toll, and you should use increased caution as you progress in years.

Although older people make up only about eleven percent of the population, they suffer 23 percent of all accidental deaths. According to the National Safety Council 24,000 persons over age 65 die each year from accidental injuries. At least 800,000 more are disabled for at least one year due to injury. This is a rather frightening statistic when you consider the fact that most accidents are the result of pure negligence, and likely could be avoided with caution and preventive action.

Many of the injuries suffered by older people are from falling, and most occur in the home. Check your home for the following:

- Do you have well-lighted stairways with switches at both bottom and top?
- Do you have night lights?
- Do you have sturdy handrails on both sides of stairways?
- Is your carpeting tacked down? Throw rugs are extremely treacherous when they slide.
- Do you have grab bars on bathroom walls, non-skid mats in the bathtub?
- Are all areas clear of objects that could cause a person to trip?

Other dangers include smoking in bed (a practice best avoided altogether), and preparing meals in loose, flowing, flammable clothing. Older people are particularly susceptible to burns because of their reduced agility. Be sure all your water heater thermostats are set so you can't be suddenly scalded. Also, the older person should plan an emergency fire exit route from the house. These precautions may seem at first over-protective. However, older people are especially prone to accidents because they often suffer from impaired hearing or poor eyesight, and coordination is not as it used to be.

The older person should avoid standing on chairs and ladders.
