Local area escapes damaging floods

Iowa Park escaped the severe flooding problems suffered by Wichita Falls residents and businesses after last Wednesday's downpour.

There was flooding in city streets, primarily in the Garden Valley area, but no homes reportedly took in any water, because no reports were received by city officials.

Some residents were caught in the flooding in Wichita Falls. At least three called the Iowa Park police department to report they were

stranded in the neighboring city's high water.

Volunteer firemen from Iowa Park. Kamay, Holliday and Wichita West took high-clearance trucks, boats and personnel to help officials in Wichita Falls Wednesday night and some returned Thursday.

Iowa Park received 2.56 inches of rain, according to measurements taken Thursday morning at the Experiment Station. That came on the heels of 1.26 inches measured Wednesday morning.

Since then, 1.80 was measured Monday morning and .82 Tuesday, giving the area 6.44 for the week.

So far this month, the station has measured 9.57 inches, making the year's total 16.83 inches, as compared to 9.85 inches for the same period last

Many streets had water running over the curbs in Garden Valley Wednesday night, but water apparently failed to reach the inside of any homes.

Pre-trial hearing held in Gilmore case

Before Bill Gilmore's trial for charges of fraud by mail gets underway the morning of June 28 in

pre-trial hearing to be held. Judge Eldon Mahon, at the insistence of Gilmore's two attorneys, Hank Anderson and Rosendo Rodriguez, continued the hearing from last Thursday to next Thursday, to hear testimony of two witnesses who appeared before the federal grand jury which returned 10 indictments against Gilmore

attorney Tim Eyssen and assistant U.S. attorney Gerhardt Kleinschmidt

Judge Mahon reminded the attorneys that Eyssen had sat in the court hallway all day Wednesday and had not been called, and offered Kleinschmidt's letter as his statement. Eyssen's home was hit the night before by flooding and he could not be contacted, and Kleinschmidt was in court elsewhere despite

having been subpoenaed. Before the judge set the June 28 trial, however, he required Gilmore to waive his right to speedy trial, because the time lapse from the Feb. 25 indictments would exceed that required by the speedy trial act.

Gilmore, the first day of pre-trial hearing, admitted he had prepared and sent fraudulent invoices to Petro-Lewis Corp. for work he had not done.

He admitted what he had done was wrong, but explained that the kickbacks to Raymond Key, Petro-Lewis area production supervisor, were demanded if he were to continue doing work for the Denver-based petroleum firm.

Key has already pleaded guilty for part, but has not yet been

State National vice president H.M. Nipper. FBI agent Lee Hale, and Petro-Lewis security agent John Seckman.
Nipper, as instructed by his subpoena, had with him copies of all financial transactions by Gilmore and his companies, but was asked for only those loans Gilmore had co-signed

individually and not as Gilmore, Inc. Seckman, who began investigation of Gilmore and Key after an employee from the Bowie office had indicated bills were being paid for work not done, said he was still on the Denver police force his first trip here, but went to work full time after that.

Defense attorneys wanted to know if Seckman ever used his police badge in the investigation, and he said he

Questioning of Seckman and Hale by the defense appeared to be attempts to find area where their testimony in the trial might be discredited.

Hale was asked several times if he

considered Gilmore a "target." The defense was very interested in the fact that Hale had received most of the bank evidence, studied it, and presented the evidence orally to the grand jury.

Explaining, Hale said the grand jury met only two days, and studying the bank statements and forms required much more time than jurors could afford to do the work themselves.

When Hale was called to the witness stand, Rodriguez explained

A great bit of information brought had Hale to go over his inves notes on a note-by-note basis, information which could be damaging to Gilmore in other cases was heard.

From an interview with former Gilmore office employee Brenda Clack, Hale told of billings sent to the city of Iowa Park under Park Construction Co., Coulson Repairs, G&P Dozer Service and also Gilmore Inc., but they had been refused payment because Gilmore, being a member of the city council, was not allowed by law to do business with

Lee said none of that information was presented to the grand jury.

The defense also indicated considerable interest when Hale said he directed the taping of a telephone conversation between Roy Fullerton and Gilmore. It was initiated from the district attorney's office in Seymour.



then the City could not do business with Gilmore, Inc. I cannot argue with the City's position, but I can argue with them requesting us to do the work and then not wanting to pay for the work already done.

After we received the City's letter and on July 10th, we resubmitted a statement to the City Administrator under the name of Coulson's Repair Service, an employee of Gilmore, Inc. The Mayor and the City Administrator both knew that the work had been done by Gilmore, Inc. for the repair of the fire truck.

Clack mentioned in her statement that the invoices were hidden. The Coulson invoices are kept in a shelf on an unlocked cabinet in the office just as all other office supplies were kept. They were not hidden anywhere.

Brenda Clack also mentioned a statement sent to the City of Iowa Park on a "G&P Dozer Service" invoice. She somehow tried to tie that in with work on the fire truck, but it in fact, had nothing to do with work Steve Morath, called Gilmore, Inc. and advised us that the bulldozer owned by the City of Iowa Park was stuck at the landfill. He further advised that he could not find anyone else to pull it out. He asked us to take a dozer to the city landfill and pull out the other dozer, which we did. We submitted the City a bill on a Gilmore. Inc. invoice for our services which we had in fact performed. The City refused to pay. Since G&P Dozer Service was just being started, we resubmitted the bill on a G&P Dozer Service invoice, and even though the work was performed as requested by the City, the invoice was not paid and remains unpaid at this date.

There was mention made of Park Construction Co. in Brenda Clack's statement. Park Construction Co. was a company established for the express purpose of entering into a joint venture between that company and the City of Iowa Park to raze the old Park Hotel building. This agreement was done with the knowledge of the Mayor, City Attorney, City Council, City Administrator and City Insurance Agent. Nothing was hidden whatso-

As I See It....



I have already started looking forward to next year, because my "last year" has concluded.

Unlike most people, my year isn't based on the calendar, but when the state boys' track meet is held in Austin. And that was last weekend.

Most all us men have our annual sporting event. Some take a trip to Colorado or central Texas to go deer hunting. They'll plan, remember the past years, and look forward to another. Same is true for those who fish, snow ski, or maybe frustrated golfers who wouldn't think of missing the annual Colonial Golf Tournament.

They'll have to postpone my burial a couple of days, if it falls on the state track meet. That's the way I felt the first time I attended one, back in 1961, and I haven't changed my mind. All else must take a back seat.

I wouldn't say I am more interested in track than some other sports, but at the huge sport carnival held in UT's mammouth Memorial Stadium one has the opportunity to see almost all of the state's finest athletes. And if you pay attention, you will see those names come up in following years.

Take, for instance, the big professional tight end Riley Odoms. He's made all-pro several times and he's a big, big man. I remember him as an athlete attending West Oso High, winning the high jump his junior and senior years.

I remember watching Randy Matson of Pampa winning the state title in the shot put. And I could still see him performing in my-mind, as I read the story of his setting the world record in that event, becoming the first to exceed the 70-foot barrier.

Then there was the year the UIL switched from the 200-yard low hurdle event to the 330-yard intermediates. The fastest time posted in the state meet that year became a record, and it was set by Jack Mildren, who went on to become an All-American quarterback at Oklahoma Univ.

That record lasted until the following year, when it was broken by an outstanding athlete from Henderson. It was Joe Wiley, who joined Mildren at OU and made All-American as a running back.

There are stories to be told for years to come about Johnny Jones of Lampassas, now a highly-paid receiver for the New York Jets. No one in the stadium the night of his senior year will ever forget Jones taking the baton on the fourth leg of the mile relay, 80 yards behind the leader, and winning. He went on to win a gold medal, his freshman year in college, on the 400-meter relay team at the Olympics.

During the first dozen or so years, I never failed to see a national record either beaten or equaled. Since then, I've lost count, but there've been many, many more.

Such as Friday night, when Odessa Ector sprinter Charles Ricks equalled the national 100-meter record of 10.4. But I've also seen a 10.0 run, by Mark McNeil of San Antonio Houston in 1980. That didn't qualify for a national standard, however, because there was too much tail wind.

But you see other interesting events at the state meet. It's unusual to watch an athlete lead the pack in the 400-meter race, get confused about where the finish line is, and stop, thinking he had won. But that's just what happened to a youth from Rankin Saturday. Two other runners zoomed past him to finish, he saw what happened, and took two steps

more to place third.

Or then there's the story of Refugio (you remember that school, tying the Hawks 7-7 for the state football title in 1970), which qualified only two athletes to this year's meet, and winning the state championship. One of the athletes was James Lott, who set a new state record in the high jump of 7-11/2, won the long jump (23-2), the intermediate hurdles (38.0), and placed third in the high hurdles.

But I've only started, telling the stories of the state meet and the fascination it holds for me. It has apparently caught the fancy of more people, because the crowds were estimated at fewer than 4,000 when I first started watching, and now as many as 20,000 are in the stands.


Like the old Sears catalog used to rank its merchandise: "good, better, best," one could rate the district track meet as good, the regional meet as better, but the state meet as best.

There's nothing like it, not even the Olympics. Because these are the cream of Texas athletes, and seldom does one find better, anywhere.

In the next two weeks, this section will feature two Holliday women with very much in common. For one, they are very good friends. Secondly, both are members of the Faith Tabernacle Church in Holliday, where much of their time and energy is spent. Both are transplants from the Northern states,

Mrs. Floyd Thompson, this week's cook, hails from Missouri, but has lived in Holliday since last June and before that spent 10 years in Iowa

but, most importantly, both are

disciples of home-style cooking.

Her friend, and next week's cook, is Mrs. Howard Lewis, who grew up on a farm near Lewistown, Pennsylvania. She has lived in Holliday since last September.

Mrs. Thompson, president of the women's group in her church, says her mother and oldest sister served as inspirations in her cooking. One of 14 children, Mrs. Thompson had plenty of eager participants to test her talents on. "I guess you can call me an old-fashioned cook," she said. "But I like quick and easy recipes also."

An example of quick and easy but tasty recipes is her seven-cup salad. She also says her recipe for poke salad "may shock some people," but first should be tried before questioning its results. "I was surprised when I found a lot of people

around here didn't know mixing vegetables with eggs would taste good, but I can testify that it certainly does," she remarked.

Mrs. Thompson's husband is retired from the air force, and is currently working at Cryovac. They have three children: Gail, Eric and Brad, a junior at Holliday High School. And her favorite hobbies are working her garden, and anything to do with the outdoors.

"I just love helping people," she says. "The love of people and helping them when they need it is very satisfying."

But probably her greatest accomplishment is overcoming multiple sclerosis which struck her three years ago. After becoming partially paralyzed from her waist down, in addition to other effects of the disease, Mrs. Thompson slowly rehabilitated herself. 


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

Council designates streets for repairs

Holliday city council members designated streets in the city to be resurfaced during Monday night's regular council meeting.

Aldermen discussed which streets should be attended to first, and decided the entire length of south Bois d' Arc would receive the initial work.

Other streets included until the material runs out is North Pecan and North Wall. City administrator Jim Hamill said the work would require a crew of three and could be completed in two weeks after they begin.

Council also decided to put base material on streets in north Holliday, according to their need, and to

resurface them at a later date. Traffic laws were discussed, and a city ordinance was passed to prohibit parking on the northside of Olive between North Cedar and Northwest Avenue (FM 368). Council tabled a request for a speed limit ordinance for the Franklin Park Addition, until it can be studied further.

Also approved was the purchase of two slump pumps for the water department. The two Gould pumps to be purchased, according to Hamill, were the best he could find after pricing them. Each will cost \$94.50.

Mrs. Margaret Wilson of Micro-Systems Bureau of Holliday approached the council with the possibility of forming a Chamber of Commerce in the city. Mrs. Wilson said this would require at least 10 members, which would include nine directors and a secretary. Alderman Jim Virdell made a motion, which passed unanimously, to endorse Mrs. Wilson's movement.

In other business, Don Talley of Talley Insurance met with council members to discuss renewing its liability insurance, amendments were made to the employee manual, and granted a merit raise to water department employee John Soho.

Action on renewing the liability insurance was tabled until Talley could contact St. Paul Insurance, which currently holds the contract for the city, to renegotiate their bid for a combination liability, fleet and city property policy.

Soho's salary was raised 75-cents per hour to \$5 in a merit raise extended after council had made amendments to the employee manual.

Mayor James Cook informed the council April's sales rebate check was for \$9,241.37, and that water supervisor Morganna Thorn would be on leave of absence for six weeks after undergoing major surgery.

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Uniform cotton planting date is important

By Don D. Decker **County Agent**

The uniform cotton planting date of May 20 is especially important this year since boll weevil numbers are increasing all over the state. Emory Boring, Extension entomologist, reports there is an increase in weevils being found in over-wintering habitat.

Boring listed two preplant practices which has a big influence on insect activity of cotton. He suggested fertilizer rates be low enough to produce only the potential of the land resources. Split applications of fertilizer can help to reduce bollworm problems. Too much fertilizer makes the field lush and green, making it vulnerable to bollworm attacks.

Seeding rate has a big influence on

cotton insect activity too. Boring suggested growers plant less than 45,000 plants per acre, which figures three plants per foot in 40 inch rows or two plants per foot in 30 inch rows. It is important for the planter to drop only one seed at a time rather than two. Any time two cotton plants are within three inches of each other they tend to compete for nutrients, degrees are determined by adding the maximum and the minimum temperature each day and dividing by two. This gives the average daily temperature. From this average temperature, the base temperature of 38 degrees is subtracted to give the day degrees.

Actual tree inspections will be used in conjunction with the day degree accumulation to determine the spray

moisture, and create a shading problem.

The day degree accumulation up to May 13 indicates the control for the pecan nut casebearer will be extremely late this year. Very cool spring temperatures will delay the emergence of the casebearer until at least June 1 or later.

We will have to have some very warm weather to get emergence as early as June 1. There is a good possibility the spray dates may be as late at June 5. The exact spray dates will be announced through the news media as soon as casebearer activity

The first significant casebearer activity occurs at 1830 day degree accumulation. As of May 13, Wichita Falls had only 1052 day degrees. Day dates. Pecan insect scouting will be performed by Jim Juehler of Valley Farms, R.G. Williamson of Wichita Gardens, and Virgil Woodfin and Tim Hunter of Iowa Park. I will observe the casebearer activity on the pecan trees of Midwestern State Univ.

The heavy rains during the week will not ruin the Irish potato crop which has done so well up to this point. Soils with good internal drainage allowed the free water in the soil to move or leach away from the potato tubers.

Mrs. Lujean Adcock of Iowa Park inquired as to the possibility of the excessive rains causing her potato crop to rot. She has the prospect for the best potato crop ever. She is already harvesting new potatoes. She digs just a few new potatoes from several plants when they are needed in the kitchen. This allows the plant to continue making more potatoes.

Soils with fair internal drainage can cause the potatoes to develop water blisters on the skin of the potato tubers. These appear as whitish spots on the peeling at harvest time, which

causes no significant damage to the tuber. It does make the potatoes unattractive, but, for the home garden the water blisters are of little consequences.

Poor internal drainage of soil is indicated by water standing over a period of time. Free standing water on potatoes can ruin the tubers in about two to three days. None of the vegetables can withstand "wet feet," particularly potatoes. Garden sites should never be located in areas which stand in water after heavy rains.

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Area oil, gas report


