Three Men Arrested Saturday Face Cattle Theft Charges Three men were in Callahar

County jail Wednesday where they were facing charges of cattle theft, after being caught Saturday night near Baird with a calf in the trunk of their car. The calf was allegedly stolen from a rancher near Cotton-

wood. The three men, each held in lieu of \$5,000 bond on the theft charge, are George Delano Car-roll, 28, Winters; Roy Townsend, 40, Kerrville, and Joe Milton Collier, 28 of Baird.

The trio was caught Saturday night near the rodeo grounds / Highway Patroiman Cecil Weems, who had observed them driving on the wrong side of the road. He examined the car and found a quantity of beer in the rear seat and asked to see inside the trunk. The men said that they had lost the key, but when they had lost the key, but when Patrolman Weems threatened to open the lock by force, the trunk was opened. When the lid came up, Officer Weems found the slain calf, which weighed approximately 200 pounds. Offi-cers said that the calf belonged to Bob Joy, Sr., of Cottonwood. It had been shot in the head.
