## Varsity teams entered in Wichita Falls Classic

Both varsity basketball teams will be seeing action this weekend in the Wichita Falls Classic tournament.

The Hawks will be trying to capture their third tourney trophy of the season, while the Hawkettes will be trying to make it two-in-a-row after they and their male counterparts captured the Holliday meet prior to Christmas holidays.

For both teams, a look at some of their Dist. 3-AAAAA competition will be on hand. In the boys' bracket, Graham, Burkburnett and Hirschi will be there from the Hawks' conference, while the girls' bracket will include Hirschi and Burkburnett.

Besides having both Wichita Falls High and Rider in the boys' bracket, the Hawks could possibly meet the Pampa Harvesters, who will be dropping down from AAAAAA classification next fall. Pampa has been a dominant figure in Panhandle area basketball for decades.

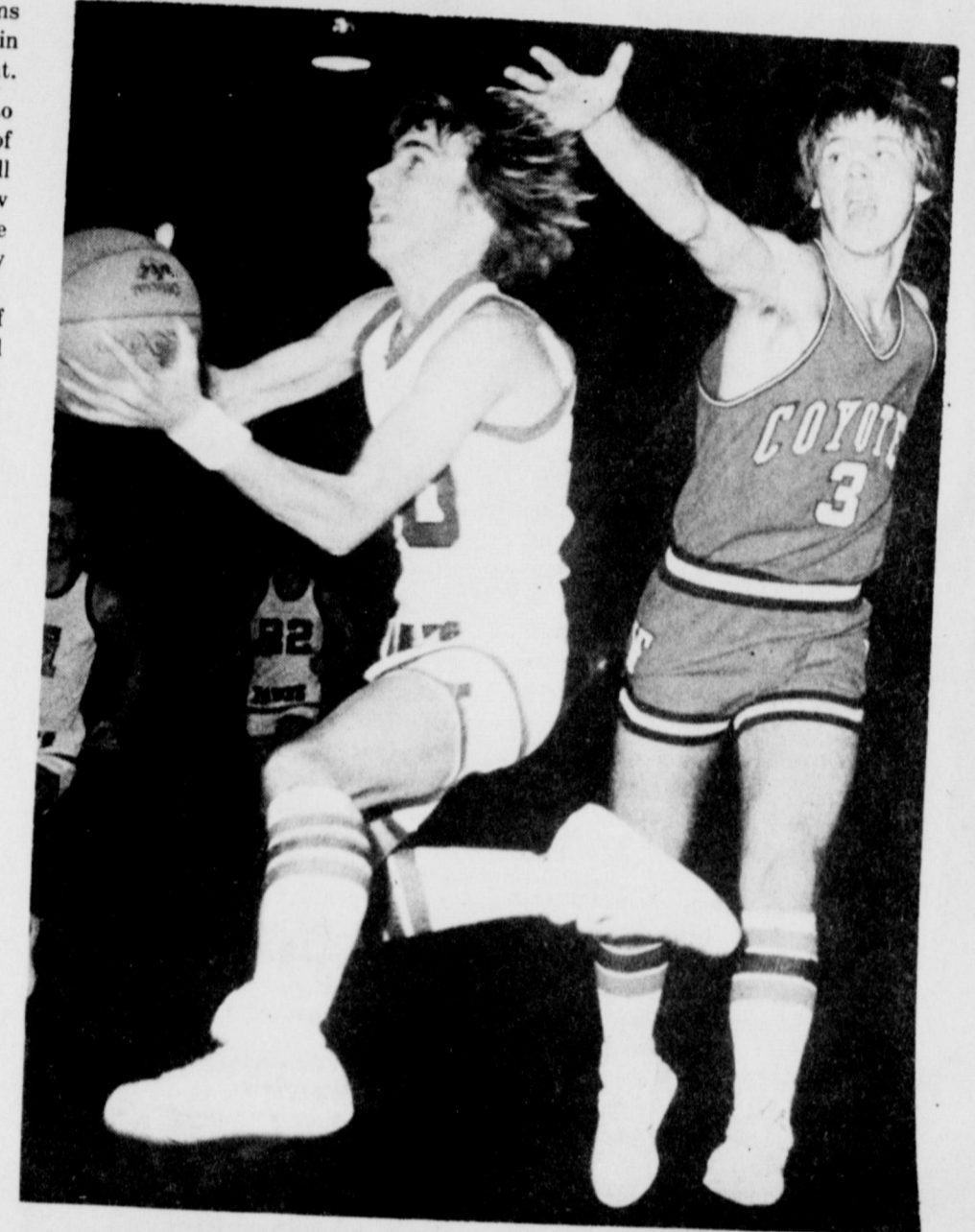
The Hawks will meet the Coyotes at 6:15 this evening. The winner will play the Burkburnett-Pampa winner at 6:15 p.m. Friday, and losers of the two opening games will play at 4:30 Friday.

Hirschi drew a first-round bye, and Rider and Graham tee off at 8 this evening.

Consolation final will be played at 2:30 p.m. Saturday; third place at 4:15 and championship at 7:45. All boys' games will be played in the Rider gymnasium.

All girls' games will be played in the Hirschi gymnasium, except the 6 p.m. championship game Saturday, which will be at Rider.

The Hawkettes will meet Rider at 10 this morning, followed at 11:30 by the Hirschi-Wichita Falls contest. Burkburnett drew a first-round bye. Burkburnett will play the loser of



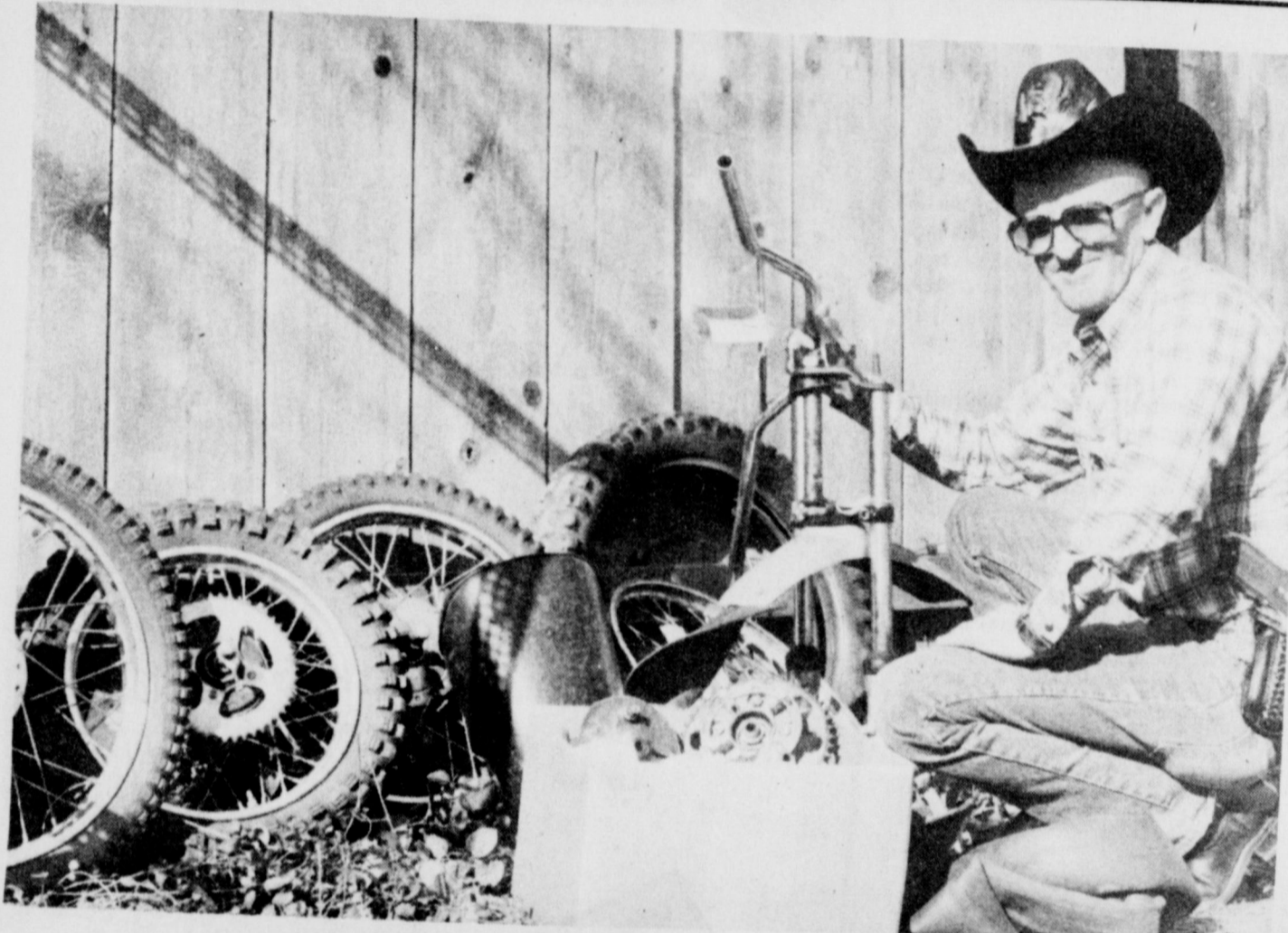
KEVIN BIDDY DRIVES FOR A LAYUP AGAINST COYOTE ... guard stole ball from Old High dribbler Tuesday night.

the Hirschi-Wichita Falls High game at 5:30 this evening. The winner of that game will play the winner of the Iowa Park-Rider game at 7:30 p.m. Friday. That game will follow a 6 p.m. tipoff between the losers of the Thursday morning games.

The Hawkettes will carry an 8-3 record into the tournament, while the

Hawks are 13-2.

This will be the final action for the Hawks before they take on Vernon Friday of next week in the district opener. The Hawkettes will travel to Electra Tuesday for their final pre-district tuneup. The Electra trip will be a tripleheader, with the freshmen starting at 4:30, followed by the junior varsity.

## Investigator clears motorcycle thefts

An ongoing investigation by Iowa Park police officer Billy Hamilton has led to the recovery of five motorcycles which were taken in separate thefts in Iowa Park since early November.

According to Hamilton, seven or eight suspects are still being

investigated. Their ages range from 13 to 48 years old. Restitutions have already been made to some owners of the vehicles while all five owners have been contacted as to the condition of their bikes.

"They tried to disguise the bikes by switching tires, handle bars and tanks and painting the bikes different

colors," Hamilton said.

And, according to the three-year veteran of the Iowa Park police force, one suspect set fire to a trash dumpster which contained the body of one of the stolen bikes. "He thought the tank on the bike was full of gas, and would explode, but we got to it before the evidence was

destroyed," said Hamilton.

The rash of motorcycle thefts in Iowa Park began in November, but all were apparently unrelated and not the result of a theft ring.

"They worked strictly on their own," Hamilton said.

## 1981 permits almost \$2-million

For a year in which building permits for two months amounted to less than \$21,000, construction during 1981 in Iowa Park really wasn't all that bad.

Thanks to two major commercial projects and 21 new homes, the year's permits amounted to \$1,993,809. It

appears to contradict construction reports for most of the rest of the nation.

Wal-Mart's permit was reported on the December list, and it was a good thing. Besides the \$805,833 permit for the big store at the old fair grounds, only two other permits were issued during December, and they totalled

only \$230.

The other two permits were: Johnny D. Lee, 116 West Garden, addition, \$180; and Walter B. West Jr., 616 West Washington, addition, \$50.

July was the second highest month for permits, with \$266,329. That month's list included the West Highway Car Wash and permits for four new homes.

The first month of the year was the best for new residence construction permits, five. No permits for new homes were listed in February, May, August or October.

## Fund established to assist parents of baby with cancer

A fund has been established at State National Bank to assist the parents of a four-month-old daughter who has contracted cancer.

The Miranda James Special fund was opened this week at the bank to help offset expenses incurred by Mr. and Mrs. David James, residents of Woodbriar Apartments.

The baby, who is to be four months old next Wednesday, is in Wichita General Hospital after having spent a month in a Dallas hospital.

Though the parents have hospitalization insurance, the father is service department foreman for Barbour Trucking, there are still numerous supply expenses not paid by the insurance, including their personal expenses in Dallas.

Physicians determined the infant had "medulla blascoma" cancer Thanksgiving week. She was treated

until Christmas week in Dallas and returned to Wichita Falls.

Miranda is the youngest infant, under 15 months of age, to have contracted the cancer, according to physicians.

Donations made at the bank can be deposited to the "Miranda James Special" fund.

## Truck weighing stations slated

Two truck weighing stations near Iowa Park will be the topic of a preconstruction conference Monday in Wichita Falls.

The weighing stations will be located on either side of US 287, approximately three miles west of Iowa Park. A&A Contractors, Inc., of Olney submitted the low bid for the work with a bid of \$121,142.

Work on the projects includes grading, base and a two course surface treatment. Work is expected to begin shortly after the preconstruction conference.

The conference will be held at 2 p.m., at the resident engineer's office of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, 1601 Southwest Parkway.

There aren't many honors at Midwestern State Univ. not yet received by Cindy Flanagan, 1978 Iowa Park High graduate.

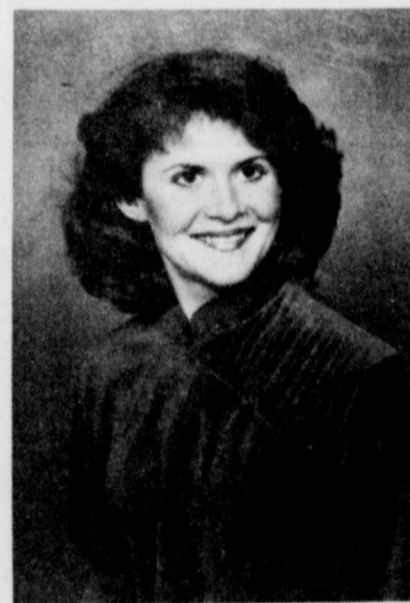

## News in brief

### Rich, Skinner recognized

Two members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department were singled out Tuesday night for special awards.

Presentations were made at the organization's annual banquet to Gus Rich, Fireman of the Year, and Danny Skinner, Special Services award.

### Meetings to be 'short, sweet'

Both the city council and school board meetings set next week apparently will be "short and sweet." The council is to meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers and school board at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at the administration building.

Early indications are that each will have three items on their agendas, other than the usual monthly reports.

Two of the city's agenda items are about a proposed sanitary landfill site. A revised lease agreement concerning the site southwest of town will be considered, and aldermen will

be asked to authorize Biggs and Mathews, Wichita Falls engineering firm, to process the landfill permit on the state level.

Aldermen will also hear a review of the past year's audit by a new auditing firm from Dallas.

School trustees always consider the superintendent's yearly extension of contract in January; they will take action on hiring a new vocational agriculture teacher, Billy Johnson; and hear a report on progress to complete the new gymnasium at the high school.

### Music director suffers stroke

Glenn Schell, music director at First Baptist Church, suffered a stroke Tuesday morning while on the golf course at Weeks Park in Wichita Falls.

He was playing golf with Miles Linder, music director at Fairway Baptist Church, and had played five holes when he slumped over. He managed to get in the golf cart and

Linder drove him back to the clubhouse where an ambulance was called and he was taken to the hospital.

He apparently suffered a stroke on the right side and at presstime Wednesday, he was still unable to talk. According to his physician, the extent of the damage can not be determined until 72 hours from the time he suffered the stroke.

### Sewer pump bid approved

City aldermen, in an emergency session Tuesday evening, approved a bid by Onyx Construction Co. to construct a sewer pump station on Texowa Street.

The bid, \$29,731, was the lowest of three submitted, with the highest set at \$35,980.

Because of time required for delivery and installation, estimated at 60 days, and the condition of the old existing facility, Mayor Johnny Crawford said he felt the emergency meeting was necessary. The council will hold its regular meeting next Monday.

# Cook of the Week

The New Year's festivities in America are over, but that is not true in every part of the world. In Singapore, where Alene (Mrs. Jack) Onstead spent four years when her husband was working there for Haliburton, the celebration will fall late in January or February.

This will be a most colorful day there and will be greeted with firecrackers and music. Traditional red banners will decorate entrances to houses, while the interiors will be appropriately decorated to signify the birth of a new span of life.

The biggest dinner of all during two weeks of celebration will be New Year's Eve when imported foods from Swatow or Hong Kong are served and relatives come from far and near to join.

The celebration has gastronomical significance because it is when the Kitchen God is supposed to be sent from heaven to report the doings of the household. He is not too popular with the people who are fearful of his tales, and they welcome the appearance of a discreet God. Their fear of the first god causes them to pay their debts, patch their quarrels, give generously to charity, put away everything old and purchase new things.

Mrs. Onstead shares the recipe for one of her favorite Singapore dishes, Satay, served with Peanut Sauce, with us today, along with four "good old Texas" recipes.

The former Alene Johnson was graduated from Iowa Park High School. Following her marriage, she moved away from here but moved back in 1979 when the family's home was destroyed in the tornado that hit Wichita Falls. Her husband works for Haliburton. They have two daughters, one son and seven grandchildren.

Mrs. Onstead attends the Church of Christ. Her hobbies are eggery, hooked rugs, reading, bridge, "42" and making Christmas tree ornaments.

## SATAY

Satay is barbecued meat on a stick. It is served with a sauce by dipping the meat-stick and all into the sauce. The meat used can be either beef, chicken, lamb, liver, shrimp or pork.

1 1/2 lbs. of fillet steak cut up into bite-size chunks. Marinate the meat in 1 tablespoon soy sauce combined with 1 teaspoon salt and 1 mashed garlic bud for two hours.

Put the meat on wooden sticks or skewers. Spread with butter and more soy sauce. Grill over open charcoal coals (no flame and thin ash on top) for five minutes turning constantly.

## PEANUT SAUCE

1 1/2 tps. lime juice or lemon juice  
1/2 large Bombay onion (minced)  
Salt to taste

1 tsp. dried red pepper leaves  
1 tsp. brown sugar  
1 tsp. soy sauce  
2 cups crunchy style peanut butter

Combine the above ingredients and cook over fire for five minutes. Fry the other half of the Bombay onion (chopped) or five small local onions (chopped) until golden brown. When the Satay is ready to serve put the heated sauce into a separate bowl, a gravy boat is recommended because it is long and the whole of the stick may be dipped at a time, and sprinkle the fried onions on top of both the sauce and cooked Satay.

## EASY PEACH COBLER

3/4 stick margarine  
3/4 cup sugar  
3/4 cup flour  
3/4 cup milk  
Pinch of salt  
1 tsp. baking powder  
2 cups sliced fresh or frozen peaches  
Melt margarine in baking dish in oven. Mix other ingredients, except peaches, and pour into melted margarine. Add peaches. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees. Batter rises to the top and browns.

## CRANBERRY SALAD

1 lb. raw cranberries, crushed  
1 can crushed pineapple  
3 cups sugar  
Mix together and let set overnight. In another bowl, mix 1 pint whipping cream, whipped, and 1 pkg. small marshmallows. Whip cream, mix with marshmallows and let stand overnight. Then mix the two together; add 1 cup pecans. Can be frozen. Keep in refrigerator.

## BARBECUE GROUND AND CORNED BEEF

2 lbs. ground beef, browned and drained  
1 chopped onion, cooked  
1-12 oz. can corned beef  
1-16 oz. jar barbecue sauce  
1 tsp. dry mustard  
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
1 tsp. salt  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
Mix and cook together over low heat, then simmer for 10 minutes.

## MANDARIN ORANGE CAKE

1 Duncan Hines yellow cake mix  
1-12 1/2 oz. cans mandarin oranges  
3/8 cup cooking oil  
4 eggs  
Mix all together. Cook in a tube pan at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes to 1 hour. While cake is hot, pour pineapple juice over cake and let set in pan to cool.

## ICING

1 8 oz. carton Kool Whip  
1 small instant pkg. vanilla pudding  
1 large can crushed pineapple  
Drain pineapple (juice used above).  
Mix together and put on cake after it is cool.

## STEAK IN MUSHROOM SAUCE

1 to 1 1/2 lbs. round steak  
1 can cream of mushroom sauce  
Salt and pepper to taste

Cut steak into individual pieces. Flour each piece well on both sides. Brown in hot fat. Pour can of mushroom soup over steak. Add 1 can of water. Cover and simmer for about an hour.

## Night WMU meets

The program dealt with communication problems in spreading the gospel and showed how some religious expressions might be misinterpreted. Those who assisted with its presentation were Mmes. Riley Thompson, James Parker and Homer Blalock.

# Microwave cooking sorority topic

Miss Nanette Page, Texas Electric home economist, presented an informative program and demonstration of microwave cooking Tuesday evening for Epsilon Eta chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha in a meeting held in the Reddy Room. Hostesses were Mmes. Carter Pirkle, Connie Johnson and Doug Johnson.

In giving the history of the microwave, Miss Page said that in the early 1940s, Dr. Percy Spencer was doing some work for the military when he found a melted candy bar in his pocket. He was working with high-frequency radio waves generated by a form of vacuum tube, called magnetron, used for radar technology.

Continuing, the speaker said that the experiments led to the discovery that the waves, when confined in a metal cavity or "oven" would quickly penetrate food and vibrate moisture molecules, and this vibration actually cooked food. Dr. Spencer's research of his discovery continued and the first consumer microwave ovens were on the market in the 1950s.

In giving the advantages of microwave cooking, Miss Page said that it could save more than 75 percent in energy costs because food cooks in one fourth the conventional time, and that food could be prepared ahead of time in serving dishes which means less clean-up, no heated kitchens, fewer dishes in the dish washers.

She gave other advantages such as safety stating that the absence of exposed heated surfaces make it safe to operate without danger of burns; the absence of heat prevents spills and splatters from sticking to the oven so cleaning is fast and easy. Nutrition and flavor of food is retained because it cooks quicker with less water and keeps its natural color.

The speaker concluded by saying that the output wattage or power varies from 450 to 700 watts, and that will affect the speed; the higher the wattage the faster the cooking will

be. Mrs. Jimmy Spears conducted the business. Mrs. David Parkey reported that adequate funds had been collected for three spring-animals at Pace Park. Mrs. Robert Needham, reporting on the annual Christmas bazaar, said that it was successful, and a letter of thanks was read from Wichita Falls State

Hospital for Christmas gifts for patients.

Mrs. Spears announced the District VI meeting for Jan. 17, and plans for the April 4 District VI meeting in Iowa Park were discussed. Mrs. Steve Turner is chairman of arrangements for the meeting.

Twenty-one members answered roll call.

# As I See It....

Maybe it's just my timing of watching television newscasts, but it seems to me that the network reporters are working overtime covering people who are complaining about the hard economic times, and all blaming it on Pres. Reagan.

The welfare recipients, the big city politicians, the laid-off auto workers, scientists, health workers, . . . gosh, the list goes on and on . . . are telling it like it is. They can't get along without government money or support or something.

I know it's rough on local businesses, but I think the heads of American auto companies are on the right track. For years, the auto workers' unions have been telling the manufacturers just what was going to happen, how much pay and how many benefits the workers would receive, or the plants would be shut down by strike.

Not the workers who were employed by plants which have closed are blaming the management and the fact that Americans have turned to buying foreign imports.

Less than five years ago I wrote in this space that the auto workers would price themselves out of the market.

Well that's just what a manufacturing spokesman said recently. He said the workers would have to cut back on their demands and increase their workmanship, or they were out of a job. And, boy, it's something the workers just can't understand or take!

The Reagan administration has been cutting back on government spending, but wherever the cutbacks occur, those affected say it's going to ruin the nation, their services can't be done without.

Well, after the administration has, with the help of congress, cut back \$40-billion in the budget, it now appears built-in increases will create a deficit for next fiscal year well over \$100-billion.

The voters elected Reagan, and I think they did it because the majority recognized that this nation could not

continue the route it was taking, financially.

An American family of four today, with an income of \$23,000, actually has five percent less purchasing power than a family in 1970 with a \$10,000 income. And it is all primarily due to government spending and borrowing.

Remember those billions of dollars I was talking about that have been cut in the budget? Have you any idea how much money that really is? The politicians and media are tossing the term "billions" around so loosely these days, it doesn't seem like much.

I read the other day that if you were to count 100 of them each minute, 40 hours a week, and not reach a billion in a 100-year period.

That \$100-billion deficit I mentioned for the government's budget. . . it wasn't very many years ago that

I remember congress being asked to approve an unprecedented deficit of \$100-million.

There is no question that lots of people are going to be hurt, for a period of time, with these cutbacks. We've got to adjust, like maybe having our children eat breakfast before they go to school, and maybe carrying a sandwich and apple for lunch.

We have only two alternatives, adjust to less government spending or continue as we were and complete the goal of total welfare state.

The administration cannot be blamed for all our ills. To think the decades of mismanagement by our elected officials could be changed in a single year is like ordering an air conditioner through Sear's catalog today, and complaining tomorrow because your room wasn't cool.

## Man killed when derrick falls

A former Iowa Park man was seriously injured and a Wichita Falls man killed when the drilling rig they were working on collapsed around 2:30 p.m. Tuesday in Ponder near Denton.

Killed was Mike Erskine, derrick hand, of Wichita Falls. Clint Owen, formerly of Iowa Park, was also on the derrick with Erskine at the time of the accident, and received severe leg injuries.

Owen was listed in stable condition Wednesday morning in a Denton hospital, but remained in intensive care following surgery Tuesday evening, according to B.G. Byrd, representative of John Swanson Drilling Inc., Rifle Range Road.

According to Byrd, Swanson

officials believe high winds and stress fatigue to the structure was the reason for the collapse of the one-year-old rig. Tentative estimates of the damage to the \$2.5-million rig is \$500,000.

Byrd said crew members, including Iowa Parkans Ricky Merriman and Daryl Dyer, were completing a trip out of the hole that afternoon, with two stands of collars left, when two cable lines broke. Merriman and Dyer escaped injury, but Erskine and Owen were unable to escape from the falling derrick.

The new rig (Rig No. 4) had been in operation in the Gainesville-Denton area since a public showing of the structure in Swanson's yard late last summer.

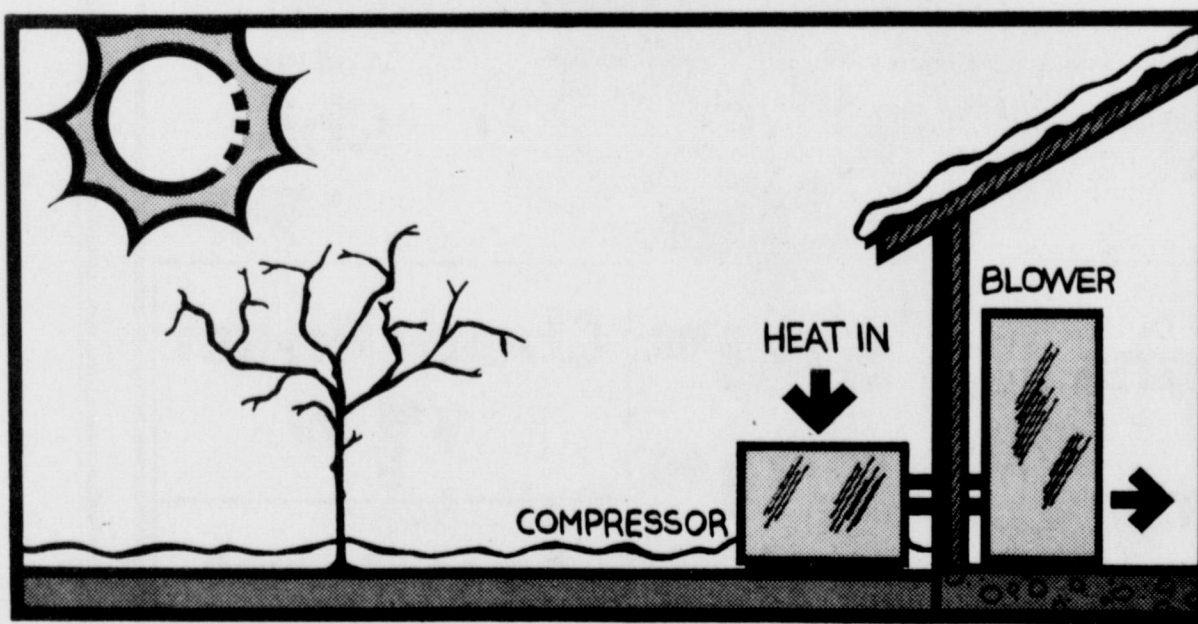

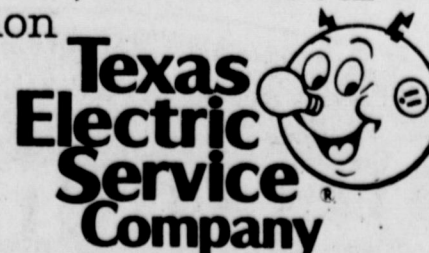

The Hawks had one more field goal, 21-20, than the Coyotes. But they sank only 10 charity shots, on 21 fouls by the visitors, missing the first of several one-and-one trips to the foul line.

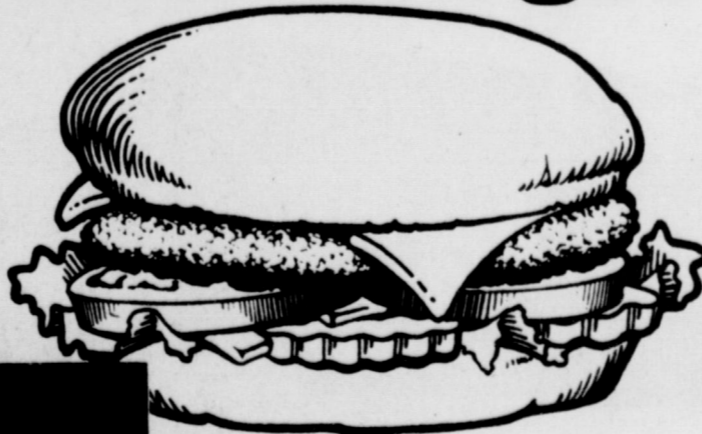

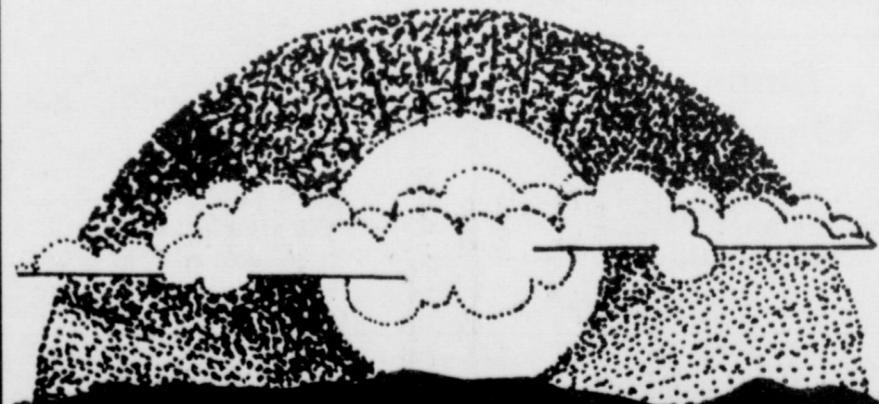

# City to purchase used DPS vehicle

Holliday city council Monday night okayed plans to purchase a car from the Texas Department of Public Safety during their first meeting of 1982 which lasted a little over two hours.

The car, to replace the old patrol car now used by chief of police Lomax Campbell, will be picked by Campbell and city administrator Jim Hamill when the two travel to DPS office in Austin in the near future.

Campbell explained to the council his conversations with DPS officials which led to the proposed purchase. The city has a choice between two models, a 1979 Chrysler Newport with a 360-hp engine, or a 1980 Plymouth with a 318-hp engine. Asked which car he preferred at this point, Campbell said the 1979 model was probably the better of the two.

According to Campbell, several sheriff departments in West Texas have been purchasing the used cars,

which were driven either by DPS supervisors or used as patrol cars, and have had good success with them. Prices for the used cars are \$2,750 for the 1979 model, and \$3,000 for the 1980 model. Each used car has over 50,000 miles travel time logged, but according to DPS officials in Austin, each has been overhauled and serviced before resold to another agency.

"They told me that the cars are in fine shape, and they would personally pick out seven or so cars for us to choose from," said Campbell.

Mayor James Cook, citing the shortage of city vehicles, especially in the water department, told aldermen the idea was a good one, and would actually save the city money in the long run.

Hamill will be given the old patrol car to use in his capacity as city

manager, and the pickup now being used by Hamill will go to city water superintendent Morganna Thorn, which will give the water department two vehicles. Mrs. Thorn, when asked if the water department has been hampered in the past because of the vehicle shortage, said it was especially difficult when the workers are engaged in jobs at different locations and require her supervision.

Cook informed aldermen that, although the city had not reflected the purchase of a patrol car in their fiscal budget for this year, they also did not reflect additional sources of income which has added approximately \$16,000 to city coffers, therefore the purchase would not necessarily put the city in a financial bind.

City attorney Gary Southard, when asked if the purchase would violate

state law if no bids were advertised, said any purchase under \$3,000 can be made without bidding, according to a 1980 revision of the law.

## OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, aldermen approved a water tap for Gil Peters with an amendment to the motion to refuse additional water tap requests for Eagle Drive at this time, tabled action on a request to install a fence at Stonewall Jackson Camp, and discussed the upcoming water association dinner to be held Jan. 21 in Holliday.

Council okayed a request for an additional water tap for Peters, who was present at the meeting, but at the same time halted future requests for additional taps until a study can be made to ascertain whether use of the water line on Eagle Drive is within guidelines set by the state.

According to Mrs. Thorn, each water tap must have a minimum of 15-pounds pressure, but some residents, including alderman John Goforth, have complained in the past of the lack of water pressure in their lines.

Council tabled action on the

controversy at Stonewall Jackson Camp until the next council meeting. Dick Wright, Girl Scout representative, was not present at the meeting. He was to request the installation of gate inside Stonewall Jackson Camp. The North Central Texas Girl Scouts association has requested the installation of the gate to protect the group's interests, which include a large metal building and picnic grounds.

This move has been challenged by the United Confederate Veteran's Association, the original trustees of the camp, saying that a locked gate would prohibit access to the entire

camp, a violation of the original charter.

Aldermen also discussed the problem of stray cattle inside the camp, but no action was taken.

Council instructed Hamill to seek bids for catering the water association dinner, a traditional event which brings together water department officials from neighboring cities. Last year, Hickory Smoke Inn of Holliday catered to approximately 115 guests, and this year officials are expecting around the same number. Cook said Wichita Falls water officials will receive a special invitation to attend this year.

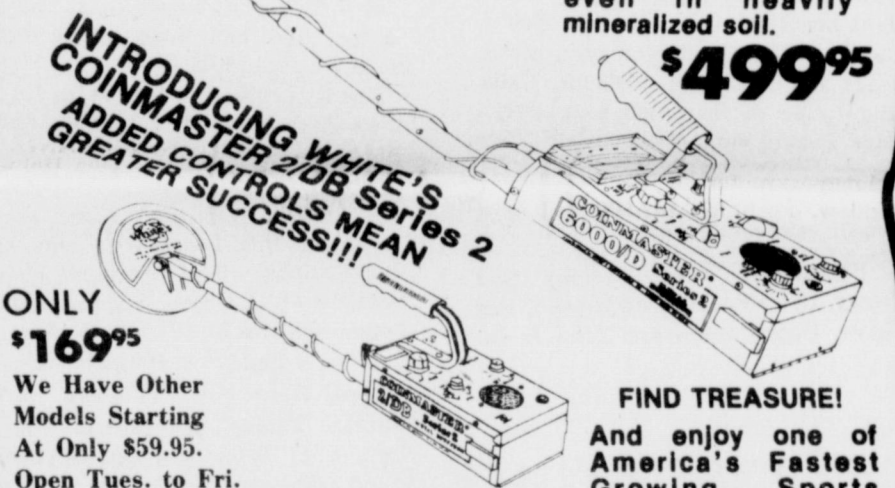

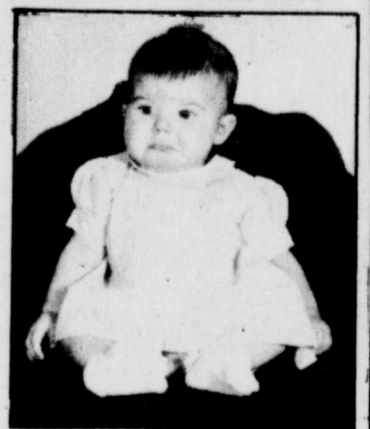

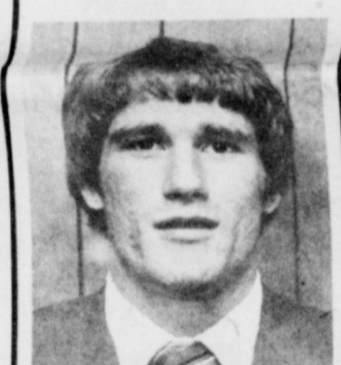
