





Cook of the Week

The New Year's festivities in America are over, but that is not true in every part of the world. In Singapore, where Alene (Mrs. Jack) Onstead spent four years when her husband was working there for Haliburton, the celebration will fall late in January or February.

This will be a most colorful day there and will be greeted with firecrackers and music. Traditional red banners will decorate entrances to houses, while the interiors will be appropriately decorated to signify the birth of a new span of life.

The biggest dinner of all during two weeks of celebration will be New year's Eve when imported foods from Swatow or Hong Kong are served and relatives come from far and near to join.

The celebration has gastronomical significance because it is when the Kitchen God is supposed to be sent from heaven to report the doings of the household. He is not too popular with the people who are fearful of his tales, and they welcome the appearance of a discreet God. Their fear of the first god causes them to pay their debts, patch their quarrels, give generously to charity, put away everything old and purchase new things.

Mrs. Onstead shares the recipe for one of her favorite Singapore dishes, Satay, served with Peanut Sauce, with us today, along with four "good old Texas" recipes.

The former Alene Johnson was graduated from Iowa Park High School. Following her marriage, she moved away from here but moved back in 1979 when the family's home was destroyed in the torndado that hit Wichita Falls. Her husband works for Haliburton. They have two daughters, one son and seven grandchildren.

Mrs. Onstead attends the Church of Christ. Her hobbies are eggery, hooked rugs, reading, bridge, "42" and making Christmas tree ornaments.

SATAY

Satay is barbecued meat on a stick. It is served with a sauce by dipping the meat-stick and all- into the sauce. The meat used can be either beef, chicken, lamb, liver, shrimp or pork.

1½ lbs. of fillet steak cut up into bite-size chunks. Marinate the meat in 1 tablespoon soy sauce combined with 1 teaspoon salt and 1 mashed garlic bud for two hours. Put the meat on wooden sticks or skewers. Spread with butter and more soy sauce. Grill over open charcoal coals (no flame and thin ash on top) for five minutes turning constantly.

PEANUT SAUCE

1¹/₂ tsps. lime juice or lemon juice ¹/₂ large Bombay onion (minced) Salt to taste

- 1 tsp. dried red pepper leaves
- 1 tsp. brown sugar
- 1 tsp soy sauce

2 cups crunchy style peanut butter Combine the above ingredients and

cook over fire for five minutes. Fry the other half of the Bombay onion (chopped) or five small local red onions (chopped) until golden brown. When the Satay is ready to serve put the heated sauce into a separate bowl, a gravy boat is recommended because it is long and the whole of the stick may be dipped at a time, and sprinkle the fried onions on top of both the sauce and cooked Satay.

EASY PEACH COBBLER

³/₄ stick margarine
³/₄ cup sugar
³/₄ cup flour
³/₄ cup milk
Pinch of salt
1 tsp. baking powder

2 cups sliced fresh or frozen peaches Melt margarine in baking dish in oven Mix other ingredients, except

oven. Mix other ingredients, except peaches, and pour into melted margarine. Add peaches. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees. Batter rises to the top and browns.

CRANBERRY SALAD

1 lb. raw cranberries, crushed 1 can crushed pineapple

3 cups sugar Mix together and let set overnight. In another bowl, mix 1 pint

BARBECUE GROUND AND CORNED BEEF

2 lbs. ground beef, browned and drained

- 1 chopped onion, cooked 1-12 oz. can corned beef
- 1-16 oz. jar barbecue sauce
- 1 tsp. dry mustard
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar

Mix and cook together over low heat, then simmer for 10 minutes.

MANDARIN ORANGE CAKE

1 Duncan Hines yellow cake mix 1-12¹/₂ oz. cans mandarin oranges ²/₃ cup cooking oil 4 eggs

Mix all together. Cook in a tube pan at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes to 1 hour. While cake is hot, pour pineapple juice over cake and let set in pan to cool.

ICING

1-8 oz. carton Kool Whip

1 small instant pkg. vanilla pudding 1 large can crushed pineapple

Drain pineapple (juice used above). Mix together and put on cake after it is cool.

STEAK IN MUSHROOM SAUCE

1 to 1¹/₂ lbs. round steak 1 can cream of mushroom sauce Salt and pepper to taste

Cut steak into individual pieces. Flour each piece well on both sides. Brown in hot fat. Pour can of mushroom soup over steak. Add 1 can of water. Cover and simmer for about an hour.


Microwave cooking sorority topic

Miss Nanette Page, Texas Electric home economist, presented an informative program and demonstration of microwave cooking Tuesday evening for Epsilon Eta chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha in a meeting held in the Reddy Room. Hostesses were Mmes. Carter Pirkle, Connie Johnson and Doug Johnson. In giving the history of the microwave, Miss Page said that in the early 1940s, Dr. Percy Spencer was doing some work for the military when he found a melted candy bar in his pocket. He was working with high-frequency radio waves gener-

high-frequency radio waves generated by a form of vacuum tube, called magneton, used for radar technology. Continuing, the speaker said that the experiments led to the discovery that the waves, when confined in a metal cavity or "oven" would quickly

penetrate food and vibrate moisture molecules, and this vibration actually cooked food. Dr. Spencer's research of his discovery continued and the first consumer microwave ovens were on the market in the 1950s.

In giving the advantages of microwave cooking, Miss Page said that it could save more than 75 percent in energy costs because food cooks in one fourth the conventional time, and that food could be prepared ahead of time in serving dishes which means less clean-up, no heated kitchens, fewer dishes in the dish washers.



The speaker concluded by saying that the output wattage or power varies from 450 to 700 watts, and that will affect the speed; the higher the wattage the faster the cooking will





Maybe it's just my timing of watching television newscasts, but it seems to me that the network reporters are working overtime covering people who are complaining about the hard economic times, and

The welfare recipients, the big city politicians, the laid-off auto workers, scientists, health workers, . . . gosh, the list goes on and on ... are telling it like it is. They can't get along without government money or support or something.

all blaming it on Pres. Reagan.

I know it's rough on local businesses, but I think the heads of American auto companies are on the right track. For years, the auto workers' unions have been telling the manufacturers just what was going to happen, how much pay and how many benefits the workers would receive, or the plants would be shut down by strike.

Not the workers who were employed by plants which have closed are blaming the management and the fact that Americans have turned to buying foreign imports.

Less than five years ago I wrote in this space that the auto workers would price themselves out of the market.

Well that's just what a manufacturing spokesman said recently. He said the workers would have to cut back on their demands and increase their workmanship, or they were out of a job. And, boy, it's something the workers just can't understand or take!

The Reagan administration has been cutting back on government spending, but wherever the cutbacks occur, those affected say it's going to ruin the nation, their services can't be done without.

Well, after the administration has, with the help of congress, cut back \$40-billion in the budget, it now appears built-in increases will create a deficit for next fiscal year well over \$100-billion.

The voters elected Reagan, and I think they did it because the majority recognized that this nation could not continue the route it was taking, financially.

An American family of four today, with an income of \$23,000, actually has five percent less purchasing power than a family in 1970 with a \$10,000 income. And it is all primarily due to government spending and borrowing.

Remember those billions of dollars I was talking about that have been cut in the budget? Have you any idea how much money that really is? The politicians and media are tossing the term "billions" around so loosely these days, it doesn't seem like much. I read the other day that if you were to count 100 of them each minute, 40 hours a week, and not reach a billion in a 100-year period.

That \$100-billion deficit I mentioned for the government's budget. .

... it wasn't very many years ago that

I remember congress being asked to approve an unprecedented deficit of \$100-million.

There is no question that lots of people are going to be hurt, for a period of time, with these cutbacks. We've got to adjust, like maybe having our children eat breakfast before they go to school, and maybe carrying a sandwich and apple for lunch.

We have only two alternatives. adjust to less government spending or continue as we were and complete the goal of total welfare state.

The administration cannot be blamed for all our ails. To think the decades of mismanagement by our elected officials could be changed in a single year is like ordering an air conditioner through Sear's catalog today, and complaining tomorrow because your room wasn't cool.



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
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City to purchase used DPS vehicle

Holliday city council Monday night okayed plans to purchase a car from the Texas Department of Public Safety during their first meeting of 1982 which lasted a little over two hours.

The car, to replace the old patrol car now used by chief of police Lomax Campbell, will be picked by Campbell and city administrator Jim Hamill when the two travel to DPS office in Austin in the near future.

Campbell explained to the council his conversations with DPS officials which led to the proposed purchase. The city has a choice between two models, a 1979 Chrysler Newport with a 360-hp engine, or a 1980 Plymouth with a 318-hp engine. Asked which car he preferred at this point, Campbell said the 1979 model was probably the better of the two. According to Campbell, several

sheriff departments in West Texas have been purchasing the used cars, which were driven either by DPS supervisors or used as patrol cars, and have had good success with them. Prices for the used cars are \$2,750 for the 1979 model, and \$3,000 for the 1980 model. Each used car has over 50,000 miles travel time logged, but according to DPS officials in Austin, each has been overhauled and serviced before resold to another agency.

"They told me that the cars are in fine shape, and they would personally pick out seven or so cars for us to choose from," said Campbell.

Mayor James Cook, citing the shortage of city vehicles, especially in the water department, told aldermen the idea was a good one, and would actually save the city money in the long run.

Hamill will be given the old patrol car to use in his capacity as city

manager, and the pickup now being used by Hamill will go to city water superintendent Morganna Thorn, which will give the water department two vehicles. Mrs. Thorn, when asked if the water department has been hampered in the past because of the vehicle shortage, said it was especially difficult when the workers are engaged in jobs at different locations and require her supervision.

Cook informed aldermen that, although the city had not reflected the purchase of a patrol car in their fiscal budget for this year, they also did not reflect additional sources of income which has added approximately \$16,000 to city coffers, therefore the purchase would not necessarily put the city in a financial bind.

City attorney Gary Southard, when asked if the purchase would violate

state law if no bids were advertised, said any purchase under \$3,000 can be made without bidding, according to a 1980 revision of the law.

In other business, aldermen approved a water tap for Gil Peters with an amendment to the motion to refuse additional water tap requests for Eagle Drive at this time, tabled action on a request to install a fence at Stonewall Jackson Camp, and discussed the upcoming water association dinner to be held Jan. 21 in Holliday.

Council okayed a request for an additional water tap for Peters, who was present at the meeting, but at the same time halted future requests for additional taps until a study can be made to ascertain whether use of the water line on Eagle Drive is within guidelines set by the state.

According to Mrs. Thorn, each water tap must have a minimum of 15-pounds pressure, but some residents, including alderman John Goforth, have complained in the past of the lack of water pressure in their lines.
