## Experiment Farm Road Being Built

## sHUCKs

Sometimes we think our young folks don't have a more serious thought than how fast a car can go, or how much the old folks can be stuck for in the way of spending money.

And sometimes outsiders don't understand our ways and compile long lists of complaints against the way we people act, talk, and generally comport ourselves.

Those of you who read Esquire's attack on everything Texas and Texans do and say; and those of you who have misgivings about the younger generation, can take heart from the following letter. It was written home by one of our area boys, just three years out of high school, now serving in our Uncle's navy somewhere on the East coast —way up in Yankeeland where everything wonderful is supposed to be.

The letter, in part, reads:

"This is funny country. There are towns of 10 and 12 thousands, but they are only a few miles apart. They don't really have any what we'd call "small towns." I guess that's because it's the coast.

"These are the most unusual people I've ever encountered anywhere. It's a class I've never run across before—98 per cent shipyard workers in this town. Everybody makes pretty good money—but everybody does hard physical labor.

"Education is practically non-existent—and people are dirty mentally and bodily. Everyone looks like he needs a good bath, I guess they just don't wash often because the climate is colder. That's the only thing I can figure.

"Complexions and teeth are bad—not a girl in this state is really good looking by Texas standards.

"The whole level of social morals is much lower than anywhere I've been in the States. But it is everybody (that I've run into), so I guess one can't actually call them bad because they're no worse than anyone else and would be terribly insulted if you even suggested they might be wrong in the things they do. But I guess that goes for everywhere.

"And courtesy is practically unheard of. You couldn't get me to raise a family here or even expose a child to it, for anything. And if its like this in a town of 10,000 just think of what things must be like in a city of millions!

"I'm reserving judgment until I get there (Boston) next month.

"I bet you never expected a speech like this from me—I didn't either—but it's just like a bunch of hogs in a wallow.

"Everybody is nice—now don't get me wrong. They're good people. It's just that they don't know any better. Or would it be better—you tell me. It's just that I've never before experienced anything like this.

"People here are friendly—easy to get along with—and there's just as much difference between them individually as anywhere. They all just have different basic standards. Well, you'll just have to come and see—hah!

"Got it all told to someone who wouldn't hit me for saying it."

You kids spread it around that Adlai and Elmer will fight it out at 2:00, March 21 at Swinging Bridge. Be there!

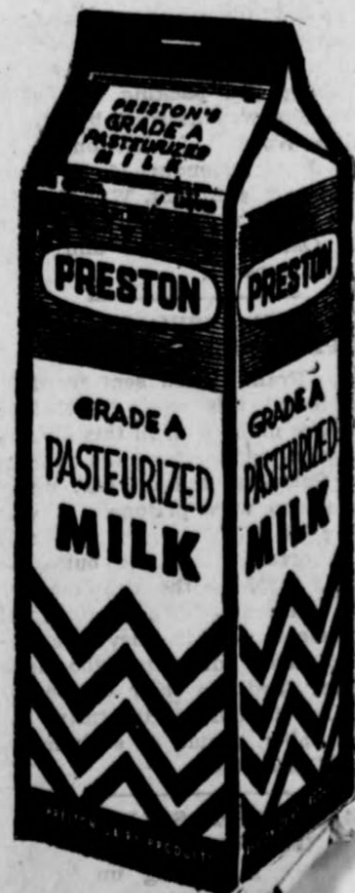

## ★ Soil Conservation

G. A. Shivers, vice-chairman of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, reported to the supervisors' meeting on his trip to the National Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors. According to Shivers the highlight of the meeting was the speech by Billy Howard of Georgia on the subject "The Job Ahead in My Soil Conservation District." Howard had recently been declared the national winner in a speaking contest on that subject.

Soil Conservation Week has been set for May 3 to 9. Tentative plans were made for a range field day during that week that would emphasize mesquite control and range practices. Sunday, May 10, has been set as Soil Stewardship Sunday. The supervisors will have a conservation field day for the ministers of the district before that date. Farm and Ranch publishing company sponsors Soil Stewardship Sunday each year and provides reference material for sermon preparations.

Conservation jobs that should be done now include shaping and seeding waterways, seeding of Madrid and Hubam clover, and preparation for seeding Chinese red peas and guar.

Burford Whiteside of Electra has recently seeded his waterway to a

mixture of K. R. bluestem and buffalograss.

Ivan Monaghan of Wichita Falls has cleared 55 acres of mesquite by dozing and will oversee this acreage to K. R. bluestem.

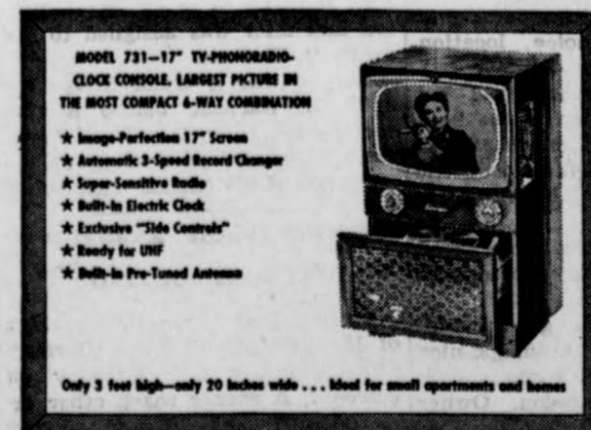

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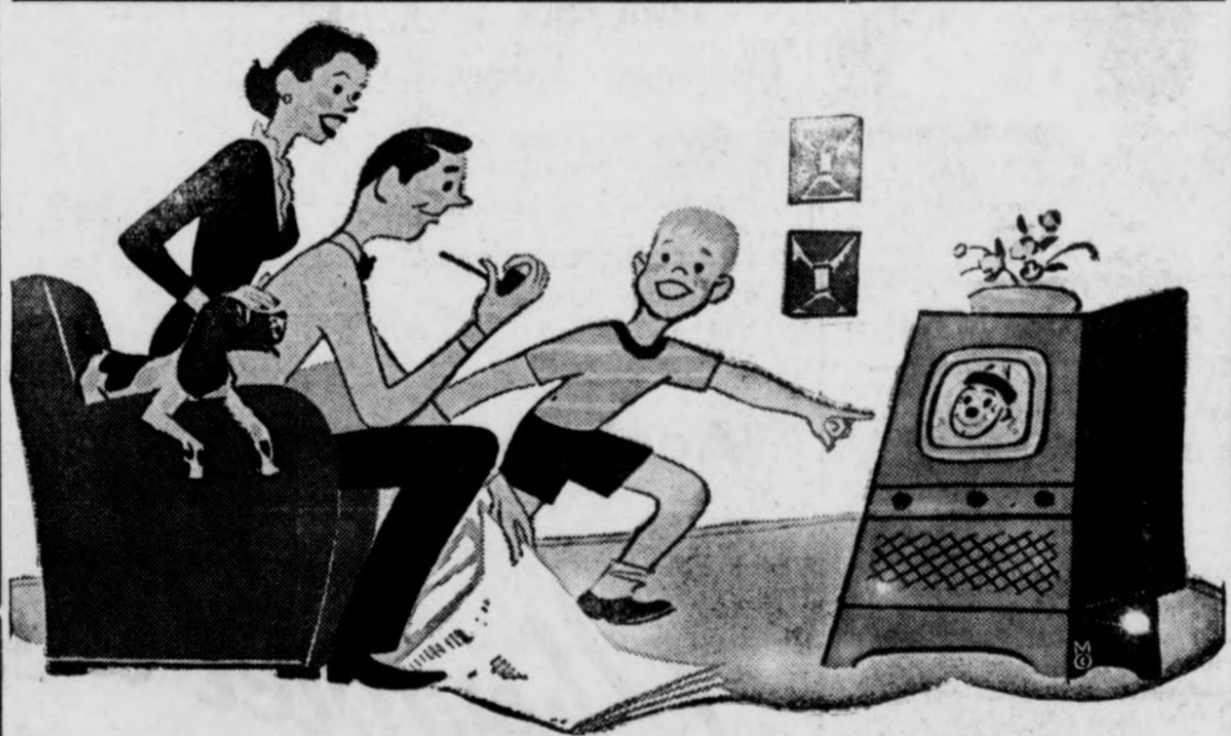


**Juniors**
