FUEL SHORTAGE

Local stations hit with allocations, prices

Gasoline could become hard to find, and will certainly be increasing in price, in Iowa Park during the coming

All service stations are now on an allocation from their suppliers, though the basis of allocation varies from one supplier to another.

Basically, what the service station operators say is that they can handle their present customers, but some will find it hard to take on any new

Some stations in the community have already experienced the frustration of having sold out their reserves and had to close, though few stayed closed long.

What the operators are saying is that they will take care of their regular customers, and when they start running low, they will start closing earlier in the day, and possible on Saturdays along with Sundays.

Jim Sargent at E&S Exxon said his supplier notified him of being on an allocation Mar. 16. He is to receive 90 percent of his purchases for the same month in 1978.

E&S has the lowest prices in town. Sargent explains that he maintains his same margin of profit, passing through only the increases his supplier makes. Though he has no self-service pumps, his prices are 66.9 regular, 69.9 unleaded and 72.9 high

Price has brought a landslide business to the Exxon station, forcing Sargent to state that he must now start holding back so much of each week's allocation for the government clients and retail businesses who regularly trade with him, as well as his regular customers.

Sargent receives shipments Monday, Wednesday and Friday. After running out Saturday, he closed Sunday. Within an hour and a half of receiving his supply Monday morning, he had sold 1,050 gallons of gasoline, what is normally considered a good full day of business for most service stations. It is also close to what he gets per load.

Sargent said he would start restricting sales to the public to 1,000 gallons per day. The rest would be saved for such customers as the post office, fire department, police department, ASCS and several commercial customers.

The station will be closed on Sundays, but will continue staying open 7-8 weekdays and 7-6 Saturdays. Some Exxon dealers in Wichita Falls have not received any gasoline since March 16, having already received and sold their entire month's allotment, Sargent said.

What the operator fears most is reaction to a customer who is refused service after another customer, who buys there regularly, is serviced. "When you get to the point where you can't take care of your regular customers, you're in trouble," he said.

Iowa Park School District buys its gasoline in bulk from Gulf. The school is allocated gasoline on the basis of its 1977-78 school year purchases, according to a notice received two weeks ago, says Bill Steger, who oversees the transportation depart-

Gulf has raised the price of bulk gasoline about seven cents since the start of school, and more increases are expected.

Mobile put its station customers on an allocation the first of March, according to Leroy Foix. Stations are also allocated on the basis of purchases made a year before.

Though he barely will have enough to finish this week out, Foix said he could. But he added if he picks up any new customers, he probably will not have enough to keep up with his

regular customers. Mobile has been increasing its prices twice a month regularly for the past three months. Increases have mostly been a cent per gallon at a

time, but once it was five cents. All but the last two increases have been passed on to the customers, Foix told the Leader. He absorbed the last

two. Self service price for Mobile regular is 69.9 cents, and 73.9 premium grade. Full service price is 74.9 regular and 77.9 at his only unleaded pump.

To control his supply, Foix says he will probably close earlier in the evenings and probably on Saturdays, if he starts running short. That hasn't happened yet, he added.

Junior's Conoco allocation is based on 1972 purchases, and for that

reason the station is in good shape. Junior said Johnson Elevator was running strong that year, buying from him, and for the reason he has had no problem running short of

Conoco went up a penny per gallon last week and again yesterday morning. The local station now charges 76.9 per gallon unleaded and

been put on a 75 percent allocation of last year's purchases, and the station ran out of regular gas Monday.

Ron Carpenter said "I don't know how bad it's going to get or whether it will loosen up next month. Hopefully we will be able to allocate to the rest of our customers so we don't run out again.'



Council promises to condemn burnt home

An appeal to the city council Monday night to have a partially destroyed home condemned and cleared away received a response of understanding and a pledge of quick

Janice Glass asked council members for help in having the former home of Howard Hill on Hope Lane, destroyed in a fire last July, leveled. She alleged the remains had become rat infested and was creating a hazard for young children in the neighborhood.

Council members were told contact had been made months earlier with former city administrator Gene Britton but nothing had yet come of

Steve Morath, city administrator, told council members a minimum of 120 days is required for legal action, which entails hearings and notices.

It was pointed out, however, that the time could possibly be shortened through the health hazard angle, and the city health officer, Dr. Earl Watson, would be contacted in an effort to clear the land in less time.

No one present at the meeting said they had seen a member of the Hill family since the fire.

OTHER BUSINESS

Aldermen accepted a bid to sell the city's wrecked police car, author Mayor Johnny Crawford to sign agreements seeking park assistance funds, and approved an ordinance changing due and delinquent dates of the utility billing.

After twice rejecting bids on the wrecked patrol car, aldermen approved sale of the vehicle to Deryl

James Garage for \$750, which was approximately \$200 higher than any bid rejected. One other bid was received from Shaw Ford for \$600.

The park planning assistance funds Wildlife Department, which is available to communities in the state under 7.500 population for securing public park land, implementing public park development projects, and budgeting assistance for development

of public park land. The council was told by Morath that the funds would be sought for assistance in implementing development projects for existing parks as opposed to securing additional park

The revised billing ordinance now reads: "Such rates and charges hereby fixed and prescribed shall be paid monthly by the users of the waterworks and the sanitary sewer system to the city administrator and shall carry a due date of 15 days after the billing date. If such bill has not been paid by the billing date of the succeeding month's bill, then the succeeding month's service will be discontinued without further notice unless full payment is made on or before the due date of the second

month's bill." Council members received a bill from Wichita Falls attorney Perry Westbrook in the amount of \$1,457, for his representation of the city in a

suit brought by John Foley. The case was referred to Westbrook by City Attorney O.N. Newman, due to his own case load,

aldermen were told. The suit concerns alleged city negligence in maintaining its water mains and caused damage to the pavement of the Johnson Road Jiffy

shortly after the pavement was laid. Westbrook, in a letter, said he felt the city could settle with Foley for \$1,000, but in his opinion the city could win the case in court, if council members wanted to undertake more expensive action.

Mayor Crawford sought, and received, permission from aldermen to talk with Foley and offer to drop the suit at this point, with each side paying its own legal expenses.

Virgil Woodfin approached the council once more to complain that Carl Catlin was not complying with his agreement to properly operate his concrete business on East Jefferson, and asked that the city cancel Catlin's lease to operate on city property.

Upon studying Catlin's contract with the city, Crawford said the contract was apparently void, as it had expired last March. He told Woodfin no action could be taken at the meeting, because it was not on the agenda, but it would be at the next meeting.

I guess the news was a shock to everyone. It certainly was to me.

Ben had committed suicide - just ran a hose from the exhaust pipe of his Cadillac into the front seat and sat there until he died. Of course you wouldn't know him. He was a high school friend and a college classmate.

I remember what the editor of the high school yearbook wrote about him in the graduating seniors' "Predictions For the Future" column. It said, "Ambitious, realistic, not a candidate for a fool's paradise."

The editor was sure right about one thing. Ben was ambitious. He was vice president of the company he worked for when he died.

But he wasn't a realist. I remember sitting in a college dorm "bull session" one time when one of the guys said, "Shakespeare was right. There is a fool in everyone of us. That's the reason we do stupid things."

"Not in me," Ben snapped. "Because if I find a fool in me - I'll kill him." It hit me pretty hard when he said it. I guess it was because he sounded as if he really meant it.

Now, 30 years later, he's dead from deliberately breathing carbon monoxide. He didn't leave a note. No one seems to know why he killed himself. But I wonder. Did he find the fool in

himself and keep his promise? I don't know - but after I heard the news I remembered something I put in my file several months ago. It's a quote from Theodore I. Rubin's book, "Thoughts From A Psychoanalyst's Notebook." Dr. Rubin wrote:

"I must learn to love the fool in me - the one who feels too much, talks too much, takes too many chances, wins sometimes and loses often, lacks self-control, loves and hates, hurts and gets hurt, promises and breaks promises, laughs and cries. It alone protects me against the utterly self-controlled masterful tyrant whom I also harbor and who would rob me of humanity, aliveness, humility and dignity, but for my fool." I had clipped it from a newspaper, made a note on the margin and filed it. I read Dr. Rubin's excerpt first then I glanced at the note on the margin. I had written it to myself. "Make a xerox of this and mail it to

Now, I must learn to love the fool who never got around to sending it to him in time.

Three meet records, all in field events, were established Saturday in the annual Hawk Relays, as Childress, Lawton Mac-Arthur and Wichita Falls High claimed division championships.

Hawk strong man Kip Fuller led the Hawks to second place behind the speedy Oklahoma team in Division II. Fuller earned a pair of first place medals, and established one of those new meet standards.

Even though the meet was moved some three weeks later into the spring, weather still was not the best for a track meet. Temperatures varied through the day, depending on cloud cover, and winds up to 20 miles per hour were constant the day long.

As has been the pattern through this season, the Hawks dominated the field events, and held a wide margin lead when the afternoon's running event finals got underway. And even though the Hawks did score more points running than in other meets, they

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still could not hold off the MacArthur club which earned double points winning both sprint and mile relays.

MacArthur finished with 119 points, while the Hawks had 98. Vernon, hampered without sprinter Earl Wilson who pulled up lame in the sprint relay, finished third with 91 points.

Fuller, on his first throw in the preliminaries, let loose a heave of 165-4 to set his new record. Preliminary measurements count in field

The senior Hawk's shot put of 51-4 was good enough for the division win, but Rider's John Blue set a new meet record in that event, competing in Div. III. Blue's toss was 58-8, breaking the record of Hirschi's Don Carlson set in 1975, by six

The third meet standard raised was by Rider's Brad Robertson, who cleared 13-9 in the pole vault. His performance bested the meet standard held by Iowa Park's Jim Dooley, 13-3, set last year.

Runners picking up most of the points in the finals for Iowa park were miler Anthony Crittenden, sprinter Andy Sitgreaves and hurler Jeff Nolen.

In the only controversy of the meet, Sitgreaves was overlooked in the 220-yard dash, and was given sixth place. Observers had him finishing either third or fourth.

Childress humbled the Div. I opponents, amassing an amazing 155 points to



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
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
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
