### Shows reserve champion heifer

The reserve champion beef heifer of the Wichita County beef show eliminations held Saturday in Wichita Falls was exhibited by Becky Whitaker.

Her entry was judged first place among the senior yearling heifers. Becky's brother, Bruce, didn't win

with his entry, but it was named an alternate for the Feb. 10-12 Wichita Falls District Beef Show.

The two are children of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Whitaker.

Also showing entries in Saturday's judging were Kay Stevenson and Toby Grace.

### Cities receive rebate checks

Though Iowa Park's sales tax rebate from the state comptroller's office was \$5,545.57 this month, it was 17.65 percent less than last January's.

Holiday's rebate was 56.14 percent greater than the check received in January of 1981. The check was \$17,631.25.

Iowa Park was not alone among

Texas communities whose rebate checks were less this January than last year. According to the report, 444 of the 737 communities listed received less than last year.

In fact, 67 of them apparently didn't receive a check at all, because their percentage comparison was listed at 100.00%.

## Council's agenda lengthy

City aldermen face a lengthy agenda Monday night, and the topics cover almost every phase of city operations.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Rev. Larry Washburn, pastor of Missionary Baptist Church, is to make a public appearance to appeal for a waiver from paving requirements. Washburn's congregation plans to construct a church at Coleman and Pacific, and will ask to

delay paving of Coleman for a period of time.

Several equipment items have been advertised for bids, and aldermen are to act on bids submitted.

The council will be asked for permission to advertise for a brush chipper and one-ton truck chassis, to replace the brush truck now in use.

Two resolutions will be considered. One would authorize the city to participate in a cooperative purchasing agreement with other entities in the area. The other would extend the

employment contract of Willie Wall, Midwestern State Univ. intern who has worked for the city three months.

Two ordinances will also be considered. One would be a minor change in the basis for establishing sewer rates. The other was discussed during the summer, but no action taken on a request to abandon a 25-foot strip of street from Bank to Texas where a home encroaches on city right-of-way.

Confirmation of city secretary designation, another topic previously discussed but on which no action was taken, will be proposed.

## Hawks 2-0 in district; face tough Steers Friday

The Iowa Park Hawks got on the road during the past week to defending their Dist. 3-AAAA basketball championship, but one of their biggest obstacles loom tomorrow.

In their two conference schedule openers, the Hawks almost doubled Vernon here Friday, 61-32, and Tuesday they shot down Mineral Wells 50-44.

and disappointing. They lost to Vernon 54-63 and Mineral Wells 53-54.

Vernon gave the Hawks a hard time during the first quarter, coming from behind 2-0 to lead 7-0, but from that point on, Iowa Park blew their visitors out of the gym.

Leading by only 8-7 at the first official rest stop, the Hawks out-scored the Lions 15-7 in the second period and 15-4 in the third on their way to the route.

Steve Smith scored 11 points before leaving the court with three minutes remaining in the game, and finished with 22 points. Steve Page added 14 and Bobby Bates 12.

Tuesday night at Mineral Wells, the Hawks held a 10-6 lead after the first quarter, but the Rams outscored Iowa Park 17-11 in the second to lead

23-21 at the half. They extended the lead to 35-28 through the third period as the Hawks experienced a cold eight minutes.

But Smith and Bates got hot in the final period, with Smith scoring a shot from the charity line, and Bates adding three field goals, to lead the Hawk scoring machine. Iowa Park outscored their hosts 22-9 in that frame.

Smith finished with 18 and Page 16, as the Hawks extended their season record to 16-4 and 2-0 in district play.

### GIRLS' GAMES

After leading 23-20 at the halftime, the Hawkettes suffered a bleak third quarter during which Vernon outscored them 22-10. During that period Iowa Park lost the ball numerous times on turnovers and registered very few rebounds at either basket.

Lisa Yeakley led scoring with 14 and Tammie Richardson had 12.

Tuesday's game at Mineral Wells was as close throughout as the final one-point outcome. Mineral Wells led 10-9 after the first quarter, Iowa Park led 27-26 at the half, and they were tied 37-37 going into the final quarter.

Mineral Wells led in field goals, 22-16, but Iowa Park out-scored the hosts 21-10 at the free shot line.

Richardson led Hawkettes scoring with 15 and Yeakley had 11.

### JV SCORES

Against Vernon, the Hawk junior varsity won 50-40, but the Hawkettes JV lost a squeaker, 25-27.

Mineral Wells won both the JV contests Tuesday, 36-30 in the boys' and 28-23 in the girls'.

## Three jailed after chase

When they were stopped by county and local officers, charges were filed against the driver for driving while intoxicated, the other two occupants for drunk in vehicle, and all three for possession of marijuana.

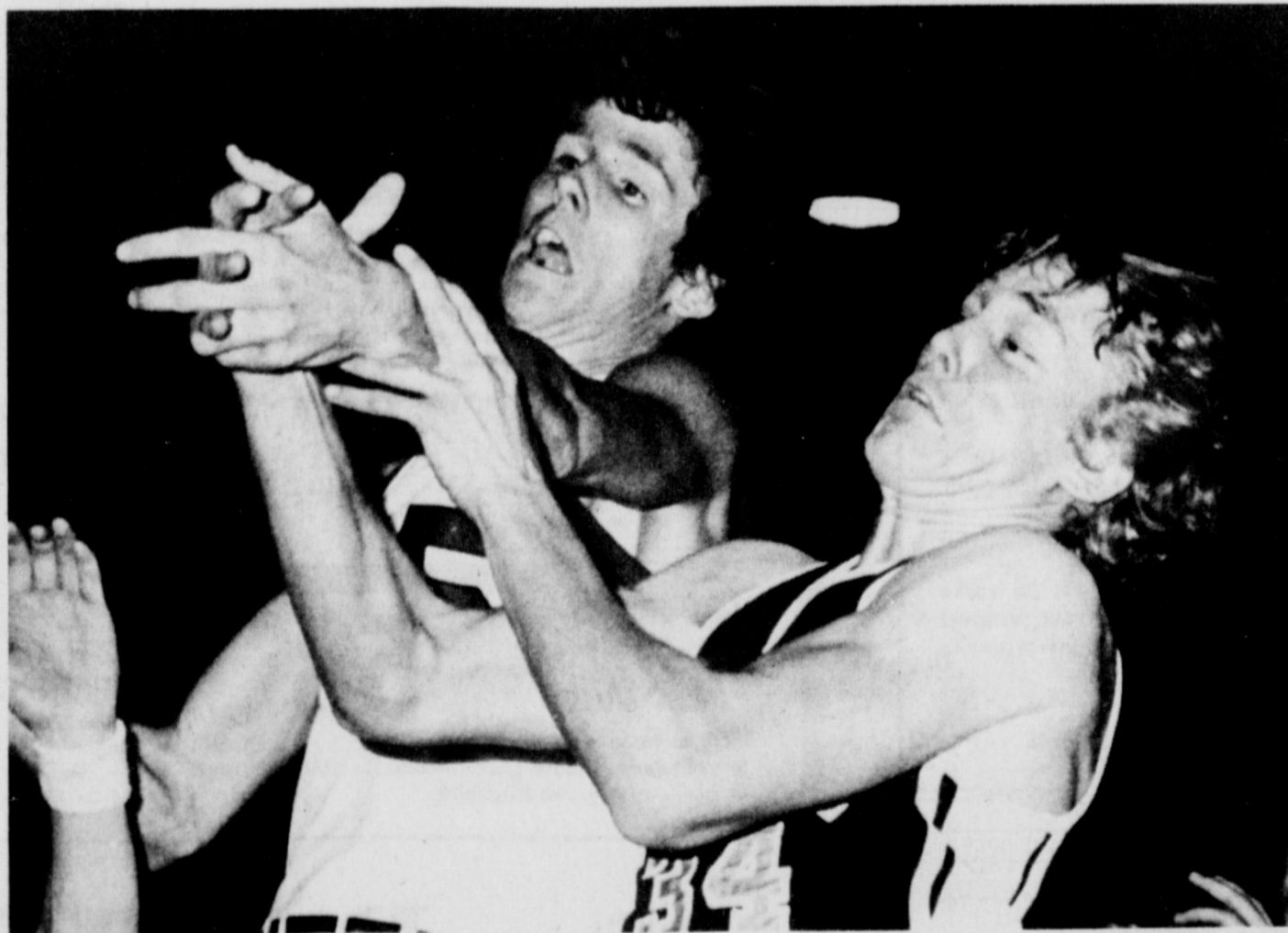

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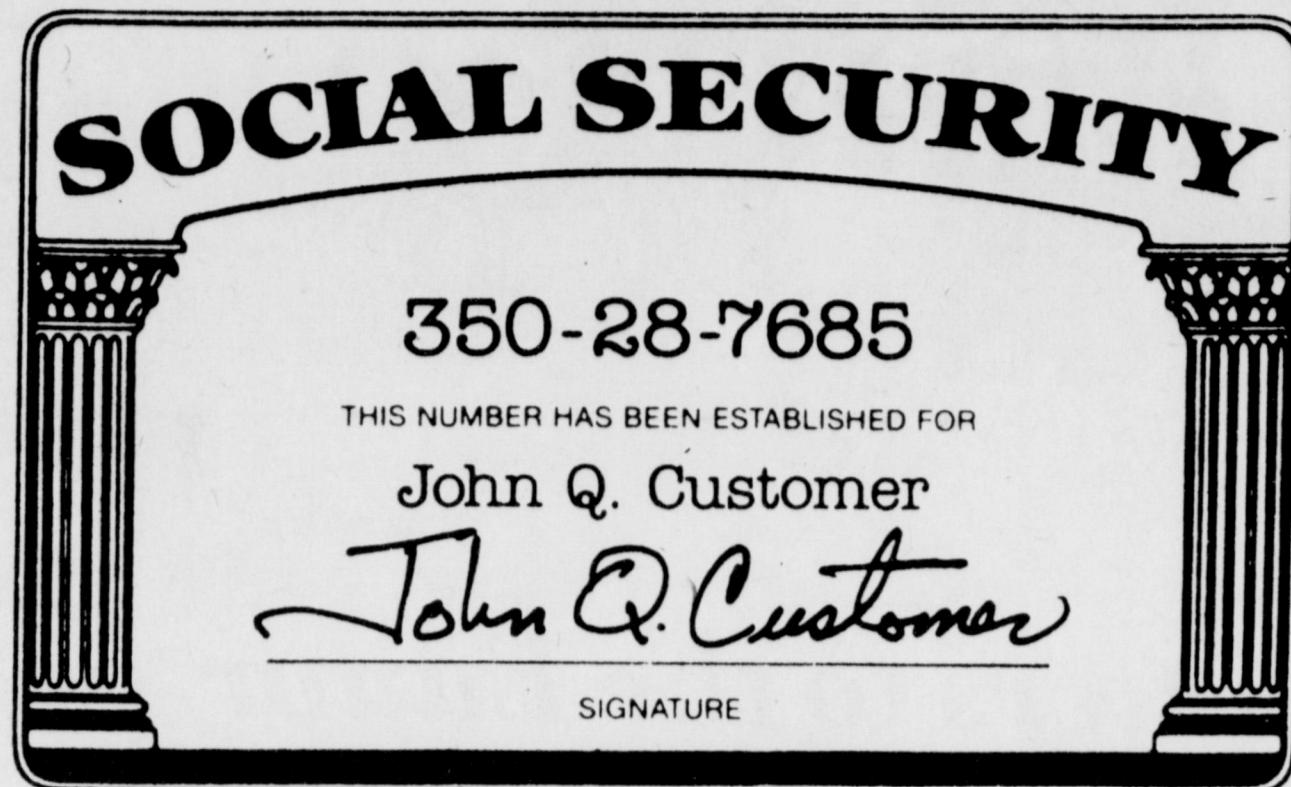

The Region IV Selective Service System office in Dallas would not provide the names of the new board's members by telephone although it was known they had been named.

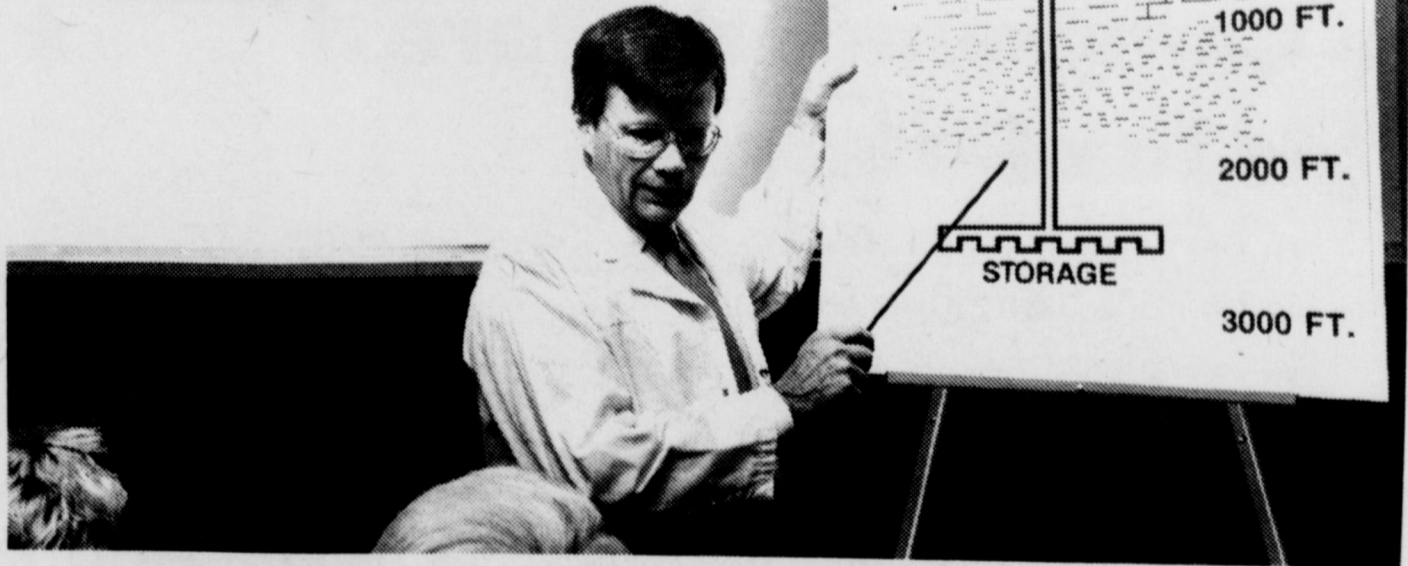
It took a special written request by The Record under terms of freedom of information act to obtain them.

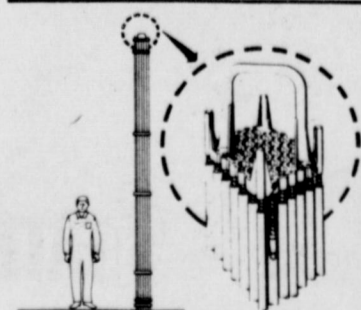

We Americans have always been among the world's foremost inventors and innovators. Scientists in America discovered and proved the principles of nuclear energy, pioneered its commercial use, and



Nuclear fuel is held in 14'-long stainless-steel fuel rod assemblies. About 6% of these assemblies must be removed each year from a 1000-megawatt nuclear reactor and stored in racks under water. Reprocessing would separate waste from reusable fuel and significantly reduce required permanent storage space.

developed safe and practical ways to permanently store nuclear wastes. But while other nations are using these methods of storage, we aren't.

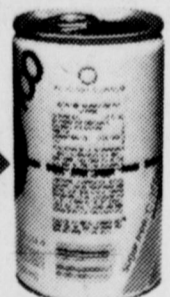
In the United States, spent fuel assemblies are stored at reactor sites. This practice is safe, but unnecessary and expensive for permanent storage.

We know how to recycle spent nuclear fuel. The 3% or less that is waste can be mixed with insoluble glass or ceramic for storage. This process is being used commercially in France, but not in the U.S.

At your electric company, we see the use of nuclear fuel as essential — if you are to continue to have the electricity you need at a reasonable cost. And we need permanent storage facilities for wastes from nuclear power plants.

The Federal Government is responsible for selecting the sites and building these facilities. Users will pay for them. But their construction will take time, while spent fuel accu-

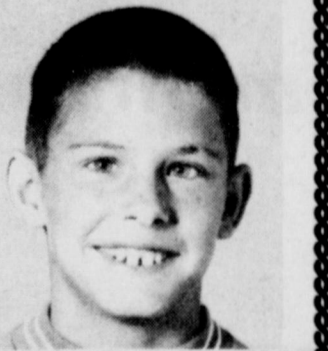

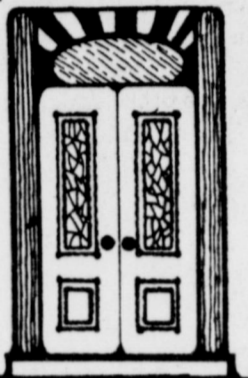

## CHOCOLATE DREAM CAKE

Sift together:  
2 cups sugar  
2 cups flour  
Bring to boil:  
1 stick margarine  
4 T cocoa  
1 cup water  
1/2 cup shortening  
Pour over flour mixture, add 1/2 cup buttermilk in which 1 tsp. soda has been dissolved  
2 eggs, slightly beaten  
Mix all ingredients well and pour into greased and floured 9x12x2 pan. Bake 35 minutes at 400 degrees. Start making icing 5 minutes before cake is done.

## ICING

1 stick oleo  
4 T cocoa  
7 T milk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 box powdered sugar  
1 cup chopped pecans  
Bring oleo, cocoa and milk to boil, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add powdered sugar, nuts and vanilla. Mix well and pour over hot cake.

1 medium onion, minced in blender  
1 tsp. Figaro Liquid Smoke  
1 T brown sugar  
1/4 cup steak sauce  
1/4 cup hot Bar-B-Que sauce  
Simmer above ingredients for 5 minutes  
2 lbs. hamburger meat  
1 T chopped onions  
1 tsp salt  
1/4 tsp. seasoned pepper  
1/4 tsp. garlic salt

Mix all together and form in balls the size of an egg. Brown in skillet; pour off grease. Place in baking dish, pour the sauce over the balls and bake in 350 degree oven until done, about 50 minutes.

## BUTTERMILK PIE

2 cups sugar  
3 T flour  
1/4 tsp nutmeg  
1/2 cup melted butter or oleo  
3 eggs, lightly beaten  
1 cup buttermilk  
Juice of 1 lemon, (3 T)  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 tsp. grated lemon rind  
1-10 inch pie shell, unbaked  
Combine sugar, flour and nutmeg in mixing bowl. Add butter, beat until creamy; stir in eggs, buttermilk, lemon juice and rind. Pour in unbaked pie shell and bake at 325 degrees until knife comes out clean when stuck in center of pie.

## HOT ROLLS

2 cups milk  
2 tsps. salt  
1/4 cup lukewarm water  
1 pkg. yeast  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 cup shortening  
5 or 6 cups flour  
Scald milk, salt, sugar and shortening together; let cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in 1/4 cup lukewarm water, add to milk mixture. Add flour to make soft dough; knead lightly. Place in greased bowl and grease top. Let rise until double in size. Place on floured board. Shape in rolls; turn in greased pan and let rise until double. Bake at 400 degrees until done.

## ICE BOX CAKE

2 eggs  
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar  
1/2 cup oleo, softened  
1 can crushed pineapple, drained  
1 cup nuts, chopped  
1/2 pint whipping cream  
Vanilla wafers  
Cover bottom of pan with crushed vanilla wafers. Mix eggs, sugar and butter and pour over vanilla wafers. Pour pineapple on top of this layer. Whip cream, add nuts and spread on top of other ingredients. Sprinkle crushed wafers on top. Let chill at least 6 hours. Keep refrigerated.

# City joins purchasing group, delays action on TESCO rate

Holliday city council Monday night agreed to join several Wichita County entities in a cooperative purchasing plan, and suspended action for 120 days on a Texas Electric Co. tariff, in action taken during the group's regular meeting.

The Wichita Area Cooperative Purchasing Council, instigated by Iowa Park city manager Steve Morath, will consist of one representative from each entity participating in the program. Interest has been shown by Iowa Park, the city of Wichita Falls, Wichita County, Burkburnett, Electra, and Henrietta.

The essence of the program, according to city administrator Jim Hamill, is to cut costs on materials and supplies purchased by the city by joining with the other entities to purchase at a higher volume and lower cost.

"The program is strictly elective, and we are under no obligation to anyone, including Wichita Falls," Hamill said. He further stated that the cooperative purchasing council

will meet once a month, at which time the participating entities will enter their lists of needs. Tentatively, the city of Wichita Falls will be responsible for advertising for bids.

"I think this will be a positive step towards bettering our relations with Wichita Falls, even though at this time they are considering taking legal action against us," mayor James Cook said.

The council voted unanimously to enter into the cooperative program. Council voted to suspend for 120 days action on a TESCO tariff after meeting with TESCO district manager Jack Redding.

Redding informed the council the tariff request is due to recent legal action by the Texas Municipal League, which Holliday participated, and deals with the fuel adjustment clause.

Any increase in the cost of fuel to TESCO consumers cannot be assumed until a tariff is approved by governing entities, and is done on a monthly basis, under a program

entitled "Fuel Cost Factor Tariff Schedule."

"Understand, we at TESCO do not agree with the ruling, because it will mean unnecessary delays in approving increases and much more paperwork for us."

According to Redding, TESCO will present figures monthly to the governing bodies which will show the company's need for an increase. Members of the council passed a sample copy around the meeting table, but alderman Leon Addison, who gave Redding less than a warm welcome, refused to look at it.

"I don't want to even look at it, because I know what I'm going to do," Addison responded, further stating he was in favor of a 120 day suspension.

Redding replied to Addison, "We have been audited frequently, and there hasn't been anything the auditors found wrong with the way we do business. . . now we are just abiding by the law."

Council voted for a 120 day suspension to research the situation further.

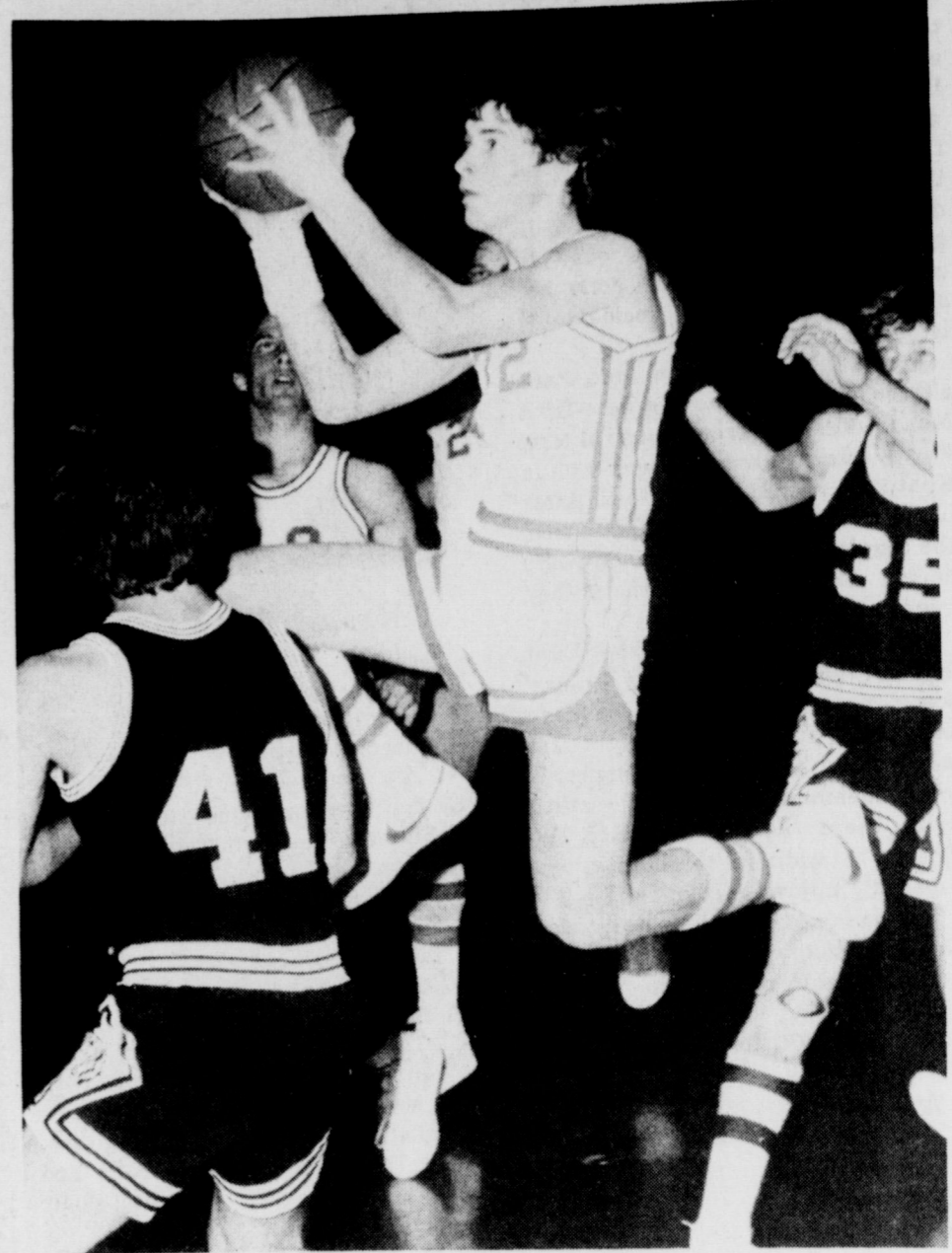
In other action, aldermen met in executive session to discuss negotiating with Newman Young to purchase the building housing the former Newman's Feed, and heard a report on the future purchase of a used DPS vehicle.

Aldermen discussed the possibility of purchasing the 2,080 square foot building located on Main St. across from Talley Insurance, and instructed Hamill to negotiate with owner Newman Young on the price.

Hamill reported that he and chief of police Lomax Campbell chose a 1979 Chrysler with a 360-hp engine for the city's new police car.

Hamill and Campbell were given a maintenance report on the vehicle, which DPS officials said was assigned to a vehicle inspection, and received an oil change every 3,000 miles. Although the car has 67,000 miles under its belt, it has had no major engine repair.

## Baseball district split

In previous years, five District 13-AA teams consisting of Nocona, Windthorst, Petrolia, Chico and Boyd comprised District 5-AA in Class AA baseball. Not all of the state's 180-plus Class AA teams play baseball, therefore it is re-aligned into fewer districts.

Formerly, members of football district 13-AA formed District 5-AA with the district winner drawing a bye in bi-district competition due to the odd number of baseball districts (5) in Class AA.

Friday night in Holliday the Eagles won a 54-52 cliff-hanger over Archer City, handing the Wildcats their second loss of district play this season and only their second loss in 74 straight district games.

The win gave Holliday a 5-0 district record and a showdown with the state-ranked Indians, now 19-0, 6-0 in district, in a game which may well decide the first-round champs. However, if the Eagles could have won Tuesday, they would have had to beat Petrolia tomorrow night in order to complete a first-round sweep, and th Pirates handed the Eagles their worst setback of the season earlier this year in non-conference play.

In the Lady Eagles-Lady Wildcats game, three quarters of play saw the game tied at 24-24, until Archer City ran away from Holliday in the final period, outscoring the Lady Eagles 17-5 to win 41-29. Debbie Long paced the girls with 11.

## Wichita Falls city council delays water rate action

A two-hour closed session of the Wichita Falls city council Tuesday morning ended with aldermen taking no action on litigation concerning controversial water rates for Holliday and Archer City.

An increase in rates for Archer City residents has not been instituted due to a state Supreme Court ruling last spring that said Archer residents were to be charged for the costs of receiving untreated water from Lake Kickapoo, and not the systemwide costs that Wichita Falls attempted to pass onto them.

The council considered taking action against Holliday after receiving negative response from Holliday aldermen last month on a proposed rate increase which would drastically raise water rates for Holliday residents if approved.

In other action taken by Wichita Falls aldermen, bids are to be advertised for Phase I of rehabilitation of Lake Kickapoo dam and structures, estimated to cost around \$297,195. A final phase will cost an additional \$389,180, according to Wichita Falls city manager Stu Bach.

The controversy stems over a vaguely-written contract between the two cities dating back to Dec. 1, 1968, which has the stipulation that rates can be approved only at the end of every five year period. Holliday officials maintain that the rates cannot be increased until 1983, and that a 250 percent increase at one time would put a bind on local residents.

The two projects, not included in a water rate increase study by Joe Nall costing several thousand dollars, will be financed partially by increases in rates to neighboring cities using Lake Kickapoo water, which includes Holliday and Archer City.

## Exemption forms mailed

The Archer County Appraisal District office will be mailing all exemption application forms to taxpayers in Holliday and the surrounding area who are in the Archer County Appraisal District and received an exemption in 1981.

These exemptions will be: General homestead, agricultural use, veterans, and religious organization forms. These will be required in 1982, but will not be required again unless the homestead or use of property changes.

The taxpayer will be responsible

for informing the Appraisal District office if there is a change. If not, the taxpayer may become liable for a back assessment of property.

Another exemption available in 1982 is for the implement of farming and ranching. This new exemption will be required to be filed annually. If exemption forms are not received by Feb. 1, contact the Appraisal District office in Archer City at 574-2172. Any and all applications are to be returned to the Archer County Appraisal District office only.

## Farabee seeks re-election

State Senator Ray Farabee has announced his candidacy for re-election to the Texas Senate representing the 30th District.

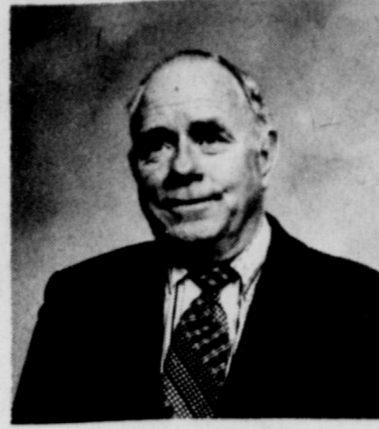
Farabee has been cited twice by Texas Monthly magazine as one of the top 10 legislators in Texas.

## Area pecan trees need fertilizer

Wichita County had a bumper pecan crop in 1981, and the trees depleted a lot of their food preserves in maturing the heavy crop. For this reason, fertilization will be important for 1982 production.

The only fertilizer pecans respond to is nitrogen, according to Don Decker, county agent. They also respond to zinc, however, the zinc must be sprayed on the foliage rather than sprayed on the ground. The soil ties up the zinc, making it unavailable to the pecan trees. The best time to

fertilize pecans with nitrogen fertilizer is February and May.

Talavage Hensley of Wichita Falls is preparing to fertilize his trees during the month of February. He would use three pounds of ammonium nitrate per inch diameter of the tree trunk. Ammonium sulphate will do the same job, however, it needs to be used at the rate of four pounds per inch diameter of the tree trunk. Hensley will place the fertilizer on top of the ground under the outer tips of the branches.

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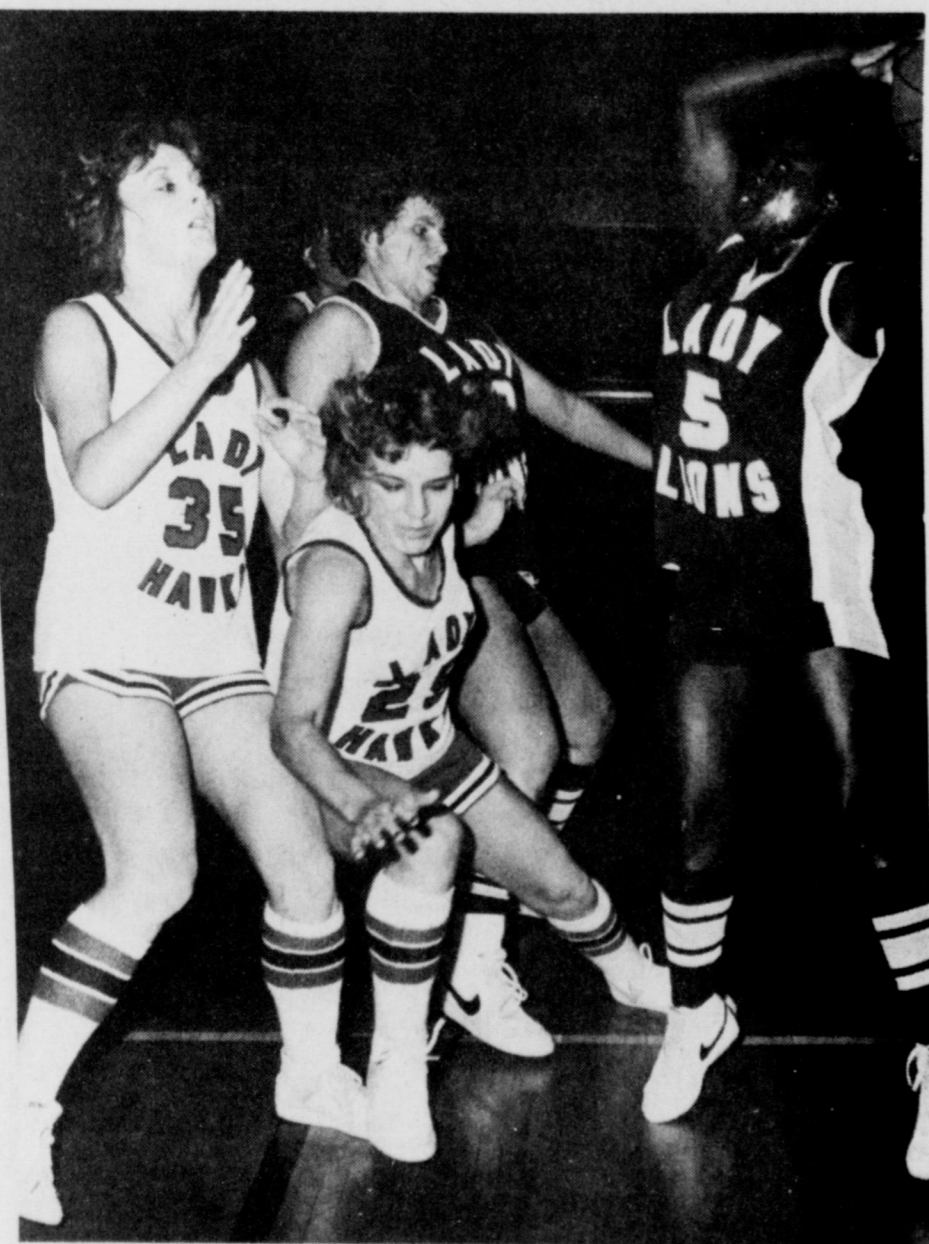

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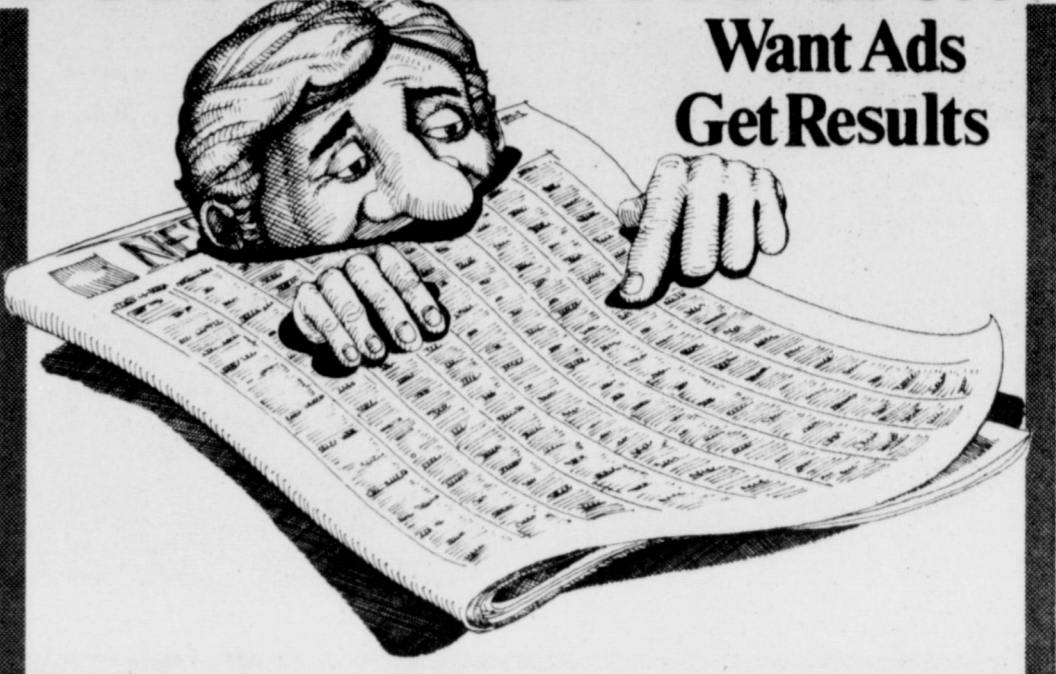
