Iowa Parkan commits suicide; police chief injured responding

A 41-year-old Iowa Park man shot himself late Sunday afternoon, and the chief of police was involved in a three-vehicle accident as he attempted to reach the scene.

Eddie Sanders was found by his wife about 6:45 p.m. lying in his garage at 708 W. Texas. He died Monday morning in Bethania Hospital in Wichita Falls, from a gunshot in the right temple.

Mrs. Sanders told police she had been away from the home. She did not see her husband when she returned, but heard him gasping for breath, because the door between the garage and kitchen was open.

When Emergency Medical Technicians and police arrived, the overhead garage door was closed and tied down by an electric extension cord and had to be forced open.

Sanders, clad in athletic shorts and a t-shirt, was found lying on two rolls of carpet, his glasses and a .38 cal. revolver lying beside him.

A former employee of Barbour Trucking, he had been laid off and had worked for a while for Geer Trucking and recently was employed by Preston Dairy in Burkburnett, according to a neighbor.



The couple had lived at the home approximately two years.

ACCDIENT

Chief Billy Hamilton was driving north on Pacific to reach the scene when he was involved in an accident at the Bank Street Street intersection. The incident was investigated by the Department of Public Safety, a routine measure whenever a city police vehicle is involved in an accident.

As Hamilton approached the intersection, a pickup driven by John Declerico, 303 E. Bank, reportedly was stopped in the east bound lane of Bank and pulled into the intersection.

Though only paint was found on the front of Declerico's front bumper, the

rear fender and bumper of the blue police cruiser was damaged. Impact sent the chief into a skid into the ditch.

As the police car returned to the pavement, it struck the left fender of another pickup, driven south on Pacific by Eddie Jones of 604 W. Cornelia. The impact spun the cruiser 180 degrees.

Hamilton was transported by ambulance to the hospital at Sheppard AFB, where he remained until release Wednesday morning. He suffered whip lash to his neck and multiple bruises over his body.

No estimate was available yesterday concerning the damage to the cruiser. It was at the same intersection about three weeks earlier the same cruiser, driven by officer Pat Hannah, experienced brake failure and plunged nose-first into a deep ditch, injuring the officer.

A DPS spokesman said a charge would be filed against Declerico for "failure to yield right of way at an intersection."

Well blowout costly to local drilling firm

The flaming blowout of an oil well near Duncan, Okla. Sunday had a direct and damaging effect on an Iowa Park firm.

Spruiell Drilling Co. was deepening a well for Mobil Oil when the blowout occurred, and the local firm lost its newest rig.

Spruiell Rig No. 4, which was completed and put into the field in early August, is a total loss. Approximately 18 months of planning and construction had gone into the \$1.6-million rig which had been designed and customized by Spruiell Brothers, Dan, Glenn and Bill.

Not one person was injured or even suffered a blister, according to the

The rig was set on the site 10 days earlier. It was deepening a hole a mile north of County Line, a small oil community 22 miles east of Duncan. The equipment is covered by insurance, according to a company spokesman.

Operating at a depth of 3,100 feet enroute to 3,800 feet, the drilling crew encountered an extreme amount of gas pressure, which had not been expected.

The blowout preventer was in place and held the pressure, but mud began to seep through seals. An official from Mobil instructed the crew to open a valve to release some of the pressure, after calling Halliburton for a load of weighted mud.

When the valve was opened, the extreme pressure began to whip the line back and forth. It apparently struck part of the structure, and the spark ignited the spewing gas.

No one can explain the presence of the gas. There is a deep well in the general vicinity, and one theory is it has a leak and the gas reached the more shallow hole site through a porous formation.

The blowout took place about noon, and the firefighting firm of Boots and Coots arrived on the scene about 10 p.m. By daybreak Monday, some 20 frac tanks were on site, the area had been bladed and leveled by four tractors and crews were hooking the

tanks to water pumps. Later in the morning more crews arrived to weld together heat shields.

Approximately 10 a.m. Tuesday, pouring thousands of gallons of water and foam on the flame, the fire was extinguished.

The remains of the rig and pipe were still over the well and could not be moved because the collars and bit were still in the hole.

Attempts were being made yesterday to inject mud into the hole to shut off the spewing gas.

No one on the scene would make an estimation of how many thousands of cubic feet of natural gas was spewing from the hole.







No cuts to elderly from Social Security

Present recipients of Social Security old age assistance have no fear of funding cutbacks from the federal government, Cong. Jack Hightower said Tuesday.

Speaking to the Noon Lions Club, the elected official from Vernon admitted the Social Security fund was going into the red with "Constant increases in cost of living allowances and increased benefits."

He said other entitlements paid

from the fund might be paid out of general revenue in the future, but he saw no change in old age assistance from the fund.

As to the federal deficit, Hightower said the only way to reduce it was to "reduce spending as much as possible and induce improvements in the economy as much as we can to increase government take."

The only other alternatives in cutting the deficit were to pass a

"gigantic tax bill to cover the \$110-billion deficit, but no one would stand for that," or to reduce spending in the amount of the budget.


Reducing spending sounds easy, he told the Lions. But to match the deficit would mean more reduction in the national defense and every area of government. This, he said would never be agreed by the people. The economy is not going to jump back overnight, he pointed out.

Hightower's primary concern, in representing his district, is to get agriculture back on a sound level. He suggested reducing imports of foods as well as convincing other nations, such as Japan, to open its ports to more shipments of food stuffs from the U.S.



Eagles shut out Cubs, 16-0

Holliday's Eagles turned in their finest performance of the year last Friday night in Olney, in a physical contest won by Holliday 16-0.

The win opens things up in the tight District 11-AA race, with Holliday now on top with a 4-0 district record, while Olney drops to 3-1, 4-1 for the season.

While the Cubs can exploit the fact their premier rusher. Blanford Paul, was playing with a huge cast on his right hand thanks to an injury suffered the preceding Wednesday before the game, the Eagles had more to do with Olney's plight.

Olney's initial first down of the

game came with 2:40 left in the first half, the same time the Cubs crossed the 50-yard line into Eagle territory for the first and final time. The Eagle defense dominated the

line of scrimmage and closed the gaps on the outside, holding the Cubs to five first downs for the night, and a total of 18 yards rushing. In addition, Holliday pounced on two Olney fumbles, and Mike A. Parker recorded an interception. The Eagles, on the other hand, punted a total of three times, giving the ball over to the host team on downs four times. The entire Eagle defense should be

praised for their job, but senior

defensive end Kovin Blankenship stands out more that any me, sacking quarterback Sign Ashton three times in tense situations, and ruining Olney's timing on its option plays to the right side.

THE GAME

Olney tried to master the Eagles defensively, and, discounting two obvious errors in judgment, the strategy almost paid off.

But the two mistakes, one leading to Holliday's initial score, went as follows:

1) Since Holliday won the toss of the coin and elected to receive the kickoff, Olney had the option going


into the third period. The Cubs, wanting the advantage of a strong southerly wind, elected to kick off to the Eagles. Holliday mounted a 71-yard drive following the kickoff for the first score of the game;

2) Holliday had driven down to the Cub 43 but stalled, and A. Parker's punt sailed into the endzone, which would have placed the ball at the 20. However, the Eagles were called offsides, and the Cubs elected to force Holliday to punt once again, this time from the 48. A Parker lofted a 44-yard punt to the Cub four yard line, placing the Cubs in a hole.

Holliday's first drive for a score took 12 plays to cover the 71 yards. Eleven and 14-yard runs by Brad Harmon and Jeff Belcher, respectively, aided in keeping the drive alive. Harmon took over from the Cub 12, tightroping the left sidelines for a touchdown. Holliday elected to go for the two-point conversion, and Harmon broke through the right side for the necessary three yards. With 6:06 left in the third period, Holliday led 8-0.

Blankenship was the hero once again in the middle of the fourth quarter, recovering a fumble on the Cub 30. Belcher, who tallied 121 yards in 17 rushes to lead all runners, was called on twice, and made the 30 yards on runs of 13 and 17 yards. Harmon was called on once again to carry on the two point conversion, which opened the game up at 16-0 with six minutes left in the game.

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





Cook of the Week

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It's fall and with it comes the romance of raising a garden, canning and preserving, which is as rewarding as the time spent raising and taking care of the spring garden. Green Tomato Chow-Chow made with the tomatoes, vegetables, spices and vinegar is one of the most popular relishes associated with fall canning. It is a recipe that gives one a chance to enjoy the herb and spice shelf to the fullest.

Mrs. Chester Abernathy uses mustard seed, celery seed, turmeric and vinegar to add zest and flavor to her recipes.

Mustard seeds are the most important edible part of the plant, which is reputed to have been cultivated in much of Europe in the Stone Age, in the Glastonburg lakes of England before the Iron Age, and in pre-historic Gaul before the Roman era. It is said that ancient Egyptians, Romans and Hindus probably popped a few seeds in their mouths while chewing meat, so their value has been known for many centuries.

Celery seeds are among the smallest of the cultivated plants, and the aroma of the celery seed is that of vegetable. Celery seeds must be imported from India, France and Indonesia, and they are the fruit of" wild celery or smallage. Celery is a native of Mediterranean areas and North East, and it was used as a flavoring by ancient Greeks and Romans.
