FORMER COUNTY JUDGE DIES IN FLORIDA

A pioneer Wichita county attorney and former county judge, Harvey Harris, 64, and brother of Mrs. J. E. Johnson, died recently in Tallahassee, Fla., at the home of a daughter. Funeral services were held in Wichita Falls.

Mr. Harris came to Wichita county in 1903 from Ellis county. His parents settled west of town on the old Electra road. He served as county judge from 1914 until 1918.

Mrs. Johnnie (Anell) Johnson, who lives northwest of town, was a sister of Judge Harris.

Visiting Minister to Direct Visitation for Christian Church

Sunday begins a week of visitation for members of the Christian church here, with leadership of Howard Marshall, minister at Knox City. He will preach both services that day. He will direct the calling program Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings as the selected callers meet at 6:30 for supper and instructions and home visits till 9:00 p.m.

Before going to Knox City, Mr. Marshall was associate minister of the Mt. Auburn church in Dallas. There he worked with Rev. Wilbur Mendel, whose wife is the former Jessie Van Horn of Iowa Park.

During next week he will be one of 400 or so ministers leading a statewide program of evangelism seeking 10,000 for Christ in March.

March 15 is Decision Sunday, when at least ten persons will answer the invitation hymn. The service of baptism will climax the day at the evening worship period. Four informative sessions via "tell & vision" conducted by the minister Chester Gleason, titled "Four Great Nights" about the Christian church will occur on March 16, 17, 18, 19. Aided with special music, these services will be of interest to new members as well as the public. The four lessons will be concerned with the questions "Whence, Whither, Where and How the Christian Church?"

Illness Cuts Strength Of Hawks at Tourney

Queen City defeated the Hawks 57-41 in regional play in Denton last Friday. The Hawks were handicapped by illness. Jim Jenkins, 6-3 center, had the flu all week and only played about a minute.

James Williams, 6-0 guard, had an infected hand and had to go to the Denton hospital the night before the game. Mickey Sewell, 6-1 forward, played some but had to go to the hospital after the game with the flu.

The loss gave the Hawks a final season record of 20 wins and 12 losses, despite losing 8 of their first 12 games. The Hawks won 14 straight at one time during the season.

Iowa Park was undefeated on its home court this season with 11 victories. The Hawks won the first district basketball championship this year since 1946.

MAIL DELIVERY

For Iowa Park will be realized if requirements can be met. The mail delivery committee of the Chamber of Commerce has already done considerable groundwork and is continuing to put forth every effort to insure the people of Iowa Park this service. Committee includes Chauncey Weiler, A. W. Perry, W. R. Pastusek and E. E. Voyles.

REQUEST

A petition has been placed in the City Hall for the convenience of all interested persons. It is to the Postmaster General at Washington and reads: "We, the undersigned residents of Iowa Park, request an investigation for the purpose of establishing City Delivery in Iowa Park." The petition requests only an inspection of Iowa Park for the purpose of attaining mail delivery.

REQUIREMENTS

Include paved or gravel streets, street lights, street markers and correct house numbering. The town is being checked closely for number of paved and gravel streets and street lights.

Material is on hand for the making of additional street markers where new streets have opened or old signs have been destroyed.

Miles Thompson is helping solve the house numbering problem by a house to house contact. He will tell you your correct number, and if you wish, he will put numbers up for you. This is a personal service of Mr. Thompson's; but the Chamber of Commerce approved it because it facilitates the program.

A "MUST"

All numbers must be on the houses before the Post Office inspector comes to visit Iowa Park. The co-operation of every citizen is asked in order to get Mail Delivery for Iowa Park.

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Kite Flyers Told of Electric Line Dangers

Texas Electric Service company this week appealed to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires.

The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is one that is lots of fun for children if it is done safely. Pat Pastusek, TESCO manager, pointed out, "Many don't realize the dangers in this pastime if safety rules are not observed, the most important of which is: Never fly kites where there is the possibility of their getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other dangerous practices include using metallic cord or wire for a kite string; making the kite frame of metal; flying kites in rain when even a cotton string can become a conductor of electricity; and trying to retrieve a kite in case it gets caught in electric wires.

"Local youngsters have been cooperative in the past and we've had no serious mishaps in several years, but over the nation each year there are many cases of injury to kite flyers," Pat said.

Such a situation usually means that the hunted and despised creature was keeping in check another, that they were keeping the numbers of the second species to such a minimum that it had passed unnoticed until the pressure was off.

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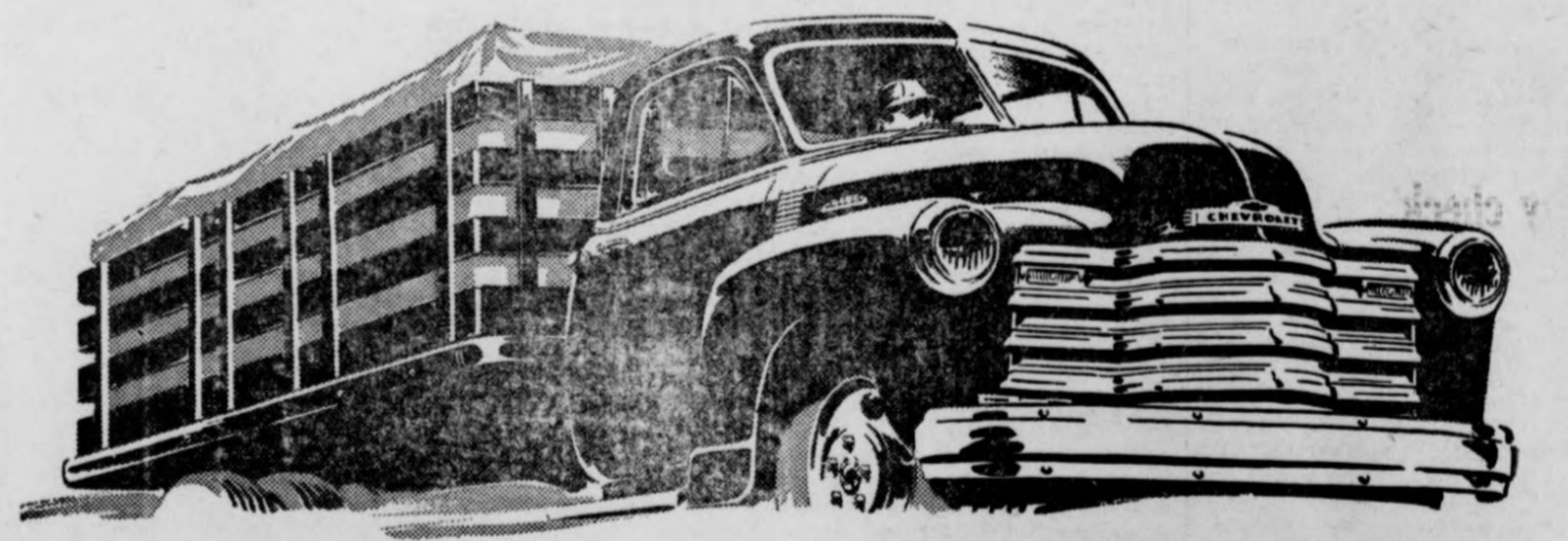

Park Boy Builds New Church at Muenster

Andy Stowe, former Iowa Park boy whose parents Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Stowe reside here, dedicated the First Baptist church in Muenster in a special ceremony recently.

The church is a brick veneer built in the shape of a "T." There are 12 separate Sunday School class rooms, a kitchenette and an auditorium which seats 200. This is the first and only protestant church Muenster has ever had.

Mr. Stowe reports that during the past three months there has been a 78 per cent increase in attendance of the Sunday School, with 31 additions to the church. He is living in Muenster with his wife Betty, and is full time pastor of the church.

Soil Conservation

Accomplishments of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District during 1952 were announced this week by T. J. Pace, chairman of the board of supervisors.

During the year the number of farmers and ranchers co-operating with the district totaled 1313.

Following is a summary of the practices applied through assistance of the SCS: contour farming 11,577 acres; cover cropping 9,050 acres; stubble mulching 27,432 acres; range improvement 2,633 acres; pasture improvement 2,748 acres; seeding of range 234 acres; seeding of pasture 516 acres; wild-life area improvement 25 acres; farm and ranch ponds 181; terracing 198 miles; field diversions 23 miles; farm drainage 431 acres; open drains 4 miles; land leveling 467 acres; improved water application 212 acres; water facilities 15; farm waterways 27; rotation hay and pasture 3,751 acres; conservation irrigation systems 469 acres.

Supervisors recognized assistance to Districts from the following groups and agencies: Extension Service, County PMA, Soil Conservation Service, Bridwell Awards program, District Agricultural Workers council, daily and weekly newspapers, Chambers of Commerce and Service clubs, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Wichita County Water Improvement districts.

Students from Wichita Falls, Iowa Park, Valley View, Electra, Harrod, Burk Burnett and county 4-H members wrote more than 300 essays for the "Save the Soil, Save Texas" contest.

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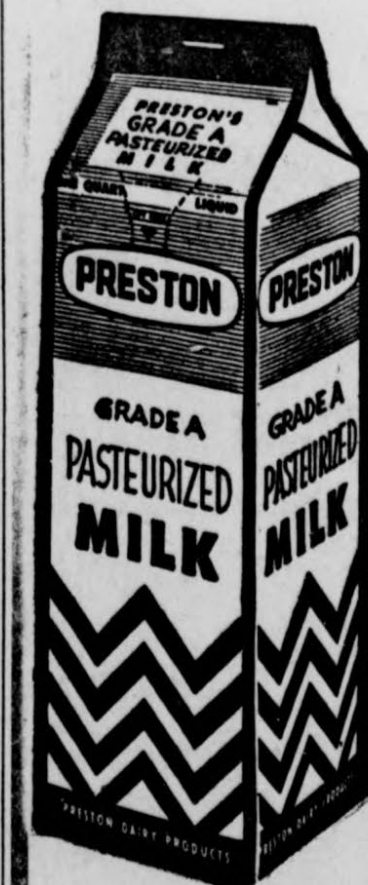
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Juanelle James and Dale Hansard Wed Here February 27

net. She wore a stole of lace and a halo headdress of blue lace and seed pearls. She carried a crescent bouquet of red carnations.

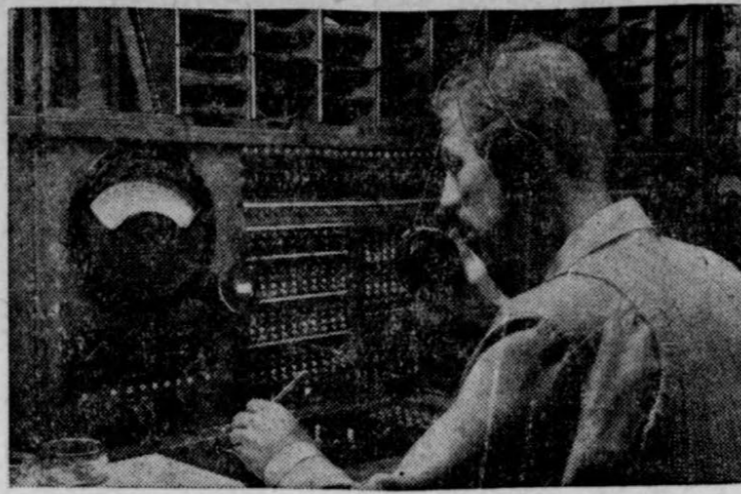
