# Injunction dissolved on car wash project

Iowa Park's city council Monday night delayed taking action on adopting numerous zoning amendments and advertising for bids to construct a fire substation.

No action was taken on changing the zoning of the old fair grounds, where the Wal-Mart store is to be built, but that action is expected at the next meeting.

A stack of 43 pages of changes for the zoning ordinance had been received by members of the council a week prior to Monday, but Mayor Johnny Crawford apparently expressed the feelings of the council that they wanted more time to study the changes before taking any action.

The changes are the result of some 12 months study by the planning and zoning commission, primarily centering around mobile home park zoning, construction of car ports and establishing child care centers.

Crawford suggested aldermen study the changes during this week, make a list of questions and present them to the planning and zoning commission at its meeting Monday night for answers. Action could then be taken at the next meeting of the council, which is slated Aug. 10.

Aldermen Bud Thompson and Charlie Lee had conducted a study of city-owned property in the south part of town as possible sites for a fire substation, but would not recommend any of them as desirable.

Thompson suggested the city might want to purchase property at or near the intersection of Diamond and Wall for the facility, and that will be explored with a report to come in the near future.

Crawford again suggested that the cost of the substation would be hard to justify in view of the low numbers of structural fires experienced in the south part of town during the past two years.

The substation is being sought by firemen and residents of the south

area of the city to house equipment which could not reach the area when a long train was passing though.

Thompson and Lee, working with Steve Morath, city administrator, are to have three proposed sites for consideration at the next meeting.

Rezoning of the old fair grounds requires a public hearing, where anyone protesting the change can make their opinions known. No one spoke out Monday, so an ordinance changing the zone code will be considered at the next meeting.

David Davis, a major stationed at Sheppard AFB who will be retiring at the end of August, was hired as the new water and sewer department superintendent. Davis said he could work part time during August and start full time in September.

Though he has no license to operate the plants, he said he would work toward obtaining one. He was recommended by Morath primarily for his administrative abilities.

# Zoning changes, bids on substation delayed

Thus, Judge Temple Driver ended a hearing Thursday afternoon in 89th District Court concerning a temporary injunction against a car wash being built on the corner of west Highway and Third Street.

The injunction had been sought by James Morris and Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Garrett, against the city of Iowa Park, Mike Longley, Gary Snow, Teddy Tomerlin and Ronny Lee Wilson.

Driver's dissolving of the injunction permits the business owners to resume construction of the beleaguered car wash. However, a trial on merits, to determine if the procedures of the city and board of adjustments in permitting the firm to build were correct, is yet to be held.

Though the judge said the trial on merits will be held "in three weeks," date of the hearing had not been set on his docket as of Tuesday afternoon.

No activity at the construction site has been noticed since Thursday's

The hearing, which was to commence at 11:30 a.m. but was 20 minutes late in starting, continued until shortly after 3 p.m., with a break from 12:25 to 1:35.

Most of the hearing was taken up by Morris' questioning of Kenneth Garrett, and arguments on law before the judge by Morris, representing himself and the Garretts, Gene Douglass, lawyer for the builders, and Lonny Morrison, representing

Keith Aulds, Don Richter and Buddy Johnson were named trustees and a fund-raising campaign was discussed.

Aulds also reported that the Wichita County Health Department had approved moving the property line over on the west side of the cemetery to use 9.27 acres that it owns, which will make possible the sale of over 1,700 additional spaces. The cemetery at the present time comprises 20 acres.

Prices for the spaces were announced at the meeting to include \$150 for a single space, \$300 for a quarter lot, \$600 for a half lot and \$1,200 for a lot.

Arthur Peevey Sr., 37, remains in the intensive care unit of Wichita General Hospital, but is said to be showing encouraging signs of recovery. The accident occurred just east of Bell Road overpass, but is still inside

the city limits. The last traffic fatality

inside the city was either in 1963 or 1964 when a young woman was killed in a car-train collision on the Wall Street crossing. Police have no records of that accident.

The father and son were riding in a Jeep they had purchased only a few weeks earlier. They reportedly were going to a restaurant for breakfast. They had reportedly driven down

Bell Road from their home at 403 E. Washington when they got on the expressway. Though the time was just before

sunrise, another motorist, Carlton Hicks, who arrived on the scene before the dust had settled, said other vehicles were driving without lights. He did not know if the Peevey Jeep had its lights on, however. A few feet after getting onto the

divided four-lane highway, a truck driven by Gary Halbert, 22, of Midlothian, struck the rear of the Jeep as it was traveling in the right hand lane. Halbert reportedly told investigat-

ing officers he had been passing another automobile and was returning to the right hand lane and struck the vehicle, which he said he did not The vehicles continued traveling

forward, but to the right of the point of impact 225 feet until they struck a culvert. The Jeep came to a stop 319 feet from the point of impact, which was marked by scars on the pavement.

Both father and son were thrown from the Jeep, with the father being found between the culvert and vehicle, and the son on the far side of the vehicle.

The truck, which had apparently passed over the Jeep, finally came to a stop 670 feet beyond the jeep in a plowed wheat field after passing through two fences.

Halbert and the driver of an accompanying truck had reportedly unloaded cattle at Tulia about 10 the previous evening and driven to Childress where they took naps and were returning to Midlothian.

They were driving for the Mike Ellis Trucking Co. of Dallas.

A Plumlee ambulance arrived on the scene 14 minutes after the accident was reported to the Iowa Park Police Department, according to the radio dispatcher's log.

Peevey, who has been employed as a truck driver the past two years for McClendon Grain, was reported conscious Wednesday morning and able to recognize and talk with family.

He received extensive damage to his left arm and shoulder, as well as serious cuts to his head and body. The accident was investigated by

Iowa Park officers Dale Washburn and Pat Hannah. The case has been referred to the Wichita County Grand



An apple pizza spiced with cinnamon sounds like a blue ribbon dessert winner any season of the year. Our thanks to Joyce (Mrs. Billy) McNeely for sharing her recipe with us this week.

Cinnamon is reputed to be the world's greatest sweet spice and it has been a precious commodity throughout the ages. It has been used not only as a flavoring for foods, but as a medicine, perfume, and quite often in love charms.

The Chinese, 40 centuries ago, believed that cinnamon was the Sacred Tree of Life which grew up in Paradise, up in the Tibetan Mts. They believed that anyone who ate even a small bit of this tree or its fruit would live forever.

At the time of the Crusades, many people in Europe, thought spices, such as cinnamon, came from the Garden of Eden, and that they were carried out of Eden by the Ganges and the Tigris Rivers. It is the bark of an evergreen tree, a native of the Far East. Today we get it from Indonesia and South Vietnam.







A first step was made this week in cleaning up Social Security when the House-Senate group agreed to end the minimum benefit beginning next February 1st.

It's the first move in getting the extra fingers out of the Social Security pie and the first step in curtailing the fast-growing art of double-dipping out of two or more retirement funds.

The change will show up in Social Security checks mailed March 3rd but notices will be sent out in December. The savings to social security fund

is in the neighborhood of \$7 billion. Liberals, headed by House Minority Leader Jim Wright of Fort Worth, have already termed the move "cruel action against some three million people currently on the Social Security rolls."

Hogwash!

Rep. Mickey Leland of Houston, who wants Kent Hance, congressman of this district, and Phil Gramm of College Station, censured by his Democratic colleagues, has described the victims of the cuts as "mostly senior citizens on very low, fixed income...senior citizens who are struggling to survive from day to day.

More hogwash! It's just not true! A little background is in order. Social Security was passed in 1937 to provide supplemental income of about 27 percent to older Americans. It was not then nor is it now designed to provide for all the needs of a senior citizen. Two years later, minimum benefits of \$10 per month were provided. Anyone who provided as little as \$3 in their entire lifetime, could receive at least \$10 per month. In 1974, Congress added SSI (Supplemental Security Income) which actually eliminated the reason for minimum benefits but it was not taken out.

Cong. Phil Gramm explains the latest move the best. "Of the three million people drawing so called

minimum benefitts - actually unearned benefits - 74 percent or 3 out of every 4 are drawing pensions of more than \$900 per month."

"As far as anyone needy losing their benefits, that's just not so," says Gramm. "Anyone needy automatically qualifies for SSI and gets \$255 a month. But under the current law, even if you're not needy, if you've paid in as much as \$3 to Social Security, you can draw \$3,065 a year in minimum benefits. And that's not right." Gramm said.

A lot of those who will lose minimum benefits, Gramm said, are people whose jobs didn't require them to pay into Social Security people like federal government retirees, railroad retirees, teachers, and people who worked abroad.

"It's important to remember than any needy person over 59 - or any blind or disabled person -automatically qualifies for SSI and a minimum of \$255 a month. They aren't affected in any way by the action this week by Congress."

In looking at the three million people who will be affected by the action this week, Gramm points out:

"One million of the three will receive no reduction because it's just a technicality. Take a widow getting half of her husband's benefit, which is a minimum of \$125 plus supplement. This would not change how much she would get. It just means the minimum would be lower and the supplement higher," Gramm said.

Another 200,000 of the three million are owed the \$122. They draw it but they have earned it up to the \$122 and will continue to receive it. Another 500,000 currently receive SSI and any loss in minimum benefits would be made up by SSI, Gramm

"That leaves 1.3 million people and according to studies by the General Accounting Office, 800,000 of them have substantial outside benefit. GAO extimates that 450,000 draw at

least \$900 a month in federal pensions, and the other 350,000 have spouses who earn an average of \$14,000 a year.

According to Gramm, there is no significant information on the remaining 500,000 people. But if any of them meet the national definition for being poor, blind or disabled, they automatically qualify for SSI but they haven't signed up for it as yet.

Gramm summed up the problem this way: "Minimum benefit is a quirk in the law that's producing almost \$3 billion in abuse over three years, and if we're to protect people who paid Social Security taxes and need it, we've got to knock off those who didn't earn it and don't need it."





# Melon festival date set

By Don Decker County Agent

The first annual melon festival is scheduled 10 a.m., August 8, at the Farmers Market in Wichita Falls. This event is aimed at both the consumers, as well as the melon growers. Free slices of cold watermelon and cantaloupe will be served to everyone attending. A melon contest will be held for the growers.

Melon producers in both North Texas and Southern Oklahoma are invited to enter the melon show. One division will be based on most desirable melon characteristics. Another division will include the largest melon contest. Ribbons will go to the top ten places with plaques going to the champion watermelon and cantaloupe and heaviest watermelon and cantaloupe. Growers must have their melon entered in place by 9:30 a.m.

Melons will be featured at the market during the festival. This will be an ideal time for families to lay-in a supply of high quality watermelons and cantaloupes at a reasonable price.

The producers who sell at the market will select a "Melon Queen" for this event. Her selection is aimed at promoting both watermelon and cantaloupe consumption.

Everybody is invited to come to the market and participate in the watermelon eating and seed spitting

contest. This has been a good year for melon production and wide spread participation is expected, according to B.T. Haws, market manager.

Trees and shrubs need water now in order to better survive the hot temperatures and dry weather. Water is needed to moisten the top 8 to 10 inches of soil in order for trees and shrubs to have enough moisture to carry them through current dry conditions.

Automatic sprinkler systems can often be misleading in trying to supply needed moisture. Most sprinkler systems apply water at a rate of 1/2 inch per hour or 1 inch per hour. In order to moisten the soil 8 to 10 inches, 3 inches of water is required. This means the 1/2-inch rated system would need to operate for 6 continous hours. A system rated at 1 inch per hour would need to operate at least 3 hours.

Mrs. Leveda McCullough of Wichita Falls is adjusting her watering system in order to more adequately water her landscape. Her system applies water at the rate of 1 inch per hour. She has been operating it for only 8 minutes a day. This figures only .12 inch of moisture per day which moistens the soil only 1/4 inch deep. The timing on her system is being changed so at least 11/2 inch

of water is applied in a single day, once per week. Her landscape is rolling so water application is being made intermittently to prevent runoff.

Caulking and weatherstripping are essential features of an energy-efficient home. Their presence and quality of installation may be good indicators of the overall quality of construc-

"Caulking" consists of a flexible sealing compound. All cracks and joints outside the house should be caulked. If a home is not properly caulked, it will not be energy efficient. If you decide to purchase an uncaulked home, caulk it yourself or have the builder caulk it as soon as possible.

Be sure that there is good caulking on all outside corners of the house and around exterior chimneys. Inspect the caulking around the outside of window and door frames, and where pipes and wires enter the house. The area between the foundation and the sill plate (illustrated) should also be

the edges of the moving parts of doors and windows. Nearly all new homes are weatherstripped, but some jobs are better than others. Check the quality of weatherstripping by rattling a few windows when they are locked. Good quality windows, properly installed and adjusted, will not rattle significantly.



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



# Council considers justice of the peace office

Holliday city council Monday night tabled action on leasing a commercial building to house the justice of the peace during the council's regular meeting.

Justice of the Peace Cecil Hamady announced at the meeting he will close Holliday Drug Aug. 1, due to an apparent lack of local interest. "I worked one year paying \$300 to \$500 a month out of my own pocket to see if the people wanted a drug store. . . it

is now obvious they don't." he said. Hamady has approached Cook and Archer County Judge Bill Holder with the possibility of leasing the building, which is next to the Holliday post office, to be used jointly as a justice of the peace office and city

Cook said the location of the building, plus the fact Hamady already handles his duties as justice of the peace in the back of the store, should be taken into consideration. "Also, the location would not only serve the interests of the county, but the city as well," said Cook.

Under current state legislation, the county "may" furnish office space, a secretary and supplies. According to city administrator Jim Hamill, there is a bill currently being discussed which would change the wording of

the legislation from "may" to "will." Action on the issue was tabled until the next council meeting, Aug. 17.

In other business, dumpground hours were changed, council set a commercial garbage pickup rate for Dwyer Texaco, okayed the purchase of an air conditioner to cool the pump house at the city waste water treatment plant, discussed next year's budget and set the dates for two public hearings on revenue sharing projects.

Hours for the dumpground were changed to 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday and Saturday. The dumpground will be closed Fridays and Sundays.

Effective Monday, the new hours will hopefully serve the community's needs better, according to councilman Fred Daume.

Current hours for the dumpground are 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, and closed Sunday and Monday.

In addition to the new hours, dumpground employee Pete Snyder was given a \$100 per month raise for the additional work hours.

Council also voted to give the mayor and council members free dumpground stickers.

Council set a \$15 per month commercial garbage pickup rate for Dwyer Texaco, and will increase

pickups to twice per week.

Councilmen also okayed the purchase of a 14,000 BTU air conditioner to cool the pump station at the waste water treatment plant. According to Cook, the air conditioner is budgeted in the water fund of next year's proposed budget, but that one is needed to be purchased immediately.



# Street project delayed

Although Holliday city council designated three streets in the city to be resurfaced during Monday's regular meeting, a closer inspection of the streets' condition by city officials Tuesday has led to reservations about starting the project anytime soon.

City administrator Jim Hamill and two council members inspected the streets Tuesday afternoon and found their condition to be worse than expected.

"The problem is, especially for the streets with curb and gutters, they have gone so long without repair that we will have to spend some time cleaning it out, and patching it up before we even begin to resurface it," Hamill said.

With two miles of resurfacing material approved for street repair in Holliday, councilmen made a list of streets Monday night which were considered top priority in resurfac-

Streets named were N. Pecan, N. Main, N. Walnut, S. Main, S. Bois 'd Arc. and S. Avenue.

Because of the limited amount of materials available for the current project, the list was narrowed to the streets which city officials thought would be ready for resurfacing in a

Three streets in north Holliday were named, but an inspection of them Tuesday showed they were in worse condition than anticipated.

City workers have been in the process of patching the city's streets for the last three months, according to Hamill, and approximately 25 percent of the project is completed. "We still have a long ways to go," he remarked, "but patching the streets has to be done first before you can think of resurfacing."

Mayor James Cook Monday night said \$15,000 has been appropriated in next year's budget for street repair. Long range plans include patching and resurfacing all of Holliday's streets, with major street repair anticipated in the late spring and summer, during the dry months of the year.

"After inspection of the city streets, we have not determined if they should be resurfaced," said Hamill. He added the council will likely take up the issue during the Aug. 17 meeting, and that it is possible the council will rescind its decision to resurface the streets, and concentrate on properly preparing them for resurfacing at a later date.


