IN CITY ELECTION

Watson, Hunter apparent winners

In the largest turnout of voters for a city election since 1978, a veteran and a newcomer were selected to fulfill unexpired alderman terms until April.

Lita Watson, who had served on the council six years but did not seek reelection last spring, and Tim Hunter, who had never sought a public office, were the apparent winners.

City offices are at-large, with those candidates drawing the greatest number of votes being declared winners.

Before either is declared officially as victors, however, the votes must be canvassed and certified. This is to take place when the council meets at 7 p.m. Monday.

Eventhough the election was special, and not one for regular terms of office, voters turned out in greater numbers than they have since the city election of 1978. A count of 907 voters was reported Saturday, exceeded

only in recent years by the 1,056 votes cast in 1978.

Watson, as she did in each of her three previous elections, drew more votes than any others on the ballot. She polled 480, including 426 from precinct 32 and 54 in precinct 33.

Hunter was by far the most successful candidate among precinct 33 voters, attracting 69 in that box and finishing second to Watson in the north box with 335, for a total of 404 votes.

Finishing in third place was former, three-term mayor Johnny Crawford, who received 284 votes. He, like Watson, had opted not to seek re-election last April.

The other two strong-finishing candidates were Herman Mahler and Herman Rains.

Mahler, who was elected to the council in 1981, resigned his office to force the special election. He said he wanted a vote of the citizens to fill the vacated position created by Bill

Gilmore's resignation because one council seat, held by Johnny Coker, had already been appointed.

Coker was named to fill the position left open by Charlie Lee, when he had completed the first of his two-year term of office as alderman and ran uncontested for the mayor's seat.

Mahler received 199 votes and Rains 190. Mahler received 300 votes when he ran successfully in 1981.

Only one other of the 11 candidates received more than 100 votes. Robert Harper received 102. Charles Whittingstall received 84, Mark Wicks 49, Carmen Lozipone 52, Ken Thornton 28, and Walter Beeman 22. George Van Dee received six votes, though he had withdrawn from the election after the ballots had been printed. Five persons received write-in votes; two of them drew two votes apiece.

State-ranked Leopards host Hawks tomorrow

If you listen to the experts, read the polls and read the predictions, there's not much reason for the Hawks to use up a lot of gasoline for the trip to Gainesville tomorrow night.

It's the Leopards, and no contest.

But no one has yet been able to convince the Mean Green. In fact, they feel they have as good a chance as anyone... maybe more a chance than many... to beat the state's second-ranked club.

Gainesville has earned its ranking. Undefeated thus far this season, the Leopards are on their third winning streak under Coach Robert James.

Two years ago, when James began, his club lost in the quarterfinals to Paris, finishing 12-1. Last season the Leopards lost 21-18 to district opponent Weatherford, and that was the last season the Kangaroos played in the AAAA division. They're up with the big boys now.

Like Vernon, Gainesville is blessed with large linemen and quicker-than quick backs.

Leading the Leopards offensively is James Calhoun, who rushed for 900 yards last season. Though a running back, he sees action at quarterback occasionally, as he did at Burkburnett.

Calhoun, a blue chipper selection by Texas Football magazine, reportedly has been clocked in the 40-yard dash at 4.4. Coach David Baugh rates that as outstanding, since the Dallas Cowboy back Tony Dorsett is rated quickest on his team with a 4.3.

Coach James has been quoted as saying "On paper, we do have some very good football players, but you know how little that means. You've got to perform on the field."

The Leopards seldom play a full game well. It was their second-half comebacks against Burkburnett and Hirschi that spelled the difference in

those outcomes.

Gainesville, like the Hawks last week, have one less day to prepare and recover for tomorrow's game. The Leopards played Saturday night in Wichita Falls, and came away with bruises and soreness after the battle with the Huskies.

Meanwhile, the Hawks are fit and well, and have gained a mountain of confidence in their defensive play after Friday's battle with Vernon.

In playing the Lions, the Hawks were matched with a team much like the Leopards, though the Lions may be the better as a defensive unit and not as experienced offensively.

Iowa Park and Gainesville have met four times in the past, and their record stands at 2-2.

They first met in 1972, and the Leopards scored late in the game in Hawk Stadium to edge the Mean Green 33-24. The next year, Iowa Park evened the score with a 35-22 victory, and followed in 1974 with a 28-0 shutout of the Leopards.

In their last meeting, the 1975

season when Iowa Park went 0-10, the Leopards embarrassed the Hawks 46-6 before Gainesville's homecoming crowd.

The Leopards have reportedly scheduled tomorrow night's game as homecoming, once again. But this time the Hawks are planning a different outcome than the last.

And if they're successful, the shock would be felt around the state.

NEW ADMINISTRATOR

Council to begin selection process

First item on the agenda Monday night for the city council, after election votes are canvassed and new members sworn into office, will be to begin the process of selecting a new city administrator.

Mayor Charlie Lee said the selection of a new administrator to replace Steve Morath, who's resignation was effective Friday, is something he is definitely interested in.

Lee, who is spending each weekday morning in the office until a new administrator is hired, said he wants

the aldermen to decide how they want to go about the selection of a replacement.

"I've received seven applications directly, and have a packet of several others which came from the Texas Municipal League," Lee said, "and I want the council to decide what process they want to use for deciding which ones to interview."

Nothing has been done toward formulating a process to select a new administrator, because the four members of the council wanted to wait until after last Saturday's election, in order to have a full council to make the selection.

Following canvassing of the ballots, it is expected that Lita Watson and Tim Hunter will be sworn into office. They were the apparent winners of the city's special election Saturday to name two aldermen who will serve unexpired terms until April.

Other items on Monday's regular meeting agenda, according to the mayor, include consideration of a request to advertise for bids for a new police patrol car; consider changes in zoning required for the National Flood Insurance Program; take action on a proclamation requesting Halloween activities be observed Oct. 30, because the regular date falls on a Sunday, and discuss a proposal for a private emergency telephone line for the police department.

The council meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Chamber officers nominated; parade replacement discussed

Nominations for 1983 Chamber of Commerce officers were announced Monday at the regular monthly meeting of directors.

To be voted on at the Nov. 15 general membership luncheon/meeting are: Linda Merrick, president; Dr. James Edwards, first vice president; and H.M. Nipper, second vice president.

Voting will also be held on eight directors, including: Frank Gossett, Mark Reed, Frank Guyette, Roy Stevens, Merrick, Nipper, Herb Skinner and Harrel Sullivan.

The annual Christmas parade will probably not be held this year, but an activity to replace it was discussed during Monday's meeting.

President Phil Welch said the resignation of director Helen Rich, who was in charge of the parade, will cause its cancellation unless someone volunteers to take over the position. No one volunteered.

Mrs. Merrick proposed that a Christmas caroling event be scheduled when the city's Yule tree is lighted, to initiate the season's commencement, the first Saturday following Thanksgiving.

She suggested choirs from the community's churches and schools would possibly be interested in participating.

Also suggested as a feature to compliment the activity was a free community feed of chili and beans by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners, that same evening.

Mrs. Merrick and Bob Hamilton were appointed to coordinate the proposed activity.

Directors approved a motion permitting Welch to negotiate a loan from State National Bank to finance the balance of the year, after the president told directors payment of dues was lagging.

Welch said approximately \$1,213

was needed to complete the year and only \$412 remained in the organization's account. He said he would contact those firms which have pledged dues payments in an effort to collect them, but needed the money if his efforts did not prove fruitful.

The board approved a request from Mayor Charlie Lee to permit the city council to use its facility whenever executive sessions were held.

Lee explained that the council now has to ask the audience at meetings to wait outside while closed discussions are held. Those attending would not be inconvenienced by bad weather if the chamber building were available to the council.

Directors also approved a proposal that an official letter from the Chamber be sent to the Wichita Falls newspaper, requesting that this community be serviced with the "final edition" rather than the "mailing edition." The point was made that Saturday's city election results were not in the Sunday edition received by local subscribers.

Farm Bureau supports amendment

Fred Dwyer, president of the Wichita County Farm Bureau, has announced support for proposed constitutional amendment number three, saying that passage of proposition three would be a positive step toward keeping a viable agricultural industry in Texas.

Proposition three proposed to correct a problem caused by a legal interpretation of the tax exemption for agricultural machinery and equipment, and is one of six proposed constitutional amendments to be

considered by Texas voters Nov. 2. This equipment is currently taxed inconsistently across the state. A 1982 attorney general's opinion held that the statutory exemption is limited in dollar amount and doesn't apply to combined agricultural operations, not even to family groups.

"Any producer of any product must recover the cost of production, including taxes, and show some profit, if he is to stay in business," Dwyer said. "Without passage of proposition three, which would

correct the property tax exemption on agricultural machinery and equipment, some producers may conclude that they cannot afford to remain in business. Then we'll see a drop in production which will also hurt our local economy.

"Many school districts and most counties do not tax agricultural machinery and equipment at all, while others do. With proposition three, we could assure fair, uniform tax treatment for all food producers," he said.

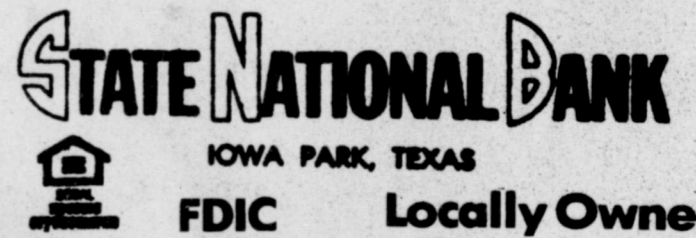

Hawks top Lions 3-0 in defensive struggle

For a football fan who especially appreciates the defensive part of a game, Friday night's battle here between Iowa Park and Vernon was a dream come true.

The Hawks emerged with a scant 3-0 victory, extending their domination over the Lions to two years, while raising their season record to 5-1.

And more importantly, the win gave the Hawks a 2-1 record in Dist. 3-AAAA play and kept alive their hopes for a state playoff berth.

It was a game filled with big plays, mostly defensive. And for a team sport, there were some individuals on the Hawk lineup who earned extra laurels.

Take Wayne Hodges, for instance. It was his 30-yard field goal with only 3:57 remaining in the game that broke the deadlock. But it was also Hodges who broke through the line of Vernon blockers in the second quarter and blocked a 22-yard field goal attempt, and then covered the ball to give the Hawks possession.

Then, there was quarterback Marc Klinkerman. His three pass completions out of four attempts in the fourth quarter had a lot to do with the outcome. But, more importantly, he intercepted a Lion pass at his 45 and returned it to the Vernon 33 which eventually led to Hodges' field goal.

And then, there was the effort of defensive end Greg Untalan who, on a fourth-and-one gamble by the Lions with 1:12 remaining in the game, cut down a Vernon runner short of a first down. And he had to run from the opposite end of the lineup to the sideline to catch him.

Linebacker Don Sidlauskas made four behind-the-line tackles which cost the Lions 24 yards, and after one

of them knocked down a certain-to-catch pass.

Lynn Fulfer overcame his two third period fumble losses to emerge a hero by catching two passes for 49 yards, making several outstanding tackles, and then covering Iowa Park's kickoff following the field goal which gave the Hawks possession and an opportunity to kill valuable minutes from the clock.

The visiting Lions emerged with only 32 net yards rushing, on 31 attempts. They completed four of 12 passes to finish the evening with only 70 yards total offense.

But the Lions had their own outstanding defensive game. Vernon allowed Iowa Park but 96 yards rushing and 54 passing, making 150 yards for the evening.

Where the Hawks plainly were outclassing the Lions offensively, the visitors stayed in the game with the outstanding punting of Brent Brittain. Considered by some to be the premier punter in this area of the state, the son of Lion mentor Leo Brittain kept the Hawks on their own end of the field most of the game by averaging 42.6 yards on five attempts. His first punt was a 51-yarder, most of it in the air.

Brittain's third punt, which came on the second play of the second half, set the Hawks back on their own three. Two plays later, the ball was actually touching the goal line, and Mac Weaver kicked the ball from the end zone to the Hawk 33.

Two plays later, Vernon's Daryl Richardson had picked up 12 yards to the Hawk 12, but fumbled and Paul Rogers covered to end the threat.

Following the kickoff that Fulfer covered late in the game, Weaver took the opportunity to give the Lions

some of their own medicine.

Unable to pick up a first down after Fulfer's cover, Weaver's punt was killed on the Lion five when it rolled out of bounds.

Also credited with outstanding defensive play by the coaching staff, after studying the game films, were Weaver and Rogers.

Coach David Baugh explained that he had switched the two from the positions they had been playing all season. And defensive end Weaver and linebacker Rogers each chalked up more tackles than in any game thus far this season.

Two of the Hawks played the game with injuries. Guard Raymond Tyler was hobbling from an ankle injury sustained in the Hirschi game, but played none the same. And center

Craig Whisnand's right hand was stepped on during Friday's game, and though he had no feeling, continued to play.

Tailback Kevin Parker finished the game Iowa Park's leading rusher, picking up 47 yards in 18 carries. Rogers was held to his lowest production of the season, 25 yards on 12 tries.

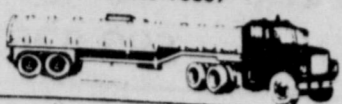

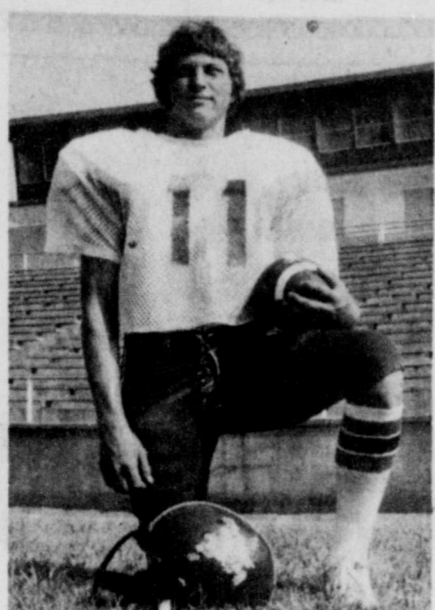

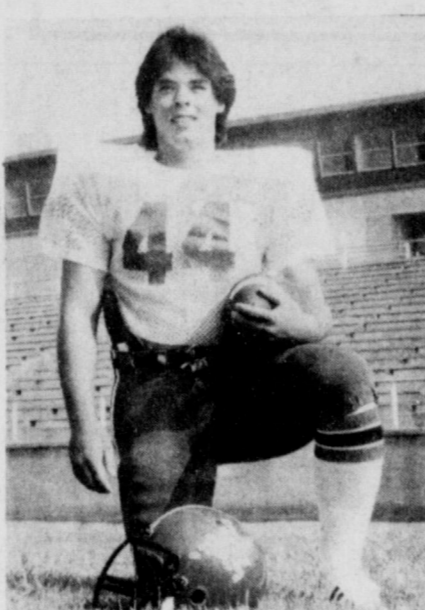

Area oil, gas report

Camino Corporation of Wichita Falls has staked location for five developmental wells in the Wichita County Regular Field. All five wells are to be in Wichita County's Denton County School Land Survey.

The No. 1 Circle-Dutton has a projected total depth of 1,867 feet and is to be located in a 2-acre lease, four miles northeast of Holliday.

Located seven miles northeast of Holliday, the No. 1 D&V-Sherrod is to be in a 10-acre lease. It has a projected total depth of 1,850 feet.

Another 1,850 foot well is to be in a 10 acre lease, seven miles west of Wichita Falls and is to be designated as the No. 1 D&V-E Sherrod.

The No. 1 D.D.&P-Dutton is in a 6-acre lease about 4.25 miles northeast of Holliday and has an estimated depth of 1,200 feet.

The fifth well is to be located in a 20-acre lease, five miles northeast of Holliday. The No. 1 D.D.&P Jackson has a proposed depth of 1,850 feet.

Location has been staked by Glenn Scott of Iowa Park for a 2,000 foot developmental probe in the Wichita Regular Field, four miles east-northeast of Holliday. The well is designated as the No. 1 Larry Grimes. Drillsite will be in an 8-acre lease in Wichita County's Denton County School Land Survey.

Electra-based Claude McIlroy has turned in first production figures for its No. 4 and No. 5 Bigson C, two successful developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field.

The wells are pumping at the rate of 4 and 16 barrels per day, respectively, both were tested on an open choke.

Drillsites were in a 40-acre lease in Wichita County's Waggoner Colony Subdivision, eight miles northeast of Electra. The wells both had total depths of 2,000 feet with top of pay being logged at 1,984 and 1,988 feet. Production intervals ranged from 1,982 to 1,994 feet into the holes.

Smi-Bro Equipment Company of Wichita Falls has filed for permit to drill a 1,900 foot developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, 15 miles west of Burkburnett. The well will be known as the No. 1 Williamson "A" Lease and is to be in a 109-acre lease of Wichita County's William Thorn Survey.

The No. 4 and 6 Seitz are slated to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field by Seitz-Hyde Producing, operator from Wichita Falls. With projected total depths of 2,000 feet they will be spudded in a 22-acre lease of the Denton County School Land Survey, six miles southwest of Wichita Falls, in Wichita County.

S.L. Mowrey of Wichita Falls has filed for permit to drill the No. 16 & 17 E.W. Bear, two 700 foot developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field, three miles southwest of Burkburnett. The operations will be in an 80-acre lease in Wichita County's BBB&CRR Survey.

M&A Oil Company, Ltd. of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 4,200 foot developmental probe in the Wichita Regular Field, eight miles southwest of Electra. The well will be located in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC RR Survey and is to be designated as the No. 3 Campbell "A".

The No. 1 Kempner "A", a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, is scheduled to be drilled two miles south of Kamay. F.T. Johnson, Jr. of Wichita Falls is listed as the operator. Location is in a 287-acre lease in Wichita County's SWVFL Subdivision. Projected total depth is 4,800 feet.

Pumping 16 barrels of crude oil per day, a new producer has been finalized in the Wichita Regular Field by Dunith Oil Company of Iowa Park.

The location is in a 299-acre lease in Wichita County's James Cole Survey, nine miles northeast of Electra.

Well's designation is the No. 12 Obenhaus.

The well was perforated to produce from an interval 1,844 to 1,852 feet into the hole. Total drilling depth was 1,888 feet, with the pay zone being entered at 1,844 feet.

Electra-based Jimco Oil Company has filed for permit to drill the No. 10 Obenhaus "D" and the No. 18 Obenhaus "C", two developmental wells to be located seven miles northeast of Electra. With projected total depths of 1,275 and 1,250 feet,

respectively, the wells are in a 30 and 80-acre lease of Wichita County's Waggoner Colony Subdivision.

The No. 4 VanMeter, a developmental try in Wichita County's K-M-A Field, is scheduled to

be spudded one mile southeast of Kamay. With projected total depth of 4,600 feet, the well will be in a 94-acre lease in the Kemas WVFL Subdivision. Texo Oil Company of Wichita Falls is listed as the operator.
