Car Upset Injures Four Young Parkans

Four young people of our community were in a car accident northwest of town on the Iowa Park lake road Sunday afternoon. Three were seriously injured.

They were Loyd Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Lewis; Lelani Jeter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Jeter; Joyce Stevenson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Stevenson; and Mike Thornberry, son of Mrs. Esther Thornberry. Mike was driver of the car.

The machine hit loose gravel and turned over.

Loyd received a severe cut on the right wrist, cutting the ligaments and artery.

Lelani received a gash on her head and a fractured pelvis.

Joyce's ear was cut and she suffered a fractured vertebra.

Mike was cut and bruised, but only required emergency treatment.

The other three were hospitalized. Lelani was dismissed from the hospital Wednesday. She will be confined to her home for several weeks. Loyd and Joyce will remain in the hospital about 10 days.

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Fletcher, who live at the Lone Star Gas station, witnessed the upset. They hurried to the scene and carried the injured young people to their home, sending for a Tanner's ambulance. The Fetters probably saved the life of Loyd Lewis because he was bleeding profusely. He required 5 pints of blood in transfusions.

The latest report from Loyd is encouraging. He is able to move all his fingers.

Prayer of dedication was offered by Mrs. R. G. Clark of Wichita Falls, Association WMU president.

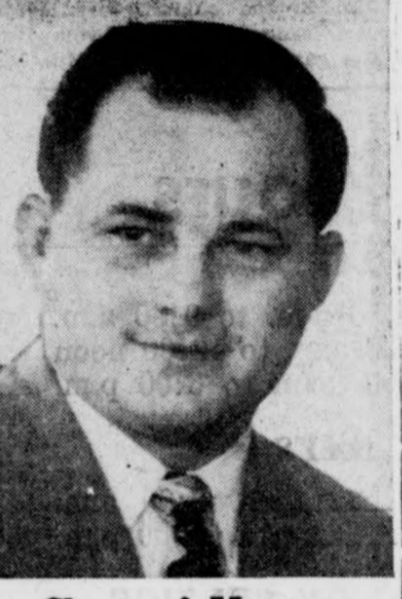
J. T. Hogan 77 Dies at Kamay

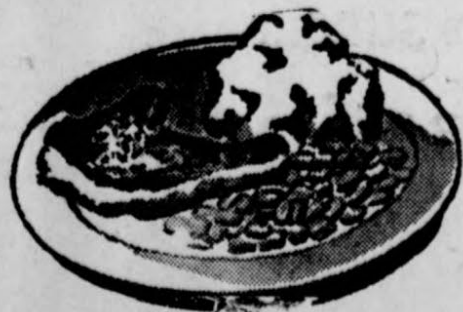

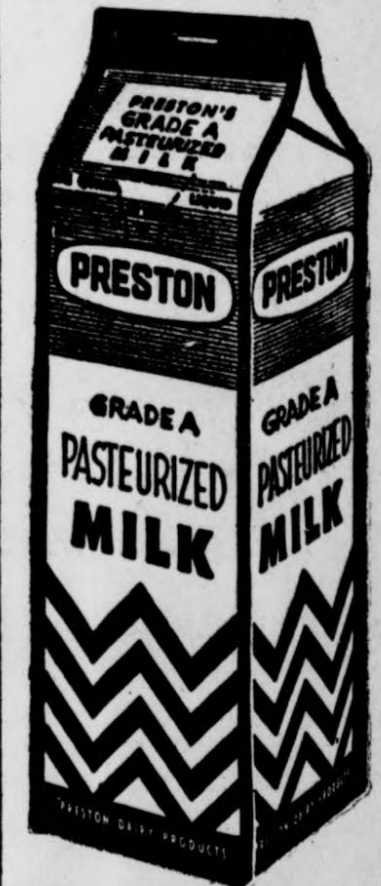

★ Soil Conservation

The board of supervisors set up in their work program and plan for the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district a combination of practices for each land class found in the area. Frequently a program is judged by the mechanical practices seen on the ground, however, the growing of adapted legumes in the conservation rotation and good stubble management will do more to get water into the soil where it falls than mechanical practices.

Technicians for the district and co-operators have found that Madrid clover has a large root system that leaves an opening in the soil that funnels water into it. Madrid supplies organic residues and nitrogen to the soil.

Lee Trigg, Wymore Downing and Cliff Brogdon are growing Madrid sweetclover on irrigated cropland. Wilbur Prechel and H. W. Beasley are growing Madrid on dryland. Supervisors suggest that neighbors confer with these men and see if their experience will assist them.

Other uses of Madrid are hay, grazing and seed production. Fenton Dale and W. R. Pasturek have recently seeded Madrid clover with oats.
