You may not feel quite comfortable at first when you set your thermostat at $80^{\circ}$ or higher, but most people adjust very quickly to living warmer. At the same time, if you dress cooler and use a fan, you may not even notice the difference. But it will help hold down your electric bill.

Increased teacher salaries highlight 1981-82 budget

An approximate increase of
1-percent in teachers' salaries 21-percent in teachers salaries
dominated the 1981-82 budget for Holliday's schools, adopted Monday night during the Holliday school board's regular meeting.
Total anticipated expenditures for the upcoming school year is
$\$ 1,566,421$, an increase of $\$ 168,297$ over last year's budget.
Teachers' salaries, totalling
$\$ 592,830$, showed the bigest $\$$ increase, with an additional $\$ 124,770$ budgeted, primarily due to increase extended teachers by the board salary over last year
Holliday teachers will now receiv $\$ 1,000$ above state base, which in itself was increased from $\$ 150$ to $\$ 200$ by the state legislature this year Another reason for the increase
due to an additional $\$ 400$ paid to fou newly-created department heads. The lowest paid classroom teacher in Holliday this year, with two years experience, will receive $\$ 11,950$. The highest, with $22-2$.
receives $\$ 18,400$.
This year's tax rate, passed during the board's marathon session, was increased from 52 -cents to 54 -cents per $\$ 100$ evaluation. Under state law. the increase of less than three-per-
cent was made without the need of a public hearing.
Aside from teachers' salaries, major increases earmarked from
$\$ 745,553$ budgeted for instruction includes $\$ 18,454$ for West Wichita Co-Operative ( $\$ 12,454$ over the previous year), and $\left.\begin{array}{l}\$ 25,000 \text { for } \\ \text { teaching supplies }\end{array} \quad \begin{array}{r}\text { (a } \$ 10,000\end{array}\right]$ increase).
Also budgeted under instruction are substitute teachers, $\$ 12,000$, insurance (a $\$ 16,814$ increase), $\$ 4,900$ for vocational agriculture students and teachers' travel expenses, and
$\$ 5,250$ for Texas Employment $\$ 5,250$ for Texas Employment figure.
