A cotton bollworm meeting was cheduled Monday at the ASCS Office suilding.

Emory Boring. The cotton insect computer program provided the predicted bollworm flight dates base on local data.

flight, Stan Hoye of Kadane Corner delayed his irrigation until Tuesday. By the time the cotton could react to the water, making succulent growth, the major bollworm flight should be over. He is hopeful there will be
enough beneficial insects to handle the lighter worm activity for the remainder of the month.
The largest bollworm flight is predicted for Aug. 20 to Sept. 2. By then, beneficial insect population
should be large and if spraying is should be large and if spraying is
required for control, a grower can get required for control, a grower can get
by with only 1 to 3 applications. Stopping the worms from this week's flight is a critical point toward making this years crop.
