City, school voters to polls

Iowa Park voters will elect a mayor and two aldermen Saturday, and school district voters will decide on three trustee positions.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at

There will be two boxes for city voters, at Kidwell and Bradford Elementary buildings, with the railroad serving as the dividing line for precincts.

School voters will have three voting polls. Two are at the elementary campuses and the third is at Valley View, where the poll will be located in the metal building north of the school house.

There was a considerable increase during the past week in absentee voting. Thirteen ballots were cast in the city election and eight in the school by Tuesday's deadline. Only four ballots had been cast this time last week, all in the city box.

Only one candidate is on the ballot for mayor, as Johnny Crawford decided to step down after three terms. Charlie Lee, completing his first year as alderman, is the lone candidate.

In the event Lee is elected, the new council will name someone to fill the unexpired term. Though it is not a policy, the council usually appoints the unsuccessful candidate for alderman who drew the highest

number of votes in the latest election. Most of the competition in voting Saturday will be for two alderman seats on the council. Seven candidates

have tossed their hats into the ring. Of the two seats to be voted on, one is being vacated by Lita Watson, who has also served three terms on the council and has decided not to seek a

Mistrial declared in Boren's case

The prosecution was a long way from convincing an Archer County jury that Iowa Parkan J.W. Boren illegally sold oil tank "bottoms."

After some six hours of deliberation, the jury announced late Friday in Archer City that it was deadlocked, and judge Frank Douthitt declared the trial in his 97th District Court a mistrial.

Judge Douthitt said 10 members of the jury favored acquittal and only two voted for conviction. But the fact that after numerous votes, the count never changed, convinced the judge there would not be a change, regardless of how long deliberations

District Attorney Jack McGaughey said he plans to have Boren retried on the charges, which are classified as third-degree felonies.

The prosecution's chief witness was David Styles of Wichita Falls, who operated Styles Tank Service at Kamay. Styles late last year pleaded guilty to theft of oil and is serving a 10-year sentence in state prison.

In his final argument Friday, Boren's attorney, Cletus Schenk pointed out several "holes" in the prosecution, after he had pointed out the case was a ". . . special interest case being prosecuted by a special interest group with a special prosecutor."

He was referring to special prosecutor Michael Payne of Wichita Falls, who has been hired by the North Texas Oil and Gas Association in an effort to stop alleged oil field

It was Payne who handled all the final argument Friday.

The prosecution offered six pieces of physical evidence, five checks allegedly made out by Styles to Boren, and a map. Schenk noted that the prosecution had never ascertained whether the signatures on the backs of the checks were Boren's. He also said three of the checks were noted to be for pipe or sucker rod, two had no notations, and they "don't prove anything."

Schenk said Boren "... had a right to dispose of the bottoms. He was doing what his boss (Latimer) told him to do." The defense's only witness called to the stand was prosecutor Payne.

The bottoms reportedly came from leases owned by Hammond Properties in Archer County, including the Ferguson D Lease. Boren has been a pumper on Hammond Properties some 27 years, it was pointed out, and he had never been accused of any thefts over all those years.

The defense attorney told the jury that the case would have never been brought to trial if it were a civil case in which Hammond Properties were attempting to recover what it had allegedly lost in thefts. "The evidence presented would have never allowed preponderance," he stated.

No date has been set for a retrial of Boren's case. Two other men were indicted in October by the same grand jury as was Boren. A May 4 date has been set in Archer City to try Ed Cornelison of Holliday, but no date has been established to try Clay Witherspoon of Wichita Falls.



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


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Worth Quoting

While on our trip to Washington, we got to observe first hand how the electronic news is manipulated and it reinforces our suspicion of a great many other "news events" which are set up and orchestrated solely for the benefit of television. We were picked up in Washington on Saturday by some friends of ours from Virginia and taken by car to Annapolis, the state capital of Maryland, for some sightseeing. Annapolis is best known as the home of the U.S. Naval Academy, but it is a historic city in its own right, being one of the colonial cities that played a prominent role in the development of our nation.

The city has about 16,000 people and in the downtown area are many delightful shops and restaurants, lots of old buildings, the tall and narrow brick edifices facing narrow streets. Annapolis has a lot of sail boats based in the bay and this is the center of much water sport activity during summer months. One of the landmarks of Annapolis is the state capitol building, built in 1772 and located on top of the highest hill in town, making it a prominent building easily seen for miles areound. We visited the capitol building that Saturday, approaching on foot from the rear entrance. When we went up the steps we found three uniformed policemen on duty and asked if the building were closed. We were informed that it was open to visitors and that the policemen were there because of a demonstration scheduled to take place that morning.

We went inside, joining about a half dozen other tourists, and went through the various rooms, including the senate and house chamber, the conference room filled with historical pictures and documents, and enjoyed reliving a bit of U.S. history. After a while we heard music and singing coming from the front entrance and went to take a look. Through the front doors we could see a procession of marchers carrying banners and singing as they marched. The

Wheat top-dressing study near Kamay

There was not a single Maryland state official in the capitol building, not the governor, any members of the legislature, no state officials.

This didn't seem to bother the demonstrators, of course, because they had plenty of network television coverage. Camera crews from ABC, CBS and NBC were in place and the demonstrators performed for them at their direction. After about 40 minutes of this, the crowd dispersed and everybody left. 



The ballpoint hasn't been in use but about 35 years. When first introduced, they were expensive, as writing instruments were concerned. Now they cost as little as 19 cents, and you can usually collect enough free ones given out as advertising gifts you never need to purchase one.

Before the ballpoint, it was either pencil or ink pen. But primarily pencils, or what we called "eversharps."

To carry a pencil around was a problem. You always had to sharpen them. And when they were sharp, you were always threatened to gouge yourself with the unprotected point.

For an advertising gimmick, there was a short pencil encased in a two-piece metal container, and it usually had a pocket clip on it. This was handy, because of the threat of self-puncture was taken away.

The mechanical pencil, or eversharp, is still in use. They are commonly available, but few people ever use them. They are always given or sold as a companion with a ballpoint, and then usually stored away in a drawer forever.

Writing with ink, before the ballpoint, was always a problem. You had a choice of using an ink pen staff, with a bottle of ink, or the more expensive fountain pen.

All desks at school had a special hole in them, called an ink well. That was where your special bottle fit and wouldn't slide, crashing to the floor. But there was always the mess of filling your ink bottle from the commercial ink bottle. The commercial bottle would never do, because it didn't fit in the ink well and would slide off the desk.

Fountain pens were always a headache. They were expensive for students, in the first place. We weren't even allowed to use them in school until we reached the seventh

But they were always running out of ink at the wrong time, when a supply bottle wasn't available. And the points were always snagging on paper.

Because you had to wait until you were at least a seventh grader to use a fountain pen, it was a badge of maturity to have shirts with a big ink splotch on the pocket. Fountain pens always leaked.

The early ballpoints always leaked. In fact, one of the leading brands of the pens today still leaks. It gets a glob of ink on the point and makes a big, smeary mess when it is put to

paper. For years, ballpoints were a problem because they would work only on certain, non-slick paper surfaces. That's why one manufacturer made a big deal about its pen would write on paper where butter had sat. Another made just as big a



Well, Iowa Park's Billy James might be known as the cooking mechanic, and he's this issue's "Cook of the Week.'

After college he became a mechanic and has owned and operated his own garage since 1953.

He married his wife, Jean, in 1951. The couple has three children, Karen, Billy and Jo Ellen, and four grandchildren.

Finnell makes formal announcement



Ricky Dean was fourth-high among 124 individuals and Iowa Park placed third among 31 teams at the district land judging contest Monday at Henrietta.


Dean graded 248 out of a possible 280 points.
